Notice To Parents Of Cross Plains I.S.D. Students

This is a reminder of the current policy regarding traffic when taking and picking up your children from school. All children should be let out in front of the elementary building. Please use this as your designated "drop off" place. Buses, maintenance vehicles and teachers will enter the north gate between the playground and auditorium and will enter the back parking lot in this way. This should minimize confusion and increase safety for our students. If you must enter the east parking lot in the mornings, please remember it is a one way system going north to south with the exit at the gym. In the afternoon at the 2:26 Primary dismissal, the one way system is reversed. Parents are asked to make a single lane for pick-up with entrance being between the gym and ag shop with exit between the playground and auditorium. Gates by the playground will be closed at all other times during the school day with no traffic allowed.

School officials, city police and parents ask that you be extremely careful in driving by the school in the mornings and especially in the afternoons at the 3:15 dismissal. Many people are driving through the school zone at excessive speeds and without regard to the safety of students who are crossing the street. Please slow down and take care when driving through the school zone.

All visitors must check in through the office when coming into the building to pick up students or for a conference with a teacher. If you are wanting to check your child out for a medical, dental or other appointment, you must come to the office and sign the "sign out" sheet, then office staff will get or send for your child.

Robert E. Howard House Proclaimed National Treasure

The Director of the National Park Service has announced that the Robert E. Howard House in Cross Plains was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on August 19, 1994. The National Register is our country's honor role of significant cultural resources worthy of preservation, and the listing of the Howard House in the National Register acknowledges the enduring and far reaching accomplishments of the Cross Plains native to the area of popular literature. The Howard House is also the first Callahan County property listed in the National Register.

In 1906, Robert Howard was born in Peaster, Parker County, and, in 1919, moved to Cross Plains with his parents, Dr. Isaac Mordecai and Hester Ervin Howard. Robert had already determined to become a writer, although he labored without success until his first story was published in 1924 in *Weird Tales*, a pulp fiction magazine which specialized in supernatural fiction.

Howard was a prolific writer whose greatest love was for historical fiction but who wrote and published stories in most of the genres represented by the popular pulp magazines of the day. Although his early career was shaky, the self-taught Howard soon mastered the art of story telling and, by 1929, he was regarded as a successful pulp author. Among the most highly regarded stories in his diversified output were his westerns; in his twelve year career, Howard wrote over forty westerns, including three successful series of humorous westerns featuring larger-than-life characters whose adventures were reminiscent of those of Pecos Bill.

However, the majority of his works was for the supernatural and fantasy magazines in which he had begun his career. In 1929, with the publication of "The Shadow Kingdom," Howard created a new subgenre of fantasy literature, heroic fantasy or "sword and sorcery," described by one author as "the purest escape fiction there is." Three years later, he wrote the first story which featured his most famous creation, Conan the Cimmerian, who soon became one of the most popular characters to appear in *Weird Tales*. Between 1932

and 1936, Howard wrote a total of twenty-one Conan stories; the series proved to be Howard's most successful, and the appearance of the character on a magazine cover was a guarantee of sales. On June 11, 1936, despondent over the impending death of his mother, Robert Howard committed suicide.

Although the first book collection of Howard's fiction had appeared in 1935 in Great Britain, the first American collection of his stories was not published until 1946. In 1950, the Conan stories were first collected in book form. In 1966, following the success of the first paperback editions of J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Hobbit* and *The Fellowship of the Ring*, Lancer Books began publishing a series of Conan paperbacks, including Howard's original stories, as well as stories left unfinished at Howard's death and completed by other writers. The series was immediately successful and most of Howard's other fiction, including stories not published in his lifetime, was published in both paperback and hardbound editions. Thirty years after his death, Howard's fiction became a multi-million dollar business, with millions of copies in print in America and at least sixteen other countries, and spawned an industry of merchandising, pastiches, and posthumous collaborations. Howard's works and characters were adapted to other mass media, as well, including a movie featuring Conan, as portrayed by Arnold Schwarzenegger in 1982, followed by a sequel two years later.

Listing of the Howard House in the National Register honors the writer regarded as one of the twentieth century's major influences on fantasy literature, as well as Project Pride, which undertook the preservation and restoration of the house in 1989. According to Curtis Tunnell, Texas State Historic Preservation Officer, there are few restrictions which accompany National Register listing. However, the formal recognition afforded by the listing will hopefully encourage the preservation of the house by its owners and by governmental agencies. In some cases, Tunnell noted, some National Register programs may be available to assist in the preservation of the property, including grant-in-aid.

"Project Pride is grateful to Steven E. Mitchell, National Register coordinator

for Historic Preservation, State of Missouri, who prepared our application for nomination and who accompanied it to Austin for review by the Texas Historic Commission Review Board. Steve is a Howard fan who, with his wife, has visited the Howard home several times making notes and taking pictures. We thank him; for now Cross Plains and Callahan County now have a National Treasure!" John Adams, president of Project Pride stated.

Vaccines Available At Cross Plains Multi-Purpose Center

The Texas Department of Health will be offering flu, pneumonia and tetanus diphtheria vaccines for people in the following high risk categories: persons 55 years old and older; adults and children with chronic heart or lung disorders, including children with asthma; people under medical care for chronic metabolic diseases, kidney or blood problems or weakened immune systems; and children 18 and younger who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy and therefore may be at risk of developing Reye Syndrome after influenza.

Vaccines will be available at the Cross Plains Multi-Purpose Center on Tuesday, October 11 from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 to 3:00 p.m.

The charge for these services are based on a sliding scale, based on income and family size. The amounts will be either \$0, \$5 or \$10, but no one will be denied service.

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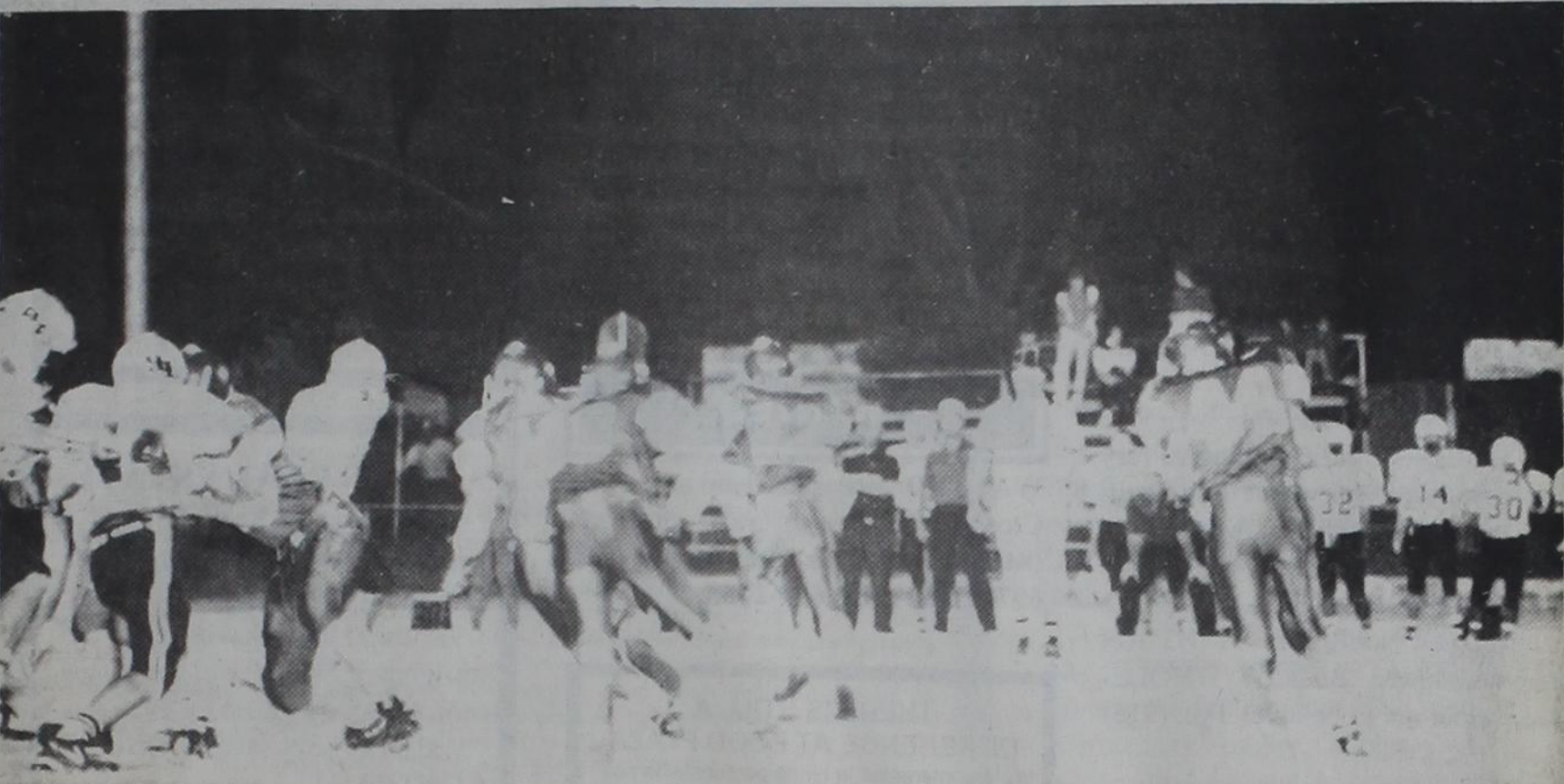

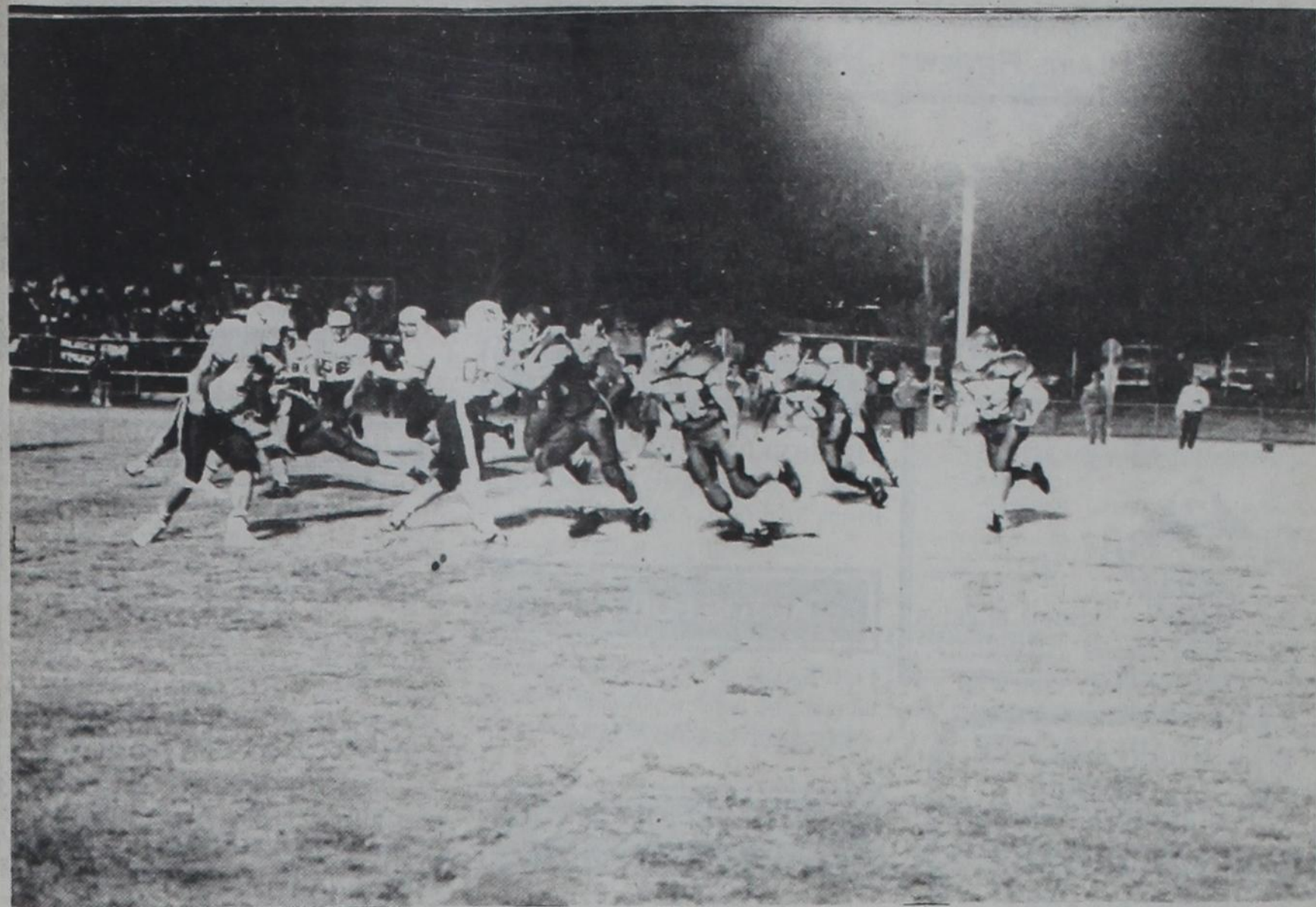
The Doggies first possession resulted in a TD on their second play from scrimmage on a 70 yard run. The PAT was good.

But it's life that the game is all about. Just as I said.

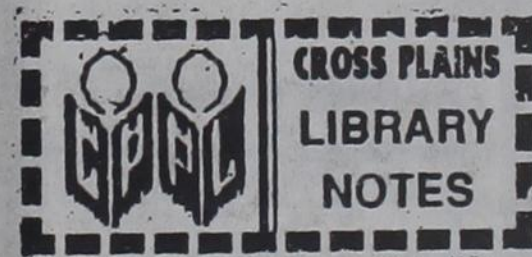
Because every game is life. And life is a game. A serious one. Dead serious.

Veteran News

DEADLINE NEARS—Vietnam Veterans are again reminded of the cutoff date of December 31, 1994 for filing with the Agent Orange Veteran Payment Program. An Application for Payment Kit may be requested by calling 1-800-225-4712.

Persons eligible for payments under the Agent Orange Veteran Payment Program are:

Vietnam Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange while serving in or near Vietnam at any time between January 1, 1961, and December 31, 1971, and who became totally disabled before their 60th birthday.

Surviving spouses or dependent children of deceased Vietnam Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange while serving in or near Vietnam during that same period, and who died before their 60th birthday. **NOTE:** The Program will not make payments for disabilities or deaths caused by accidental, traumatic, or self-inflicted injuries.

Veterans and/or survivors are urged to call for an Application Kit as soon as possible. It will all end on December 31, 1994.

TEXAS COLLEGE SAVINGS BONDS—The Texas Veterans Land Board will soon offer its fifth issue of Capital Appreciation College Savings Bonds. The College Savings Bonds program, adopted by the Texas legislature as a means of encouraging Texas to save for the education of their children, has proven quite popular since the bonds were first issued in 1989.

These bonds differ from most others issued by the state in that they are capital appreciation bonds available in small denominations. It is anticipated that the bonds, which mature in 5 to 20 years, will be priced between \$280 (20 year) and \$770 (5 year). All will mature at \$1,000. The actual cost of the bonds will not be determined until the sale date, which is expected this month (October, 1994). Prices will be determined by market conditions prevailing at that time.

The bonds are exempt from federal income tax. For example, a bond purchased for \$280 that matures at \$1,000 will produce \$720 of tax-free income to the initial purchaser who holds the bond to maturity.

NEW NATIONAL CEMETERY—The Department of Veterans Affairs has announced the purchase of the 638 acre Mountain Creek site on the east side of Mountain Creek Lake southwest of Dallas for the new National Cemetery. The new cemetery will serve more than 500,000 Veterans, spouses and dependent children with a 75 mile radius. Burials are not limited to the 75 mile radius and any Veteran with other than dishonorable discharge, their spouse and dependent children may be buried there. Late 1995 is the target date to begin burials.

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"We're Not Vaccinating Our Children Enough"

The outbreak of whooping cough (pertussis, the 100-day cough) this year is a real warning to stick to vaccination schedules, this from Dr. Henderson at Public Health Services. Children should receive a DTP shot to protect against diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis at ages 2, 4, 6, and 15 to 18 months. They should receive a booster shot before they enter school, between ages 4 and 6. Be sure your children are vaccinated.

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
