

History's Dusty Pages Reveal Interesting Heritage

Searching through the dusty pages of life long spent, in order to place each branch of a family tree in its place, oft time reveals some very interesting facts and sometime produces some real "characters."

Both resulted as the history of the family tree of a Muleshoe man, Bill Woodard, 424 West Avenue B, unfurled.

A trail of relatives came from England in the 17th century when Nathan Tabor came to this country. He was the son of John Tabor, the seventh son of a family of 13 children. . . 10 sons and three daughters. Little else is known concerning his life with the exception of the names of his brothers and sisters.

The heritage trace reveals that the family of John Tabor settled in Virginia and was in-

deed an Englishman. His great grandfather was William Tabor and was a martyr of the Indians, leaving three children from which the Tabors descended. Down the trail of ancestry comes the marriage of Emma Tabor to William Crawford Woodard. Muleshoe's Bill Woodard is the third of nine children born to this union and is the great-great-grandson of Nathan and Elizabeth Taylor of who this story of unusual nature concerns.

The story was uncovered in Bryson City, N. C., and goes like this. Two tombstones, now in the Tabor Cemetery in Swain County's Brush Creek Community, were delivered 68 years after they were ordered. It took the Civil War, Sherman's march through Georgia and a fire to cause the delay.

Nathan Tabor, one of Western North Carolina's earliest pioneers, was born April 4, 1784, shortly after the end of the Revolutionary war. He died in Brush Creek country on February 16, 1851, after making arrangements for tombstones to be ordered for him and his wife after her death. He was to be buried, he said, between two huge oak trees on a hill near what was then the site of his home. The old log cabin since has been destroyed. Mrs. Tabor was to be buried at his side.

Elizabeth Tabor, Nathan's wife, died January 6, 1860. Relatives immediately sent to a firm at Tate, Ga., for tombstones to be inscribed as follows: "Nathan Tabor, Born April 4, 1784; Died February 16,

1851; 'Beneath This Rests an Honest Man' and 'Elizabeth Tabor, Born March 28, 1796; Died January 6, 1860; 'Blessed are the Pure in Heart for they Will See God.'"

The tombstones were to be of Georgia marble, five feet high, shaped something like obelisks, and attached at the base to a large marble slab covering the graves.

Apparently the firm at Tate had a backlog of orders and there was some delay. The tombstones were eventually made and stored in a large barn for shipment to Swain County. The stones were taken from a quarry near Tate. The barn was located near the quarry.

With the outbreak of the Civil War, priority was immediately given to war-related materials on the available transportation facilities.

The stones and their bases remained in the rather isolated barn until Sherman made his raid through Georgia near the end of the Civil war. A detachment of Sherman's troops drifted through the area and burned the barn.

A mound of ashes and debris left, soon blended with the countryside and apparently the barn and contents were forgotten during the long years in which that sector struggled to recover from the war.

In 1928, chance led to the unearthing of some of the stones and the Tabor stones, being of unusual shape, the discoverers rubbed off enough dirt and smoke stains to distinguish the word "Tabor." By coincidence, a woman named Tabor -- Hattie Tabor -- lived in Jasper, Ga., not far away. She turned out to

be a great-granddaughter of Nathan Tabor. She wrote a relative, John Dehart Tabor, who lived in Swain County, a grandson of Nathan Tabor. He went to Tate and made arrangements to have the stones shipped to Swain County in 1928. They arrived 68 years after they were ordered and were placed on the graves of Nathan and Elizabeth Tabor.

ONLY RECENTLY, more than 100 years after the tombstones were ordered, Verlin Tabor, another great-great-grandson, put the finishing touches to the arrangements made by this pioneer as he had asked them to be. Traces of the stump of one of the two oak trees is still visible near the tombstones. In spite of many cleanings, traces of Civil War smoke smudges are still in evidence.

Surrounding the graves of these early day settlers are the graves of six generations of Tabors and number about 100. Nathan was the first to be buried in the spot known as Tabor Cemetery.

Legend of the Tabor family goes that Nathan, as a very young man, was a friend of Daniel Boone. The story from the Carolinas and Georgia reveals that he and Boone once led a party across Cumberland but split up because of a difference of opinion. Tabor led his group to Chattanooga, then a small settlement. Some died of malaria, including Tabor's first wife.

Tabor returned to the mountains, settling near Franklin, where he met a man named Silver who owned a huge tract of mountain land called the "Silver Entry." This included

a large part of Swain County. Tabor bought a section covering what is now almost the entire Brush Creek section of Swain, settled there and built a house. He soon married again.

He was one of the original seven founders of the present Brush Creek Baptist Church. After many years as a respected community leader, he sensed the end and made his final arrangements for burial. Now, after 116 years after his death, he rests in quiet dignity, on a beautiful little hill, between the remnants of his two trees, his wife by his side, his tombstones in place as he wished, inscribed as he wished with faithful descendants respectfully keeping the 'little hill' fresh and green. Receiver Hurdled Through Window

Monday was a day of experiences for several Muleshoe merchants and especially for Leila Allison, owner of Allison Shoes. The string of events ended in the jailing of Robert Michael Dale, 20, for worthless checks.

"Around 10 a.m. Monday, a well-dressed man came into the store to purchase shoes. He tried on a pair of black Jarman Wing Tip shoes, liked them and decided he also needed the same style shoe in Cordova brown.

"He had no sooner decided on the two pair, then he decided he should have a pair of loafers. . . but by this time, I became suspicious due to some discrepancies in general conversation, so I decided to see how he was going to pay for the two pairs he had selected before finding his size in loafers.

"Upon telling him that I didn't seem to be able to find his size in loafers right now, we went to the counter and he immediately picked up a First National Bank check and filled it out for the amount of the purchase.

"I asked for his driver's license as identification. He said 'I have just been discharged from the Marines and have spent a year and one-half in Vietnam and do not have a driver's license.'"

"However, he produced a Social Security card and I wrote the number on the check.

"He then left the store," Mrs. Allison continued, "and I called the bank and found that he did not have an account."

"A short time later, I saw him passing the store carrying other packages, and ran out on the sidewalk and told him that I wanted to talk with him inside the store.

"He said: 'This is embarrassing and I am in a hurry.' Mrs. Allison said 'I took him by the arm and after some resistance by him, I managed to get him back inside the store told him I had checked with the bank and he didn't have the money on deposit. He asserted that he had made a deposit so I asked him to go get the cash. He didn't comply so I proceeded to remove the shoes he had purchased with the worthless check which he had worn from the store."

"This, he did not resist; and I turned to unwrap the shoes he had worn into the store to make the purchases, he grabbed them and ran out the back door." Police were called and the investigation began which led to the arrest of Dale.

Dale was given 30 days in jail, fined \$100, and \$44 court costs on the check charge and officers report that other merchants have checks which are being filed on.

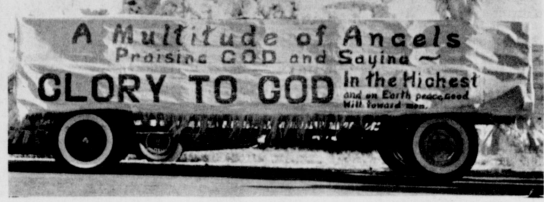

Judge, Teenagers Exchange Ideas in Pleasure, Duties

The FBI's Uniform Crime Reports, a compilation of statistics submitted voluntarily by local and state police agencies disclosed that for the first nine months of 1967 crime in the United States increased 16 percent over the corresponding period in 1966. The crime rate or the risk of becoming a victim

of crime increased 14 percent. These figures were released today by Attorney General Ramsey Clark.

In making those figures available FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover stated that nationwide the violent crimes as a group increased 15 percent. Individually, these crimes showed a 27 percent increase in robbery, 16 percent in murder, nine percent in aggravated assault, and seven percent in forcible rape. Each of the more voluminous property crimes recorded increases with auto theft up 17 percent, burglary 16 percent, and thefts over \$50 in value 15 percent. As a group, the property crimes registered a 16 percent rise.

According to the FBI's Uniform Crime Reports, the large core metropolitan cities of over 250,000 population showed an average 15 percent rise. The suburban communities recorded a 17 percent increase and the rural areas a 12 percent rise. Regionally the crime trends were consistent, ranging from an overall increase of 14 percent in the Southern States to an 18 percent rise in the North-eastern States. The North-Central States registered a 17 percent increase during the nine-month period and the Western States a 15 percent. Each region recorded increases in all crime classifications.

The FBI Director called attention to the significant increase in robbery on a nationwide basis and, particularly, to a 33 percent increase in armed robbery. He disclosed street robbery, which makes up over one-half of all robbery offenses, increased 27 percent, business house robberies 36 percent, service station robbery 26 percent, chain store robberies 33 percent, and robbery of residences 10 percent. Bank robbery continued its sharp upward trend with a 60 percent increase during the nine-month period in 1967 over the same months in 1966. The FBI Director also singled out a marked 22 percent increase in the use of firearms in aggravated assaults.

According to the FBI figures, the nationwide burglary increase of 16 percent continued to be influenced by an 11 percent increase in daytime burglary of residences. Burglaries of non residences rose 18 percent.

In the larceny category purse-snatching increased 23 percent, thefts of personal property from automobiles 17 percent, pocket-picking 14 percent, and shoplifting 11 percent during the nine-month period. Assuming the 1967 crime trend as recorded during the first nine months continues at the same level through the last quarter, Hoover noted there

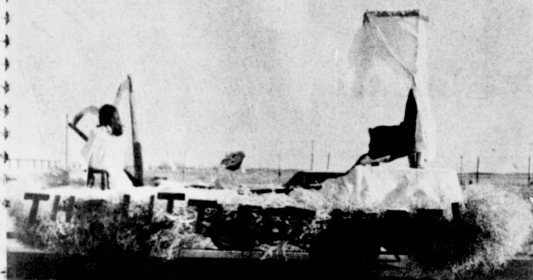

tically over recent years. These continuing crime increases are too often treated routinely and rationalized as a burden to be tolerated in today's changing society. The time for concerted action cannot be delayed any longer. State and local police agencies must have the support of all citizens and all levels of government. State and local police agencies need to improve their capability in the prevention and solution of crime, and thereby, increase the risk of detection. To accomplish this, increased financial support is necessary to raise selection and training standards, develop modern communication and information systems, and to further supply new technologies to all aspects of the law enforcement effort."

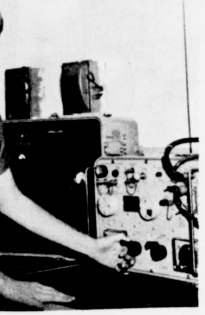

Cotton Outlook Brightens With Expansion Programs

Prospects for market expansion, more acres, and greater profits for farmers appear bright in the years ahead, a speaker told the Plains Agricultural Forum here today.

Clifton Kirkpatrick, Memphis, director of field service, National Cotton Council, noted that the market for fiber is expanding at the rate of a million bales a year in the United States and slightly more than that overseas.

The greatly expanded research and promotion effort, spearheaded by the Cotton Producer's Institute through the National Cotton Council, is working in cotton's favor in bidding for this growing market, he declared.

He cited West Texas cotton industry leadership for its key

role in making this program possible. He figured prominently, he noted, in CPP's organization in 1961 and in the campaign to effect the Cotton Research and Promotion Order. Financial support from this area, he explained, is a substantial portion of the total.

West Texans, he continued, are active in the administration of the program with Roy

B. Davis of Lubbock secretary of the Cotton Board and Howard Alford, Lubbock, vice president of CPI. Serving as CPI trustees are Roy Forkner and Joe B. Pate of Lubbock, J. D. Smith of Littlefield, L. C. Unfried of Tahoka, and Aubrey L. Lockett, Vernon.

Kirkpatrick pointed out that the industry's direct investment in cotton research and promotion has been virtually

doubled through the eight million dollar CPI program.

Some \$5.3 million is being budgeted for cotton promotion in 1968. This includes \$2,850,000 for national magazine advertising, \$1,261,000 for sharing the cost of newspaper ads with local stores, and \$14,000 for joint projects with major retail chains.

Improving the quality of cotton products -- with particular attention to durable press and easy care -- is the goal of an \$850,000 research allocation. Another \$400,000 will be directed toward developing new products and \$750,000 toward reducing costs of controlling insects, diseases, and weeds.

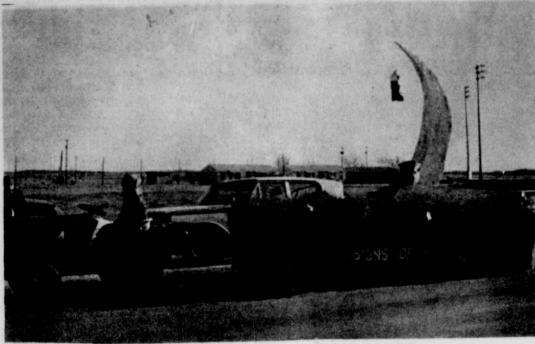
Expansion in CPI -- plus matching funds from others with a stake in cotton research and promotion -- should add some \$25 million to \$30 million to the total effort for cotton next year, he told the forum.

The National Cotton Council, which has made its staff and facilities available to CPI since 1961, will continue to service the program, thus avoiding staff duplication and overhead expense. This makes it possible also for other industry groups, through the Council, to share with cotton growers in financing cotton research and promotion.

Research expenditures by all agencies in behalf of cotton presently are estimated at \$26 million annually. This includes that of the Department of Agriculture, land grant colleges and experiment stations, allied industries and foundations, Plains Cotton Growers and other cotton organizations, Cotton Producers Institute, and the National Cotton Council.

Domestic sales activity, he explained, was pioneered by the Cotton Council and was greatly augmented when CPI was organized in 1961. Matching funds multiply the industry's direct investment, swelling the total promotion outlay to an estimated \$12 million to \$16 million annually. This could be as high as \$28 million in 1968.

Promotions patterned after the Cotton Council are being conducted in 14 major cotton-consuming countries, he noted. Their expenditures, including matching funds from industries in these countries, amount to more than \$7 million.

The House Republican Task Force on Crime Tuesday unveiled plans for a "comprehensive legislative" attack on the three major money makers of organized crime: gambling, narcotics trafficking and loan-sharking. They pegged the "take" for these racket activities at "nothing less than \$10 billion a year -- \$50 for every man, woman and child in America."

Federal statutes specifically aimed at those offenses "are largely inadequate," Congressman Bob Price, a member of the GOP Crime Task Force charged, and said "no legislation of significance in these areas has been enacted since 1961."

In a prepared statement, the Task Force outlined its plans for a program "aimed directly at the three most lucrative racket activities. In some instances we will modernize old proposals; in others, we will make recommendations to fill the gaps in existing laws; in still others, we will propose new laws where none now exist," they said.

Because "organized crime cannot be met with programs whose impact will not be felt for twenty years, immediately effective solutions are required," the Crime Group said, and these are "laws and law enforcement."

Price reiterated his support for legislation which would permit court supervised electronic eavesdropping and which would broaden witness immunity procedures, but said that "pending Congressional action on these bills," the enactment of their new program would "greatly aid the Executive Branch" in the war against organized crime.

Price indicated that the first part of the program would deal with "loan-sharking" and that the legislation would be introduced hopefully in a day or so.

Largest Draft Quota Called Since Last Year

AUSTIN--State draft boards will be called upon to furnish 1,659 men for the armed forces in January, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

This quota is the biggest monthly call since November 1966, when the quota was 2,012 men.

This compares with quotas of 924 for December, 1,159 for November, 977 for October, 1,189 for September, and 1,421 for August.

The Texas quota of 1,659 for induction in January is the state's share of a national call for 34,000, all for the army.

The Selective Service boards will forward 5,455 men in January for pre-induction examination, Colonel Schwartz said, and they have scheduled 3,485 for this examination in December.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examination in January are scheduled to be mailed from state Selective Service headquarters on or about December 6.

December calls for the local boards already have been assigned.

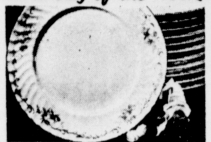

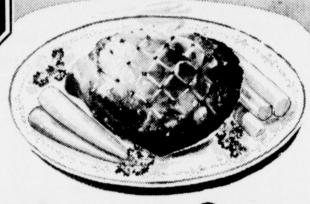
