The stones and their bases remained in the rather isolated barn until Sherman made his raid through Georgia near the end of the Civil war. A de-tachment of Sherman's troops drifted through the area and burned the barn.

A mound of ashes and debris left, son blended with the coun-tryside and apparently the barn and contents were forgotten during the long years in which that sector struggled to recover from the war.

In 1928, chance led to the un-earthing of some of the stones and the Tabor stones, being of unusual shape, the discoverers rubbed off enough dirt and smoke stains to distinguish the word "Tabor". By coincidence, a woman named Tabor -- Hattle Tabor -- lived in Jasper, Ga, not far away. She turned out to

be a great-granddaughter of Nathan Tabor. She wrote a relative, John DeHart Tabor, who lived in Swain County, a grandson of Nathan Tabor. He went to Tate and made arrange-ments to have the stones ship-ped to Swain County in 1928. They arrived 68 years after they were ordered and wree placed on the graves of Nathan and Elizabeth Tabor. 





the given to command and non-tars, colorful story of "Fight-ing Billy Woodsd" comesfrom Pumpkintown and goes some-this is the billy "Woodard, a bara-knuckle mauler with the strength of an ox, fought most of his life and never lost a fight. Fights fists made him a legend while he lived.

His first made him a legend while he lived. They gave him a name and a certain amount of fame in an era when backwoods sports tended toward the bloody, crude, bar-barous and cruel. For he reigned at a time when bear-baiting, dog-fighting, gan-der-puiling and rough- and-tumble fighting were still not too uncommon.

tumble fighting were still not too uncommon. "Fighting Billy" took on all comers for 30 years or more. He fought fist and skull, sometimes toot and nail. He retired without ever hear-ing of the Marquess of Queens-berry and his set of rules for boxing, which eliminated blows below the belt and the use of bare fists. "Fighting Billy" came out of the hills of Tennessee and settled in here around 1864. He came just a jump ahead of Col. George Kirk's rulhless band of marauders which "Fighting Billy" had taken some pot stots at while bil younged near his old home "That Kirk." he was fond of

vouacked near his old home place. "That Kirk," he was fond of relating years after the fact, "would come out of a mornin" and stand on a rock off back of the house and crow like a bantam rooster. I decided one mornin' I'd give him some-thin' to stop his crowin'. Missed got down by rifle-gun and got off a couple shots. Missed him clean as a whistle. So I flgured I'd better head across the mountains."


