

The Cross Plains Lady Buffs and Buffaloes competed in the Region II-A Track and Field Meet at Abilene Christian University this past weekend. Cross Plains' highest finisher was junior Malyssa Sowell who finished second in the discus. Sowell shattered her own school record with a throw of 126 feet 10 inches. To my knowledge, that is the second best throw in the state. Malyssa will compete Friday, May 10, at high noon in Austin. Malyssa also garnered points in the shot with her 6th place finish.

Freshman Laura Ricci equalled her school record by jumping 5'2" and placing third. This makes Ricci an alternate for the state meet. Laura barely missed 5'4" on her first attempt which would have given her a ticket

Senior Whitney Kirkham finished her Cross Plains athletic career in style with a school record setting 400 meter run. Whitney finished 5th overall and the new school record in the 400 is 63.79. The old record was held by Tamara Flippin who now runs for Angelo State.





He also has about 8 different varieties of mint including chocolate mint and orange mint. Also included are several varieties of garlic and onions. Vegetable wise Sunday: Cottonwood Baptist there's cabbage, several varieties of broccoli, some broccoflower, asparagus, and was preparing to plant black-eyed peas. Lots more vegetables are growing there including Jerusalem artichokes.

> Growing from various specially prepared logs, he is raising Shitake

mushrooms. He has lots more, too numerous to list in the gardens. Also fruit trees.

We toured some of the grounds. Beautiful, lots of trees, some "very" tall bamboo, honeysuckle (red), flowers, shrubs, also one interesting plant is his Confederate rose bush.

He also raises several varieties of fowls, guineas, emus and rheas, ie.

We walked down to the creek to view a father rhea sitting on a nest of eggs. Seems in the rhea world, the father does the actual hatching and raising of the young.

In their lovely home, we were able to view some fresh grown mushrooms he'd raised (for soup), and a "ve-err-r-ry" large pastel yellow rhea egg. The egg probably weighed at least one pound.

We really enjoyed the tour, the visit and some valuable information was absorbed for gardening.

As we left for home, we carried with us some horseradish to transplant, cilantro and cilantro seed, all presented by Rolan.

....And last but certainly "not" least the rhea egg. We prepared the egg for brunch Saturday morning and had enough left that we enjoyed it for supper (or dinner) as well.

# Garden Tip Of The Month

By ROLAN JONES

There is one garden seed catalogue that I recommend to anyone who has a vegetable or flower garden. It is PINE TREE GARDEN SEEDS, Box 300, Glouster, ME 04260, and is

This company was established in 1979 and I have been ordering seed from them since 1980. Their catalogue is 151 pages and contains 750 varieties of open pollinated, organically grown seed, including your regular Texas varieties, plus French, Italian, Chinese, Japanese and Latin American vegetables.

It also includes annual and perennial flowers, herbs, cover crops, books, pamphlets, bat, bird, and butterfly equipment, organic insect control, organic fertilizers, recipes, bedding plants, and much more.

The seed is high quality and low priced. Seed packs are priced from 45¢ to 90¢ per packet, with most in the 50¢ to 60¢ price range.

Harlequin bugs will soon become a pest problem on your cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, radishes, turnips, mustard, and other cabbage family crops.

The Harlequin bug is black, with orange markings, shield shaped, flat, and 3/8 inches long. The organic control for Harlequin bugs is to keep your garden well weeded, plant trap crops of mustard, use pyrethrum and sabadilla dust, or soap and nicotine sulfate (Blackleaf 40).

Squash bugs will be attacking your squash, watermelons, cucumbers, and cantaloupes this summer. Organic control of the squash bug is to

plant nasturtiums, marigolds, and radishes around hills of squash to repel squash bugs, dust with sabadilla dust to kill adult bugs, and to hand pick adults and eggs. Another good way to avoid squash bugs is to wait until late summer to plant

The best organic control for all worm species in the vegetable gar-BACILLUS THURINGINIESIS. This is a species specific pathogen which attacks only members of the lepodoptera family of insects. (Moths and But-


Butterfly larva (worms) are not destructive to most garden vegetables, so are seldom found in the vegetable garden. Therefore, the use of BT in the garden will have a minimal effect on butterflies.

BT controls cabbage loper, cut worms, corn earworms, tomato worms, and many others found consuming your garden.

BT is sold under several brand names, one being Dipel, and is available in most garden centers.

The Farmer's Almanac says that the best planting days in May for root crops is May 11th and 12th and 15th and 16th. Above ground crops is the 17th, 20th, 21st, and the 28th through 31st. The best time to plant flowers is the 20th, 21st and 22nd, with the 30th and 31st being food days also. The best time to transplant is the 17th through the 24th.

# VETERANS NEWS

QUESTION: During what period of time does a Veteran have to use VEAP (Veterans Educational Assistance Program) or Montgomery GI Bill Education benefits?? ANSWER: There is a 10 year period from date of separation from active duty during which these benefits must be used. QUESTION: What about eligibility for payments under Chapter 32, the post Vietnam Era GI Bill. VEAP?? What is the latest date that a service person could contribute to VEAP?? ANSWER: Benefits are indeed available under that law for eligible Veterans. To be eligible, service members must have contributed before April 1, 1997.

QUESTION: Is it possible for long before we have stopped service persons currently eligible for the VEAP educational assistance program to become entitled to the Montgomery GI bill?? ANSWER: Yes. A service member must be separated voluntarily after December 4, 1991, on either the special separation benefit (SSB) or voluntary separation incentive (VSI) programs.

QUESTION: Are any Veterans still entitled to receive educational payments under the Vietnam Era GI Bill?? ANSWER: No, not under that authority, known as Chapter 34. However, some Veterans from that period may be eligible for the

Montgomery GI Bill - Active Duty. INSURANCE Q & A: Who can I call if I have any questions concerning my National Service Life Insurance? Answer:VA insurance representatives are available to answer any insurance questions weekdays 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Eastern time at a toll free number, 1-800-669-8477. A 24hour Interactive Voice Response (IVR) system is available at the same toll free number for customers using a touch tone telephone to ask for specific information from their own insurance records.

STATE CEMETERY AT FORT BRAGG, NC----The Department of Veterans Affairs has announced the award of a \$792,353 grant to the State of North Carolina to develop a new State Veterans Cemetery in Fayetteville adjacent to the Ft. Bragg Army Base. The 55 acre cemetery will be located at the intersection of Bragg Boulevard and Murchison Road northwest of Fayetteville. Landscaping features will buffer

the cemetery from roadway traffic. To complement V A's National Cemetery System, the State Cemetery Grants Program has helped to develop, expand or improve 34 State Veterans Cemeteries by providing matching funds on a 50-50 basis. Since the program was established in 1980, V A has awarded 94 grants totaling more than \$41 million to 18 states and the Territory of Guam.
