Bagley Named To ARN All-Big Country Team

Cross Plains' Senior Shana Bagley has received another honor for her performance during the 1993-94 basketball season. Bagley, a 5 foot 6 inch wing on the 22-11 Lady Buff Varsity, was named this week to the Abilene Reporter-News All-Big Country Class A Basketball Team. She placed on the second team elite squad with a 12.3 points per game average. Shana also had a 4.3 rebound per game average, shot 55


percent from the floor, 55 percent from the free throw line, had 106 assists and 72 steals during her final year at Cross Plains. She has garnered the ARN award two of the past three years.

"Shana was definitely a leader for us this year, both on and off the floor." Lady Buff's Coach John Starcher commented. "Naturally I'd have liked to seen a few more players listed, but the Big Country is a large place to select a 10player squad! Shana has worked hard during practice and on her own, and the honors she receives reflects that. She will be missed!"

Bagley, a four-year starter for the Lady Buffs, earlier this year was named unanimously to the 1st Team 26-A All-District squad.

"This award is a real surprise to me," Bagley stated. "I really appreciate this honor. I've enjoyed our year, even though we did not finish where we wanted to. I thank my teammates for their support, also."

Montgomery Gains Regional Honor

Another post-season honor to a Cross Plains' Lady Buffs basketball player also arrived this week. Cross Plains High School Senior Heather Montgomery has been selected to the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches Girls All-Region II-A Third Team for 1993-94. This elite group of bank thall talent contains only 15 players in the Class A Region II area from Northeast Texas to the El Paso/Big Bend portion of

Montgomery, a 5 foot 10 inch post player for the Lady Buffs, averaged 11.3 points per game, 8.0 rebounds per game, shot 50 percent from the floor and 54 percent from the free throw line, and had 68 steals and 67 blocks for Cross Plains this past season.

"This is a very high achievement for any basketball player to receive," stated Coach John Starcher. "This is a hard group to get into. I've only had five other players win this award in the past 11 years. And when you consider how many schools are involved and how many thousands of square miles are in

the region, you have made a very select group!"

Coach Starcher also gave the work credit to Montgomery. "The TABC has recognized the hard work and efforts Heather has put into basketball. She has done anything asked of her for whatever was best for the team. I am very happy for and proud of her! She, too, will be missed!"

The TABC award came as a surprise to Heather. "Wow, that's great!" said Montgomery. "It's been a fun year and everybody worked real hard and gave their best. It has been a real priviledge playing for this team."

Kite Flying **Safely Tips** From WTU

·Never use wire, tinsel or any metal in kites or string--they can conduct electricity.

•Never fly a kite near power lines. Electricity always takes the path of least resistance to the ground. It could go through the string to your body. Choose a wide open field to fly kites.

•If a kite is caught in a power line, LEAVE IT THERE. Parents should call WTU for assistance, and properly trained personnel with safety equipment will take care of getting the kite down.

•Do not fly kites on rainy days when there is a possibility of lightning arcing to the string. Wet strings are good conductors of electricity.

Medicare **Enrollment** Reminder

"If you don't have Part B of Medicare and you want it, you have from now until March 31 to sign up," says Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. Every year, the government offers a three month enrollment period during which people who were turned down or previously dropped the Part B coverage can sign up for it.

Part B coverage, also called "medical insurance," helps pay for doctors' care, outpatient hospital visits, and other medical services. Individuals are offered the option of signing up for Part B at the same time they are automatically enrolled in Medicare's Part A program. Part A helps pay for inpatient hospital care and certain other services.

Individuals who want to sign up for Part B should call the Abilene Social Security office or call Social Security's toll-free number: 1-800-772-1213. Callers are advised to avoid peak business periods by calling later in the week and later in the month

WTU Continues Restructuring **Process**

moving into the next phase of the corporate restructuring announced last November. The effort involves the electric operating companies, service companies and other related parts of Central and South West Corportation (CSW).

"The changes are aimed at making CSW companies more productive and efficient in meeting customer needs, to maintain corporate shareholder value and to compete in the midst of deregulation of the electric utility industry, new environmental requirements, new technology and increasing customer expectation," said Glenn Files, WTU president and chief executive officer.

The reorganization process, which began in May 1993 and will continue over the next six months, means realignment of work groups, consolidation of support functions across the CSW system and within WTU, and fewer levels of management. The restructuring includes the relocation of a number of positions from CSW's four electric operating companies to its centralized services unit, Central and South West Services, Inc. Approximately 600 service company positions will be located in Tulsa, and another 250 will be in Dallas.

Employees reviewed the new structure and the process for staffing the structure during meetings held March 1-2. The result will be about 177 fewer positions at WTU, including about 80 in Abilene. WTU has 1,268 employees.

An early retirement program, announced in January by CSW, has been offered to 113 eligible employees at WTU. The program was offered so that long-service employes, who could be affected by job losses, would have the opportunity to choose an enhanced early retirement package or a lump-sum enhanced severance package.

The number of actual job losses will not be known until mid-summer, when the restaffing process is complete. During that process:

·Many employees will fill their same or similar jobs:

·Some will change jobs or relocate within WTU or the CSW System:

•Some eligible employees will choose the enhanced early retirement or enhanced severance options; and

·Some will not have jobs. Throughout the CSW System, the

number of positions eliminated is about 10 percent of the system workforce of 8,800, and 726 employees are eligible for early retirement. Enhanced relocation packages and severance benefits are also provided for employees as part of the restaffing process.

WTU is one of four electric operating subsidiaries of CSW, an electric utility holding company based in Dallas, Texas (NYSE: CSR). Other operating companies are Central Power and Light Company, based in Corpus Christi, Texas, Southwestern Electric Power Company, based in Shreveport, La., and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, based in Tulsa, Okla, Other CSW subsidiaries include Central and South West Services, which provides services at cost to the electric operating companies.

CSW Services, located in Dallas, has been divided into CSW Operation Services, which will move to Tulsa, Okla., and CSW Production Services, which will remain in Dallas, along with the CSW corporate headquarters and other non-electric subsidiaries.

The restructuring involves centralization of support functions to gain economies of scale and eliminate duplication among the various companies. For example, many finance, accounting, information services, and transmission and substation engineering functions which had been performed at WTU and the other operating companies will now be performed for the operating companies by employees at CSW Operation Services in Tulsa. The corporation also will gain efficiencies through CSW Production Services' centralization and coordination of planning, fuel purchases and operation of power plants throughout the CSW System. This will help WTU and CSW stay competitive as low-cost energy providers.

The new structure includes fewer levels of management and broader spans of supervision. The organization has been "flattened" to improve internal communication, reduce cost and empower employees, especially those on the front

lines dealing with customers. "This new structure will put our em-

West Texas Utilities Company is ployees in a better position to improve our customers' satisfaction, make faster decisions, be more flexible in their operations and reduce cost," Files said.

> With the new structure determined, a systematic process of internal restaffing has begun to place the best available candidates in the new organization. "In our communication with employees throughout this reorganization process, we have emphasized our intent to treat employees, fairly, consistently and with dignity during the restaffing stage," Files

Most positions will be filled by early June, with most relocations and other changes completed by the end of the

Conservation Program

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) is a conservation costshare program that involves a long-term contract between a landowner and the USDA. GPCP is administered by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS). The program provides federal funds to help apply needed conservation practices on farms and ranches. The term of the contract may be a minimum of three years to a maximum of ten years.

"The Great Plains Conservation Program is tailor made for ranchers because it provides cost-share assistance for many conservation practices that would otherwise be to costly for many ranchers to undertake on their own," says Chance Walker, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Baird.

Examples of conservation practices approved for cost-share include: chemical and mechanical brush control, prescribed burning, interior crossfences, livestock ponds, livestock water well drilling, livestock water pipelines, range seeding, terrace construction, etc.

Minimum requirements to be eligible for GPCP is at least 50 acres or a livestock carrying capacity of 8 animal units. In addition, the land cannot have been under GPCP at anytime during the past ten years.

A landowner may receive up to "Every spring, Texans head back to \$35,000 in cost-share funds per the land owned by that ownership within the County. These cost-share funds pay costs to apply conservation practices. The average costs are review and revised frequently by the SCS based on actual costs to apply conservation practices in that area.

> The landowner develops a Conservation Plan of Operations (CPO) with the assistance of the SCS in order to meet the landowners goals in keeping with the needs of the land. After the CPO is approved and funded, SCS personnel

After the conservation practices are installed the landowner will be required

to follow certain management items such as proper grazing use, crop residue use, etc. in order to insure that the conservation practices will last for the life of the contract and beyond. "Followup management is critical to the success of conservation practices so that the initial problem does not occur again in the future," says Walker.

A GPCP contract is a legal binding contract between the landowner and the SCS. Components of the contract may be modified for sound technical reasons. If a landowner fails to implement the program he then is put into violation and may be subject to refunding all of the cost-share funds received during the term of the contract.

All applications will be prioritized on a needs basis and funded according to the amount of money available during that fiscal year. Application may be placed anytime during the coarse of the year. 

Don't have a cow, man! A southern New Jersey businessman admitted in court Friday that he illegally made and sold molds for copyrighted figurines, including Bart Simpson.

Among the aggrieved parties are such giants as Mattel Toys, DC Comics and Warner Brothers, who had gotten civil judgments against H. Stewart Maggard of Atco, N.J. several years ago.

But it took a tiny Abilene maker of doll molds to get Maggard brought up on criminal charges. Maggard now faces up to a year in prison and a \$100,000

In 1992, Vicki Anguish, operator of Vicki Anguish Originals in Abilene, caught wind that Maggard's business Alamo Mold Co. was selling molds of figures she held copyrights for.

She called the FBI.

"He got run out of doll shows for the things he was doing," Anguish said Friday from her one-woman operation in Abilene. "I probably lost half my business while he was doing that."

Planting is in full swing in flower and vegetable gardens, and it is a good time to re-evaluate landscape plantings. Remove shrubs and trees damaged by freezing or drought or even old age and replace with new ones.

Knowing something about the plants your are considering can save time and money. For instance, are they prone to insects and disease? Will they do well in your soil? Will you have adequate sun or shade for them? Can you supply enough water? How large will they be after a few years growth and will you still be comfortable where they are planted? A qualified nursery man can answer all

It is not always cheaper to buy small one-gallon size plants or trees, as larger or taller one in 3-5 gallon size will have a much deeper root system for a greater margin of error during summer droughts. They will also give you that immediate impact of a more mature landscape.

When transporting plants from the nursery to home in the back of a pickup they must be protected from the drying winds and sun of the highway. Wrap the branch canopies with burlap or even an old sheet. Pad the trunks to prevent damage. Always handle plants by their soil ball, not the trunks or branches.

Once home, plant as soon as possible in well prepared soil, rich in organic matter and adequate root space. Your plantings will be no better than the soil you provide for them. Fertilize with quality slowrelease plant food. A 3-1-2 ratio fertilizer is best for most Texas plantings, as well as lawns. Healthy, vigorous plants ward off insects and disease much more effectively than undernourished ones. Don't forget the ever important mulch-



At one time the ranch encompassed an area which ranged south to San Angelo, including the present Ballinger area, and back to the present location. The ranch now is a 27,000 acre ranch and is currently owned by the descendents of Mr. Odom.

The Chadbourne ranch has done a remarkable job in preserving the atmosphere that existed more than a century ago. The ruins of old fort Chadbourne still stand silently above the rolling hills and lush pasture lands. The ranch still teems with deer, wild turkey and other game, as it has for so many years. Camped out under the stars, it's not difficult to let your mind drift back a hundred
