> Some Memories of the Cross Plains Schools and Town

When Vanda asked me to write some of my memories of the Cross Plains School, I realized that my memories are threefold as a student, a parent, and a teacher.

In the 1930's, the years of the Great Depression, a young, handsome man came to head the Cross Plains Schools, along with his able principal and a faculty of fine teachers. During those years, many successful students graduated from Cross Plains. This era produced doctors, dentists, football coaches, teachers, FBI agents, military leaders, and fine wholesome parents and a regional football team!!

To say that Nat Williams and his staff were strict was the understatement of the century. But it worked! During those years when I had the privilege of being a student, Cross Plains had an outstanding school.

When I came back to teach in Cross Plains in the sixties, my own children were high school students, one a freshman and one a sophomore. The town, the faculty, and students welcomed them with "open arms". It was overwhelming! They felt so welcomed and

As a teacher, I was assigned to the junior high and elementary schools. The late Jack Watkins was the principal. He was a man of great dignity, a wry sense of humor, and a subtle way of wording things. This was a time of transition where girls' dresses were getting shorter, and the boys' hair was getting longer.

Mr. Watkins said many times that junior high was the hardest place in school to teach. He said, "You don't have to be crazy to teach junior high, but it surely helps!"

I remember this skinny eighth grade girl bending to drink at the water fountain. Mr. Watkins walked by and said, "Zada, you have so many pretty blouses, why don't you get a skirt to wear with them?" (nuff said!)

Two lovely young ladies began teaching for Mr. Watkins, I doubt that they would have survived the temperamental girls who cried over grades given in red ink and very active boys, without Mr. Watkins' understanding, encouragement and support.

Today, the ladies are two of the finest

teachers in the Cross Plains School. At one trying day in junior high, one of the young ladies asked some of older teachers how much her Teacher Retirement would be after one year of teaching? We told her "not very much!"

One of my favorite memories in junior high was of this pair who should have been named Mutt and Jeff. They were inseparables. One was about 6'4" and weighed about a 100 pounds (soaking wet) and the other was about 5'4" and stocky built. They had devious ways of giving teachers "acid tests", such as the uses of graffiti and mimeographing!

The last day of school in the eighth grade, one of the above mentioned pair, gave me a letter. I kept and treasured this letter for many years. It read as follows:

Dear Mrs. Spencer

I have been a lot better to you this year than you deserved, but I'll have to say, you have "guts" and nerves of steel.

Love, Richard

I hope Richard's evaluation of me will see me through another Cross Plains Homecoming!

jury commission. The grand jury commission is chosen by the district judge. Other items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—The county commissioners' voted to approve the tax rate in Callahan County for the 1994-95 fiscal year. The county's tax rate totals .3553 cents per \$100 of property value. The rate approve by the commissioners is this year's effective tax rate, the tax rate which will generate the same amount of tax revenue as last year. The effective tax rate was slightly higher than last year's tax rate because of a \$6 million decline in the county's tax valuation. This year's tax rate includes .2724 cents per \$100 for general county and .0829 cents per \$100 for Farm to Market roads.

-County commissioners arranged for federal government food commodity distribution in the county on Wednesday, September 14.

-Commissioners' met with County Attorney Allen Wright in regards to the county attorney's budget using seized money. The county attorney must have the budget approved by the commissioners every year.

Wright stated \$9,408 in seized funds has been budgeted. He said \$6,000 will be used to supplement the county investigator's salary, \$1,719 will be used for office supply purchases and \$1,689 will be set aside for in-service school-

-County commissioners' tabled setting fees charged by the county sheriff and constables. The item is being tabled until the September 26 commissioners' court meeting date. -Commissioners voted to set the

early voting polling places in Callahan County for the upcoming general election in November.

The early voting locations include the Clyde Justice of the Peace office, the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace office and the County Clerk's office at the county courthouse in Baird.

Early voting for the November 8 general election will be held from October 19 until November 4. Early voting will take place at the three early locations during regular business hours from 8:00 1.m. until 5:00 p.m. weekdays.

# Varsity Buffs Equalize Dragons

In an exciting offensive game played at Buffalo Stadium on Friday, September 16, the Cross Plains Buffaloes and the Class II A Bangs Dragons played to a tie game 27-27. Scoring by quarters went as follows:

The game stats balanced out fairly evenly also. The Buffs out paced the Dragons in first downs and total rushing. The Dragons had more passing yardage, fewer fumbles and less penal-

First downs: Cross Plains had 18 while Bangs only had 12.

Rushing: Cross Plains had 37 carries for 259 yards while Bangs had 33 carries for 136 yards.

Passing: Cross Plains had 12 attempts with 6 complete and 2 interceptions and Bangs had 20 attempts with 5 complete and 1 interception.

Fumbles: Cross Plains had 4 while Bangs only had 2.

Penalties: Cross Plains had 8 for a total yardage of 70 yards and Bangs had 8 for total yards of 60.

Punts: Cross Plains had 3 for a total of 40 yards and Bangs had 2 for a total of 35

In the first quarter, the Buffs scored first (with 4:55 left) on a 50 yard run by Jimmy Lee. Cory Switzer's PAT was good. Bangs scored twice in the time remaining.

Bangs scored one more time in the second quarter before the Buff's Matt Reed caught a 10 yard pass from QB Brock Walker. Again, Switzer's kick was successful.

In the 3rd quarter, both team's defenses took control and neither team scored.

In the final quarter, the Buffs scored first on a 14 yard run by Cole Gilliam. Switzer's kick was good again. Bangs then made their final score. With 5:13 left in the game, Walker on a keeper took the ball 60 yards for the Buffs final TD. This time the kick failed and the score remained 27-27.

In the rushing game, Lee totaled up 98 yards; Gilliam ran for 93, and Walker carried for 76 yards.

Donnie Dillard was top receiver with 81 yards in 2 catches from Walker. Reed had 22 yards and Gilliam had 14 yards; both also receiving two a piece.

The Buffs record is now 1-2. On Friday, September 23, the game will be in Eden beginning at 8:00 p.m. That leaves only one more game before dis-

trict play begins.

# Zion Hill Cemetery News

The Callahan County Historical Commission reports that Mrs. Earl (Flora Clark) Rutherford has been identified as the Secretary-Treasurer, and only officer, of the Zion Hill Cemetery Association formed in 1962. The formation of this association, and the cemetery clean-up at that time, was mentioned in a recent issue of this newspaper.

LaVerne Rutherford of Baird, the daughter of the Rutherfords, has in her possession her mother's little vestpocket note pad listing the contributions made in 1962 and 1963. No activity is shown after 1963.

The names of all 1962 contributors were (amounts omitted): Mrs. Nalley, Earl Jobe, Jack Ledbetter, Mr. H.S. Hilburn, Dwight Black, E.W. Ledbetter, Fred Heyser, Earl Rutherford, P.M. Ray, Mr. Boland, Mr. Shrader, Roy Speegle, and Hewes and Black. Total: \$132.50

The 1963 contributors were: Mr. H. Hilburn, Mr. M.D. Hilburn, Mrs. Sprawls, Earl Rutherford, and F.P.

The last noted bank balance, March 18, 1963: \$19.34.

No disbursements were shown in this little note pad, nor any further activity. Several of the above named contributors apparently had no relatives buried in Zion Hill. However, there are perhaps 50 graves there with no marked tombstones, so there might be a relative in that group.

Zion Hill Cemetery was on land originally owned by Rusher Tanner. One of the Tanner daughters married a Heyser, and they were the parents of Fred Heyser, who owned the land for many years. It is owned now by Mr. Jackie Sanders.

## USDA NEWS

WASHINGTON-Sept. 13---The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation today asked for public comment on the support prices for pulled wool (wool on unshorn lambs) and mohair for the 1995 marketing year.

The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended (the Wool Act), the 2-year phaseout of the wool and mohair programs began with the 1994 marketing year. Producer payments for the 1995 marketing year will be calculated using the support prices covered by this proposed rule, but will then be reduced by 50 percent in accordance with the Wool Act. The Wool Act is in effect through December 31, 1995.

The Wool Act provides that the support price for pulled wool -- the wool removed from the pelts of unshorn, slaughtered lambs -- be set at a level relative to the shorn wool support price that will maintain normal pulled wool marketing practices. This provision has been implemented in the past through payments based on the live weight of unshorn lambs marketed.

The Wool Act also provides that the mohair support price be set at a level to maintain about the same percentage of parity as for shorn wool. Under the Wool Act, the mohair support price may be set at not more than 15 percent above or below the shorn wool parity

The shorn wool support price is determined by a formula specified in the Wool Act. Based on the current reported parity index, the 1995 shorn wool support price will be \$2.12 per pound, grease basis.

The proposed regulation is scheduled to be published in the Federal Register on September 16. Comments on the proposed regulation should be sent to: Director, Fibers and Rice Analysis Division, Room 3760-S, USDA/ ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013-2415 and must be received by October 17. A preliminary regulatory impact analysis on the options considered is also available from that office. Public comments will be available for inspection in Room 3756-S of USDA's South Building during normal business hours.



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

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
