One Cub Scouting purpose is showing how to be helpful and do one's best. Boys participating certainly did this and with the communities help have shown we can make a difference.


Rita Sanders

All houseplants should be inside or in a protected place by now. They won't require as much fertilizing until warm weather returns unless they are in a sunny

Daffodils can be planted right now, just be sure they are planted deep enough. Also, some wildflowers should be planted before winter.

After the "fall blooming perennials" quit blooming, clip them back, chrysanthemums to about 4 inches and asters to 8

If you are considering planting a shade tree, this fall is the best time. Pecan trees make a lovely shade plus delicious nuts. Wichita and Western are just two that grow well in our area. Some other long lived shade trees for our area are Shumard Red Oak, Chinquapin Oak, bur oak, live oak, Sawtooth Oak, and Southern Red Oak.

If you are putting in a new lawn, Titan Fescue can be planted this fall. It's a permanent year-round grass, the ideal planting time is now. It's a fine blade, deep rooted, dwarf grass developed especially for our part of the country. If you decide to plant new grass, do it soon and be sure to use 18-6-12 new lawn starter fertilizer according to label directions to get it off to a good start. There are several products to choose from our winterizing established lawns. Be sure to follow label directions.


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



Elks National Foundation **Grant Available**

Students planning to pursue a postsecondary vocational/technical course in a school or college leading to an associate degree, diploma, or certificate, but less than a baccalaureate degree, are eligible to compete for \$2,000 grants offered by the Elks National Foundation. The Elks National Foundation Trustees have set aside \$788,000 for the grants for the 1994/95 — 1995/96 school years. Each grant is for \$1,000 for each of the two years.

A total of 394 grants are available, at least one per state, with additional grants allotted according to Elks' donations within each state. One grant will be of-

fered to a student from Puerto Rico and one to a student from Guam or another Pacific Island.

Although graduating high school scniors are eligible to apply, older students who desire training or re-training are also encouraged to apply for these grants. A high school diploma or GED is not required. Students who plan to transfer to four-year colleges or universities are not cligible.

Applications are available from financial aid officers at community, technical, and junior colleges, as well as local Lodges of the B.P.O. Elks of the U.S.A. Application deadline is November 19, 1993, and applications must be submitted to the student's local Elks Lodge. (If you need assistance in locating the nearest Elks Lodge, consult your local telephone directory or contact the Elks National Foundation, 312-929-2100.) Each state's applications will be judged by a panel selected by the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT).

Nominations

The gifted and talented program for the school district is a Kindergarten through 12th grade program. The emphasis for this program is on reading skills. Identification for G/T is in the spring.

Students who are nominated take a series of tests in order to be identified. To measure intelligence, the district is using a test called Structures of the Intellect. The test consists of approximately twelve parts that measure different areas of intelligence — it does not give a single intelligence score — instead, we are looking for several areas of strength.

This test also measures creativity. We watch this score closely, since creativity is often another indication of giftedness. Parents and teachers are sent questionaires. Their opinions are good indicators of whether or not giftedness may be present.

Kindergarten students produce a portfolio of work under the direction of the G/ T teacher. Older students are required to produce writing samples. These work products are scored. Test scores, parent/ teacher questionaires, and the work products are all put together on a profile

The district has a G/T committee. It is composed of principals, the G/T coordinator, a classroom teacher, and the G/T teachers. The G/T committee reviews the profiles of each student nominated for tested. Obviously, the district is looking for the highest scores in each area. Students must meet district criteria in at least three of the five areas. Parents are notified of the results.

In the fall, the district requests nominations from the teachers and the counselor. The district would also like nominations from parents and the community.

If you have a child, or know of a student in Cross Plains that you would like to nominate for testing for this program, please fill out a nomination form that is available at the elementary or high school. The nomination period will end on November 30.



Dear Editor:

I would like to tell you how much I enjoyed the history of the Baptist churches in Cross Plains, written by Jack Scott. I've always appreciated his writings through the years, and will never forget when he was our editor here. But I was especially pleased to read this one because I have been wanting to get the history of the churches at Pioneer for some time now; and since the idea of putting Pioneer back on the map, as it were, introduced by the Good Old Days, headed by Nelda Weiss and Barbara Powell, I have greater hopes of this dream coming to pass.

I am interested in everything about Pioneer. I was born and raised there and have lived in and around there most all of my 92 years. The churches in Pioneer have been of the utmost importance to me all these years. The Baptist, Methodist, and Church of Christ, while the Presbyterians never had a church in Pioneer. there were also good friends of mine that belonged to the Presbyterian Church. I mention these four churches because back then, approximately 1904 to 1910 before the railroad came, these were about the only churches most of us knew about. Everyone was welcome to attend any of these churches services, regardless of church affiliation. Every summer they held camp meetings together, revivals, etc. I loved all these churches and people and still do, but the purpose of writing this is to let you know that amid all these plans that the club has, I wanted to point out to you that may not know that there are still two churches in operation in Pioneer: the Baptist and the Pentecostal. The Baptist Church is in the south central part and the Pentecostal Church is across the street from the Pioneer Club House. We plan on having these churches open December 4, 1993, the day of the planned celebration.

We hope to have pictures and different things of interest about our churches and Pioneer. Some one will be at the churches to answer your questions about the history of Pioneer churches. There has always been a Baptist Church in Pioneer, but the Pentecostal Church was built in 1926. You can find out a lot about it if you walk over a few hundred yards from the club house.
