

Herald Of Truth Finds Messages Of Faith

The Church of Christ in Cross Plains is pleased to announce that the television special, "Memorials with a Message," will be airing locally on Sunday, August 21, at 10:30 p.m. on channel 32 (cable channel 7). This program is produced by Herald of Truth, a media ministry of churches of Christ

Herald of Truth's television crew has been in Washington, D.C., filming memorials with a message—literally. The TV special with that name, the fourth of the In God We Trust Campaign, will feature several national memorials that offer messages of faith in God.

A stained glass window in the prayer room of the Capitol Building shows George Washington kneeling in prayer below the inscription "One Nation Under God." The Latin phrase, "Laus Deo," which translates "Praise be to God," is found on top of the Washington Monument. And several verses of scripture, including, "The judgments of the Lord are true and righteous altogether," can be seen in Lincoln's second inaugural address, which is mounted on the wall of the Lincoln Memorial.

The special focuses on Christ as the answer, some of the reasons our society has strayed from that answer, and encouragement for individuals to look to Christ for their guidance and direction.

"As we lead Americans back to God. our nation will be healed," said Randy Becton, Herald of Truth's speaker featured in the special. "Our hope for the nation is to see more and more people ground their behavior on God's eternal principles. Our country needs laws with the moral authority that is based on the divine wisdom of God."

Plans have been made to broadcast "Memorials With a Message" nationally this summer, Becton said. "With all the changes taking place in America, this will be a timely message."



WTU To Seek Review Of Revenue, Change In Electric Rates

West Texas Utilities Company today announced it will file a petition with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) to start a process to review WTU's revenues, rule on proposed rate changes and implement lower interim electric charges to customers by 3.25

The petition, to be filed around August 25, will request that a review of WTU's revenues be conducted by the PUCT to determine if WTU's revenues should be adjusted. The petition proposes interim rates until the PUCT can complete this review.

Until a final PUCT order is implemented, interim charges to customers will be reduced by 3.25 percent, effective October 1, 1994

"The action to initiate this review process by WTU is quite remarkable since some other electric utilities have recently increased rates, "said Glenn Files, WTU president and chief executive officer.

WTU's customers have not experienced a base rate increase since 1987, even though the average overall cost of living

has increased nearly 30 percent over that

"WTU, however, has effectively managed the business and, as a result, we have remained financially strong. Our strong financial position has allowed us to be a key player with the communities we serve in economic development activities," Files said.

"The action we are announcing underscores our commitment to the growth and prosperity of the communities we serve," he added.

"Reasonable electric rates and rate options are important to our customers and to prospective customers. Therefore, WTU will use this process as an opportunity to introduce new rate options in response to market changes and modify or replace old rate options. These changes are necessary for WTU to continue to be responsive to the changing marketplace and to meet the needs of our customers," Files added.

"Our company has always had a commitment to ensuring that our rates are fair and that our customers are paying appropriate prices," he added.

"After reviewing our current and projected financial results and after discussions with the PUCT and others, we are announcing this action. The action will ensure that our customers benefit from activities that have resulted in efficiencies in our service to the customers, Files added.

"Also, as part of our commitment to ensure the benefits are passed to our customers in a timely manner, we are proposing to set the effective date for any revenue adjustment and new rates implemented as October 1, 1994, regardless of when the PUCT issues its final order," Files added.

"It is not clear at this time what the total amount of the overall base revenue change may be or what impact this overall base revenue change will have on customer bills. Those determinations will be made during hearings before the PUCT after a careful review of our financial numbers, the proposed rate changes and some assumptions made by the PUCT staff," Files added.

"But the point is that the overall base revenue that WTU receives from its customers for the electricity could be lower than it is today," Files added.

In addition to the PUCT review of utility rates, a city may also review and analyze its electric utility rates under another formal proceeding.

"We are proud of the strong relationships that we have with the communities we serve. It is from these types of relationships that we have been able to work together to benefit our customers," Files

ANDREW JACKSON SHEPHARD

Andrew Jackson Shephard Jr., 79, died Saturday August 13, 1994 at his home. Services were held Monday at 4 p.m. at Pioneer Baptist Church with Dwayne Clowers officiating. Burial was in Union Cemetery in Eastland County, directed by Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mr. Shephard was born in De Leon and was a barber and a member of Pioneer Baptist Church. He retired as a barber from the Vernon State Hospital. He was also a licensed minister and a WWII Veteran. He married Maudie Dawson in 1949 in Amarillo.

BUYING MEDALS-World War II Veterans can now buy military medals, ribbons, heraldry items and garrison caps at post or base exchanges. Previously, only retired military could shop for these items. The change in policy is a result of numerous requests to buy these items during the many 50th anniversary commemorations of WWII.

WWII Veterans must get permission from the base commander and provide proof of service, such as an honorable discharge. All items must be worn in accordance with military regulations. For more information, Veterans should contact their nearest base or post exchange.

COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENT— Barring any congressional conference battles, Veterans who receive VA disability compensation will receive a 3 percent COLA increase, effective December 1, 1994. The COLA would appear on the January 1995 check.

The COLA reflects the rise in the cost of living for the preceding year and is usually identical to the Social Security COLA.

ANN LANDERS SAYS-Having fun is a lot like insurance. The older you get, the more it costs.

VETERAN DISAPPEARANCE-The spouse and child/children of a missing Veteran may be eligible to receive benefits from VA. Veterans who have been missing for seven years or more are presumed dead, if there is no other evidence to refute this. Dependents may file a claim if the missing Veteran falls into one of the following classification: Disappearance of Veteran (competent or incompetent), or Unexplained absence of Veteran for seven or more years.

When a Veteran receiving pension disappears, a claim requesting payment of that pension to the spouse and child/ children may be filed. In applying, the provision VA will base said pension on the reported annual income of the Veteran at the time of his/her disappearance. VA payments made to the spouse and child/children shall not exceed the amount that otherwise would have been granted had the Veteran died of a nonservice-connected disability.

Q & A-Why does my VA medical center ask if I have medical insurance when I go for treatment?? VA is required by law to bill the insurance companies for the cost of medical care furnished to Veterans, including service-connected conditions covered by health insurance policies. This makes VA similar to other health providers. Filing claims with insurers does not cost the insured Veteran anything. The collection process is between VA and the Veteran's insurance company only.

Q & A-Will I have to pay VA the difference if my insurance company does not reimburse the full amount of VA claims for my health care?? NO. VA swill not try to collect unpaid funds from a patient. This should not be confused with bills VA may send to Veterans in a certain income category (Discretionary) who make copayments to VA for their medical care.

FORFEITED LAND—The Texas Veterans Land board is offering three percent financing on forfeited state land through August 31, 1994. Non-Veterans purchasing a tract will pay four percent. There are some 774 tracts located in 121 Texas counties and these must be purchased through a real estate broker. The tracts range from 4.3 acres to 78.9 acres and full financing is offered through the TVLB. No down payment is required and 30 year fixed rate financing is offered on each tract. The buyer will be responsible only for the current year's taxes. Call 1-800-252 VETS.

SOAPBOX----On Thursday, August 11, 1994, the U.S. House of Representatives turned down President Clinton's \$33.2 BILLION crime bill package by a vote of 225-210. Our area Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford was among seven conservative Texas Democrats voting against the bill. The others were Pete Green of Fort Worth, Jim Chapman of Sulphur Springs, Greg Laughlin of West Columbia, Ralph Hall of Rockwall, Bill Sarpalius of Amarillo and Charles Wilson of Lufkin.

Republican objections focused on \$7.4 BILLION for crime prevention programs. Many Republicans contended that the spending diverted money from prison construction and amounted to wasteful "pork" for urban Democrats. Pointed out was funding for sensitivity training programs, arts and crafts and dance classes along with midnight basketball leagues to reduce violent street crime. Many felt that it was not a crime bill but a welfare bill with a few good things thrown in to

Readers will probably not be surprised to learn that the bill included \$10 MILLION authorization for a criminal justice "research" center at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas which just happens to be the home of Congressman Brooks, one of the bill's sponsors!!

There is strong action already underway to run the bill through again. No matter what your position on the bill, you should let Congressman Charles Stenholm know of how you want him to vote. His Washington address is 1211 Longworth House Office Building, Washington, D C







A Trans/Pecos Rolling Plains Wildlife Conference will be held August 26-27 at the Texas A & M University Extension Center in San Angelo. 





Ticks Is Causing Canine Ehrlichiosis In County exhibiting a nose bleed. A low grade A relatively new disease, pneumonia with weight loss may be seen in chronic stages. If death occurs it

Ehrlichiosis, is being diagnosed more frequently in the Callahan County area. Although canine Ehrlichiosis was once considered to be a rare entity in our area and in the United States, recent evidence suggests the disease is on the increase. Since the disease is transmitted primarily by ticks and considering our severe tick infestations, we are anticipating diagnosing more cases of Ehrlichia.

The progression of Canine Ehrlichiosis has been shown to consist of an incubation period of one to three weeks, an acute phase of four to six weeks and a chronic phase which may last indefinitely or until death. One should suspect this disease if a wild or domestic dog is severly infested with ticks and is feeble, anemic, weak or

is normally from depletion of clotting factors and hemorrhage or secondary infections from exhausted bone marrow activity.

In suspected cases of Ehrlichia, good supportive care such as fluid therapy, proper nutrition, antiobiotics, and vitamins are necessary. In extreme cases, blood transfusions may be the treatment of choice. The Veterinary Diagnostic Lab at Texas A&M can confirm the infection, but in most cases it takes 5-7 days.

Dogs treated successfully for Ehrlicichiosis are fully susceptible to reinfection. Strict tick control measures are necessary to eliminate this major natural reservoir.
