Run-Off Election Tuesday, April 12

to the polls in the Democratic Party's Run-Off Election set for Tuesday, April

Locally, that election will feature a run-off between Callahan County Commissioner Precinct #2 candidates Bryan Farmer and Terry Ellis. Also Callahan County Commissioner Precinct #4 candidates Charlie Grider and Kenneth Sowell will face-off in the runoff election.

The polls for the Democratic Party Run-Off Election will be open Tuesday from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

County voters can still cast their ballots in the run-off election by early voting. Early voting in the party's run-off election will conclude on Friday, April 8. The early voting locations will remain the same as in the Democratic Primary Election in March at Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains. The hours to vote by early ballot are during business hours.

Callahan County voters will again go will be able to vote by early ballot at the Clyde Justice of the Peace office on North First Street in Clyde and at the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace office. Early voting at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird will also be taking place in the county clerk's office.

Persons who did not vote in the primary elections will also be eligible to vote in the run-off election; however, those who voted in the primaries will only be allowed to vote in the run-off if they voted in the Democratic Primary. Those who voted in the Republican Primary are not eligible to vote in the runoff election.

The voting locations for the April 12 run-off election will remain the same as in the March 8 Democratic Party Primary Election.



Judge Rolan Jones was certified at a recent 20-hour Justice of the Peace Seminar held March 21-25 in Dallas. The seminar was sponsored by the Justice of the Peace and Constables Association of Texas and is conducted by the Texas Justice Court Training Center headquartered at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos.

The seminar is one of many held statewide to allow Justices of the Peace to meet their Continuing Judicial Education requirements as set forth in (Art. 27.005) Texas Government Code.

Judges were allowed to select areas of study that closely matched their courts activity. Topics covered were as follows Criminal Complaints, Traffic Law, Rural Court Financial Management, Criminal Law - Filing thru Appeal, Juvenile Law, Civil Law, Magistrate Warnings, Contracts and Torts, Rules of Civil Procedure, Justice Civil -vs- Small Claims Court, Alcoholic Beverage Laws, Forcible Entry and Detainer, Bond Setting and Forfeiture, Post Judgement Remedies, Jursidiction and Venue, and Judicial Ethics.

Proper groundwork must be laid prior to marriage for it to be happy and successful — and part of the groundwork is an attitude of the marriage being for life and of marrying "for better or for worse," not "more or less"!



Special Tax Credit For Low-Income **Families Available**

By Paunice Oglesby

Millions of low-income families with children aren't claiming the special tax credits, worth up to \$2,500, that they are entitled to. Many workers who miss out on this credit earn so little they had no tax withheld from their paychecks and were not required to file a return. Workers who lost their jobs or only worked part-time may be eligible for this credit.

You may be eligible for this credit if you worked during the year, had at least one child, and your earned income was less than \$23,050.

Working families with wages between \$5,400 and \$13,000 can qualify for a credit of at least \$1,000. There is also additional credit of up to \$321 for a child born in 1993 and another for help to buy health insurance.

The Earned Income Credit was provided to give low-income parents an extra incentive for working and staying off welfare rolls.

Earned Income Credit is the only credit that is refundable. That means it can go to a family whose income is so low that it owes no tax but can receive a refund



Abilene, Texas, Bailey said.

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 1 for election of area committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Bruce R. Bailey said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Bailey said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Bailey said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by Farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a threeyear term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Mr. Bailey said. "Previously, this was not

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
