Guess who we saw Saturday? Helen Ellis -- she's here visiting her mother, Mrs. Settle, and ever so anxious to see the new home-making department at Baird High School. That was Helen's domain before moving to her present position at the Marietta school.

Best news possible is what we are about to pass on right now! Bobby Jack Simms is home and completely recuperated from recent surgery. The little fella' began school work again Thursday in Mrs. Ross's third grade, and my! aren't those classmates happy to welcome him back!

Want to know who is a sweet person? Not that you need anyone to tell you, because you know but its Orace Ray. That thoughtful gal saved a beautifully decorated hat box and gave it to us so it could go to school to hold valentines. Now a whole room of little youngsters are enjoying it.

Last week we told you about the home making work-units in the new high school building. This week, we want to talk about another very important department and one which the school is justly proud of -- the library. Often called the "heart" of the school because it plays such a vital part in every phase of class work, the new building will have what is probably the largest school library in the county and certainly one of the most modern. The new library will be 20x40 in size and is planned to accommodate sixty people at a period. The room will be furnished with ten large library tables and chairs in the new birch finish. Wood work in the room will also be in that blonde wood with blending beige tile and terra cotta floors. Color used in the wall decor will be azure blue and this color will extend into the librarians work area. The work area, by the way, is a librarian's dream come true, with counter space and sink, as well as cabinets, shelves, and table. The library proper will have eighteen sections for books, additional shelf space, magazine racks, file cabinets and checking station for issuing books. The library now has approximately 5,000 books, some 40 magazines and periodicals, and subscribes to three daily papers and the Baird Star. Mrs. W. Clyde White is the school librarian, a position she was appointed to in 1945. Under Mrs. White's wise guidance, the library has grown rapidly while maintaining a remarkably fine balance in all ten library divisions. All departments are strong, from philosophy on through government, religion, language, science, useful arts, fine arts, literature, history and fiction. Something over 1,500 books are in the fiction section keeping it up to the minute with current best sellers, as well as old favorites. Mrs. White is particularly proud of her reference department, which has seven sets of encyclopedias, World Almanacs, Columbia Gazetteer, current biographies and a special section of Texas books.

The library enjoys a generous budget, due to the farsightedness of Supt. Bill K. Ford, who is strong in his conviction that worthwhile books are a fine investment for young people. Monthly publications, which cover every field imaginable from TV, radio, motion picture, through sports, science, news, homemaking and current history are a popular part of the library and a student can get information on any hobby, sport or special study he may wish.

Mrs. White, who holds a degree in Library Science (BS in LS) from NTSTC, is also a member of the American Library Association and also the Texas Library Association, holds special training session in library work for interested students. In order to make this

Forfeited Land Sale Very Successful

AUSTIN — Tuesday's Veterans' Land Board forfeited land sale was the most successful of the three that have been held, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder reported Friday.

The State received \$34,686.92 more than veterans owed on property when their contracts were forfeited. Previous sales had produced excesses of \$23,319.56 and \$5,951.84.

"The State didn't forfeit these lands with the hope of making a profit," Commissioner Rudder said. "Some veterans just didn't realize what a good thing they had and didn't keep up their payments."

In other record-breaking aspects of Tuesday's sale, the Veterans' Land Board accepted \$252,621.30 in bids. This is over \$14,000 more than in the second sale held in September, 1956. The first sale, in January, 1956, drew \$90,335.51 in acceptable bids.

A total of 741 bids were submitted in Tuesday's sale. This shattered the previous high of 355 bids, which were received for the September sale. The first sale drew 285 bids.

Property offered in these sales was originally purchased by qualified veterans through the Veterans' Land Program, but was later forfeited.

POLL TAX RECEIPTS DOWN; AUTO TAGS BEING ISSUED

The Tax Assessor-Collector's office reports that only 1,354 poll taxes were paid this year, as compared to last year's total of 2,074. Four exemptions were issued this year; 34 were issued last year.

The office also reports that as of Monday, Feb. 11, 182 passenger car licenses had been issued. Thirty-six farm licenses, twenty-eight commercial licenses and two trailer licenses had also been issued.

Callahan County passenger car tag serials run: CW 10 to CW 200; and from CV 8500 to CV 9999.

Last year the department registered about 3,400 passenger cars.

Many Vitamins Unnecessary For Good Health

Part of the 300 million dollars a year that Americans spend on vitamins could be saved, according to the editors of Changing Times. The Kiplinger Magazine, if purchasers would ask for their doctor's advice on whether they needed them.

In a copyrighted article, "Don't Overdo On Vitamins," the editors report that only one-third of the vitamins people buy are bought with a doctor's prescription. The article lists four principle points about vitamins:

1. Several of the vitamins that look so important listed on the bottle are put in solely for sales purposes. Scientists are not even sure they are needed by the normal human body.
2. No amount of vitamins can "supercharge" you with boundless energy. The oversupply is simply thrown off by the body.
3. An adequate diet provides the vitamins our bodies need and in much better form than drugs can.
4. There are dangers in taking too many of certain vitamins. To play safe on vitamins, and save money, the editors suggest eating a basic daily diet of seven types of food: Group 1 — dark green or deep-yellow vegetables. Group 2 — Citrus fruit, tomatoes, raw cabbage. Group 3 — potatoes, other vegetables and fruits. Group 4 — milk, cheese, ice cream. Group 5 — meat, poultry, fish, eggs, dried peas, beans. Group 6 — bread, flour, cereals. Group 7 — butter, margarine.

If you have allergies, or a dietary restriction, you may need supplemental vitamins. Mothers, children and babies often need vitamins. In these instances, check with your doctor for a prescription.

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
