One turkey, massage into turkey reast and legs, the juice of six lemons, onc cup of Dijon mustard, one black pepper or to taste. Sprinkle inside and out with seasoning salt Stuff with lemon rinds and lots of resh herbs (or dried if you don't have resh). Also layer top of turkey with resh herbs. Suggested herbs are sage, thyme, basil, mint and garlic. Add liquid to bottom of pan, water o brohn, about two and $1 / 2$ cups. Bake f turkey). Check periodically and baste about every 45 minutes to an hour, adding liquid if necded. Serve on large platter, garnished with lots of parsley and marachino cherrics or cranberrics washed and partially dipped in powdered sugar.
