Cross Plains High School Athletic Award Winners Announced

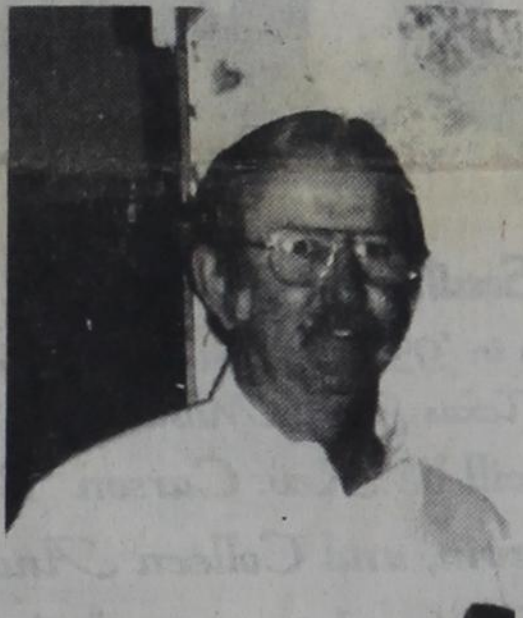
The 1996 All Sports Banquet was held Saturday, May 18, at the Cross Plains Community Center. Approximately 200 people enjoyed the evening's festivities.

James R. "Dick" Wagner, 67, employed by Citizens State Bank for 35 years before retiring in 1982, passed away Monday, May 20, 1996, in an Abilene hospital.

Services were held at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday in Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel with Dr. Jim O'Dell officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Mr. Wagner was born in Cross Plains. His family was among the early settlers in Cross Plains. His grandfather served as mayor as did his father. Upon his retirement from Citizens State Bank he was a cashier and vice president at the bank. He was also a U.S. Navy veteran. He married Donna Scott in 1982 in Cross Plains and was a volunteer fire-fighter for 25 years. He was a ham radio operator for many years and was a Lutheran.

Project Pride Prepares For Howard Day Observance June 14 & 15

Cross Plains annual Howard Day observance will be marked this year with a number of activities planned for Friday and Saturday, June 14 and 15.

Robert E. Howard, fantasy writer and creator of Conan, The Barbarian, made his home in Cross Plains from 1919 until his death in 1936. The Howard home, which is owned and maintained by the Project Pride group, served as both home and office for Howard during this period. This year marks the 60th anniversary of his death.

A large number of out of town people are expected to be in Cross Plains for this event. Members of ROBERT E. HOWARD PRESS ASSOCIATION (REHUPANS), some from other countries, will be here. Persons involved in the making of the movie, "The Whole Wide World," will be sharing the latest developments. The movie is based on Novalyne Price Ellis' biography of Howard, ONE WHO WALKED ALONE. Unfortunately, the premier for "The Whole Wide World" had to be cancelled.

Callahan Co. Appraisal District Expects Busy Month

The Callahan County Appraisal District has mailed taxpayers' 1996 valuation notices and expects to be quite busy during the month of June responding to taxpayers' questions and protests. According to Chief Appraiser Rod Lewallen, the district mailed approximately 10,000 notices to

property and business owners whose values increased over their 1995 values. "That is roughly twice the usual number of appraisal notices for us" Lewallen said. "We began to see property values rise in mid 1994 but did not have sufficient data to justify increases for 1995. The additional year of sales and economic data indicates that some categories of property in certain areas of the county are up as much as ten percent over the 1994 valuation". Lewallen went on to say that increased prices for oil have helped values in the oil patch while railroad, pipeline and utility company values are also generally improved over prior years. "In addition, real estate values have turned around over the last two years for the first time since 1985. We hope the informed property owner is aware of this and is expecting some sort of increase" Lewallen said.

The normal response to appraisal notices, according to district staff, is that approximately one out of ten notices will call or stop by the appraisal district offices with a question or disagreement about their property value, etc. If that bears true this year, the district staff will field about one thousand taxpayer complaints over the next thirty days. "We are really trying to encourage folks to call for an appointment before dropping by to avoid long waits to see an appraiser. We are fully aware that the whole subject of taxes is annoying at best and we want to minimize any frustrating delays for our taxpayers". Lewallen went on to say that many problems can be resolved by a phone call and that a taxpayer should first examine this year's valuation and ask themselves if they could reasonably expect to sell the

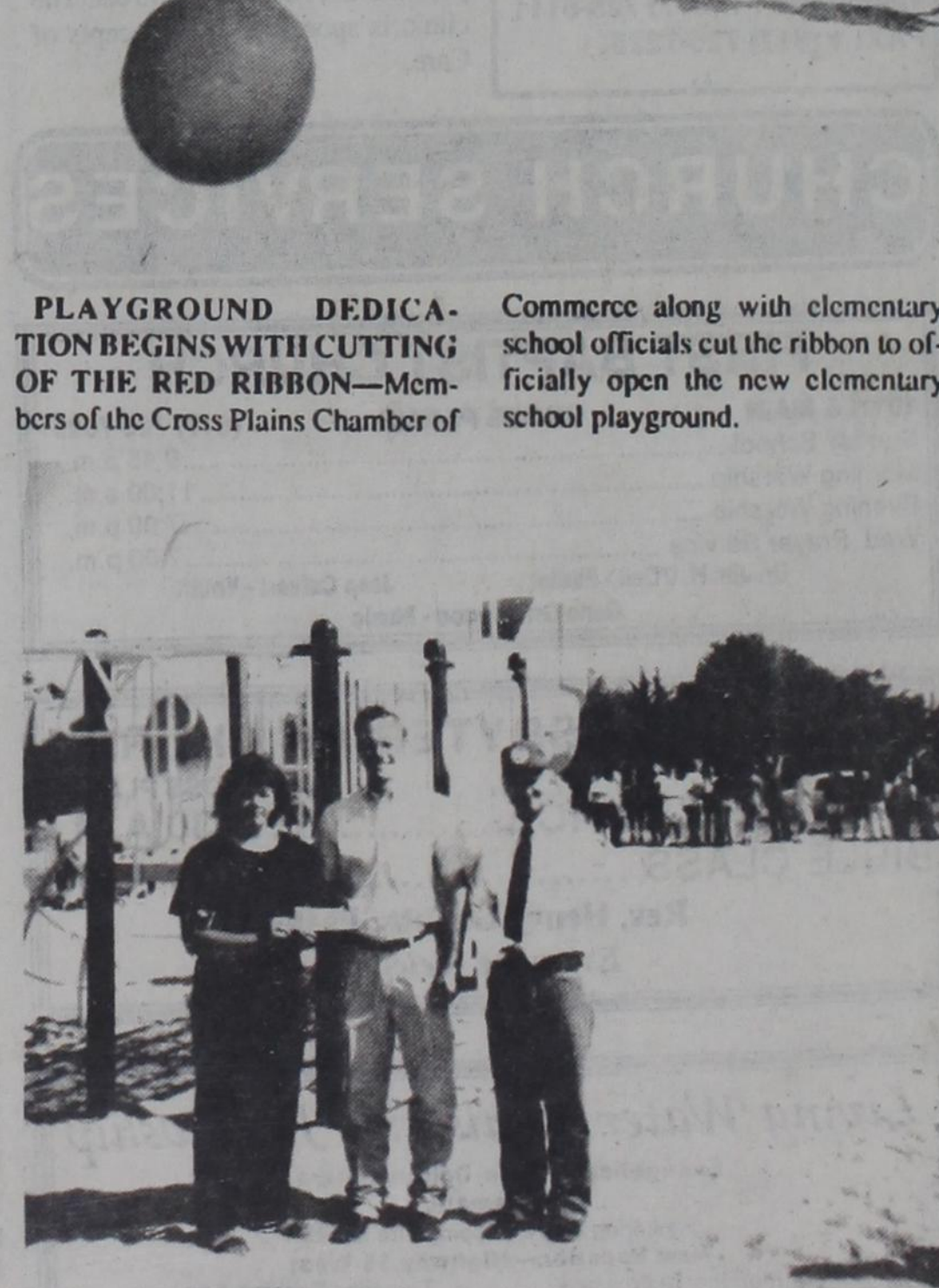

The Mayor and Council canvassed the votes of the May 4th election. Ray Womack moved to accept the election results as reported by Election Judge Vicki Worley. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Keith also informed the council that three members needed to be appointed to EDC board, due to the expiration of the first year terms. Jerry Cassle moved to reappoint Keith Lawrence, Albert Lovell, and Billie Ruth Loving to two year terms. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

Due to state regulations, James Nichols moved to discontinue oil collection at the city yard. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Edwin Weiss moved to purchase the North 27 1/2 acres for an additional water supply from Ricky Potter. Ray Womack seconded and motion carried, with James Nichols voting nay.

Ray Womack moved to purchase the property with \$25,000 out of Federal Funds and \$25,000 out of reserve. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried, with James voting nay.

Ray Womack moved to elect Edwin Weiss as Mayor Pro-Tem. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

Edwin Weiss moved to take bids for the sale of the old water tower located next to the new tower. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

James Nichols moved to reject applying for additional grant rehab monies, other than the one already applied for. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Debbie is to contact Bob Harrell, Fire Chief, to see if the department will be interested in putting a fence around the new tower for the fire department radios, to eliminate climbing of the tower.

Bob Hill present the judge's report. James Nichols moved to allow Debbie Gosnell to attend a one day school in Abilene for her account software. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Edwin Weiss moved to pay the bills. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried.

James Nichols moved to adjourn. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

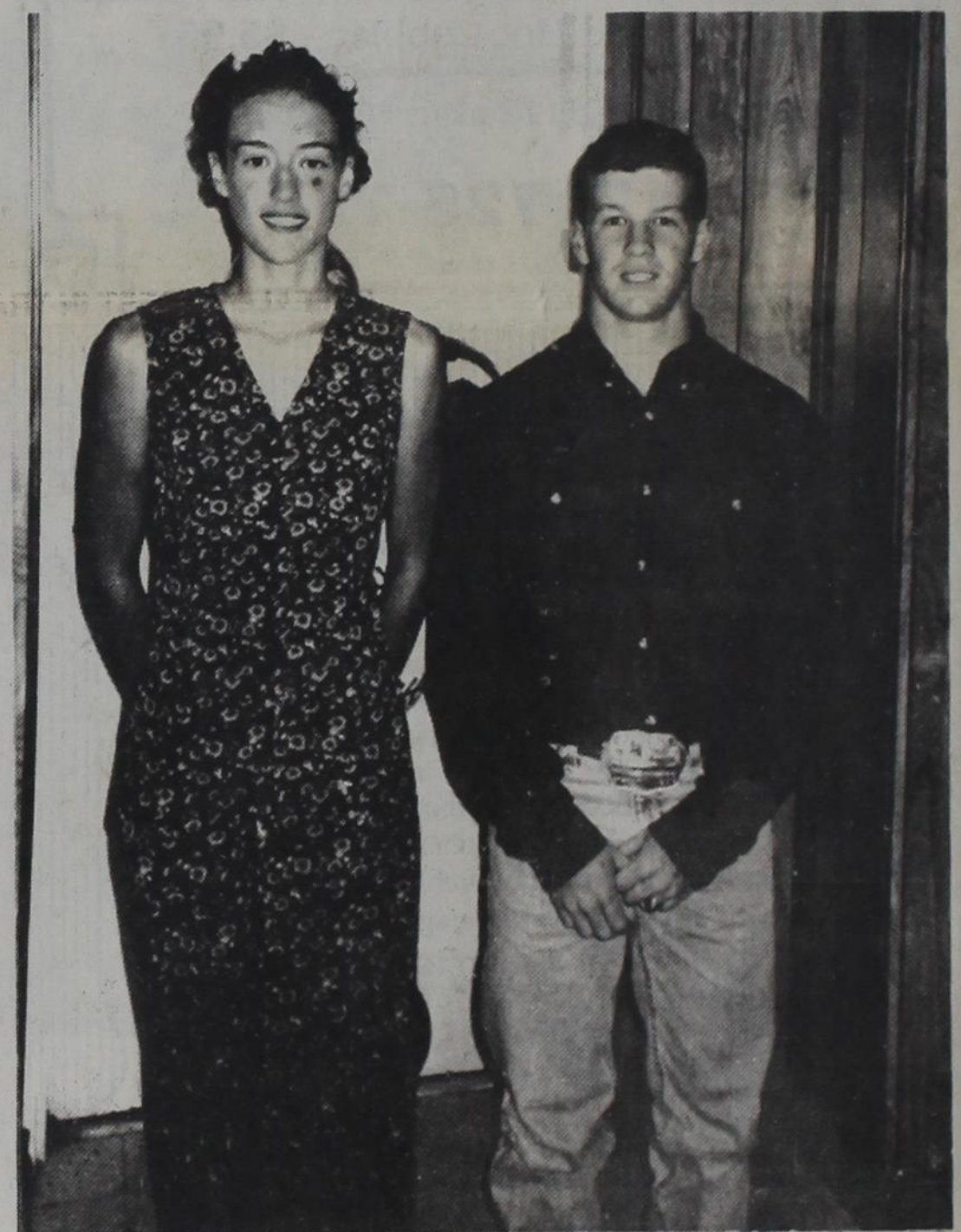
Williams Baseball League Begins Season

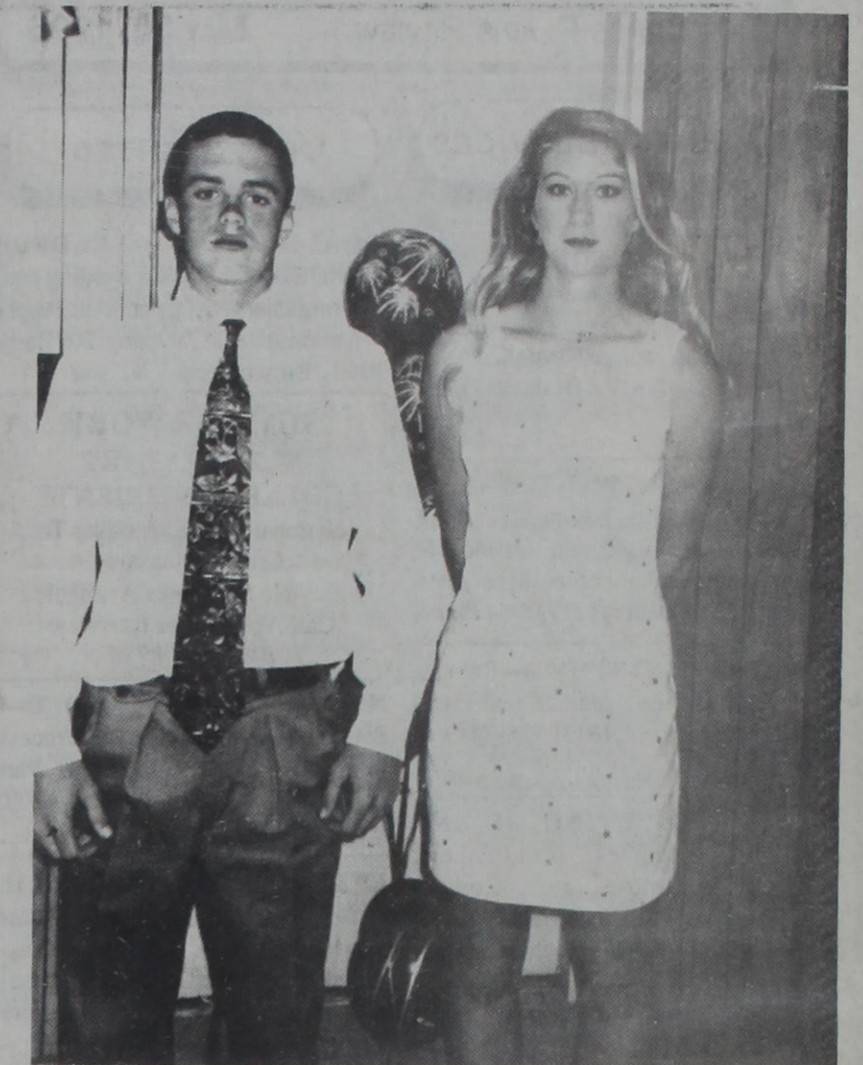

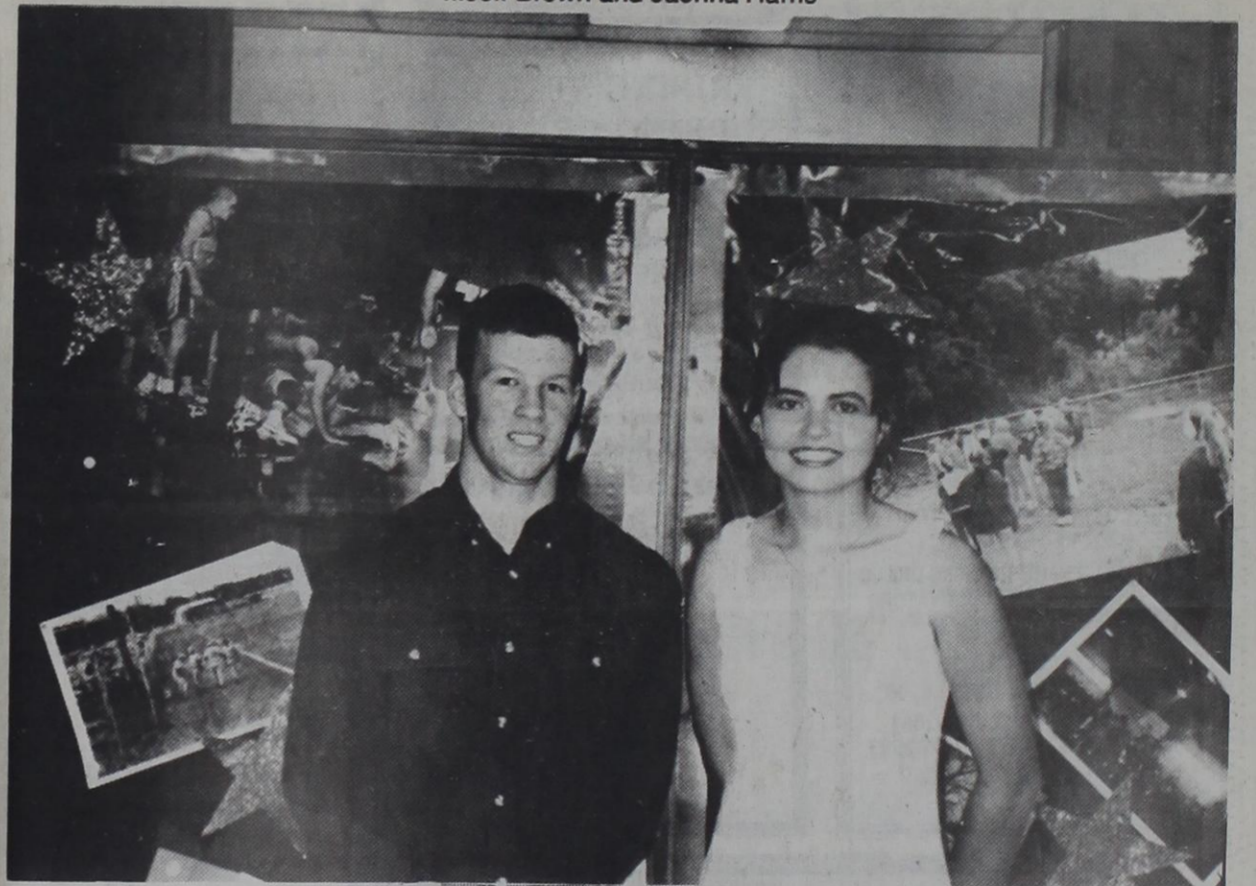

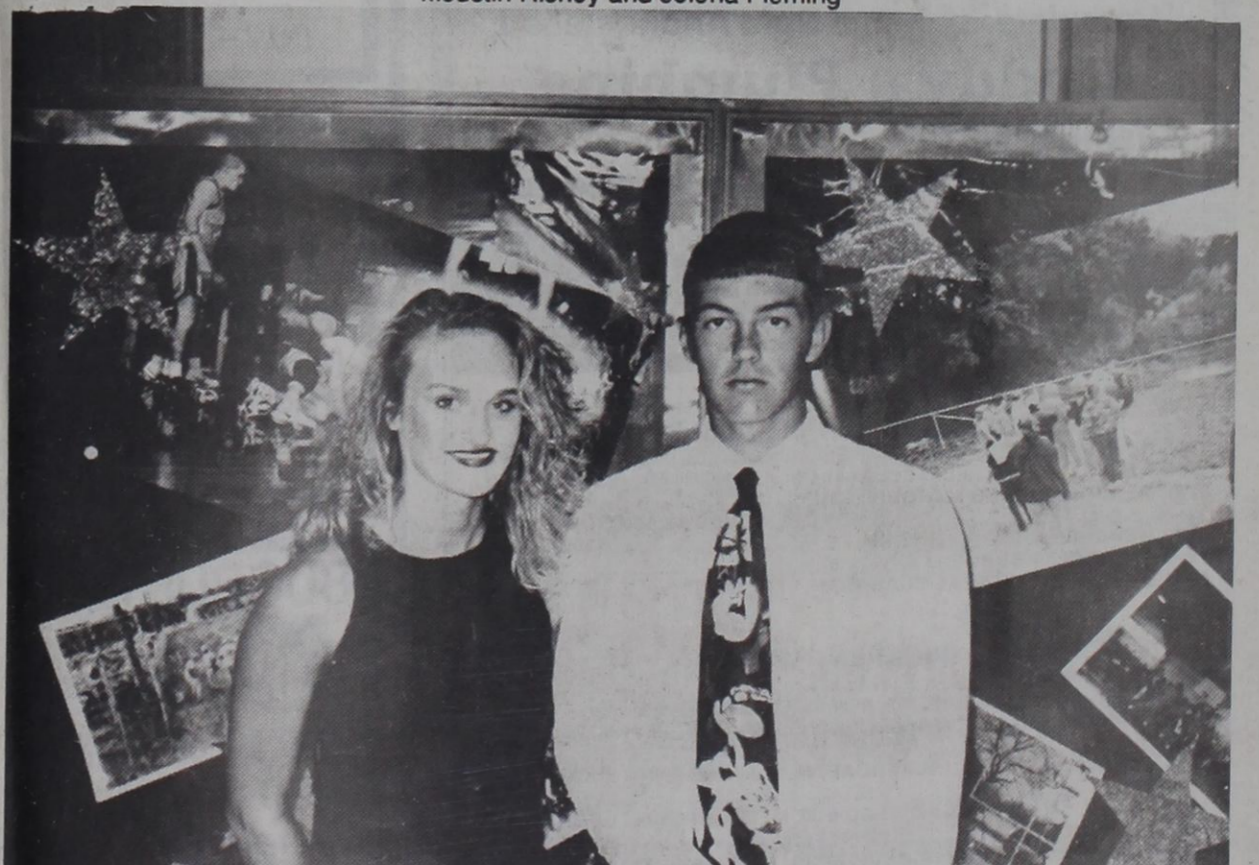

Signup To Be Held Until July 12

TAYLORVILLE, ILL.— Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman today kicked-off a one-time signup period for producers wishing to enroll their farms in a Production Flexibility Contract by signing up producers in Christian County, IL. The sign up period runs until July 12, 1996. The contracts, authorized by the 1996 Farm Bill, are for seven years, beginning in 1996 and ending in 2002.

flexibility contracts are not available for ELS cotton and oilseeds but marketing assistance loans will be available to producers of these commodities."

Glickman reminded producers that compliance with conservation and wetlands provisions continues to be a condition of participation. Payment limitation rules that were applicable in 1995 also will be applicable to these payments. The total amount of payment a person may receive in any fiscal year may not exceed \$40,000.

Farmers may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits or vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain circumstances. A producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the program and, after signup, may request a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty.

Farmers & Ranchers Eligible To Apply For Economic Injury Disaster Loans

WASHINGTON — Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in Callahan, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Nolan, Shackelford, Stonewall, and Taylor counties are eligible to apply for low-interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm has announced.

Gramm said the loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to effects of a disaster. Drought, high winds which have occurred since January 1, 1995 caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers.

The closing date for loan applications is January 6, 1997.

The Economic Injury Disaster Loan program covers small businesses which are without credit elsewhere. The interest rate available is 4 percent

with a maximum of 30 years allowed for repayment.

The Small Business Administration provides these loans to small businesses which have sustained substantial economic injury resulting from natural disasters.
