

# C.P. Public Library **Upgrading Detailed**

Last year, in order to be eligible for a state grant for automating the library and getting on Internet, the Cross Plains Public Library needed funds to prove that the town is sincerely interested in upgrading the library. The appeal went out, and funds came from far and near. Since nothing seems to have happened since then, the Library Board and Friends of the Library feel that an explanation is necessary.

The Big Country Library System, of which Cross Plains Public Library is a part, has submitted to the state an application for a grant, but as yet has failed to receive one. It is possible that an application from an individual library might help to get a grant more quickly - but that, too, is a gamble. At this time, the waiting game is on.

At the present, all funds which have been donated are in a special account at Citizens State Bank. When other circumstances make it possible, they will be used for the projects for which they were donated. Our gratitude to a special group of Cross Plains folks (wherever you live!) who helped the library at least get into the running.

### BREAKTHRU

Four national magazines carried an ad for a leading auto manufacturer with the letter "i" left out of "America" -- hence "Amerca." One of the magazines caught the error after 450,000 copies were already printed. At least fifty people had proofread the ad, and it had been used at a company meeting attended by another twenty-five, yet still the error went unnoticed. It only illustrates that when we see something familiar, we automatically make assumptions about it. Flaws go unnoticed since accuracy is assumed.

Although we must not be too critical of ourselves or others, shouldn't we continue to examine ourselves in the blazing light of truth, the truth of God's word? Too much is at stake to take things for granted. When an error is found in our lives, it should be admitted immediately, no matter how embarrassing, and corrected at once. After all, the world is "reading the ad" -- and so is God. Our lives are as an open book before the world and especially before God, Hebrews 4:13.

What we say must be clean, clear and correct, even in the smallest detail -- right down to the "i"! It is better to be critical in self-examination, no matter how painful, than to dispense inaccuracies for the world to see. Perhaps I would not feel so keenly concerning this if Jesus had not said, "And whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in Me to stumble, it would be better for him if a millstone were hung around his neck, and he were thrown into the sea," Mark 9:42. Our influence is so very important! How many eyes, especially little eyes, are upon us...

Come study and strive with us in preparing ours lives to be lived before God (and those others who are "reading us").

### Will It Take A Law To Force Texas Judges To Think Clearly?

The nightmare refuses to end for the family and friends of Melinda Lee. A year and half ago the Texas Tech student was hit by a drunk driver at a Lubbock intersection. The crash was so severe Melinda never regained consciousness. She died 54 days later.

The driver of the car killing the 20year-old college student was Wayland Leroy Lamb Jr. He was charged with DWI manslaughter and faced a maximum of 20 years in state prison and a \$10,000 fine. A jury panel was selected for the trial and last August Mr. Lamb had his day in

After hearing the charges against him, Lamb entered a plea of "no contest." The jury, appalled by the incident and possible influenced by evidence presented in the punishment phase of the trial, gave Lamb the maximum. The sentence was harsh indeed, but a prosecutor familiar with the case said the facts supported the decision.

Unfortunately for Mclinda Lee's family, the jury's sentence brought no closure to their ordeal.

The 7th District Court of Appeals in Amarillo recently overturned Lamb's conviction. The Court ruled the trial judge did not properly warn the defendant about all the consequences of a "no contest" plea. The trial judge's mistake, the Appeals Court ruled, was not warning the defendant that a "no contest" plea can result in deportation for a non-

tions)

Let me say that again - deportation for a non-U.S. citizen.

Wayland Lcroy Lamb is from Levelland. Wayland Leroy Lamb was born in New Mexico. New Mexico is hardly a foreign country.

Sadly, the 7th District Court has forgone sound reasoning for a game of "gotcha." Because the trial judge did not provide an inapplicable warning, a manslaughter conviction carrying the maximum sentence was reversed.

So unless the Appeals Court reverses itself, or the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals agrees to hear the case, Lamb will be tried again. And this time there is no guarantee he will enteraplea of "no contest," A plea of "not guilty" would result in a full blown trial involving two full time prosecutors, weeks of preparation, jury selection, a round up of witnesses and another case on the docket. All for a technicality.

Perhaps it is because of such outrageous rulings that a bill to make technical reversals more difficult sailed through the Senate last session. Legislation proposed by Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown would have placed the burden on defense attorneys to prove their clients would not have been convicted but for the error

The bill, which was an attack on trial technicality, ultimately stalled in a House committee.

Misguided decisions such as this provide further evidence such a bill would have been a good idea.


