## CROSS PLAINS EMS RECEIVES AMBULANCE GRANT

The Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service is pleased to announce to the community the awarding to them of an EMS Projects Matching Grant in the amount of \$35,000 toward the purchase of a new ambulance.

Due to the ages of the CPEMS's present ambulances, the number of miles on each of them, the increasing repairs having to be made, and the distance of travel necessary to transport patients from Cross Plains to hospitals, the 1995-96 CPEMS Board voted to apply for the matching grant money for the purchase of a new ambulance. The 1996-97 Board made application, then received word on September 26 that it had been approved and awarded.

The ambulance must be purchased by August 31, 1997.

Plans are underway regarding fund-raisers (like a barbecue dinner) to help secure the amount needed to match the grant money. One ambulance will be sold or traded in and that amount will apply toward the matching of the grant money. The other ambulance will be kept as a second or backup ambulance. The amount of money raised will determine whether a completely new ambulance, chassis and module, or a new chassis with a refurbished module will be purchased. It is hoped that a completely new one can be obtained.

Part of the matching money must come from donations from indi-

viduals, businesses and organizations. Please keep in mind how vital the Cross Plains Volunteer Ambulance Service is to this area, and how important it is to have dependable and adequate equipment, especially ambulances, to facilitate needed medical care to people of all ages of our community.

Contributions can be made to the EMS's "behind-the-scenes" volunteer accountant/bookkeeper, Dannes Turner, at the Citizens State Bank, or to one of the EMS coordinators, Linda Strength and Bob Pipes -- or other board members, Donnie Dillard, Betty Lewis, W.G. ## Early Voting Underway in Callahan Co.

Early voting in Callahan County for the November General Election began Wednesday, October 16 at three voting locations in the county.

Early voting for the November General Election will continue in the county through Friday, November 1. The General Election is set for Tuesday, November 5 at various voting locations in the county.

Early voting will be held at the Justice of the Peace office located on North First Street in Clyde. Early voting in Baird will take place at the County Clerk's office located at the County Courthouse. The Justice of the Peace office in Cross Plains will also be accepting early voter ballots.

Early voting hours are from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. each business day at the three locations in the county.

Registered voters need no reason to vote by early ballot. Voters from different voting precincts can also

vote at all three early voting locations.

Callahan County Clerk Darlene Walker said 6,000 ballots have been ordered for this year's General Election. She said during the last General Election involving election of a U.S. President, 5,500 people voted in Callahan County.

Along with the election of the U.S. President, county voters will choose between a Republican and Democrat candidate for the office of county sheriff. Incumbent Sheriff Eddie Curtis (Democrat) faces challenger Paul Jaworski (Republican) for county sheriff.

Other contested races include: U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative in District 17, Railroad Commissioner, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Justice, Supreme Court Place 1, Place 2 and Place 3, Judge for Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, Place 2 and Place 3, State Senator, State Representative, and Justice for the 11th Court of Appeals.

## Homeless Assistance For 1997 Set At \$100M

WASHINGTON—The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) today announced that \$100 million in federal funds has been made available to help feed the hungry and shelter the homeless during fiscal year 1997 (starting Oct. 1, 1997). This marks the fourteenth year that Congress has appropriated funds for those with non-disaster emergency needs under the Emergency Food and Shelter (EFS) National Board Program.

"These funds will reach more than 10,000 nonprofit and local government agencies in every state," FEMA Director James Lee Witt said. "The money will supplement their efforts to provide emergency food and shelter."

The EFS program is a model public/private partnership. FEMA chairs a national board composed of representatives from the American Red Cross, Catholic Charities USA, Council of Jewish Federations, National Council of Churches, The Salvation Army and United Way of America. This board develops each year's distribution plan based on unemployment and poverty rates.

"We all take great pride in a program that has efficiently distributed federal funds by relying on a continuing partnership between FEMA and dedicated volunteer organizations. With a minimum of paperwork and bureaucracy, the Emergency Food and Shelter Program is an example of how the federal government can help themselves," Witt said.

Grassroots involvement has been a hallmark of the EFS program. Final funding distribution is done at the local level. Each jurisdiction receiving federal money has a local board whose composition mirrors that of the national board. These local boards advertise the availability of funds, establish local priorities, select the nonprofit and government agencies to receive EFS funding and monitor program compliance.

Callahan County will have \$11,540 available. Texas will have a total of \$8,199,366 allocated.

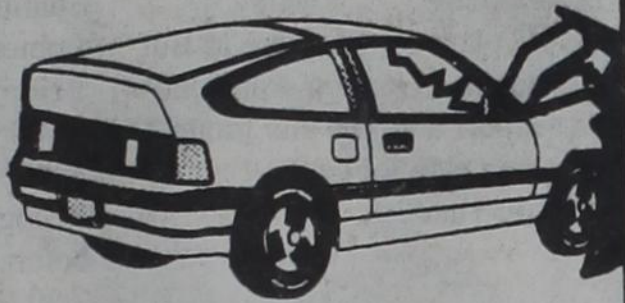

What think ye of Jesus' statement: "Those who are well do not need a physician, but those who are sick." Luke 5:31b? Some might say it is one of those "needless to say" statements -- everybody knows that! Others might say it is true, logical and down-to-earth. You may have even another response, but I have two points to share.

First, Jesus' teaching is true, down-to-earth -- and logical, to the discerning mind. As in His parables, Jesus selected common, everyday, down-to-earth illustrations to make a spiritual application. He used a sower, sowing seed in various soils, to teach how God's word, sowed in various types of hearts, produced different results, Luke 8:4-15. He used trees, and the different fruits on different trees, to show the varying influence of lives, according to their hearts, saying, "A good man, out of the good treasure of his heart, brings forth good; and an evil man, out of the evil treasure of his heart, brings forth evil. For out of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks," Luke 6:43-45. Yes, Jesus' teaching makes sense!

Second, the statement, "Those who are well do not need a physician, but those who are sick," was made to introduce a greater one, a spiritual one -- just as in the parables. Jesus followed by saying, "I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance," verse 32. 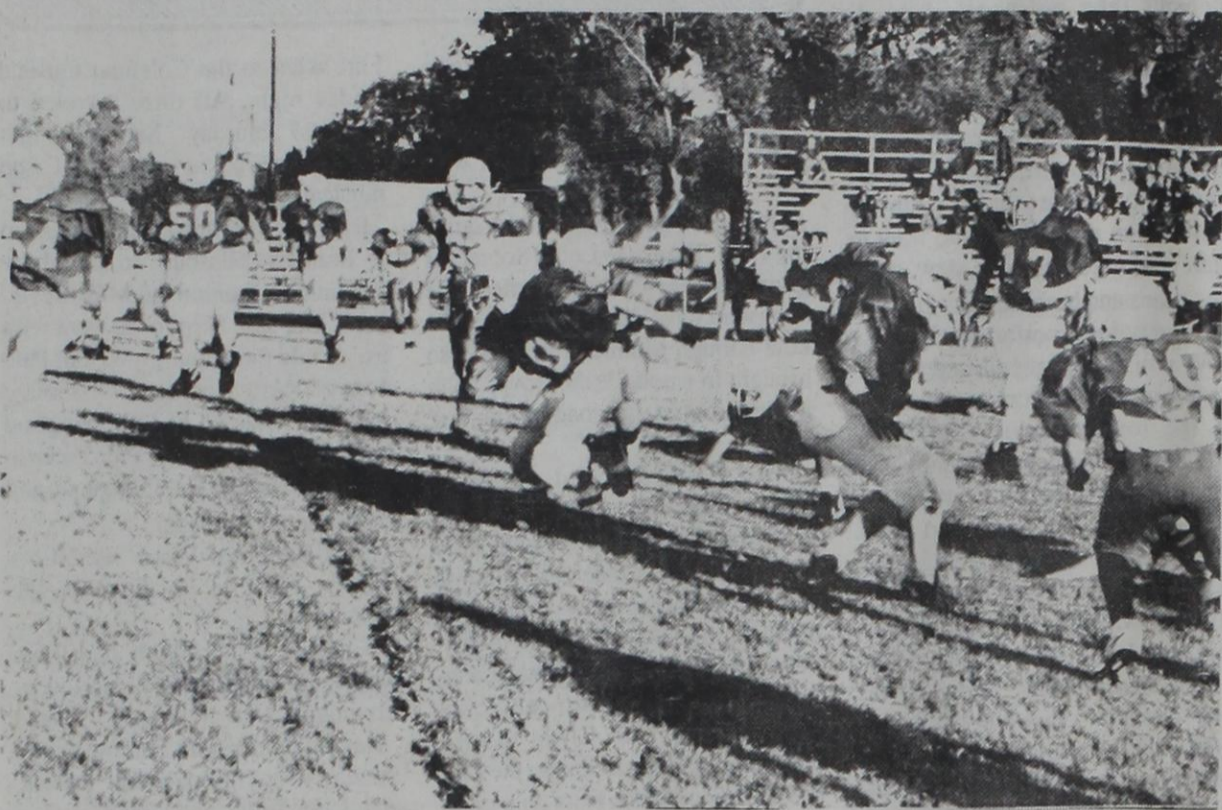

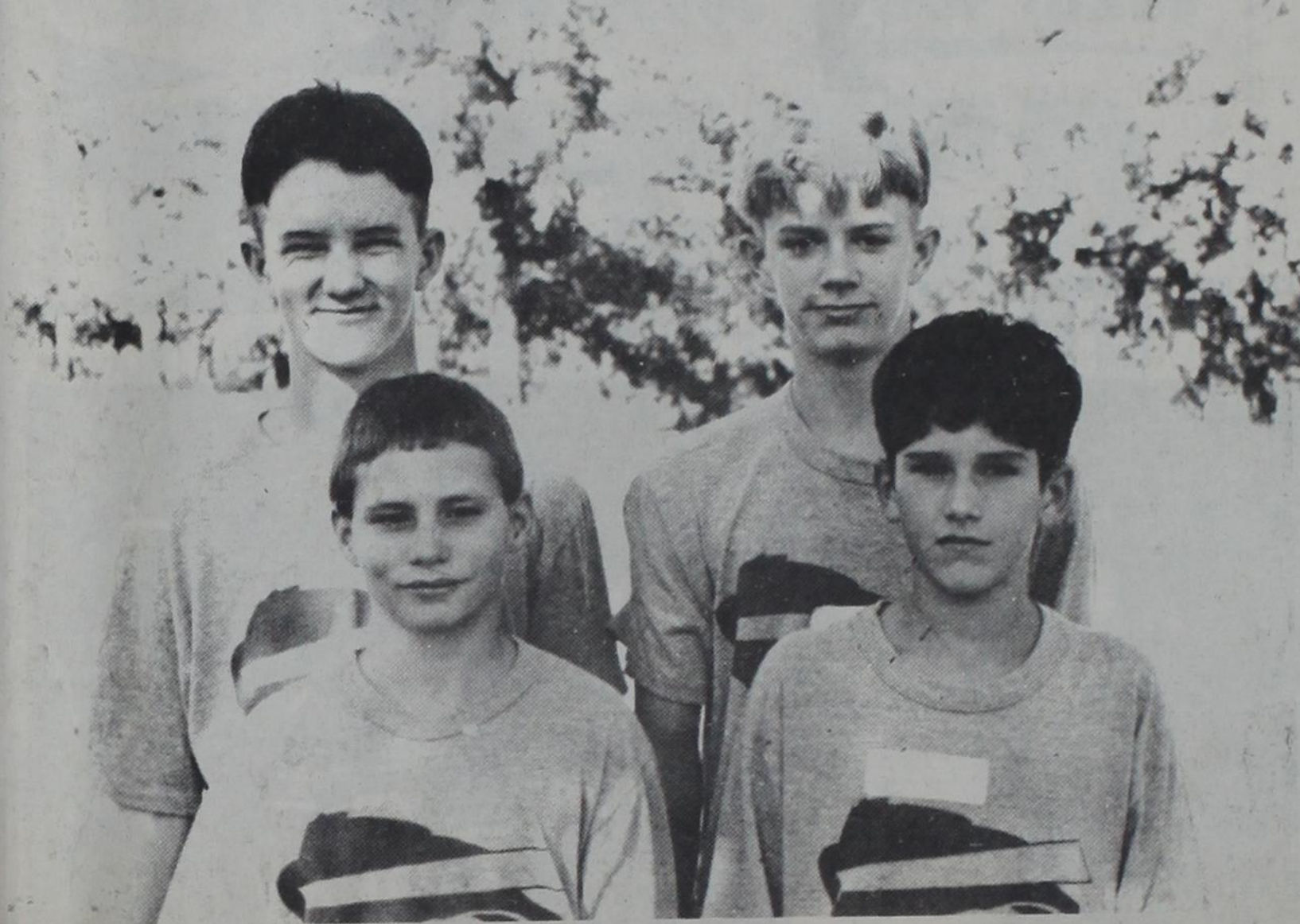

## SLEEP -- A Necessary Requirement For Good Grades

HOUSTON--(Oct. 17, 1996)--Students of all ages may be missing a key ingredient to good grades -- adequate sleep.

"Sleep is probably the most important period of the day for processing new information," said Dr. Bruce D. Perry, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Missing sleep, Perry says, causes most of the day's experiences to be stored inefficiently in the brain. Lectures heard, chapters read, interactions with teachers are harder to remember if the brain is sleep deprived.

"Rather than cramming information for a test, students are better off studying in smaller chunks and getting enough rest to process the information properly," he said. "Otherwise, you end up storing the information in short-term memory and forgetting it in a few weeks."

Sleep is critical for young students as well.

"Children have many new concepts to learn in school," he said. "A good night's sleep not only lets them process what they learned but also helps them be alert in class."

Students who are sleep deprived tend to be more irritable and have difficulty concentrating.

Perry feels that parents often underestimate the importance of sleep.

"Children are kept so with after-school and evening activities that sleep gets short-changed," he said. "This lack of adequate sleep robs children of some of their learning potential."

Perry recommends at least eight hours of sleep for adults and 10 or more hours of sleep for children.

"Sleep helps the brain organize new information, so literally, in the morning you wake up smarter than you were when you went to bed," he said.

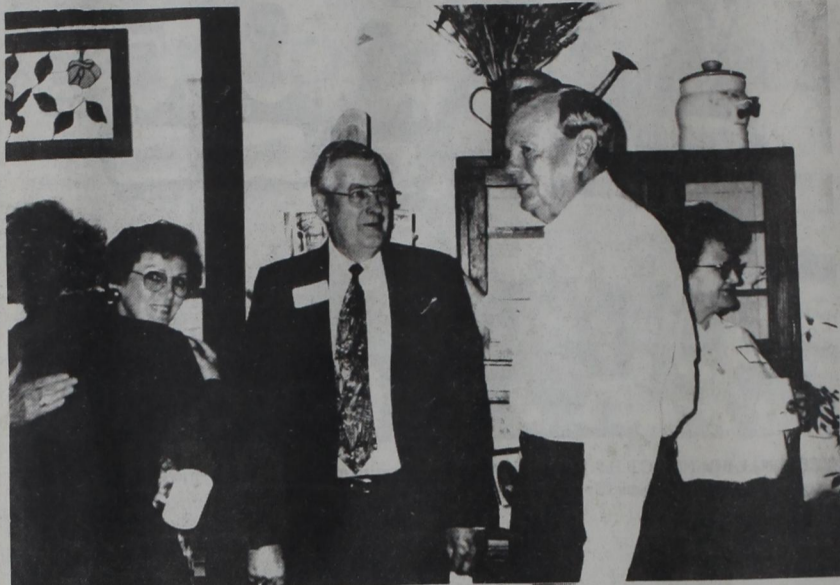

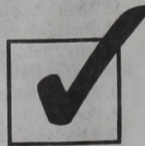

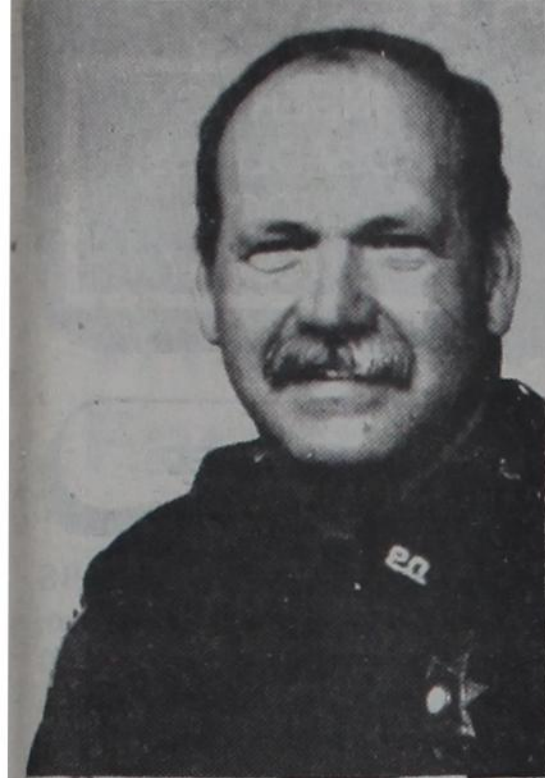

## Paul Jaworski Asks For Your Vote

## County Commissioners Approve Mower Purchase

Callahan County Commissioners, holding a regular monthly meeting Monday, October 7 at the County Courthouse in Baird, voted unanimously to purchase a boom mower for Commissioner Tommy Holland's County Precinct #3 (Baird).

Back on September 23, county commissioners voted to table opening the bids for the boom mower because only one bid was received.

Despite tabling the items, commissioners still received only one bid from Future Equipment Company in Tyler. The base bid for the boom mower was \$57,300. Two mowers traded-in by the county

included a Case for \$9,900 and an Alamo for \$19,400. The net cost for the new boom mower is \$28,000.

One other item brought before commissioners' court included a proposal to close County Road 406 located in the Cross Plains area.

The short county road hasn't been in use for a number of years. Two residents who have property with access by the road are requesting it be closed. The road is located in Commissioner Charlie Grider's county precinct.

The roadway will be posted for closure for the next 20 days. County commissioners will vote to close the roadway at the October 28 commissioners' court meeting.

Commissioners also approved signing of the minutes of the previous meeting and voted to pay approved bills.

## Baird ECD Makes Offer On Land

**BAIRD**—Baird Economic Development Board approves making offer on future industrial site.

The Baird Economic Development Board, during a regular meeting Monday night, unanimously approved making an offer for railroad land south of the tracks through Baird. The area is now undeveloped pasture land that once was occupied by a round house and cattle yards serving Texas and Pacific Railroad. Although there are still a lot of obstacles to cross, the board feels like this is a great step in the future of Baird's growth. It is not known how long it will be before a decision will be made by the present owners on the offer. The board hopes the area can be developed into an industrial park in the future.

Other action taken was amending the Economic Development Boards by-laws concerning appointment of new members. New members will now be appointed by the City Council. Previously members were appointed by the Mayor and then approved by the City Council. This action will depend on approval of the City Council for validation.

Board President Felix Manion also reported on a meeting he had with the presidents of Clyde and Cross Plains Economic Development Boards concerning the three boards working in unison for benefit of the whole county. He said all three board leaders agreed to work together in the future.

## Sales & Use Tax Totals For County

The state sales and use tax analysis for Callahan County has been reported for the first quarter of 1996 by State Comptroller John Sharp's office.

Sharp reported gross sales, for all industries in Callahan County, for the first quarter of 1996 at \$12,709,518 which is 16.8 percent higher than the gross sales of \$10,880,643 reported during the first quarter of 1996. Gross sales are the total amount of all sales, leases and rentals of tangible personal property and all labor and service charges made during the reporting period.

Use tax purchases for the first quarter of 1996 for all industries in Callahan County amounted to \$212,684. Use tax purchases are the cost of all taxable items removed from inventory for personal or business use and all purchases on which no Texas sales tax was paid or use tax accrued.

The amount subject to state sales and use tax in the first quarter of 1996 in Callahan County was \$4,859,953. The amount subject to state sales and use tax is calculated by taking taxable sales and adding use tax purchases.

The number of business locations in Callahan County, with a sales and use tax permit which filed a return, are 247. There were 280 permits issued during the same quarter the previous year.

The gross sales for the retail trade division in Callahan County for the first quarter of 1996 was \$6,978,502 which is 9.9 percent higher than the 1995 first quarter gross sales of \$6,349,941.

The use tax purchases for the retail trade division in Callahan County for the first quarter of 1996 was \$6,881.

The amount subject to state sales and use tax for the first quarter of 1996 was \$3,335,951 for the retail trade division in Callahan County.

The number of reporting outlets in the retail trade division in Callahan County totalled 152 for the first quarter of 1996. There were 168 reporting outlets during the same quarter in 1995.

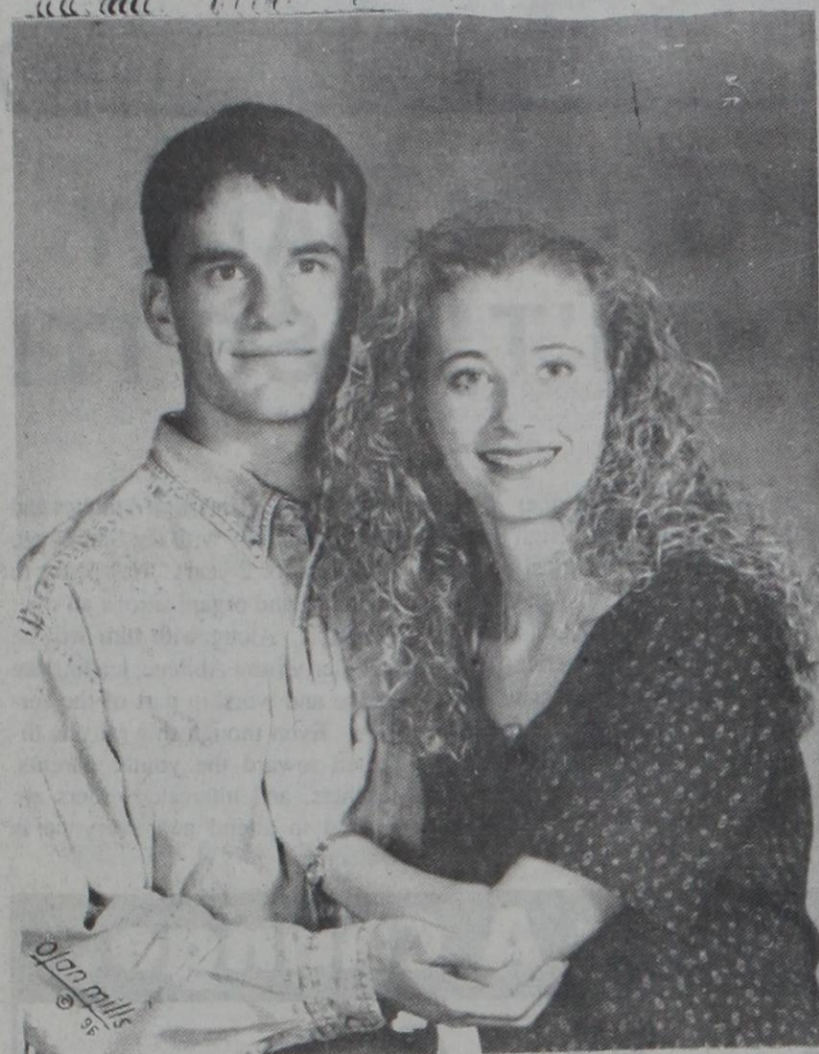

In their enthusiasm for gathering treats, children may forget what they were taught about crossing streets. Kids could dash from between parked cars, accidentally trip on long costumes or cross against the light. Drive slowly in residential areas and honk your horn while driving down dimly lit streets to let children know your coming. **Think safety.**

- Make sure costumes and shoes fit properly...tight or oversized clothing could cause a child to trip.

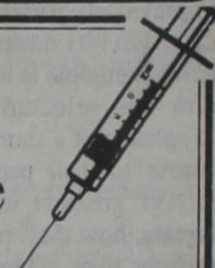

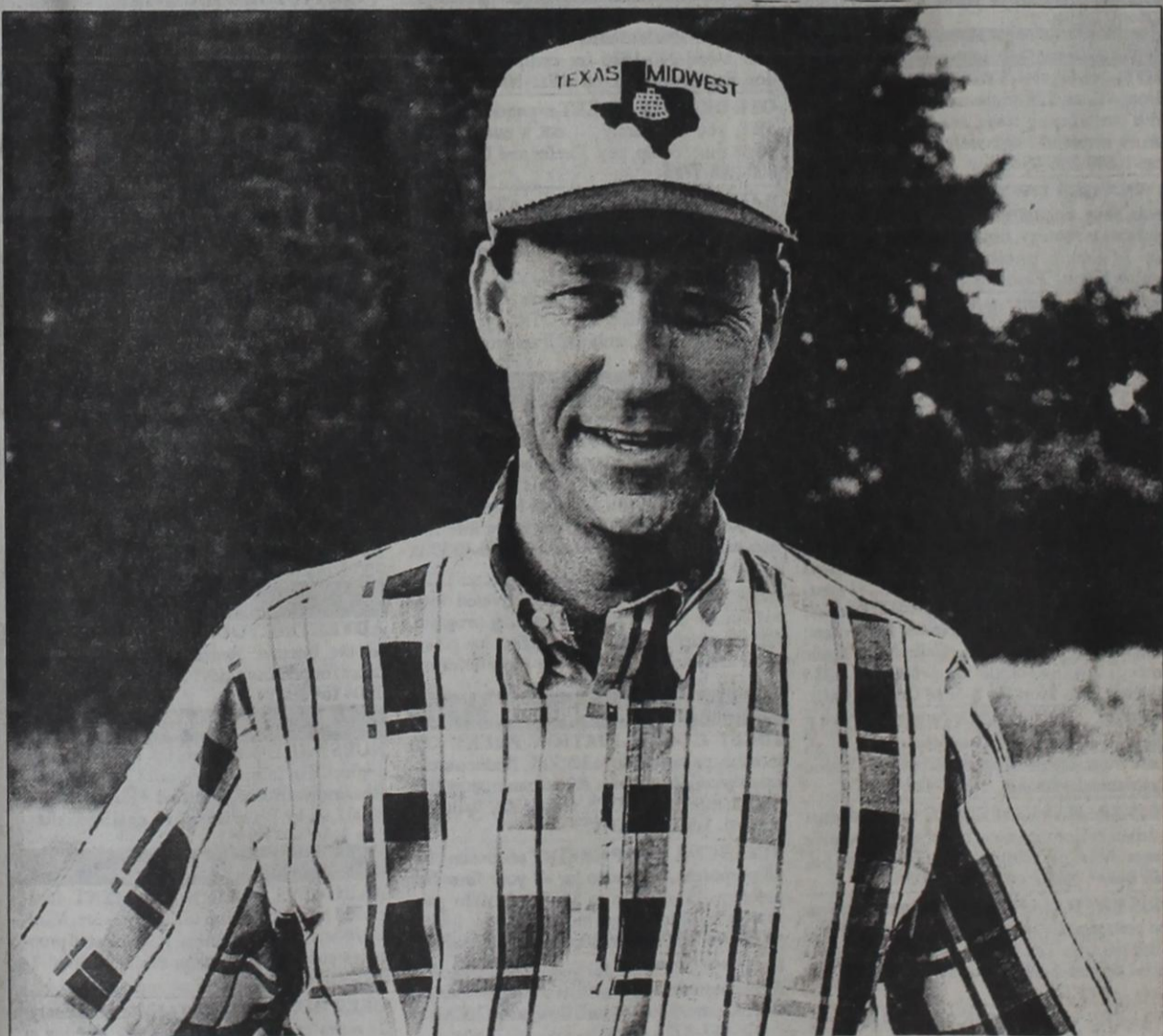

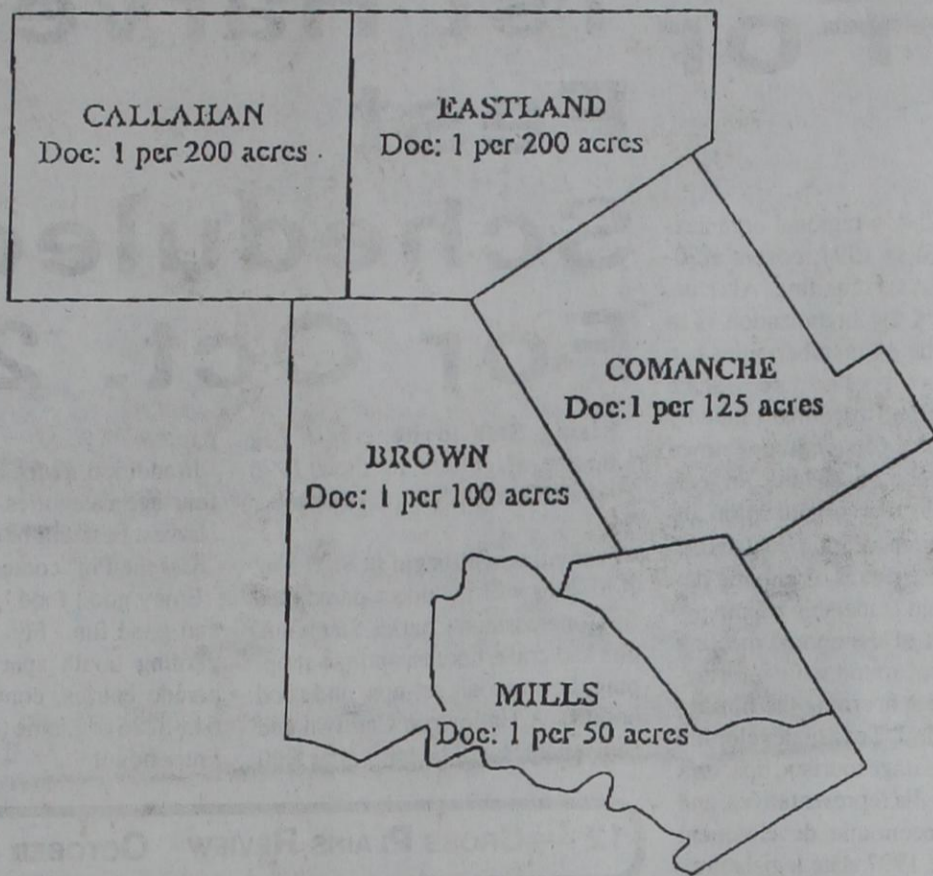

## Recommended Deer Harvest Announced

### CJC Board of Regents Approved Plans to Offer a Christmas Mini-term

Landowners and sportsman are reminded that the 1996 general deer hunting season in Callahan County will begin on Saturday, November 2, 1996 and will run through Sunday, January 5, 1997.

As in the past, no special antlerless deer permits or tags will be required for harvesting antlerless (doe) deer in Callahan County. Only the appropriate tag from the required hunting license will be necessary.

Annual fall deer surveys are conducted during August and September each year to determine overall deer density, reproduction and sex ratios. Because it is impossible to survey each individual ranch, standard survey lines are established and conducted each year. By collecting this trend information over a period of years, it is possible to make density estimates and general harvest recommendations for a particular area.

It should be stressed that these harvest recommendations are very general. Deer densities may vary greatly in a given area, even between

adjoining ranches. A ranch which is overstocked, overgrazed, and/or over hunted will not support as many deer as a well managed ranch where selective harvest is practiced.

Therefore it is important for each landowner to look closely at his existing deer herd and decide how many deer need to be harvested, if any. The bag limits established by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are intended to be used as broad guidelines which will accommodate most areas of the county. Even though the legal bag limit in Callahan County is 3 deer limit 1 buck, there are several areas where very few if any deer need to be removed. The landowner can and should make the final decision as to how many deer and what sex may be taken from his property.

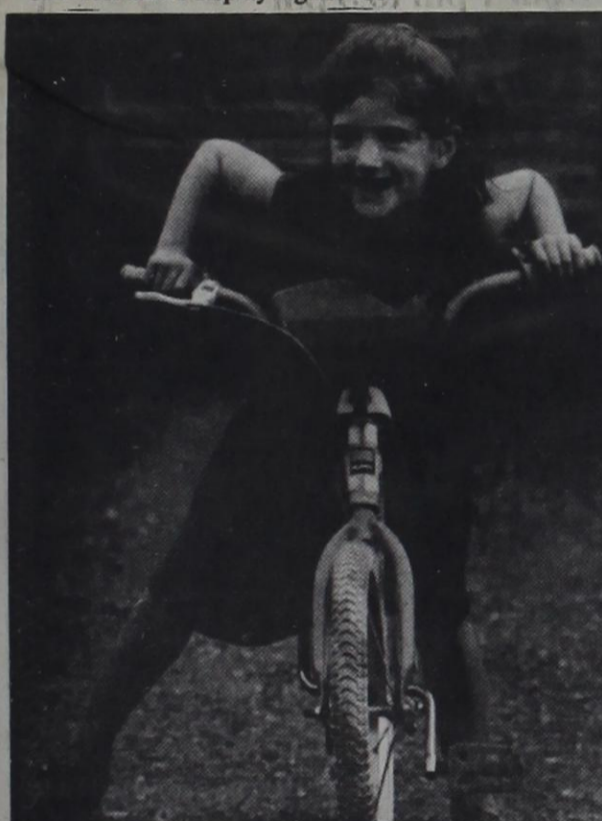
## New GED Passing Score Announced

The new GED test minimum passing scores will be an average standard score of 45 on all five tests with no score below 40. A score of 50 represents the average score earned by high school graduates. This will be effective beginning January 1, 1997 as approved by the Texas Board of Education for all GED Testing Centers in the state of Texas.

GED test takers display high school level competency in writing, social studies, science, literature and the arts, and mathematics. "GED credentials have been issued for over 50 years and higher passing standards will ensure their continued credibility and acceptance," say Cathy Erwin, GED Unit Director at the Texas Education Agency. "One in five high school graduates in Texas have GED credentials and GED graduates have

found that earning a GED credential is an important first step in securing employment or access to higher education."

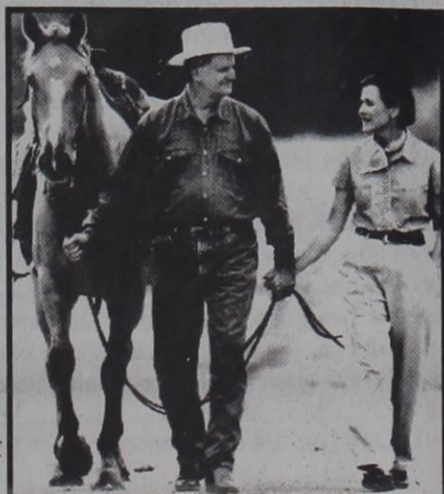

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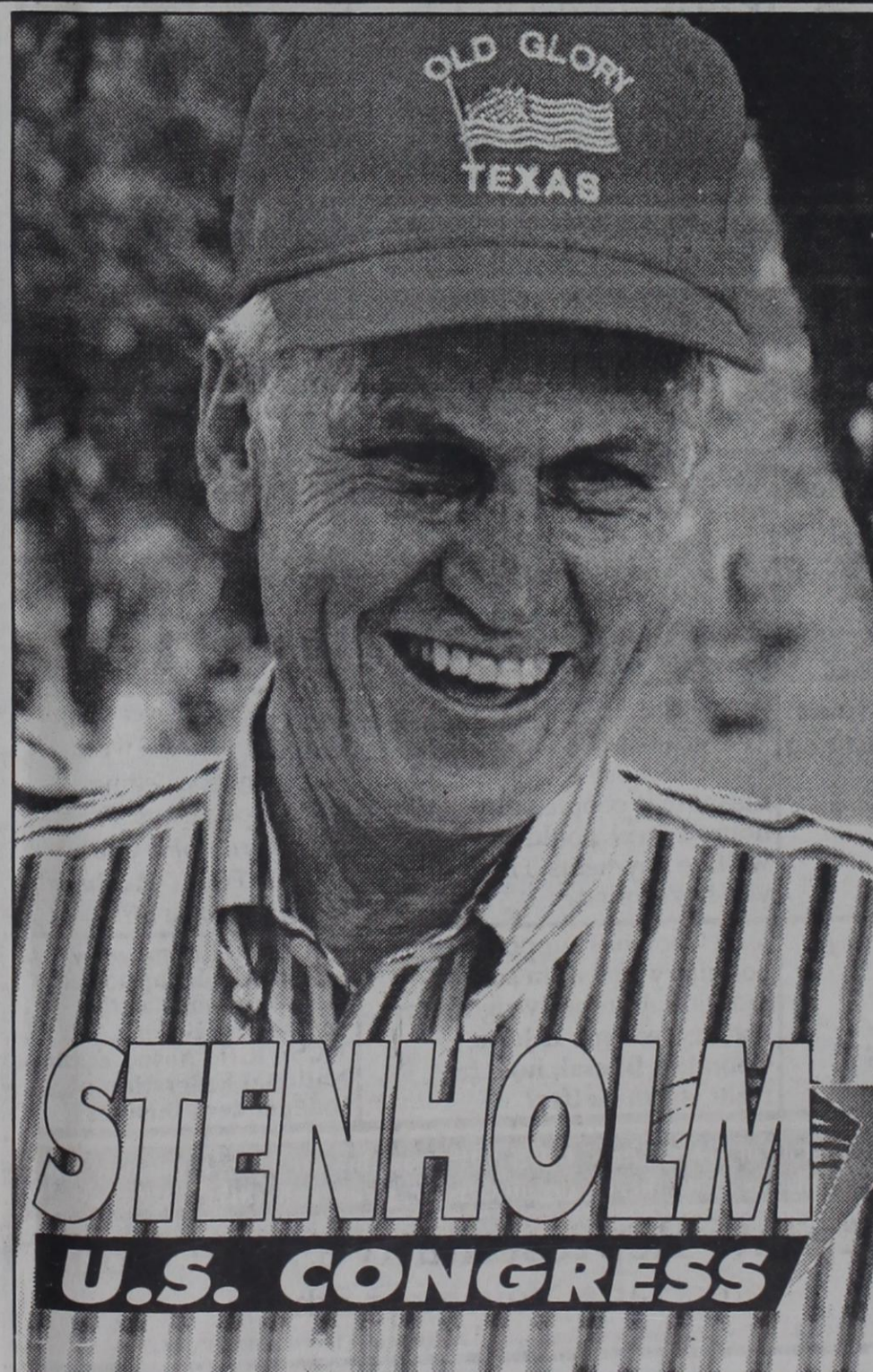
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# Midwest Texas Leaders Learn Communication Skills
