February Is  
National Heart  
Month

Besides the association of February to Valentine's Day month, it is also observed as National Heart Month. This concerns the real human heart which pumps continuously 60 to 100 times per minute.

This fantastic organ is responsible for circulating the body's five quarts of blood through 60,000 miles of blood vessels. Now that is quite a trip!

It has been announced recently that heart disease kills more Texans than other disease. More than 45 percent of all deaths in our state are caused by cardiovascular disease. This total is higher than death due to cancer and accidents combined.

A million Americans suffer heart attacks each year, while over 43 million live with one or more forms of heart or blood vessel disease.

The most prevalent cause of a heart attack is due to the gradual buildup of cholesterol in the inner walls of arteries. The process is slow, but may continue until enough blood is cut off to warrant an attack.

Smoking is a definite and strong risk factor for heart disease. The death rate among smokers is 70 percent greater than nonsmokers. Heavy smokers are at even higher risk. If you smoke and have elevated blood cholesterol or high blood pressure, chances of heart disease are dramatically increased.

The body transmits signals for early detection which should be acknowledged. Some of these signals include: brief spells of chest pain, irregular or racing heart beat, shortness of breath, and dizzy spells can indicate some level of coronary artery disease. The supply of oxygen-rich blood may not be sufficient to meet the demand of the vital organ — your heart.

The symptoms of an attack may vary from person to person, ranging from a sensation of constriction or heaviness in the central chest to a feeling of tightness to one of agonizing pressure. The pain may be continuous or intermittent. It usually spreads to the back, jaw, and left arm accompanied by shortness of breath, sweating, nausea, dizziness, and pallor.

If symptoms persist for more than two minutes, you should not hesitate to call Emergency Medical Service immediately. Procrastination could prove fatal.

Prevention is the most logical control of the disease. Educating the nation concerning proper diet, exercise, and regular check-ups offers future generations hope.

Doctors advise that it is never too late to change habits that could be harmful to your heart. Follow your physician's advice and minimize coronary risk factors.

Advancements in medical science now allows people with cardiovascular disease to return to normal, productive lives. Open heart surgery is common place and can be performed as close to home as Abilene. Many local residents have already underwent such heart surgeries.

Use your head, and take care of your heart!

The Cross Plains Ex-Student Association is making a dedicated effort to invite all former teachers to attend Homecoming.

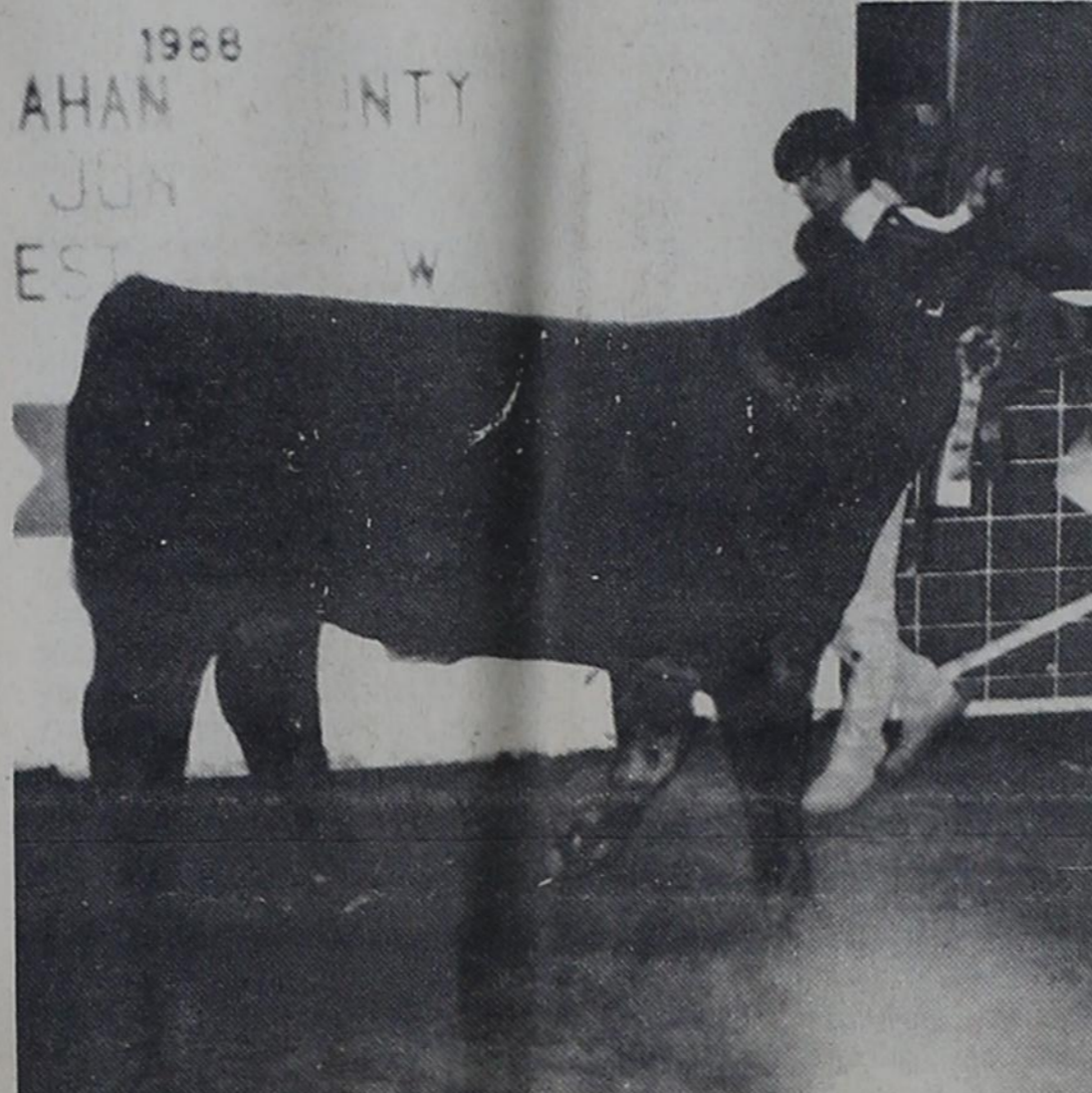

## Local ACS Services Available

The American Cancer Society in Callahan County announced that it has a variety of services available to cancer patients without charge. "Many people are unaware of all the services we can provide right here in Callahan County," said Judge Mack Kniffen, Service and Rehabilitation Chairman. "And all that is re-

quired in most cases is written permission from the patient's physician."

Loan equipment such as hospital beds, wheel chairs, commode chairs, and walkers are available as well as expendable items including dressings, hospital gowns, bed pads, pillows, and other items.

"These are all in addition to our basic information and referral services," said Kniffen. "And, depending on location, we also have several rehabilitation programs including Reach to Recovery for mastectomies, esophageal speech lessons for laryngectomies, ostomy rehabilitation and related patient and family support groups."

The concept for these rehabilitation programs is the volunteer-to-patient relationship," added Kniffen. "We have many volunteers who are themselves former patients and who are specifically trained by the Society to help other patients and even their families adjust to living with cancer."

Kniffen cited that when most people think of the American Cancer Society, they relate the name to cancer research. "While it is true the ACS funds millions of dollars for cancer research, we are also a community-based organization providing many local services. These patient services as well as education materials of all types are just a few of the ways we can help."

### An Open Letter To All Cross Plains Ex-Students

There has been much concern the last week or so in regard to the possibility of the 1988 Homecoming game not being played on a Saturday. At this time I would like to take a few minutes and explain to each ex-student the manner in which a school sets the football schedule each year.

At the end of October the school sends the enrollment for that month to the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Education Agency sends the information to the University Interscholastic League.

The U.I.L. divides the schools in the state into districts, which are determined by the size of the schools. This district alignment was released this year in late January.

After the alignment is released by the U.I.L., every school in Texas has about two weeks to request a hearing in Austin before the Athletic Executive Council composed of school superintendents elected by vote by other superintendents in the state.

If a request is denied by the Athletic Executive Council, then the school has an additional two weeks to file for another hearing in Austin before another committee.

The decision by the second committee is final and this year the committee will meet on February 25, 1988.

On February 26, all schools may then have district meetings and arrange district games in regard to playing dates and sites. After the district schedule is set, then the schools may arrange non-district games to complete the 10 game schedule.

Next fall Cross Plains will have five district games and five non-district games. Every effort is made to have five games at home and five away from home. Nearly all these games are played on Friday night.

In order to play any other time, such as Saturday, the visiting team MUST AGREE TO DO SO. If the visiting

team refuses to play on Saturday, then there is nothing the home team can do about it.

Sites and dates for district games are determined by drawing numbers and these are set and approved by the members in the district and cannot be changed without permission from members within the district.

Changes without approval can lead to forfeit of the game and disciplinary action by the district committee.

Non-district sites and dates are set by the individual schools involved and a contract is signed by the superintendents of each school. This contract sets the date, site, and financial arrangements as to how the attendance money is to be shared between the two schools involved. If this contract is broken by either school, there is a penalty clause wherein the responsible school must pay the other school a set amount of money agreed on in the contract, as a penalty.

I realize this information has been long and technical, but it is essential that our ex-students realize our school athletic program is supervised by the U.I.L. as to when and how we schedule our athletic contests.

We will continue to make every effort to have Homecoming '88 on a Saturday, but remember the most important thing of all: THE VISITING TEAM MUST AGREE TO PLAY ON SATURDAY!

I appreciate your interest in your school, school activities, and Homecoming. Our faculty and staff have always cooperated with all organizations in the community and this will not change.

We only ask that you be patient and give us some time to persuade one of the schools on our schedule to play us at Homecoming this fall.

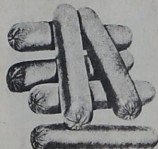
