

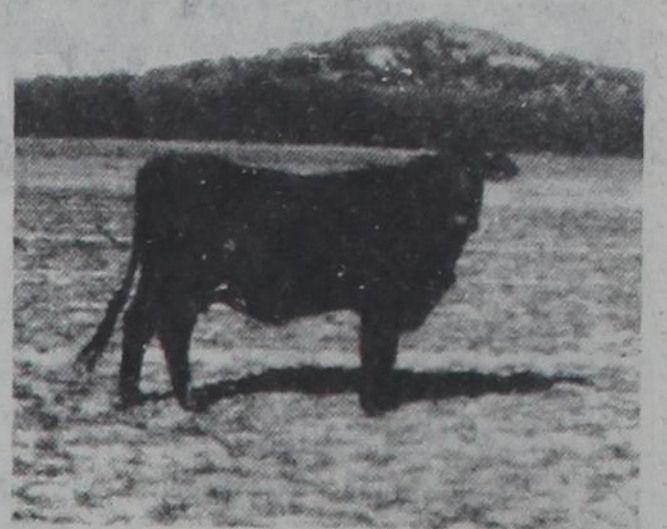

## WELCOME RAIN ARRIVES

Callahan County, along with area counties, have received rainfall over the past week which will offer some relief to drought conditions. The following area residents reported rain measurements as of June 4:

- Cottonwood - Scott Childress, 4.75 inches
- Sabanno - Jerry King, 6.5 inches
- Pioneer - Tommy King, 3.7 inches
- Rowden - Joyce Odom, 6 inches
- Burkett - Joe Kemp, 6.5 inches
- Cross Cut - Marie Stambaugh, 4.4 inches.

Rain filled stock tanks, even to the point of running around, in communities such as Rowden. Others areas have not received as much. Some farmers now have the necessary moisture to prepare their land for planting. Haygrazer and maize already planted will benefit from the generous rains. Pastures will have an opportunity to replenish and perhaps the cattle market will improve.

## Former C.P. Superintendent Nat H. Williams Passed Away June 1

Nat H. Williams, 91, of Fort Worth, Abilene Independent School District superintendent from 1947-1951, died Saturday, June 1, 1996, at a Fort Worth health center.

Private graveside services were in Resthaven Memorial Park, directed by Sanders Funeral Home.

Mr. Williams was born in Putnam and graduated from Abilene High School and, in 1924, from Simmons College (now Hardin-Simmons University). He graduated from the University of Texas with a master's degree and had a 49-year career in public education.

He taught at Abilene High School from 1924-1926 and was principal at Tahoka High School for three years. He was superintendent at Cross Plains, Baird, Ballinger and Gladewater before coming to Abilene and was superintendent at Lubbock for 19 years, retiring in 1970. He was an officer at American State Bank for eight years and was a board member of the Teachers Retirement System of Texas for 12

years, 10 as chairman. He served on the advisory committee of the University Interscholastic League and executive committee of Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers. He was former chairman of the board of stewards at First United Methodist Church.

He was active in Lions Club and served as president in two cities. He was also active on boards for Goodwill Enterprises, United Way and Boy Scouts of America, along with numerous other civic involvements. Nat Williams Elementary School in Lubbock is named in his honor. He was the widower of Georgia Williams.

Survivors include one son, Dr. Don Williams of Ada, Oklahoma; two daughters, Natilynne Camp of Fort Worth and Dr. Gwen Yeo of Aptos, California; eight grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

6. Funded a portion of Cross Plains' entry in the Texas Midwest Travel Guide and on the Internet.

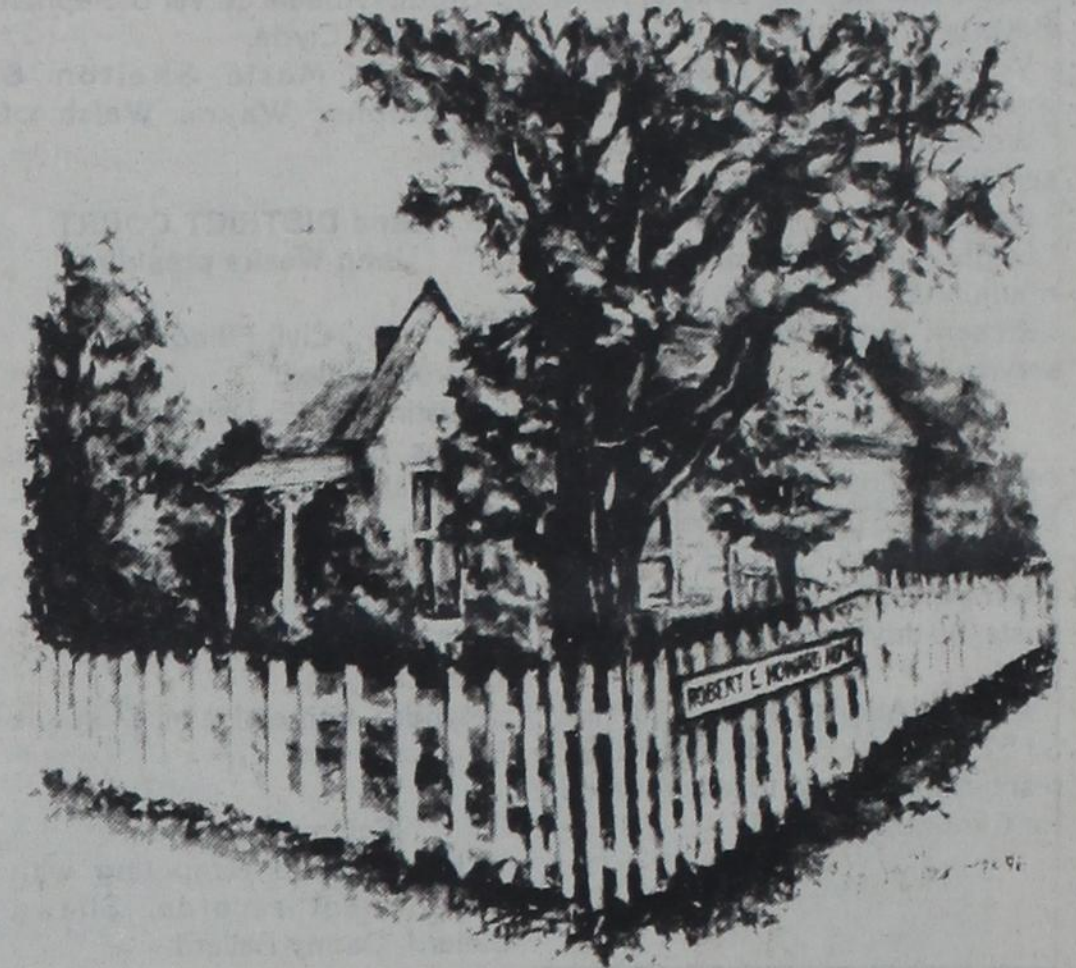

## Robert E. Howard Weekend Festivities Begins June 14

Cross Plains annual Howard Day observance this year will extend into a weekend of activities planned for Friday and Saturday, June 14 and 15.

Robert E. Howard, fantasy writer and creator of Conan, The Barbarian, made his home in Cross Plains from 1919 until his death in 1936. The Howard home, which owned and maintained by the Project Pride group, served as both home and office Howard during this period. This year marks the 60th anniversary of his death.

A dinner is scheduled at the Community Center on Friday evening at 7:00 o'clock. Deadline for ticket purchase is Monday, June 10. Tickets are \$8.00 each and are available at Greenwood Insurance or Citizens State Bank. If this is inconvenient you may call Margaret McNeel at 725-6100 or 725-6498 to make other arrangements. No tickets will be sold at the door. Michael Meyers and Ben Mouton of California will be showing clips from the movie, "The Whole Wide World," which is based on Novalyne Price Ellis' biography of Howard, ONE WHO WALKED ALONE. Ross Hemphill, a Dallas attorney and formerly of Cross Plains, will be sharing items of interest, as Ms. Ellis roomed with the Hemphill family during the period

she writes about.

Inquiries and reservations from out of town people have been pouring in, currently coming from 12 states and one European country. A recent feature article in the Dallas Morning News pertaining to Cross Plains' claim to fame and upcoming Howard Day observance was read by Cora Mae Byers of Dallas. She explained that she is a cousin to the late Mrs. Howard, Robert's mother, and plans to be here.

Saturday morning the Cross Plains Library will be displaying original manuscripts and first edition WEIRD TALES and books. There, too, you may purchase current publications of Howard's work and of Ellis' ONE WHO WALKED ALONE. The Howard House will open Saturday at 2:30 p.m. for public tours, visiting and refreshments. The Post Office will be open from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. offering a special Robert E. Howard commemorative cancellation.

Throughout the day sidewalk sales will be in progress under the direction of the Chamber of Commerce. Howard memorabilia will be for sale at various locations. Plan to come and share a bit of Cross Plains history.

**Regional Information Guides Now Available**

The Texas Midwest Community Network has published a regional information guide. Already distributed to Texas Information Centers state-wide the guides are also available at most chamber of commerce offices in the region.

The "Texas Midwest Guide" is a 40 page booklet that includes a variety of information about 24 communities in the Texas Midwest. In addition to a regional calendar of annual events, listings can be found for attractions, accommodations, bed and breakfasts, golf courses, lakes and camping, medical facilities, recreation and state parks. **Locally Known Woman Suffers Compound Fracture To Leg**

Nancy Palmer, executive secretary to Clyde CISD's superintendent, sustained a compound fracture of her left leg Thursday evening, May 30 while treating a horse.

The accident happened around 7:00 p.m. Thursday evening at her residence northeast of Clyde.

According to Nancy's husband, Charlie, she was assisting her son Michael who was treating a horse for ear ticks. He said Nancy was using a nose "twich" on the horse when the animal reared and came down on her left leg below the knee, breaking both lower leg bones. She also suffered a deep gash in her shin where the horse's hoof hit.

Charlie, local manager for West Texas Utilities Company, said he was out working at the time of the accident. The accident happened just after an afternoon thunder-

storm passed through Clyde which knocked electricity out to several parts of town.

Nancy was transported by Citizens EMS to Abilene Regional Medical Center where she currently remains. Surgery was performed Monday afternoon on her injured leg. Charlie said, according to the doctor the shin wound was "as contaminated as he had ever seen."

Charlie said it was just a freak accident. He said the horse which caused the injury is a gentle animal. Palmer said he purchased the horse from Bob Gallagher of Clyde.

Palmer said he didn't know when Nancy would be released from the hospital, but doctors want to make sure no infection occurs. "She needs everyone's prayers," Charlie said of his wife.

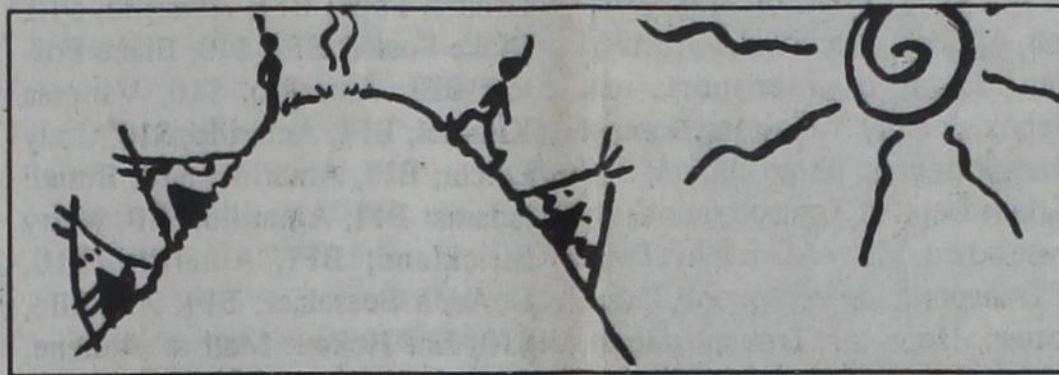
It is my opinion that we were all glad to experience the rain, we were just a smidgen over awed at the abundance of it in so short a time.

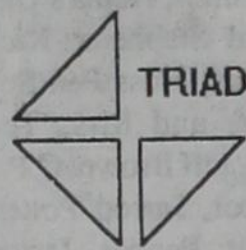

## TRIAD: Travel Tips For The Motoring Public

When traveling, motorists should take steps to protect themselves and their vehicles to reduce the risk and personal injury and theft.

### PREVENTIVE MAINTENANCE

The best way to avoid problems is to try to prevent them from happening. Make sure your check:

- \*All fluids.
- \*Proper air pressure of tires.
- \*Windshield wipers.
- \*Gas - keep it at least half full.
- \*Condition and air pressure of spare tire.
- \*Tell a friend or family member what route you are taking and when you expect to arrive.
- \*Have periodic mechanical check-ups at your local service station or automobile dealer.

### TIPS FOR GETTING TO AND FROM YOUR VEHICLE SAFE

- \*Have your keys in your hands as you approach your vehicle. You are most vulnerable when you are getting into the vehicle, even if you left the vehicle locked.
- \*Check the passenger compartment before getting into the vehicle, even if you left the vehicle locked.
- \*Lock all doors and roll up windows when driving.
- \*Never pick up hitchhikers.
- \*Always park in a central, well-lit place where there are attendants on duty.
- \*If you notice someone loitering near your vehicle, do not go near but seek help or wait until they leave.

### WHAT TO DO IF YOUR VEHICLE BREAKS DOWN

- \*Stay calm.
- \*Park as far off the traveled portion of the highway as possible.
- \*Make your vehicle visible - turn on your flashers.
- \*Exit the vehicle from the passenger's side, away from traffic.
- \*Open the vehicle's hood and leave it open.
- \*Tie a light colored cloth to the antennae or door handle.
- \*If possible, stay with the vehicle until uniformed law enforcement arrives, especially at night or during bad weather.
- \*Place a "Send Help" sign in a window so it is visible to other motorists.
- \*If someone stops to help, keep your doors locked, crack a window, and ask them to call law enforcement for help.
- \*If you decide you must walk, write down:

- \*The date.
- \*The time you left.
- \*The direction you are going.
- \*If you decide you must accept a ride with another motorist, write down:

- \*Your name.
- \*The date.
- \*The time you left.
- \*The direction you are going.
- \*The plate number of the you are riding in.
- \*Description of the vehicle.
- \*Name and description of the person you are riding with.
- \*Notify law enforcement of the location and circumstances in which you left your vehicle.

### CARJACKING

What is carjacking? Carjacking is the taking by force of someone's vehicle. It may be done at gunpoint and may involve a physical assault.

- \*Always be familiar with your surroundings. (Know what is going on around you.)
- \*Before getting to your vehicle, have your keys out and get into your vehicle quickly.
- \*Lock all doors and keep your windows rolled up.
- \*Conceal all valuables. Keep them under the seat or locked in the trunk.
- \*When you are stopped at a red light or stop sign, leave room to maneuver around the vehicle in front of you.
- \*If someone tries to enter your vehicle at a red light or stop sign, drive through the intersection (safely).
- \*Use interstates or toll ways when traveling through cities. Stay out of high crime areas.
- \*If you need to stop for gas or use a phone choose a well-lit, busy facility.
- \*If you are followed into your driveway, stay in your vehicle until you can identify the other driver. If you need to, sound the horn in short steady blasts to get the attention of others.
- \*If someone bumps into the rear of your car at an intersection or when traveling at slow speeds, do not get out, but motion for the driver to follow you to the nearest police station, fire station, or other busy, well-lit facility.
- \*Most important, if there is no escape, **DO NOT RESIST.** Your life is more valuable than your money or your car.

### Limits On Breast Cancer Drug Recommended

The National Cancer Institute recommends that doctor limit use of the drug tamoxifen in the treatment of breast cancer to five years. New studies have found there is no benefit for longer use. Tamoxifen, sold under the name Nolvadex, is prescribed for women who have had surgery for breast cancer that had not spread to the lymph nodes and who had a type of cancer fueled by estrogen. Tamoxifen remains one of the most potent weapons against breast cancer and the limit to five years should in no way diminish its use.

## How To Live A Long, Healthy Life

**HOUSTON** -- (Baylor College of Medicine) -- Do you want to increase your chances of living a long, healthy life? Stay active and "connected."

"Exercise can help older people stay strong and guard against frailty. Even an activity as basic as walking maintains muscle mass and strengthens bones," said Dr. Robert Roush, an associate professor in the Huffington Center on Aging at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Staying 'connected' to other people is another vital component of longevity."

Roush says that Americans are living longer than ever before and that focusing on "functional age" is the goal.

"This means we are staying active longer and increasing the quality of our lives as we get older," he said.

Advances in public health, breakthroughs in medical technology and better preventive health care cited by Roush as the major reasons for improved health later in life. A change in attitudes among the general public and those in the medical profession have contributed as well.

"People in their 70s and 80s are running and playing golf and tennis on a regular basis," Roush said. "These are not the types of things we always thought older people should be doing. But now it's clear that an active lifestyle is one of the keys to enjoying a long, healthy life."

"Having a circle of friends, taking the time to talk with people and interacting with others builds emotional ties while exercising the brain," he said. "This may also help you to avoid depression."

While the life span of human beings may never change much, steps can be taken to improve the quality of life during the later years.

"Research has taught us a great deal about aging, and we will continue to learn more in the future," Roush said. "We are already beginning to see that old age can be enjoyable."

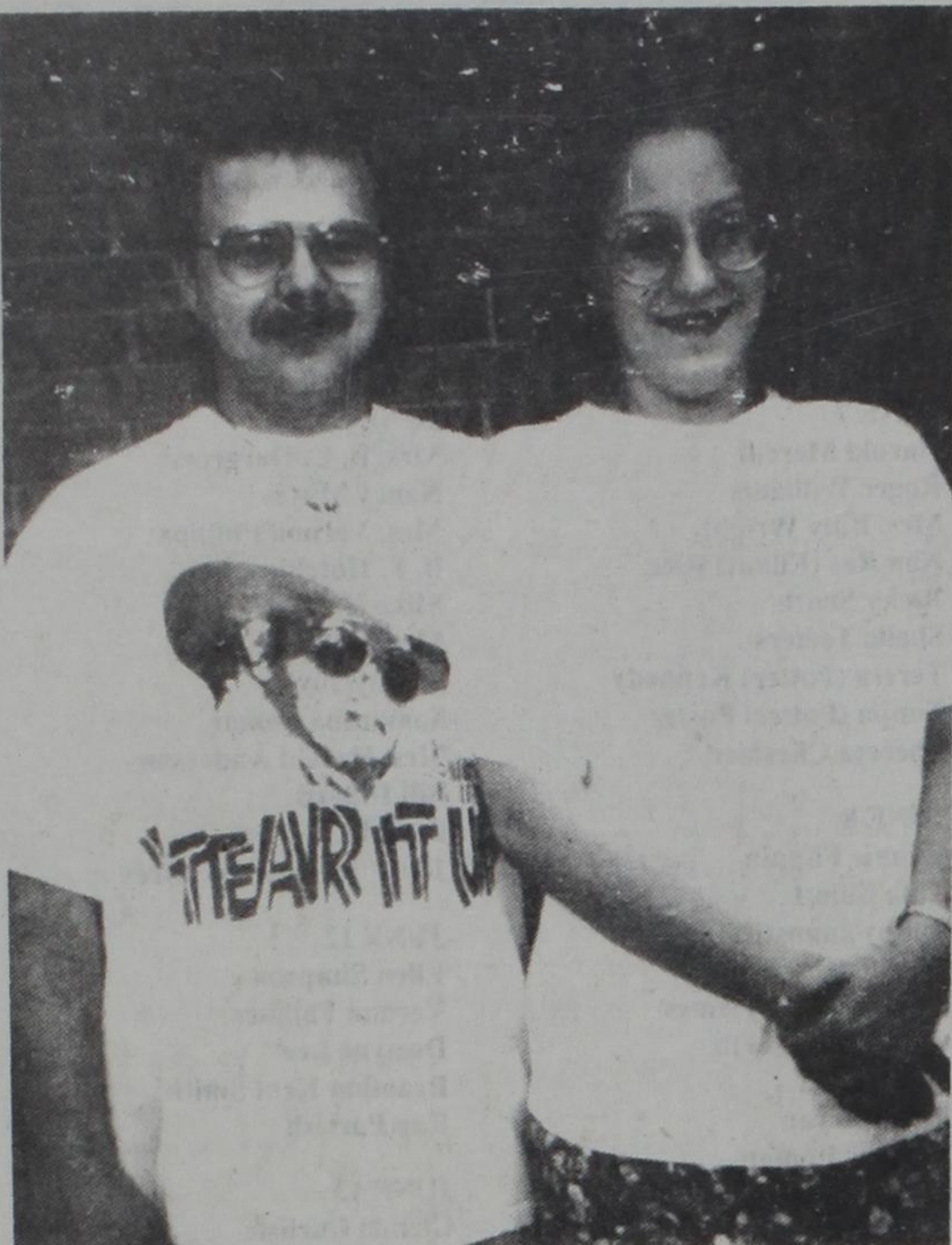

## Interest Rate For Veterans Land Loans Lowered to 6.65 Percent

AUSTIN -- The Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) has reduced interest rates on land loans to Texas veterans to 6.65 percent interest.

The board set a 6.65 percent interest rate for loans up to \$20,000 on a 30-year term. On loans up to \$40,000 the new rate will be 8.85 percent on a 30-year term. A 5 percent minimum down payment is required.

The rates had been 7.64 on loans up to \$20,000 and 9.80 on loans up to \$40,000.

"This reduction reflects the board's commitment to keeping interest rates for veterans well below market rates in general in both our land and housing program," said Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, VLB chairman. "And it reflects the VLB's intention to react quickly and efficiently to market conditions."

In addition to the land program, Texas veterans can receive both home and home improvement loans - a total of \$110,000 low-interest loan package.

Since all Texas veterans loans are funded by bond sales and there are no discount points charged, loan costs under the program have consistently been among the lowest in the nation with rates that usually range from a point to a point-and-a-half below market rates. Small fees on each loan cover the costs of administering the program and the bonds are retired as the borrowers pay off their loans.

Mauro said the VLB programs have never been more popular with Texas veterans.

"This cost-effective method of financing allows this great program to function at no cost to the taxpayers," Mauro said. "At the same time, VLB loans stimulate the Texas economy by creating new jobs in construction and real estate in every region of the state."

"Texas veterans know that our loan programs are far and away the best deal in today's home and land buying market," he said. "No other state has anything that compares with these special benefits. It's a special way of saying 'thanks' to our veterans for the sacrifices they've made in the service of our country."

The VLB made nearly 150,000 loans to Texas veterans totaling \$2.5 billion since the program began making loans in 1949. Economists estimate that for each dollar through the program six dollars are created in the economy, which means Texas has benefited by more than \$14 billion in the overall VLB ripple effect.

Last November Texas voters approved a constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$500 million in bonds to finance low-interest housing loans for Texas veterans. The measure won landslide approval from Texas voters with 59.7 percent statewide.
