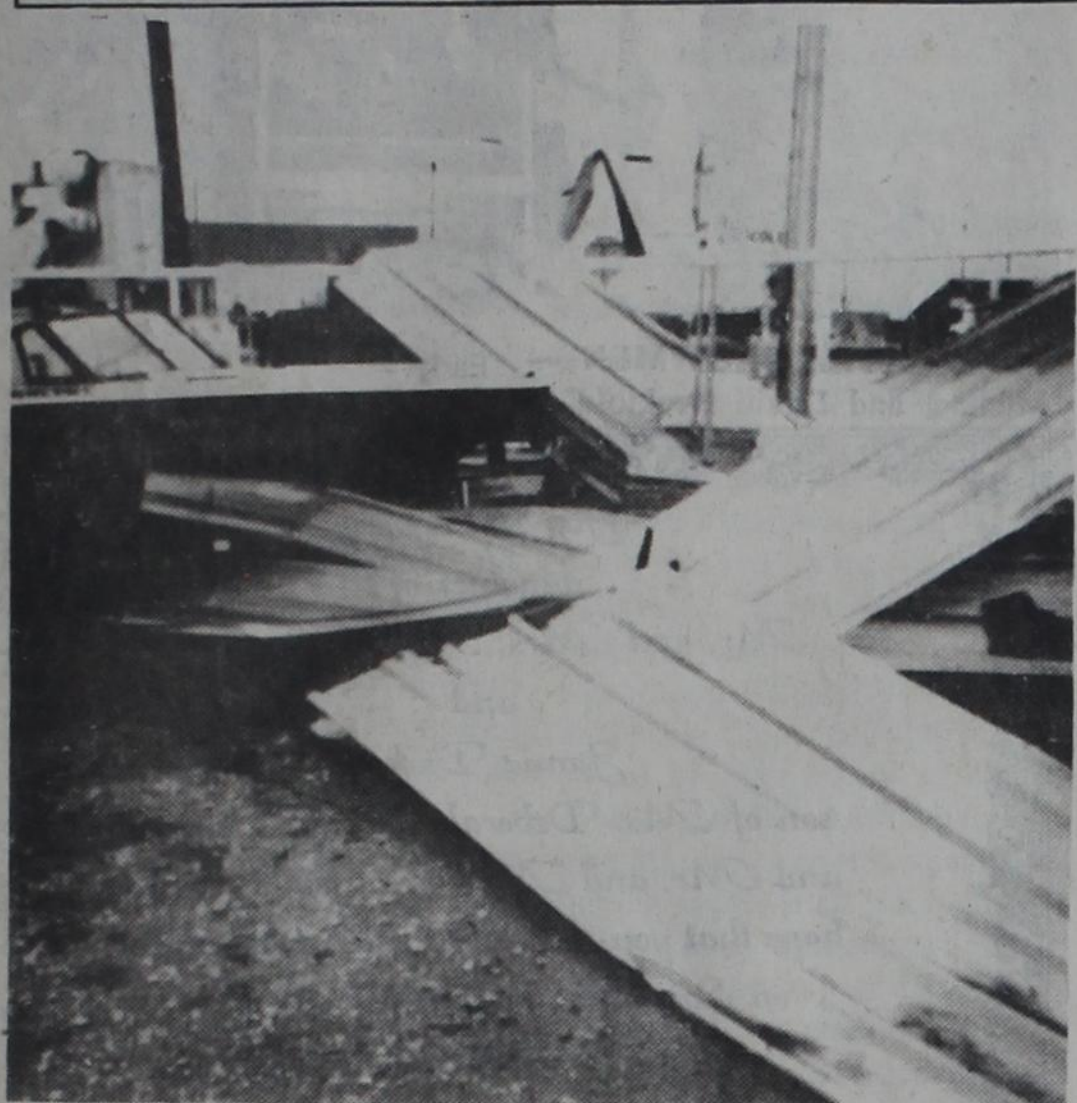

STRONG WINDS BLEW THROUGH CROSS PLAINS

Wednesday, July 31, a thunderstorm delivered some much needed precipitation to the city of Cross Plains, but high winds also played havoc. Some reported seeing a funnel cloud, while others feel that it was straight line winds. At approximately 3:15 p.m. rain was falling so hard and blowing that visibility was difficult.

The tin top of Flip's Choice, an antique shop located on East Highway 36 (across from Food Plaza), was ripped off and scattered for three blocks. Donald Flippin reported a \$300 loss in merchandise due to water leaks and having a shelf with glassware blown over.

Strips of tin dangled from telephone and electricity lines in the four-way stop intersection and down West Highway 36. Telephone and electricity lines were severed. West Texas Utility restored service to Dudley's Fruit Stand. Cable lines were damaged and cable representatives repaired the lines. GTE used their service buckets to retrieve tin from the overhead lines.

Tin was wrapped around objects and damaged merchandise on the lot at J & L Sales, owned by Joe Kemp

and Lowell Martin. Mr. Martin also owns the building Flip's Choice was housed in.

A piece of tin damaged Don Gosnell's pickup which was parked at Jody's Tropical Sno. Those inside during the storm reported the duration of the storm as a little rough.

Bill Dudley, who operates the fruit stand on J & L Sales corner made a dive under his stock trailer for protection.

B&R Fireworks Stand, owned by Brandon Smith and Rodney Rudloff, on Highway 206 was turned over and damaged.

The roof of James and Deborah Griswold's storage building was blown through their kitchen windows. LaNeal (Sissy) Worley stated that the walls in her home, just one block north of the blinker light, were shaking just like in May of 1994. The Jim Irwin's lost the roof over their travel trailer. There was numerous personal damage to homes but the information was not available. Several inches of rain fell during the brief storm. Everyone is thankful for the blessing of the showers.

County Fire Departments At Rural Fire Protection Meeting Well Attended

ABILENE—Callahan County was well represented Monday night at a meeting with the Rural Fire Protection Steering Committee. This committee is made up of individuals from different segments of fire service agencies all over the United States and reports to the appropriate members of Congress to influence legislation concerning rural fire protection.

Members of Baird, Eula, Clyde, and Cross Plains Fire Departments were among the 38 Departments attending the meeting. Fourteen fire trucks that had been acquired through the Texas Forest Service, and used by area rural fire departments, were on display outside the Round Building at the West Texas Fair Grounds. A total of 9 area counties were represented by their fire departments, county commissioners, and county judges.

Due to recent fires in Texas, New Mexico, and Alaska the Committee was provided with an excellent opportunity to reconvene and conduct site visits to these areas. Their findings will be used to update procedure documents and enhance cooperation between all agencies involved in fighting fires in the wildland-urban interface. The committee will meet with affected homeowners, local firefighters, state & federal fire managers and officials of all levels to gauge the effectiveness of local fire planning, training, and coordination.

Our area was honored with this visit and to have our local input expressed before the members of the committee. The committee is holding just two of these meetings in each state before mentioned.

Representatives of the various fire departments in attendance spoke to the group of local needs and problems in our area. Of these, Equipment and Financial Assistance were at the top of the lists. The Big Country Firefighters Association was praised by the Texas Forest Service for their efforts to coordinate the area fire departments with a unified communication system and the formation of the Big Country Task Force to help area departments with manpower and equipment in large fire situations. Most of the Callahan County Fire Departments are members of this organization.

Baird Fire Chief Tom Windham was interviewed by KRBC news. He told the reporter that March of this year was a bad time as there were many brush fires in the county and keeping the trucks up in shape to

fight fires was a problem. He said donations from area citizens was very instrumental in the Baird trucks being able to make it to all the fires.

Michael and David Bechtold of Earl have been showing rabbits for nine years and are raking in quite a collection of awards for their hard work.

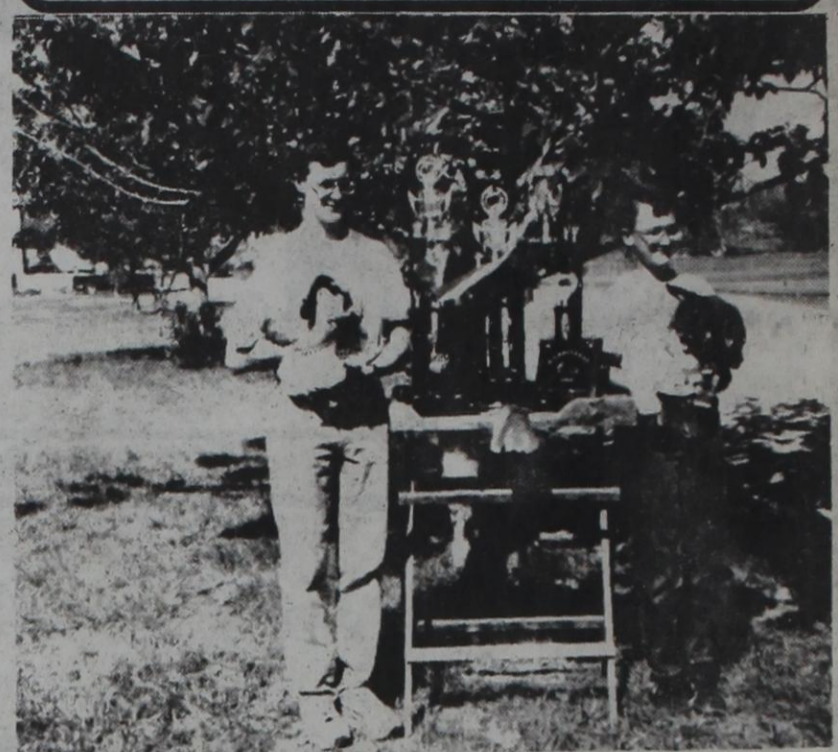

Quips, Clips & Comments

Bored with the heat? Yearning to do something different, but don't want to go out due to the heat?

Try this! Go into your cool, air conditioned kitchen and with inspiration create a dream meal. First remove that tired everyday tablecloth. Replace with frilly lace tablecloth, or a cool, spring, pastel cloth and matching napkins. For a centerpiece, a slender vase filled with a few long-stemmed blossoms from your flower garden on, surround with votive candles in pastel shades to be lit when dinner is served.

For an appetizer, dip rims of juice glasses in lemon or lime juice and then dip rims in salt, chill in freezer until meal time. When dinner is served fill with V-8 or tomato juice and insert a celery or carrot stick as the swizzle stick. Serve with toasted wheat bread rounds.

For the entree!

Herb Crusted Pork Tenderloins with Roasted Sweet Red Pepper Sauce...

To complete the meal...Buttered Noodles with Crunchy Poppyseed and Shredded Carrot, Raisin and Crushed Pineapple Salad.

For dessert...Berries with Rose Geranium Cream and Lavender Shortbread cookies. Prepare food ahead. Around 3:30 p.m. take a 45 minute to an hour nap or relax and read a good book or magazine. Next turn on some easy listening music or other relaxing tunes and take a long, hot soaking bath. When you emerge from the tub, dry briskly with a soft towel and slather on some rich moisturizing body lotion. Get dressed in something cool and crisp, brush hair back from face and if worn long fasten hair with a large clip. Get out your glass or crystal pitcher and mix gingerale and white grape juice half and half, garnish with orange slices and chill. Serve when spouse returns home for dinner. Now that you've had some relaxation and the cooling drink, heat the entree' and noodle dish in the microwave and -- Dinner is served. Ah-h-h-hh Super!

Recipes follow: Pork Tenderloins -- Herb Encrusted with Roast Red Pepper Sauce

2-12 ounce Pork Tenderloins--1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon cracked black pepper, 1/2 cup finely chopped parsley, 1/4 cup finely chopped fresh

herbs (rosemary, sage, thyme, oregano, and/or marjoram).

Trim fat from pork tenderloin. Season tenderloins with salt and pepper. Combine parsley and finely chopped herbs, coat tenderloin on all sides with herb mixture. Wrap each tenderloin in plastic wrap and chill for 6 to 24 hours. Meanwhile, to make sauce, halve 2 large peppers (sweet), remove stems, seeds and membranes. Place peppers cut side down on a foil lined baking sheet. Bake in a 425 degree oven 20 to 25 minutes or until skin is bubbly and brown. Place peppers in a new brown paper bag; seal and let stand 20 to 30 minutes or until cool enough to handle. Peel skin from peppers, place peppers in the bowl of a food processor. Add the quarter cup roasted hazelnuts, 2 cloves garlic, 2 tablespoons sherry vinegar, 1 tablespoon rosemary, 1 tablespoon oregano, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper. Process until smooth. With processor running, gradually add 1/2 cup of the olive oil; process until thick. Cover, chill until needed.

Heat 1/4 cup olive oil in a large ovenproof skillet. Add herb-crusted pork and brown over medium heat, turning to brown all sides, about 8 minutes total. Transfer skillet to a 400 degree oven, bake for 15 minutes or until meat thermometer reads 160 degrees. Remove from oven, let meat set for 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, place the red pepper sauce in the top of a double boiler, heat over a simmering water. Thinly slice meat, serve with red pepper sauce.

Makes 6 servings.

Crunchy Poppy Seed Noodles -- Into a sauce pan, place 4 cups water, bring to a boil, add 1 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon oil. When water is at a rolling boil add 1 1/2 cups wide egg noodles. When noodles are tender pour into a colander or sieve, drain. Place cooked noodles back into the sauce pan. Add 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, toss, then salt and pepper to taste. **Sour cream may be substituted for butter or margarine for that European taste.** Place in serving dish, sprinkle lavishly with poppyseed. Serve with herb encrusted pork tenderloins and carrot-raisin salad.

What think ye of Jesus when He says, "Come follow Me...?" That is His basic invitation, you see. It's what He invited, encouraged and challenged Peter, Andrew, James and John to do, Matthew 4:18-22.
