## Farmers To Take Yet Another Blow

A news release from Texas Farm Bureau advised farmers concerning the taxation of diesel. "Fill your diesel storage and tractor tanks now!" was the comment made by Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True.

Upon returning from Washington, D.C. where he was working on a delay in the April 1 start-up date for implementing the new diesel tax collection procedures, he was not encouraged.

"It looks like the April 1 date is our biggest obstacle," the Plainview farmer said. He noted that if legislative changes were not made before Friday, April 1, farmers and ranchers will be forced to pay the 15.1 cents per gallon tax at the time of purchase and then apply for a refund.

True, as a farm leader, said the proposal to maintain the present federal diesel fuel excise tax exemption has tremendous support in Congress, including all but four of the 27 House members from Texas.

He anticipated the short time-frame legislative technicalities and budget implications to be a great disadvantage in halting the bill.

H.R. 4192 is the critical bill to maintain the exemption, and it is presently before the House Ways and Means Committee.

True stated that Texas Senator Phil Gramm and Rep. Larry Combest, Lubbock, were among the first to introduce bills against the tax back in January. Changes in the collection point for diesel taxes were incorporated in the Revenue Act of 1987.

We will be watching for the decision concerning the bill and in the meantime, I hope that it will be intervened. With our community being primarily farm-oriented, the effect on many residents is obvious.

The application for a refund sounds like more red tape, while obtaining the additional cost for fuel tax is one more costly expense in producing a crop.

It is not reasonable that farmers and ranchers continually withstand penalties, while they feed our country plus many more. Have they become so efficient that they are like the student who is over-qualified for every employment position? How have all the priorities become reversed?

## Billy D. Dillard Ends Long Career With City

Thursday afternoon, March 31, will mark the end of an era at Cross Plains City Hall. At that time Billy D. Dillard, Sr. will reach the end of a 25-year career, one that informed observers feel has seen the municipality develop from "a little town in financial trouble" to perhaps the most solvent city of its size in Texas.

Audits done in April 1963 show the city's net worth at that time was \$218,794. This value included the City Hall, waterworks, sewer system, street machinery, mosquito sprayer, dump truck, fire equipment, and everything else the town possessed. The most recent audit, one done by an Albany firm of certified public accountants, reveals the city's assets now aggregate \$881,958, a growth of more than 300 per cent during Dillard's tenure. This has been accomplished notwithstanding the fact that eight years ago all ad valorem levies were discontinued and Cross Plains became one of the few cities in the nation that collects no property tax.

Becoming a town without a tax is only possible when there is no bonded debt. To reach this level of eligibility Cross Plains paid the remaining \$36,000 worth of bonds on the waterworks and \$53,000 incidental to bringing the two Bryant additions into the incorporation. Simultaneously during this 25-year span the city upgraded public facilities and prepared for future demands on water, sewer, and fire departments. Accordingly, expenditures of \$105,000 were made for additional land at the sanitary landfill and at the sewage disposal plant, making a total of 105 acres owned there by the city. Thirty-six acres were bought on FM Road 880, two miles north of town and added to the waterfield. Another 120 acres was acquired near Cottonwood for the same purpose. These two land additions are currently valued at \$145,000.

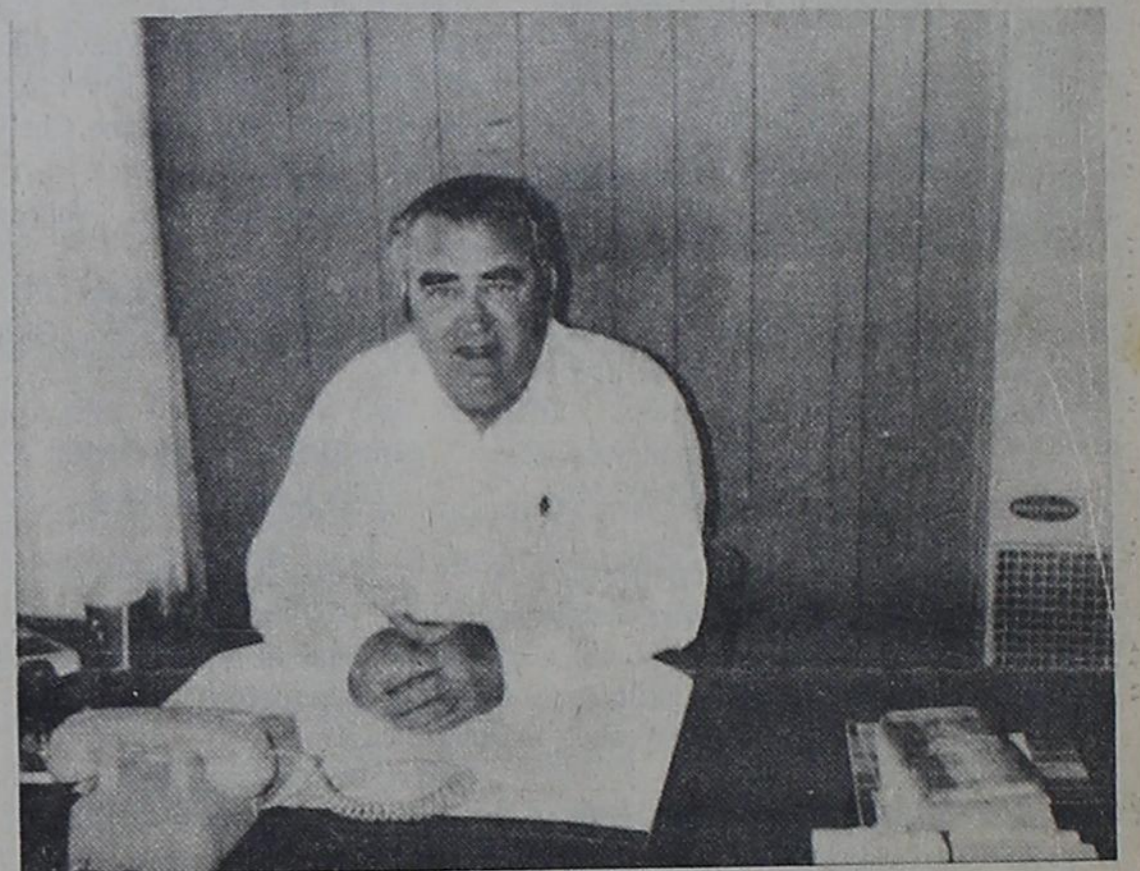
Much of the city's upgrading has been in drilling the water fields, laying lines, and installing pumping equipment. Twenty-five years ago Cross Plains could pump 110 gallons of water per minute. Present potential is 1,000 gallons per minute. Water storage has been tripled since 1963.

With the city providing \$4,500 worth of materials and firemen and others volunteering most of the labor, a new fire station was added in 1964. A building for street equipment was constructed near the settling plant on 9th Street in 1985 at a cost of \$15,000. It houses a large caterpillar for which the city paid \$60,000, an all-purpose truck, tractor and shredder and street grader, as well as pumping equipment and pipe and supplies. Near this site are also a new pump station and chlorination system.

Cross Plains has 80 per cent of its streets paved and well-maintained. Miles of new water and sewer lines have been laid and additional fireplugs installed in all sections of town.

A facility enjoyed by most all local residents is the new Community Center at the east end of 9th Street. It provides a public meeting place, reunion hall, and serves as the polls at election time. Parking space there is paved. A well-equipped playground and tennis courts are nearby. Dillard points out that facility and others were made possible by federal grants and federal revenue sharing which the city received annually until a few years ago. "These federal funds were carefully used," he says, "as also were the monies spent to improve many substandard homes."

A small innovation which Dillard recommended to city fathers was the painting of the water tower in purple and gold, colors of Cross Plains High School. Other towns have copied Cross Plains' leadership in this and so far as anyone here knows a water

tower thus painted has never been disfigured by graffiti. High schoolers seem to like the idea and help keep their colors untarnished.

Cross Plains has been an incorporated city 77 years, served by 17 different men as mayor and 100 separate councilmen. Dillard worked with six mayors and about 33 councilmen. "I would say for every one of them that there was never a wastrel in the lot and all tried to save city money and do the best job possible," he declared.

Although Dillard's duties with the city will officially end at quitting time Thursday, he has assured Mayor Frank Robertson and present members of the Council that he will be available on call in any emergency. The city does not plan to replace Dillard. Vickie Walker will become manager and city secretary and Maxey Evans and Bill Hedrick will assume additional responsibilities.

Shaun, a freshman at Western Texas College in Snyder, is majoring in agribusiness. He graduated from Cross Plains High School and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Scott Odom.

The Foundation is part of Communication for Agriculture, a national, non-partisan, non-profit rural advocacy organization which has a number of members in this area. 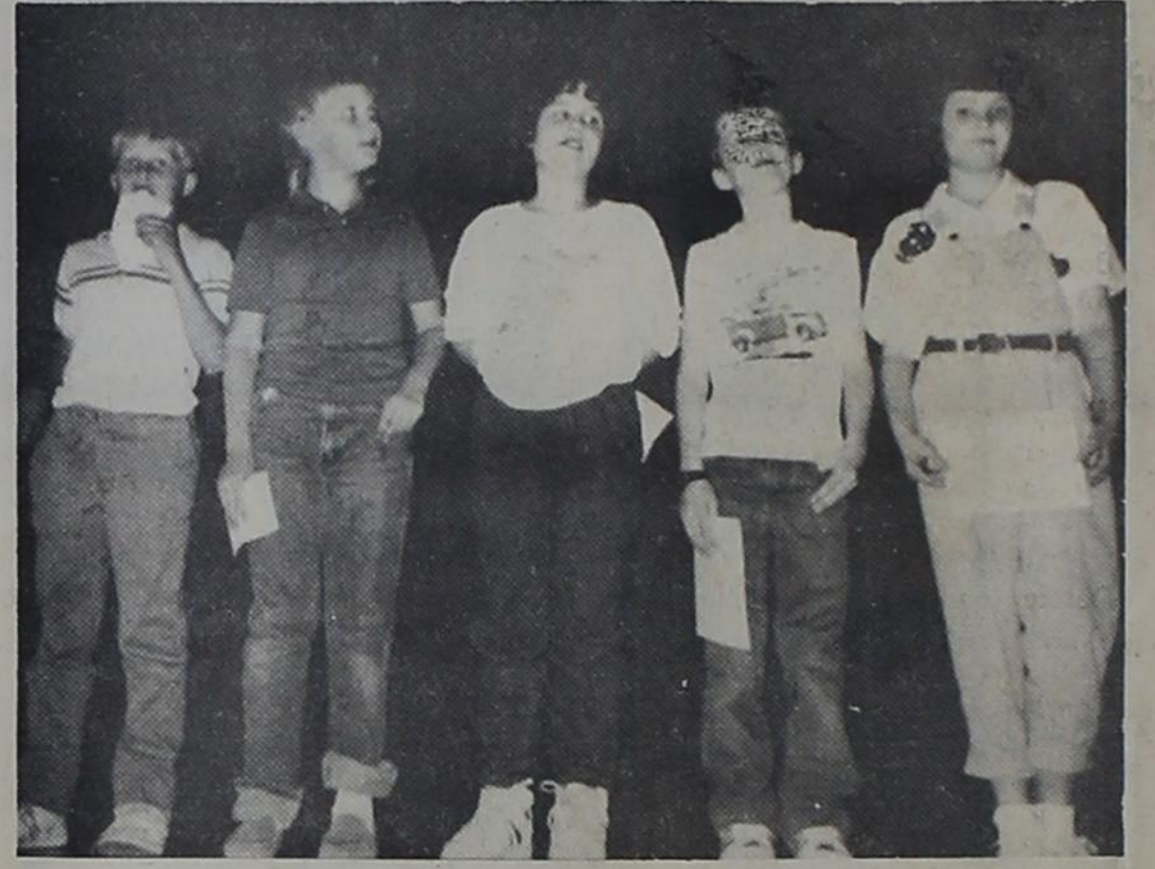

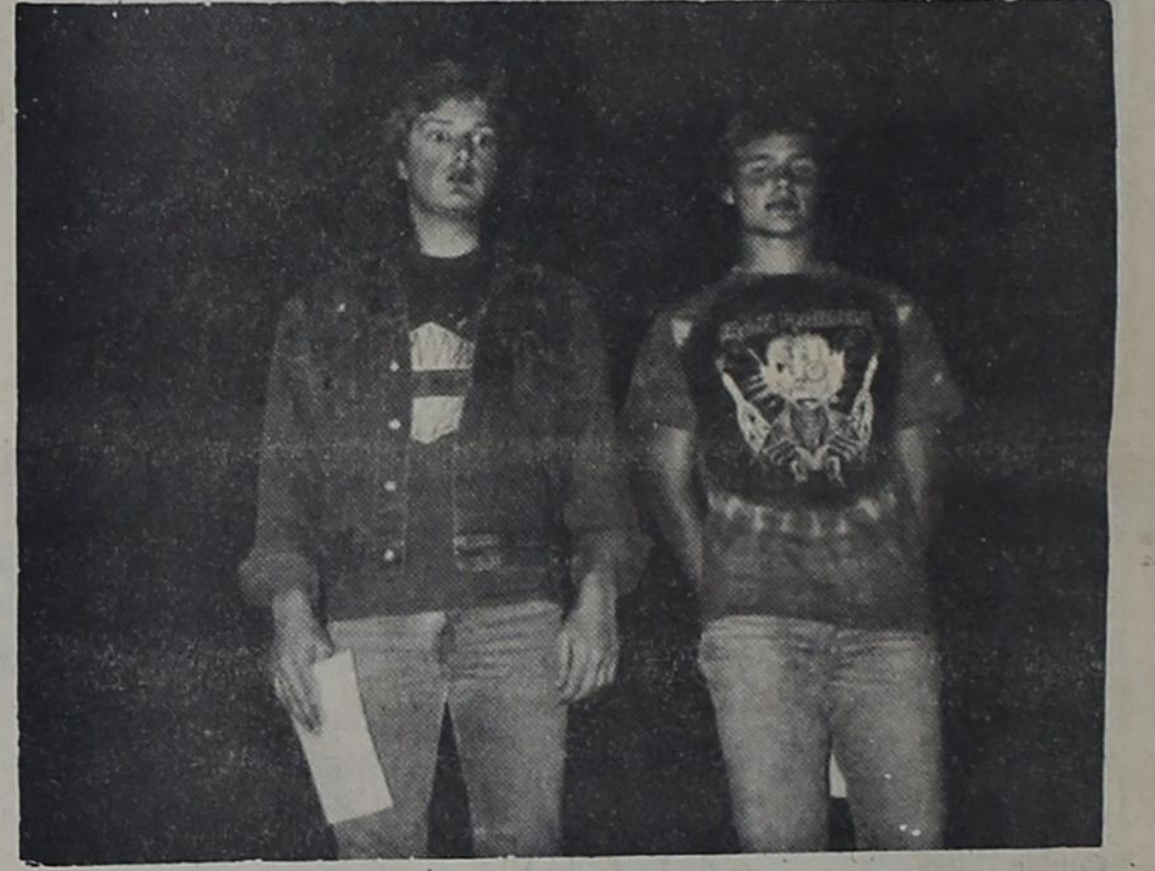

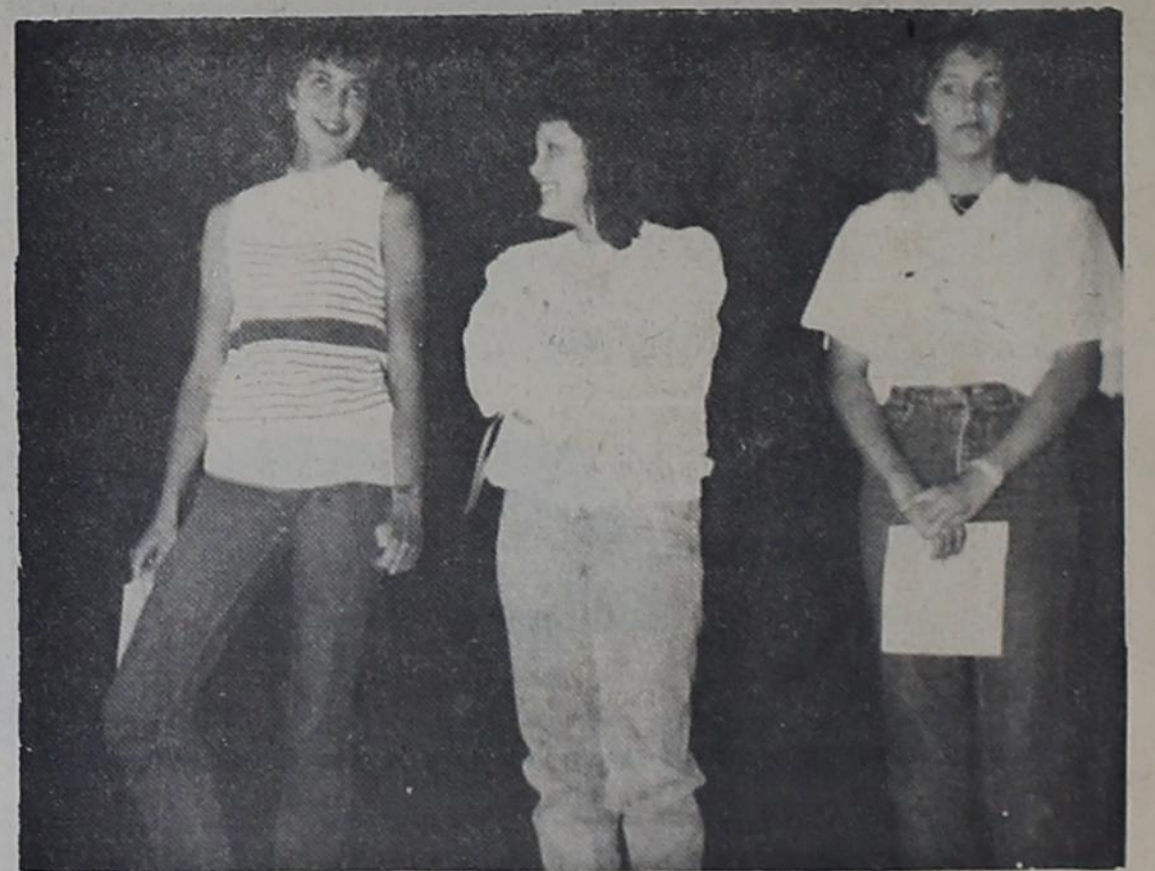

The Gold Boys team took second place with 4 wins and 2 losses. They were coached by Donnie Dillard and Mike Yates.

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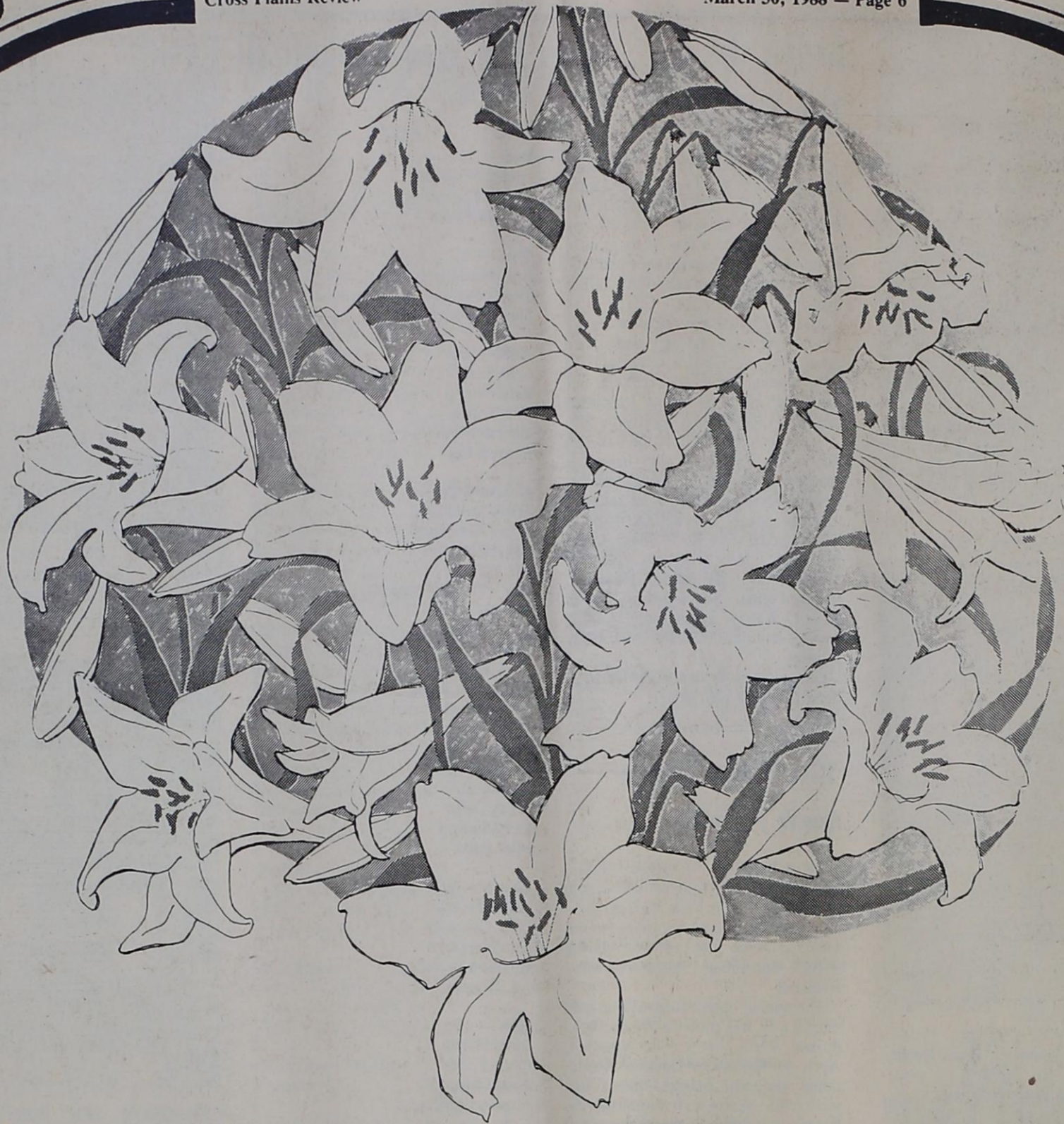

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## Cattlemen Protest Change In Liability Insurance Regs For Farm Trailers

SAN ANTONIO — Texas farmers and cattlemen may not have liability insurance coverage on their farm trailers thanks to a little publicized action by the State Board of Insurance, says John E. Birdwell, president of the 14,000-member Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Speaking at the association's 111th annual convention here, Birdwell warned cattlemen that many of them were in jeopardy of not having coverage, were subject to severe liability if they had an accident, and risked possible suspension of their driver's license for failure to maintain financial responsibility. He laid the blame on a November 1, 1987, decision by the State Board of Insurance which requires separately scheduled liability insurance for all trailers with a 2,000-pound load capacity pulled by vehicles not covered under a personal auto policy written after November 1. Previously, if a farmer was towing a trailer with a vehicle covered either by a personal or business auto policy, the trailer was also covered.

"While it is still true that trailers towed by personal vehicles with personal auto coverage are exempt from being scheduled separately, you may find instances where a farmer or cattlemen will have to pull that trailer with a vehicle that is not carried as a personal vehicle such as a grain truck. In that case, the grain truck would be covered under a business auto policy and separate coverage would be needed for the trailer," Birdwell said. "Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers believes this rule change is unnecessary and will have an adverse financial affect on a substantial number of our members. I have called on the State Board of Insurance to hold a public hearing as soon as possible so that the agency can better understand the seriousness of this action."

Birdwell noted that it is not unusual for a family farm or ranch to have several small trailers with a load capacity exceeding a ton. A two-horse trailer, for example, would probably be required to have separate liability coverage if pulled by something other than the owner's personal vehicle.

Birdwell also criticized the State Board of Insurance for not adequately notifying farmers and cattlemen of the new insurance requirement and added that many insurance agents were unaware of the change leaving the farmer or cattlemen vulnerable to suit or other penalties for not having his trailers insured.
