Billy Dillard Honored For 20 Years Service To National Weather Service

On August 28, Mr. Billy Dillard of Cross Plains was honored for 20 years of service to the National Weather Service and to the people of north central Texas. Mr. Dillard joined the Cooperative Weather program in August of 1975.

The National Weather Service has undergone major changes in the Cooperative Weather program during the last year which resulted in a delay in getting Mr. Dillard his award. A certificate recognizing Mr. Dillard's 20 years of service and a letter of appreciation from the Director of the National Weather Service's Southern Region was presented to Mr. Dillard

by Ms. Eva Mullen, who is a Cooperative Program manager for parts of central Texas.

The data that Mr. Dillard collects is compiled and mailed to the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, North Carolina, at the end of each month. The information is archived and published in NOAA's Hourly Precipitation Data of Texas to become part of a permanent record of the world's weather.

The National Weather Service gratefully acknowledges Mr. Dillard's contribution to them and to the community.

A series of approximately 20 or more art works created by Calvin Champion over the last 4 years, will be on display during Abilene's monthly downtown Art Walk.

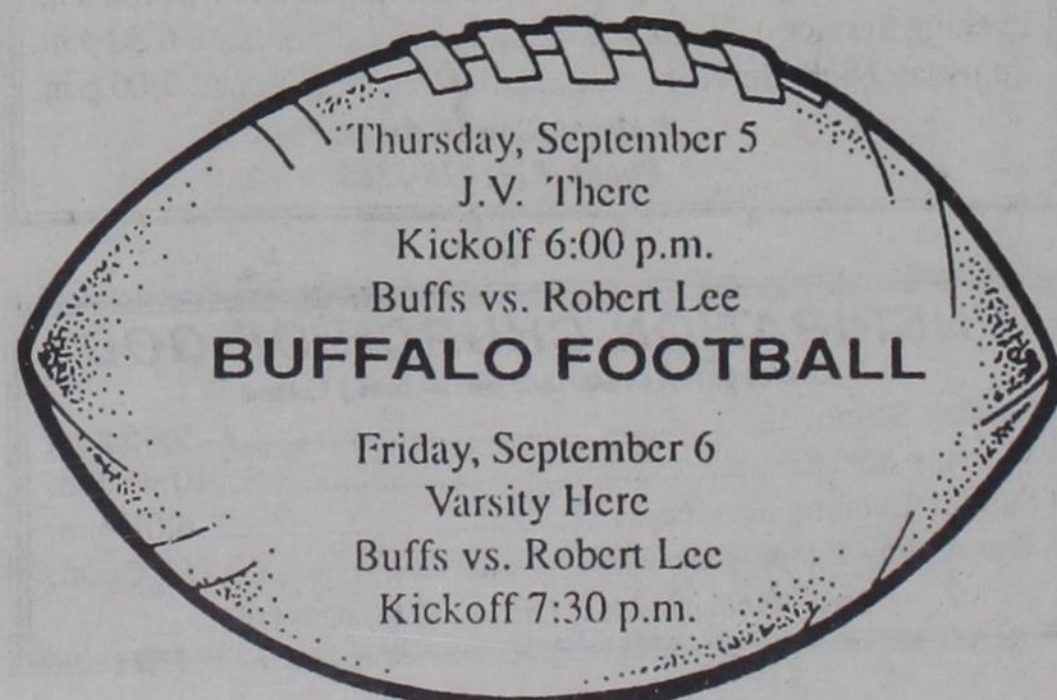

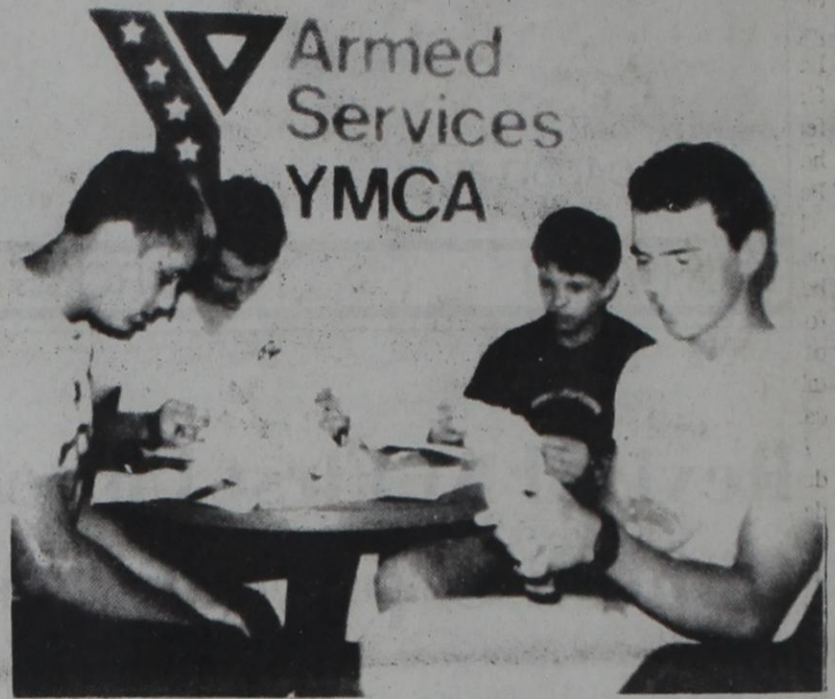
Effie Maxine Fields

Judge Poe has appeared on 60 Minutes, 20/20, NBC Special Reports, CNN Special Reports and Dateline NBC to discuss innovative sentencing. He has been named Outstanding District Judge by the Houston Police Officers Assn. and the Harris County Deputy Sheriff's Assn., and Outstanding National Victim Advocate by the National Victims Center.

Some sentencing include a wife abuser apologizing to the victim before a women's organization, a convicted man shoveling horse manure at the Police stables, and a piano teacher who molested two students selling his piano and posting a warning sign at his home. Stenholm Seeking Applicants For Nomination To The U.S. Service Academies

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that he is currently seeking applicants for nomination to the United States Service Academies. Applicants for nomination to the U.S. Military Academy in West Point, New York, the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado, the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland, and the United States Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point, New York, may be obtained by writing to Congressman Stenholm's San Angelo office.

Nominations are available to young men and women who will be at least 17 years of age, not past their 22nd birthday, upon entry into the academy in July. Nominees are selected by a competitive process, judged on scholastic aptitude, moral character, leadership ability, and community involvement.

The academies offer a four-year degree in a variety of areas ranging from Civil Engineering and Physics, to American Studies and Behavioral Science. While attending the academies, cadets and midshipmen will earn an annual salary from which expenses for books, uniforms, and incidentals are taken. Tuition, room, board, medical, and dental expenses are paid for by the academies. Upon graduation from the academies, the cadets and midshipmen will serve as officers in the service for a minimum of six years.

Any persons who may be interested in applying for a nomination, or who would like to obtain additional information, should write to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, 33 East Twohigh #318, San Angelo, Texas 76903. Applications must be submitted, and files completed, no later than December 1, 1996. Nominations will be made toward the end of December.

Quips, Clips & Comments

"FENNEL"

Have you had the occasion to grow or cook with the herb fennel? I first grew fennel in my herb garden in Lubbock. When I relocated here to Cross Plains. I purchased some fennel plants for my herb garden here. They are growing like wildfire. Fennel loves it here in Cross Plains.

Though fennel is edible, it also is a beautiful plant for the flower beds because of its outstanding form and foliage. The foliage is similar to that of dill, however, I have found it has a taller more abundant foliage. It also can be found in seed catalogues.

Fennel is a tender perennial that does equally well in vegetable gardens and flower borders. In kitchen gardens, try combining the fennels delicate foliage with large, coarse-leaved plants such as artichokes etc. In the flower garden the plants feathery sprays grow rapidly to 5 feet, forming an excellent backdrop foil for most perennials and annuals.

Fennel needs sun and good humus-rich soil. Grow it as you would an annual herb sowing the seeds directly in the garden in spring. In mild areas, fennel may successfully be overwintered with protection. From experience, I have found this to be the case here. We just rake leaves around it in the fall and winter and it comes back out each spring.

There also is Florence fennel grown not only for its edible leaves but also for its bulb like base. Give Florence fennel plenty of water as the bulb is forming.

All fennel varieties will stimulate your sense of smell as much as your

sight. It's fresh, anise like fragrance make weeding and harvesting--or just brushing against it in passing--a pleasant experience.

Minced fennel leaves lend a delightful flavor to salads, fish, and egg dishes. Sprinkle the leaves in a bread pan before the dough is added to infuse home-baked bread with unforgettable flavor and aroma. The yellow flowers, too provide an anise like taste and thus add both flair and flavor to salads. Collect and dry fennel seed to add to rice or fish dishes. If you are an adventuresome cook, crush a few seeds and add them to apple pie for an unusual but pleasant taste combination. We have found deviled eggs containing fennel, delicious and delightful.

Fennel seed are also recommended for obesity.

Florence fennel should be harvested early while the bulb is young and tender. The mild, crunchy bulbs, should measure 3 to 5 inches across. Do not let the plant bolt before harvesting--an elongated bulb is a sign that the plant is beginning to form its flower stalk. Use the bulbs whole roasted, or braised as side dishes to meat and poultry, or add the celery-like stalks to salads. While successive crop may appear, these will often become tough.

Whether you try for its decorative foliage or delicious flavor you won't regret giving it space in your garden.

It finally rained again. What do you reckon the chances are of it continuing intermittently for the rest of the year? ANY PREDICTIONS?

In-person voting will take place in the county Extension offices. Voters may request an absentee ballot from the county Extension office that serves the voter's residence or, if the voter is a business entity, the office that serves its main office or headquarters.

County Extension offices may only fill requests for absentee ballots from August 26 through September 17. Completed absentee ballots must be received in the county Extension office by the close of business on September 27. Ballots will be counted on October 16.

If the referendum is approved, the program would be funded by a mandatory assessment on domestic producers, feeders and exporters of live sheep and greasy wool. The assessment would be one cent per pound on live sheep sold and two cents per pound on greasy wool sold. Importers would be assessed a one cent per pound on live sheep, the equivalent of one cent per pound of live sheep for sheep products as well as two cents per pound of degreased wool or the equivalent of degreased wool for wool and wool products.

An earlier referendum was carried out on February 6, 1996 but Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman determined that the results were invalid because the procedures were applied incorrectly and inconsis-

tently. Eligible voters must have been a "person" engaged in the production, feeding or importation of sheep or sheep products during the calendar year of 1994. The USDA defines a person as an individual or legal entity (a corporation, partnership or estate), or a group of individuals with a joint ownership interest in sheep (a family, cooperative or an association). All 4-H or FFA members who owned sheep in 1994 are eligible to vote.

In this referendum, each "person" has only one vote. Spouses who jointly own sheep are considered a family and are not entitled to two votes even in community property states such as Texas.

No one is authorized to register or to vote on behalf of an individual voter.

Raw wool is exempt from assessment, and importers who imported only raw wool are not eligible to vote.

Questions about voter eligibility, verifying the volume of production, challenges, the challenge resolution process, appeals of eligibility determinations, ballot counting, reporting and related topics should be made to county FSA offices.

Questions about voting procedures may be asked at the county Extension office.

What think ye of Jesus when He says, "You have heard that it was said to those of old, 'You shall not murder,' and whoever murders will be in danger of judgement. But I say to you that whoever is angry with his brother without a cause shall be in danger of the judgement," Matthew 5:21-22a?

In Jesus' "Sermon on the Mount," He contrasted several of the teachings of the Law of Moses with His "but I say unto you..." Mixed in with the actual teachings of the Old Law were the interpretations and added traditions of the scribes and Pharisees -- which kept them from being the pure teaching of God under the Old Testament. Nevertheless, Jesus was pointing out that there were deeper factors than just the actions, one of which was attitude. Murder begins in the heart with anger, and if anger is controlled, murder will not occur -- and even if murder doesn't occur, if anger is to the point of lashing out with "Raca!" and "You fool!" one is as guilty with God as if murder did occur.

Jesus goes on to point out the same principle with illustrations of adultery and lust. "But I say to you that whoever looks at a woman to lust for her has already committed adultery with her in his heart," verse 28. Then He addresses the matters of oaths or swearing (not cursing), revenge, and how to treat enemies. In each instance, Jesus points out that one's attitude and action must be far above that of the ordinary -- far above that of even (especially?) the scribes and Pharisees.

When Jesus finished His sermon, "the people were astonished at His teaching, for He taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes," Matthew 7:28-30; How do Jesus' teachings strike you? What think ye of Jesus when He says, "Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of My Father in heaven," Matthew 7:22?

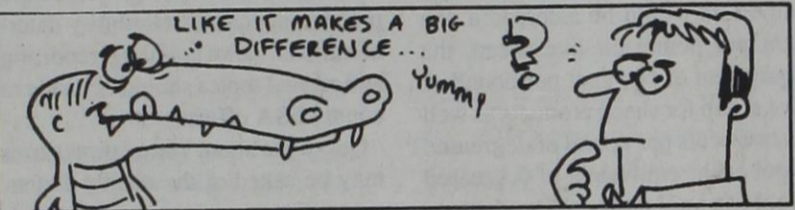
The Cross Country Teams ran in Eula Saturday, August 31. The weather was hot and humid.

Put Helmets On All The Not-So-Hard Heads

Within the last few months, Dallas, Fort Worth and Austin have joined a small but growing list of cities passing an ordinance requiring bicyclists to wear protective helmets. The leaders of these towns along with those of Bedford and Houston, cities which already have ordinances, are to be commended.

The Fort Worth ordinance, which takes effect September 15, covers children 17 or younger. Both Dallas and Austin ordinances require all riders regardless of age to wear helmets as do laws in nine other cities throughout the nation. Houston's rule affects riders under age 18; Bedford's ordinance is for those under 16. An ordinance for San Antonio is under discussion but has not yet reached the City Council. Currently, bicycle helmet laws apply to some 2 million Texans, about 11 percent of the state's population.

Passing such an ordinance is the first push that inches us toward better bicycle injury prevention, especially for head injuries. Next on the list is to get all riders, both adults and children, to consistently wear the helmets.

Fines, although provided for in these ordinances, are not always the best way to get broad compliance. Positive persuasion and heavy doses of education, along with people's usual desire to obey the law, seem to be better avenues. Getting most people to wear helmets will probably take two things happening: Riders will accept helmets as an indispensable and rather stylish piece of equipment, and people will comprehend the enormous cost to everyone — both physical and financial — of preventable injuries.

Peer pressure and habit are great allies of helmet use. Even a gentle legal push will propel people to comply much as laws helped increase the use of seat belts and child safety seats in automobiles. For instance, seat belt use rose from 14 percent to 64 percent the first year of the mandatory use requirement. After the first 12 months, fatalities were down 7 percent and injuries were reduced by 12 percent. We can hope for the same positive trend in mandatory helmet use.

The reasons most often cited by

cyclists for not wearing helmets are that these head coverings are uncomfortable, too hot, unattractive, too expensive or that friends don't wear them. None of these excuses can stand up to the danger and damage of head injuries, not only to the rider but to the family and the community as well.

We often throw statistics around like confetti. But they do indeed tell the story, often with frightening clarity. Bicycle helmets reduce the risk of the traumatic long-term head injuries by about 85 percent. Unfortunately, in Texas now, fewer than 20 percent of bicycle riders strap on this gear. Children are less likely to wear helmets than adults, and teens aged 15 to 19 are the least likely to use them (only 3.8 percent of riders). Nationwide, if helmets had been used by all bicyclists from 1984 to 1988, one death a day and one head injury every four minutes could have been prevented. One of the saddest statistics: Four of every five deaths of bicyclists result from head injuries.

It's hard to equate monetary losses with the intense pain and anguish caused by traumatic head injuries. But the fact remains that these mostly preventable injuries are expensive both from short-term trauma services and long-term rehabilitation care. Costs for rehabilitation services exceed \$110,000, and the average lifetime cost for one brain-injured patient is \$4.5 million. Every \$15 bicycle helmet saves \$30 in direct health care costs and an additional \$365 in other costs to society.

Community partnerships between public agencies and private enterprises can go a long way toward increasing the use of bicycle helmets. Donations toward free or lower-cost helmets plus incentives for wearing helmets and bicycle education courses are a starting point. We can continue the patchwork process of city by city considering a bicycle helmet ordinance, presenting the statistics, covering the monetary details, congratulating the leaders who pass regulations, bemoaning those attempts that fail. And we can hope that Texas will join the other 15 states that have adopted statewide laws since the first one was passed in California in 1987. We all have the opportunity to create a real safety net for bicycle riders of every age.

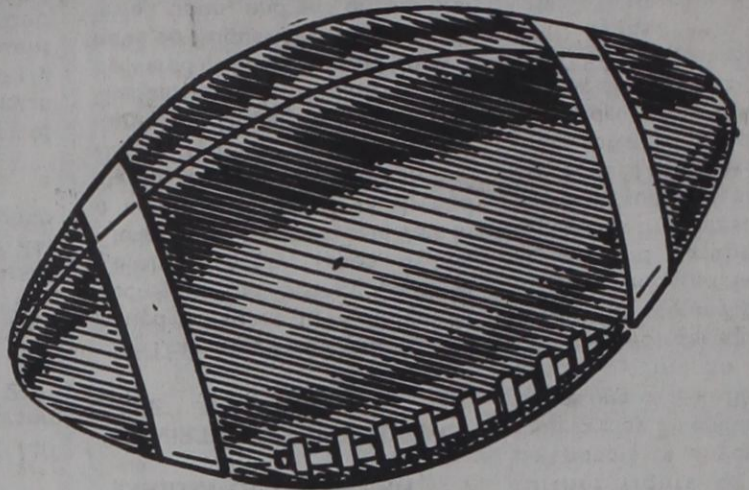

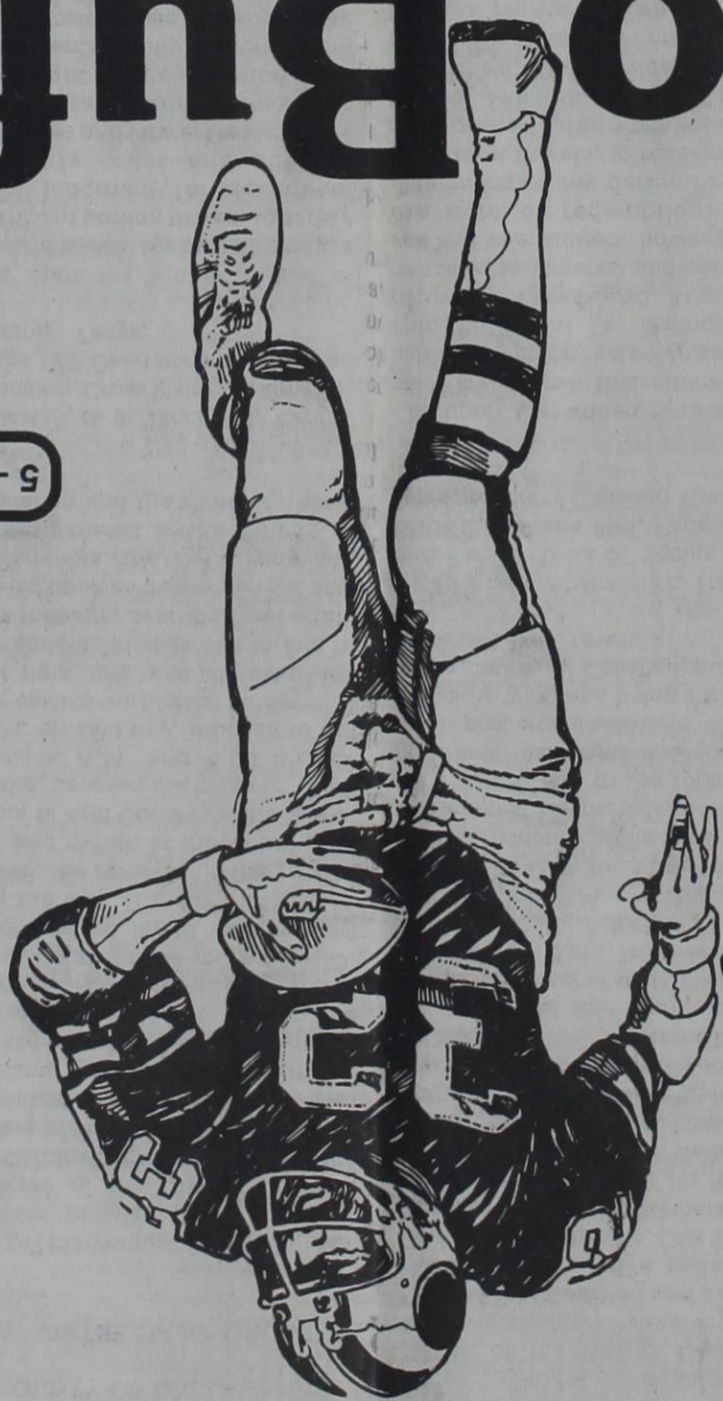

Callahan Co. Employees Compete In District Rodeo

ABILENE—Bobbie McNeil and Hector Aguirre, Callahan county maintenance section employees, recently competed in the Abilene district's second annual rodeo.

McNeil and Aguirre earned the right to compete at district level by taking first and second place respectively in the Callahan county rodeo competition.

"The Texas Department of Transportation's idea of a rodeo is a little different as one might imagine," Lauren Garduno, Abilene district maintenance engineer, said.

"In our rodeo, we don't ride 1200 pound horses, we wrangle 7 1/2 ton dump trucks. Employees are challenged to steer trucks down long, winding and narrow passages; and, instead of seeing who has the best time in an event, they compete to see who can stop closest to a stop line and an alley dock."

In addition to TxDOT's rodeos testing precision driving skills, they also test the employees preventive maintenance knowledge.

"This year," Garduno said, "we tighten up some of the rules regarding preventive maintenance. For instance, the competitors were given ten minutes to find ten defects on a vehicle. Last year, they were required to find only five defects in the same amount of time."

Contestants at both county and district meets took dump trucks through a six-part precision driving course that tested such skills as stopping on a line, backing up to a loading dock, navigating a serpentine course and driving through nar-

row corridors. According to Garduno, the district narrowed the dimensions of the corridor this year. The drivers started out with a 12 foot wide corridor and finished driving through an eight and one-half foot wide path.

"We're happy with the enthusiasm created by this year's competition," Garduno added. "We discovered last year that this competition not only recognizes the skills and pride exhibited in the safe operation of TxDOT equipment, but it inspires camaraderie between the employees and boosts morale."

From the maintenance section supervisors to the Abilene district engineer, supervisors agree this program gives the department drivers the recognition they deserve.

"Everyday they have to drive in some of the most dangerous situations possible. They're expected to analyze every situation and react immediately in a vehicle that doesn't go as fast or respond as easily as a car," Blair Haynie, Abilene area engineer, said. "We're happy to finally have a program that gives the drivers the recognition they deserve."

Finals will be held in Austin in November and the top two finishers from there will go on to the nationals. TxDOT employees representing the 13 county Abilene district in the state finals are: Norman "Jibber" Herridge, Borden county, Chris Medford, Haskell county, and alternate, Pio Munoz of Nolan county. They came in first, second and third respectively in district competition.

New Drug May Help Glaucoma Patients

HOUSTON—Glaucoma is the second leading cause of irreversible blindness in the United States, but a drug recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration may help thousands of glaucoma patients save their sight.

"Latanoprost has been shown to have advantages over previously available medications," said Dr. Ronald Gross, associate professor of ophthalmology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and one of the physicians who participated in clinical trials for the new drug. "It apparently has fewer side effects, and patients need only one dose a day."

Nearly all other drugs used to treat glaucoma require two to four daily doses. Gross said a reduction of doses can improve compliance.

While latanoprost has shown promise in trials, in most patients, it is not meant to be used as first line therapy against glaucoma.

"In people with green and hazel-colored eyes, the drug makes their iris darker," Gross said. "Researchers are not sure why this happens."

As a precaution, it is recommended that the drug be used only in patients who have not benefited from other medications.

The new drug is expected to be available in September.

Glaucoma is a disease that slowly steals a patient's sight. If the disease is diagnosed early, blindness may often be prevented, but the vision that has been lost cannot be restored.

Ophthalmologists recommend glaucoma screenings beginning at age 40 for most people. However, people with a family history of glaucoma and African-Americans should be checked starting at age 30. Glaucoma is three to four times more common among blacks.
