International Sorority Celebrates Fifty-Eight Years

On April 28, 1989, here in Cross Plains, Alpha Rho Zeta Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, in concert with 12,500 chapters of 250,000 members throughout the world, will celebrate their Founder's Day.

During the depression, Walter W. Ross thought that young women needed more in their lives than work, responsibility, and hardship. He thought a social and cultural outlet was needed and that he was the man to see that it was provided. His efforts brought seven young women in Abilene, Kansas together on April 30, 1931 to form that sort of organization, Beta Sigma Phi began, and time proved Walter Ross's idea a good one. Because Beta Sigma Phi has continued to meet their needs, on this April 30, Walter Ross will be remembered by this largest Greek letter sorority in the world.

Throughout the fifty-eight years of their history, the members of Beta Sigma Phi have enjoyed programs for cultural studies and numerous social events; they had a difference in their lives. As they enjoyed these opportunities for personal growth, they came to devote much of their time and effort to service; they came to make a real difference in the world around them.

A typical year finds the chapters donating over \$3 million directly to local charities, reflecting over two million work hours. Early, the chapters created their own international funds for purposes they selected. Their International Endowment Fund has donated over \$2 million to health research groups, to homes for underprivileged children, and to many other worthwhile causes. Through Beta Sigma Phi's International Loan and Scholarship Funds, members and their families receive assistance.

Basic to Beta Sigma Phi, however, are the socials for its members. One of the most important is their Founder's Day celebration. Each year a theme is selected to both challenge and to exemplify each member. This past year, the theme has been "Pave It With Stars."

The Alpha Rho Zeta Chapter will meet on April 28 at 7 p.m., at the Cross Plains Garden Center, to observe Founder's Day. The chairman of the celebration is Pauniece Oglesby. The mistress of ceremonies for the evening will be Mary Dunn. Pauniece Oglesby has been selected for the honor of presenting the special message from the International Executive Council of Beta Sigma Phi. Other members taking part in the program are Berdessa Saunders, Sandy Yates, Joyce McCoy, Sarah Brashear, Bobbie Johnston, Pat Stephens, and Debra Childers.

Awards will be presented during the evening to outstanding chapter members, recognizing them for their sorority and community work. Some local Beta Sigma Phi projects include Parade of Homes, Taster's Pic'N's, Miss Valentine Parade, and the Yellow Rose Arts and Crafts Fair.

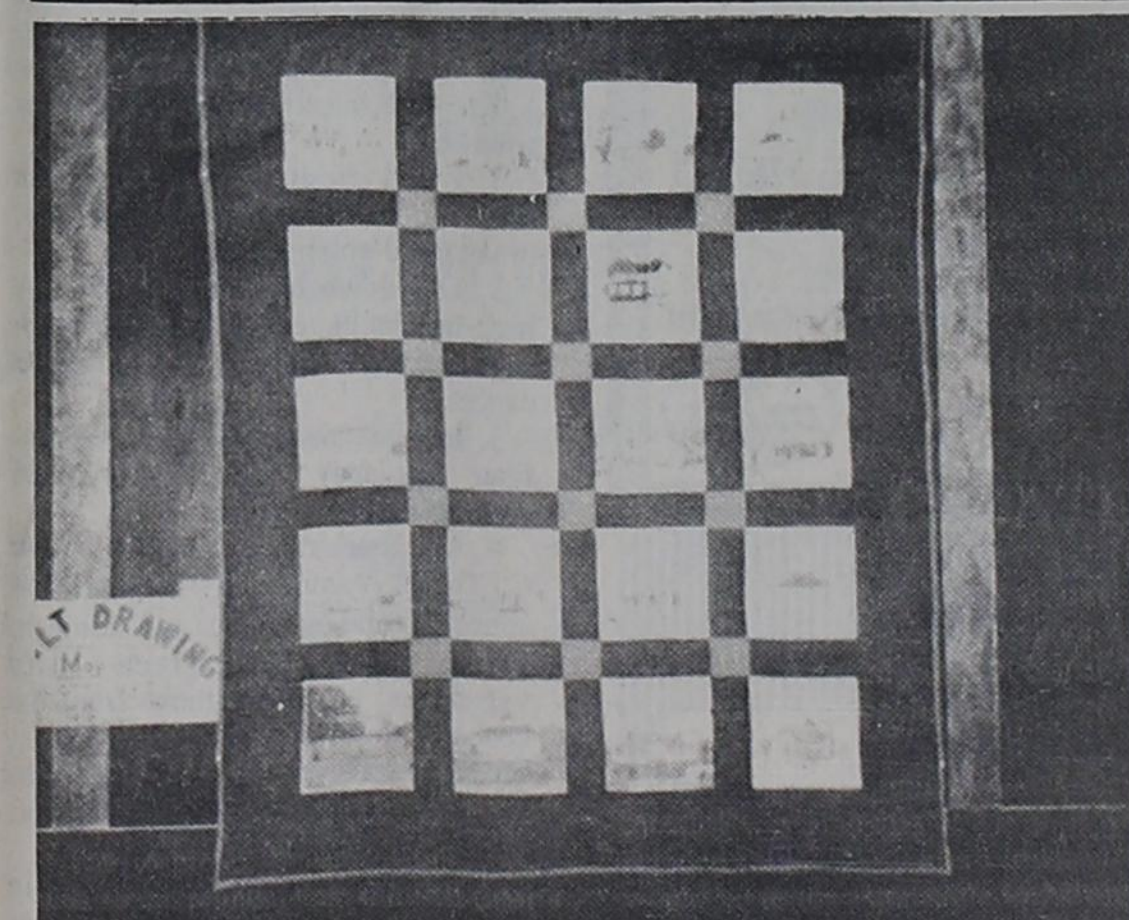

Summary of April 20 Board Meeting

1. The 1989-1990 school calendar was delayed until the May board meeting, pending approval of a bill currently in consideration by the legislature to allow school to open the week of September 1 instead of on or after September 1.

2. The administration advised the board that in view of anticipated increases in gasoline, car lease costs, insurance, and teacher time the tuition cost for driver's education will have to be increased this year. The board directed the administration to verify expenses and teacher time and set the maximum tuition charge at \$135 per student.

3. The list of students requesting to transfer into the Cross Plains School District for the 1989-1990 school year was approved by the board.

4. The Chapter I Program and the Chapter II Program were both approved to join the ESC IV Coop in Abilene for the 1989-1990 school year.

5. Ann Watson (school counselor) appeared before the board and advised the board of the requirements for the 1989-1990 campus plan for instruction. After the discussion the board and administration completed a needs analysis survey and board member Don Harris volunteered to serve on a forthcoming campus plan committee to be composed of school personnel, community members and board members.

6. No action was taken on student accident insurance for the 1989-1990 school year. Due to the projected increase in premiums, the superintendent was advised to contact other insurance companies for bids.

7. The superintendent led a discussion with the board and other administrators in regard to current facilities and future needs.

8. Approval was given for an advance order for athletic equipment to be ordered now for fall delivery and billing.

9. After the financial report was given by the superintendent the board discussed the current report from the school delinquent tax attorneys advising the board of the delinquent tax payers that had been filed upon in the courts at Baird.

10. In matters of personnel the board agreed to release Tim Layman from his current contract effective May 1, 1989. The board also interviewed a prospective candidate for the boys basketball coach for the 1989-1990 school year.

11. A plaque was presented to Jackie Thomas in appreciation for his services as a school board member.

12. After all business was transacted the board voted to adjourn.

Microwave Safety

Q. Can baby foods be safely heated in the microwave oven?

A. Baby foods can be safely heated in the microwave oven if a few simple precautions are taken. Baby foods should always be placed in a microwave-safe dish. If a reduced power setting is available, 50% power should be used. The foods should always be stirred and temperature tested by tasting before feeding to baby. For specific guidelines on heating individual Gerber products, look on the back of the label.

Products that should not be heated in the microwave oven include chicken sticks, turkey sticks, meat sticks and egg yolks. These products heat unevenly and can splatter, causing burns.

Baby's nurser bottle should not be warmed in the microwave oven. The bottle can be cool while the liquid inside may be very hot and could cause burns. Recommended procedures for warming nurser bottles include placing the bottle in a pan of warm water on the stove or running warm tap water over the bottle. As with food, the parent should always test the temperature of the liquid before feeding to baby.

Eat To Live

During April, Cancer Control Month, the American Cancer Society is offering a free brochure to alert the public to nutritional guidelines, the risk of developing some cancers.

According to Aubrey Loper, President of the Callahan County Unit of the American Cancer Society, there is evidence linking diet to certain cancers. "We are just beginning to understand how a person's eating habits and the amounts of specific nutrients he or she consumes fit into the very complicated question of cancer risk," Loper said. "We don't have all the answers yet, but we know enough to make basic recommendations."

The ACS nutrition guidelines are as follows:

1. Avoid obesity: Obesity has been linked to risk of uterine, gallbladder, breast, and colon cancers.
2. Cut down on intake of fats: A high-fat diet increases risk of developing breast, colon, and prostate cancers.
3. Increase intake of fiber: A high-fiber diet may reduce the risk of developing colon cancer.
4. Add foods rich in Vitamins A and C: These vitamins may help prevent cancers of the esophagus and stomach. Citrus fruits and green leafy vegetables, especially those from the cabbage family — brussels sprouts, broccoli, kale, cauliflower, and cabbage — will provide these vitamins, as well as some fiber.
5. Drink alcoholic beverages in moderation: The risk of liver cancer may be reduced by drinking in

moderation.

6. Limit amounts of salt-cured, smoked, and nitrite-cured foods. Cancers of the stomach and esophagus are more common among people who consume large quantities of these foods.

And, President Loper said, "People should try to follow these guidelines not just in the home, but when dining out as well."

It is important to remember that diet is just one factor in adding up a person's cancer risk. If you smoke, changing your diet may reduce your cancer risk, but you still are a prime candidate for lung cancer, regardless of what you eat or drink. Smokers should make quitting their first priority in bettering their odds against cancer."

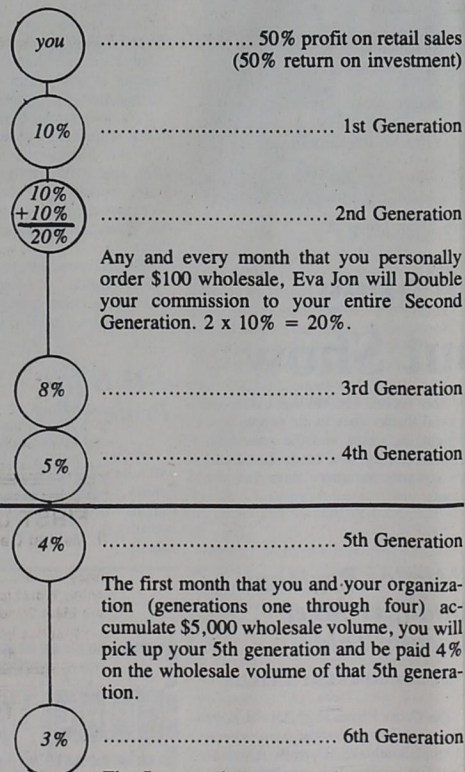

AUSTIN — The 31 members of the Texas Senate voted unanimously last week to approve Senate Bill 1351, authored by 30th District Senator Steve Carriker (D-Roby). The bill, called the Outstanding Rural Scholars Act, provides generous financial incentives for high achieving rural students who wish to go into the field of rural health care.

Once a student, who is sponsored by his community, commits to a career in health care, the student may receive training in any health care field including that of a physician.

"The long-term solution to our rural health problems must include growing our own doctors and nurses," Carriker said. "We have a wealth of young people with the potential to serve our needs, and this bill gives us the financial resources to educate them."

SB 1351 now awaits action in the Texas House of Representatives, where it is being sponsored by State Rep. Charles Finnell (D-Holliday).
