## Down Home

### National Library Week Celebrated Locally

Plains Public Library would like to focus on the celebration with an update of its growth. The pattern has been continuous, despite a decrease in income over the past two years.

Last year the school board, for the first time, was able to assist with a donation for which the library was grateful. If it were not for the generous donations, memorials, and volunteer time from the citizens, the library representatives stated, "We would soon have closed its doors."

As part of the celebration of National Library Week, the local facility has declared a grace period to allow the return of all overdue books with no fines charged. The grace period will run until the end of April.

The Cross Plains Public Library has a membership with the Big Country Library System which benefits libraries serving a population of 10,000 or less.

Basic requirements for membership include per capita support \$1.20 or \$5,000, whichever is greater, and at least half of the annual local operating expenditures must be obtained from local tax sources. This includes funds appropriated by school districts, city or county governments from general revenue.

One item of library materials per capita, and must have a minimum of 7,500 materials. Access hours must be no less than 20 hours per week, and a head librarian must be employed for at least 20 hours a week.

Benefits include funds available to purchase books annually. The library ordered \$900 worth of books in 1987 and will be ordering close to \$1,000 worth. Extension books are received monthly from Abilene, approximately 50 each month on a rotating basis.

Through the interlibrary loan department's computer they are able to obtain any book in print from libraries anywhere in the USA.

Film strip projector, film projector, permanent collection of film strips and rotating selection monthly, and an Apple II computer and word processor are equipment maintained locally.

The Learn About Program (LAP), cleverly named by Billie Loving, librarian, has been a true success story. The program is designed for pre-school children, and it helps them prepare for kindergarten.

Parents' Day for this year's group has been set for the evening of April 28, and the children will receive their certificates at this time. This year they were treated to a tour of the kindergarten room, plus a ride back to the library on the school bus. Becoming familiar with school surroundings would make the transition to the classroom less traumatic.

The Cross Plains Public Library is planning to join with the Big Country Library System in offering an adult literacy program to begin later this year. This class would be for those seeking reading skills, plus improving reading comprehension, etc.

Similar programs in Abilene, Clyde, and Eastland have been reported well-attended. One-on-one tutoring in comprehensive reading at all levels will be

offered. The Summer Reading Program for children will run for six weeks, beginning in June through July. Elementary students in the first through sixth grades are eligible to participate. This year's theme is "Trail Blazers and Star Gazers." Sounds like quite an adventure to fill the long days of summer.

The library has been a great educational and cultural addition to the community of Cross Plains, which residents hope to see continue. Its establishment has been a source of pride for Cross Plains.



## Pre-Registration For Kindergarten Students

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will enter Kindergarten next fall. All children who will be 5 on or before September 1, 1988, may attend Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Cross Plains School System and the service is available to all students.

Parents are asked to call 725-6123 or come by the elementary principal's office to pre-register their child this week, May 2-6. A screening schedule will be arranged for May 9 for each child. The screening will take about 60 minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills, language ability, and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter

school in Texas the student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization requirements include: 3 in a series of DTP and/or a booster after age 4, oral polio series, measles, mumps, and Rubella. Please bring the birth certificate and immunization record at the time of registering, asks Principal Ray Womack.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time as regular Kindergarten screening. The Early Childhood Program is to help those children age 3-6 who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have, or know of a child who might benefit from this service, please contact the Elementary School office during Kindergarten registration.

## GARDEN TIPS

FROM THE Cross Plains Garden Club

For April

Fill in bulb beds with annuals from flats or early planting.

A plastic openwork berry basket (like the ones you buy in grocery stores) is an ideal cover for tiny seedling. It provides protection from small animals, heavy rains or hail. In addition, it filters strong sunlight, so that the seedlings get the dappled light they seem to like best.

If you have a protected place to hang baskets, they are a summer delight. Choose several kinds of flowers and carefully blend the colors for a tailor-made basket.

To make a wire-frame basket, line the frame with unmilled sphagnum moss that has been soaked in a bucket of water. Press the wet moss along the side of the basket to form a 1/4 inch thick lining. Wrap the moss over the rim so that it won't break away from the edge later. Fill the fully lined basket with sterile potting soil to just below the rim. Work a couple of tablespoons of fertilizer, such as 10-10-10, into the soil. Set the first transplant in the center of the basket, then place the others around it. You can even cut slits in the sides of the moss basket and slip plants into the soil so the basket is enveloped with flowers. Water frequently.

## Farmers Apply Now For Fuel Refund

Forget here and now, this is a matter of here and then. If you were a farmer in the 1970's, you're entitled to a refund for some of your fuel expenses. But you have to act before June 30, reports Greg Gerngross, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The refund is a result of a settlement reached by the Department of Energy with oil companies that allegedly overcharged for crude oil during a period regulated by price ceilings.

Consequently, farmers can get back about \$80 or more for every 100,000 gallons of fuel used between August 19, 1973 and January 27, 1981, says Gerngross. That equates to a little over

\$14 for every 100 acres of cropland in production during the seven-and-a-half year period, according to economists with the Extension Service.

Gerngross notes that this refund should not be confused with the income tax credit for federal excise taxes on fuel.

The Department of Energy will base refunds on actual gallons purchased, estimated gallons used or a USDA estimate of 23.8 gallons per acre of cropland per year. An explanation of filing procedures for the refund and a simple two-page filing form can be obtained from Gerngross at the County Extension office.

## POW's To Apply For Medals

On March 30, President Reagan signed House Joint Resolution No. 233 into law, establishing April 9, 1988, as "National Former Prisoner of War Recognition Day," according to Conrad Alexander, Director of the Big Spring Va Medical Center. The President's action follows closely an announcement by the Department of Defense that a special "Former Prisoner of War Medal" is now available. This specially designed and minted medal is now available to all former prisoners of war (POW's), who must make individual applications to the Department of Defense.

## Panhandle hog pens reborn as greenhouse

(PAMPA)—Just a few years ago, one of the largest hog pens in this part of Texas was located 12 miles outside of this Panhandle city. Hogs came and went here for many years. Then the hog market fell off, and the Hoover family, which had been raising the hogs, decided to take advantage of all the empty pens and convert them into greenhouses.

The complex of former hog pens is now home to Red River Growers, one of the state's largest greenhouses. The business has been in operation less than two years, but already the greenhouse produces 8,000 different plants, from geraniums and poinsettias to bell peppers and tomatoes.


Rob Thomas, one of the partners in the company, says that Red River Growers got its start not just from a novel idea, but with some nuts-and-bolts help from area extension agents and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"The Department of Agriculture has helped in searching possibilities for other funding and for different fund programs and loan programs that are available to us and other agriculturally-tied businesses like this one," Thomas said.

Most of the plants from Red River Growers are sold to customers in the Panhandle. Some of their customers, however, come from neighboring states and some from as far away as Kansas and Nebraska.

According to Thomas, business has been so good that he and the other owners have decided to expand their 13,000-square-foot facility late this summer.

"I think the future looks real bright



All kinds of plants, from geraniums and poinsettias to tomatoes and bell peppers, are produced in this greenhouse owned by Red River Growers. Formerly a complex of hog pens, this 13,000 square-foot greenhouse was started with help from extension agents and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Red River Growers is situated 12 miles outside Pampa and sells its products to area retailers, but also has customers as far away as Kansas and Nebraska.

for us," Thomas said. "We are in the process of expanding, and by expanding, we're going to increase our production and thereby increase our market area, as well as our profits. With

the help from the Texas Department of Agriculture and the other funding facilities we now have working on our behalf, I think that we have a real bright future."

## Report Change Of Address To Social Security

Over the past few months, the Social Security office has received calls from some Social Security and supplemental security income (SSI) beneficiaries wondering why they didn't receive a notice telling them about a change in their benefits. For example, they asked why they weren't told about the change in the cost of Medicare or the increase in their benefit amount. Since Social Security always sends a notice to beneficiaries when there's a change in benefits, they wondered, too.

As Social Security looked into the problem, they discovered, in most cases, the reason the caller had not received a notice was because they did not have a correct address. Most of the callers had direct deposit and since their benefits went directly to the bank, they had not told Social Security when they moved.

If you receive Social Security or SSI benefits, be sure to tell Social Security whenever you change your address, even if your benefits are sent to a bank or other financial organization for direct deposit. Social Security needs your address to send you information about your benefits. And they may need to contact you to make sure you continue to be eligible for benefits. If you cannot be located, your benefits may be stopped until your new address is known.

It's easy to report a change of address. Just call or write any Social Security office. The address and phone number are listed in the

telephone directory under "Social Security Administration" or "U.S. Government."

If you write, please type or print your complete, new address, including your ZIP Code. Also, include your Social Security claim number, your old address, and the names of everyone in your family who will receive mail at the new address. The Social Security office will change records as soon as they can.

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

Any reasonable explanation for why you all can't give us adequate notice for increases of this magnitude?

Dear P.O.: Depends on what you mean by "adequate." The law administered by the Texas Employment Commission requires us to use third quarter wage information in computing rates for the next year. Employers have until October 31st to get that information filed. We must then key all that information and begin the tremendous task of computing rates for 330,000 employers. Generally tax rate notices are ready by the first week in February.


