## Down Home

For the next couple of weeks I am featuring guest writer, Ozella Huddleston. She will be sharing some experiences local residents have had with the Cross Plains Public Library. The first article is about adult readers and the second one will be on children. Vanda King, Editor.

Are you a reader? I am. I enjoy reading. There is seldom a day goes by that I don't pick up a book for a few minutes, or a few hours.

I am constantly amazed at the variety of books and subject matter displayed for our use in the Cross Plains Public Library.

For example, Billie Loving, librarian, is beginning a collection of old text books. She has a good beginning, many of which bring back memories.

She is also collecting other old books. The oldest she found was published in 1805. Just think, that book was published 183 years ago. The library also contains the newest books, or they can be ordered through the interlibrary loan system.

My favorite subject is early American Historical novels. Some of them are written as a series, using the same characters and introducing new ones. I had read the first two of a set, but decided it was time for the third to be out. I didn't know the title, so Billie pulled out an index of authors, and we found a recent publication. The title sounded right, and four days later I had my book. The one I wanted, too.

I've checked out books on Rome in order to make a Roman soldier's costume. It was very authentic.

I've needed a copy of the constitution. It's in the library.

My family got into a discussion of Down's Syndrome, but couldn't agree on what causes it. Where could we find out? Of course! The public library. I had the answer within a few minutes, and over the telephone.

I asked some other people who use the library about their preferences, why they read, and came up with different reasons. First on the list seems to be enjoyment. Edith Hinesly is one of these. She reads novels, mysteries, and chooses other books with interesting covers.

I really enjoyed visiting with Chester Cunningham. When asked his reading preference, he replied, anything by Louis L'Amour. He has read all of his books. I asked what he would read since Mr. L'Amour's death. He finds books that look interesting. He also enjoys J. Frank Dobie, and shared with me Mr. Dobie's method for killing a large rattlesnake. Don't carry a tape or scales. That way you can't know how truly big he is, then kill him the same way you would a small one.

Chester also reads historical novels. He thinks Cross Plains has a very nice library, and the librarians are congenial.

Lynette Gomillion uses the interlibrary loan system constantly. She gets the best seller lists from the *Abilene Reporter-News* and women's magazines, visits the library, and has them within a few days.

Her favorite subjects are mysteries and espionage. Like all of us, she has favorite authors, among them Robert Ludlum and Dick Francis. She also reads historical novels, art books, and fiction. She especially enjoys the interlibrary loan system, and takes advantage of its many benefits.

Lynette was brought up to read. She and her husband are teaching their children to enjoy books.

Sandra Crockett also reads espionage. She likes any kind of who-done-its and science fiction.

She spends a lot of time in the library and loves every minute of it. "We have a good library. It's a real asset to our community," she said. Her entire family reads, and thinks Billie deserves a lot of credit for her

effort. Billie Loving's goals are to reach more people, and to have more people get involved in the actual function of the library.

## Justice Of The Peace Attends Crime Victims Seminar

Justice of the Peace Rolan Jones attended a seminar in Abilene Tuesday, June 28, concerning the Crime Victim's Compensation Act at the Taylor County Courthouse. Jones represented Callahan County at the briefing.

"Crime victims and persons who intervene in crime on behalf of peace officers may suffer disabilities, incur financial burdens, or become dependent on public assistance. The legislature finds and determines that there is a need for indemnification of victims of crime and citizens who suffer personal injury or death in the prevention of crime or the apprehension of criminals." The "Declaration of Purpose" of the Texas Crime Victims Compensation Act quotes the above statement in part.

Claims filed under the Act are investigated by the Attorney General and administered by the Texas Industrial Accident Board.

The eligibility, conditions for eligibility, available benefits and other sources of compensation were all discussed. Also limits on awards, recoveries from offenders, procedures, prehearing and appeal and how to file a claim were other topics.

The Bill of Rights for victims of violent crimes is as follows:

As a victim of a violent crime, as the guardian of a victim, or as the close relative of a victim, you have certain rights in the Texas criminal justice system. Among these are:

1. The right to PROTECTION from harm, and threats of harm, arising from cooperation with peace officers or prosecutors.

2. The right to have your SAFETY, and that of your family, taken into consideration when bail is set.

3. The right to be INFORMED about court proceedings, including whether they have been canceled or rescheduled.

4. The right to INFORMATION about procedures in criminal investigations.

5. The right to INFORMATION about procedures in the criminal justice system, including plea bargaining.

6. The right to TELL a probation department conducting a presentencing investigation about the impact of the offense on you and your family.

7. The right to be INFORMED about the *Crime Victims Compensation Fund*, the payment of certain medical expenses for victims of sexual assault, and of the availability of social service agencies that may provide assistance.

8. The right to be NOTIFIED about parole proceedings.

9. The right to INCLUDE information in the defendant's file to be considered by the Board of Pardons and Paroles.

10. The right to be PRESENT at all public court proceedings related to the offense, if the presiding judge approves.

Note: Article 56 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedures states: "A judge, attorney for the state, peace officer, or law enforcement agency is not liable for a failure or inability to provide a right enumerated in this article."

# City Council Releases Marshal Martinez

At a closed meeting of the Cross Plains City Council Tuesday, June 28, a majority of councilmen voted to release Jerry Martinez from his duties as City Marshal, effective June 30, the end of the pay period.

No reasons for the action were released to the press.

Mayor Frank Robertson stated, "No replacement has been named at this time."

## Statement Of Ex-City Marshal

I, Jerry Martinez, would like to express many thanks to all of you who supported me as city marshal for the past two years. Special thanks to Mayor Frank Robertson and Councilman Brad Harris.

I would have preferred to have left on my own notice, however, that would have been impossible, because I felt a strong obligation to stay and battle the small town politics, regardless of the issue or who the person was.

As you well know, I lost, and have been terminated. I have learned a great deal about law enforcement in rural areas and about small town politics.

A lot of it I don't agree with, therefore causing some controversy.

I hope to be able to apply my experiences somewhere else in my law enforcement career.

Again, I thank all of you who supported me the past two years. I strongly believe that I had 80 percent of Cross Plains supporting me and 20 percent opposing me. Unfortunately, some of the councilmen made up the 20 percent.

I will be moving back to my home in Abilene. My dry cleaning store will remain open for business.

## Highlights Of Kerry Pointer's Year Abroad

The host family, where Kerry Pointer is living as an exchange student, owns a middle size farm. They raise cattle and grow hops.

The Huber family is Catholic and attend church regularly. They live in Elsendorf, which is 80 kilometers from Munich in Bavaria. It is located between Regensburg and Munich. Kerry attends school in Mainburg.

The oldest daughter speaks a little English, so Kerry has to speak German most of the time. Kerry attends a Gymnasium school, which is the highest level school for college-bound students.

There are 721 students grades 5-13. All except the English class is taught in German. School begins at 7:30 a.m. and is out at 12:30, except on Tuesday when they go until 5 p.m.

School starts September 15 and runs until July 31 in West Germany. Kerry is the first exchange student her school has ever had.

Each morning of school starts with a prayer. All students rise when the teacher enters the room and say guten morgen (good morning).

You don't have to get tardy slips if you are late, and when a teacher is absent, there isn't a substitute teacher — just no class that period.

Last September Kerry's class traveled to Munich where she saw where the Olympic games were held. She went to the inner city and Oktoberfest also.

Last February she went to a YFU Seminar in Berlin for 11 days where she had to present a project in German. She also visited the American Embassy in Berlin and was taken to East Berlin.

June 1 through 5, she stayed with a YFU student and met two other students she had met earlier in Washington D.C. The main mode of travel is by train.

On July 12, Kerry will be in Frankfurt and will fly to Washington D.C. She will remain in the capitol city July 12, 13, and 14. At this time there will be a re-entry session, congressional visits, addresses by Congressional Representative and U.S. Information Agency Officials, Smithso-

nian Museum visits, Kennedy Center performance, and on July 15 she will depart for Dallas and Abilene. Kerry will soon be home with her family after a year of adventure.

## AARP Defensive Driving Course Well Attended

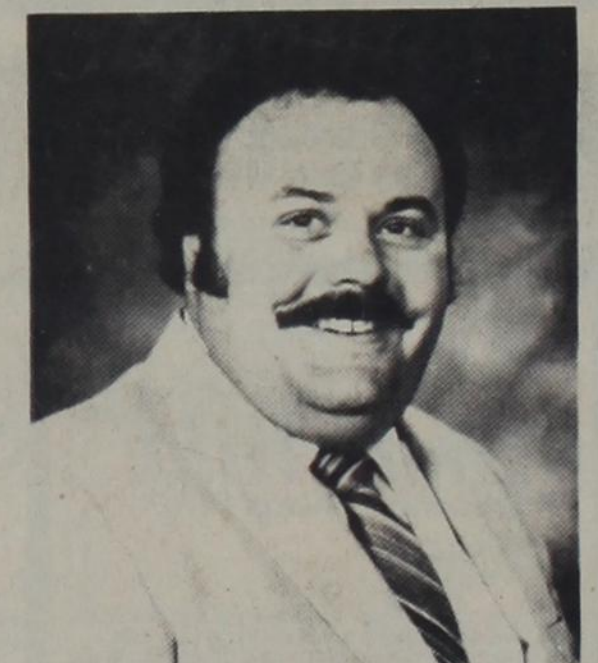
The Defensive Driving Course offered by the local AARP was attended by 17 drivers. Attending the course will benefit each by receiving a discount on their car insurance.

## Carriker Calls For Property Tax Relief

State Representative Steve Carriker (Democrat-Roby), a long-time critic of the state's property tax system, is calling for major policy changes to help relieve the tax burden on small business and family homes.

Carriker says the time is now right for a bill he introduced in a previous session of the legislature. That bill would provide for the direct election of appraisal board members, rather than their appointment. "An elected board will be more sensitive to the needs of the taxpayer and would have a greater interest in resisting pressure from the state to over-appraise property," Carriker said.

Carriker is also championing a plan that would appropriate any state surplus budget monies first to property

tax relief. He says that as the Texas economy recovers, that revenue surpluses generated by the existing tax structure should be focused on areas such as education, which soaks up over half of the local property tax. "We should require that additional state monies over and above mandated education improvements be dedicated to property tax relief," he said.

In the 1985 session of the legislature, Representative Carriker passed a bill to allow the refund to the taxpayer of penalty and interest when the delay which resulted in the penalty was the fault of the taxing entity and not the taxpayer. He is also the author of a bill to restore the homestead tax exemption.

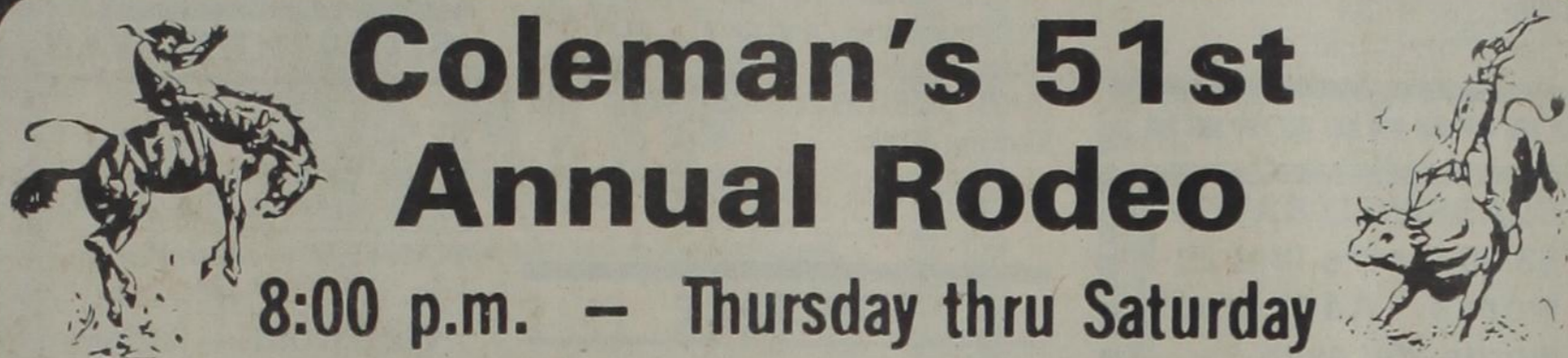
## Agriculture Dept. Needs Volunteers

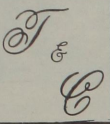


