Wheat Harvest Starting

Wheat harvest in Bailey County will start about June 15, says Texas Employment Commission's June 1 bulletin, and the crop on irrigated acres "is normal for this time of the year.' The report said however, that recent rains in the Muleshoe area came "too late to benefit dry land acreage."

The bulletin said harvest is just getting under way in the Muleshoe, Tulia, Lockney, Floydada and Silverton region, adding that yield rains were too late to benefit. Irrigated acreage is maturing fast and harvest should be good on irrigated land in those areas.

The report from the northwestern part of the Panhandle read: Recent rains received too late to be of much benefit to dry land acreage, and yields are expected to be very poor from the acreage that has not been abandened. Yields from irrigated acreage expected to be from fair to good when harvest gets underway about June 15.

Of the region farther east (Pampa to Shamrock) the June 1 TEC report said: Recent rains received too late to be of much benefit to dry land acreage, and yields are expected to be from average to below average when harvest begins this week. Irrigated acreage continues to look good with average yields expect-

Like fingerprints, tastes in curry seem to vary with the individ-Like ingerprints, tastes in curry seem to vary with the individ-nal. The cook of India makes her own curry powder, and may pulverize from five to fifty different ingredients to obtain just the precise flavor she wants for a particular dish. In other countries such precision is not required; prepared curry powder will do the trick. But the foods to be curried, the amount of spice used and the accompaniments are subject to wide variation. Two facts do not seem to change, however: curries are popular, and are always

accompanied by rice. The reason for the latter fact is simple. Whether the curry is hair-curling hot or subtle as a hint, the bland flavor of rice sets it off ideally. Rice adds to the attraction of the dish, too, with

its contrasting texture and compatible color — snowy white or delicate yellow as in the Saffron Rice below. Lamb Curry With Bananas is a Caribbean version of the classic Indian curry. Bananas as the single accompaniment and saffron rice (yellow rice) give it the island touch.

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





KNOW YOUR INSECT ENEMY-**BIG AND SMALL BOLLWORMS**

Cotton farmers must always be on the lookout for an invasion! There are a great number of insects that invade fields and take a "bite" out of cotton plants. But when growers see signs of bollworms, large or small. arge or small, they know there

s big trouble. A generation of bollworms may be completed in 30 days during warm weather, with 4 to generations occurring annually Farmers should watch for smail. pearly-white, dome-shaped eggs on growing tips, squares and bolls. Eggs indicate a potential infestation, and the field should be surveyed again in 3 to 5 days. The color of developing worm varies from pink to green to al-most black. Full-grown worms enter the ground and become mahogany-brown pupae, from which adult moths emerge. A bollworm infestation is in
