Commissioners Accept Used Grid Rollers Bid

Callahan County Commissioners voted Monday, March 13, to purchase two road grid rollers at a cost of \$31,000 to the county.

from West Texas Equipment Company to purchase two used road grid rollers for Precinct 3 (Baird) and Precinct 4 (Cross Plains). The bid by West Texas Equipment was the only one recieved.

The grid rollers are used by the county precincts in laying down road material. Other items brought before commissioners court include:

-Met with Baird rancher Frank Windham, Jr. to discuss the county hiring a trapper to trap wild animals in the county. It was reported that price to hire a trapper had increased from \$500 to Hatchett of Baird. \$900 per month. Callahan County had once used a trapper to decrease the number of wild animals. No action was taken, but County Judge Mack Kniffen will report back to the commissioners

about hiring a trapper. -Accepted a bid for moter fuel for Precinct 2 (Oplin) from Tyler Oil Company in Clyde. Precinct 3 (Baird) and Precinct 1 (Clyde) accepted bids from King Hoermann for motor fuel. Precinct 4 (Cross Plains) accepted a diesel fuel bid from Cross Plains Petroleum and a motor fueld bid from Grider Brothers.

-Met with Clyde Emergency Medical Service administrator Ron Young to discuss the new ambulance the service will purchase. Young informed commissioners that bids will be taken on a new ambulance. No action was taken.

-Approved a motion to let Clyde Justice of the Peace Eston Shelnutt and County Treasurer Dora Hounshell attend county officials schools.

-Discussed future bidding process for motor fuel and county jail food. Commissioners agreed that motor fuel for the county will continue to be bid out. but tabled action on taking bids for food for the Callahan County Jail.

-Voted to move the next commissioners court regular meeting date from March 27 to March 28 to coincide with an inspection by the Jail Standards Commission of the Callahan County Jail in Baird. County officials said that the county jail continues to be the oldest jail in the state still housing prisoners.

-Discussed the Complete Count Committee county commissioners must name to the 1990 Census count. Only two commisioners have nominated County commissioners approved a bid members to the committee. All four county commissioners and the county judge must each name one member to the county committee. No action was

> -Voted to advertise for bids for the sale of two dump trucks in Precinct 2 (Oplin) and one truck from Precinct 1 (Clyde).

-Appointed three members to the Callahan County Child Welfare Board. The new child welfare board members include: Lola Waggoner of Clyde, Robert Warren of Baird and Debbie
