## Elementary Teacher Retires After 35 Years Of Service

Upon entering Marie Stambaugh's fourth grade room, she asked, "Do you remember walking into my class some 30 years ago?" And yes, I most certainly did recall the classroom on the second story of the old high school building. What fun climbing up the stairs and making all the noise. The floor was built on a slant, which caused some problems — especially if you dropped your pencil. It would roll all the way to the back of the room.

She stirred some good memories which I know many of you, as past students will also recall. It just so happens that my graduating class of 1967 was Mrs. Stambaugh's first class at Cross Plains. This was the beginning of 30 years of teaching fourth grade students. The other five years of her career were at the Cross Cut School.

I asked her if she always wanted to be a teacher, and she replied, "I remember writing a paper in high school about ambitions to teach, so I always knew what I wanted to be." She went on to state that teaching had been a satisfying job and she never had any regrets for choosing the field.

She received her Bachelor of Arts Degree at Howard Payne University, and in 1962 she received her Master's Degree. She has always been a member of the Texas State Teachers Association and plans to remain active in the organization after retirement.

"The greatest rewards of the teaching profession are watching boys and girls accept their Christian citizenship in society," she remarked. Many students have taken their places in the world in measures of success and happiness, and she was honored to have been a small part in the development of their lives. It is her opinion that the most valuable resource we have today is the children.

Mrs. Stambaugh has always strived to teach morals, courtesies, honesty, integrity, obedience, and dependability along with the school curriculum. She stressed the importance of retaining educational material and mastering subjects, due to a highly competitive world. "Students must be prepared," she said.

When I questioned her as to the changes she had noted in both children and parents, she stated, "Kids are kids and they always will be. They are still doing the same things they have always done." As far as parents are concerned, they have always been very kind.

She emphasized a fine fellowship with the administrative school personnel, faculty, and students. Her

teaching career had been very pleasant and enjoyable and she was thankful for it.

The most traumatic event was the burning of the old elementary school building in 1972. The loss of Jack Watkins, the principal, the very same week was overpowering.

She told me how that Dr. Frances Merritt and Miss Myrtle Brick brought books to the First Baptist Church, where temporary classrooms were established. Bro. Brooks and Ora Breeding showed a great deal of understanding and kindness to the students, according to Mrs. Stambaugh. The tables were put up on Monday and taken down on Friday for church services. Not a day of school was missed.

Speaking of days missed, Mrs. Stambaugh holds quite a record herself. She has only missed two days of school due to illness throughout the 35-year span.

Just one of the highlights of her career include the terrific record her picture memory teams have maintained. They have finished with top honors in every competition. This year's team turned in five perfect papers. This is just one example of the incentive she can motivate.

For those of you who do not know Marie Stambaugh on a personal basis, this brief story will make it clear to her compassion. The day that I interviewed her, she received a note from an ex-student who had learned of her retirement plans. He stated that he was grateful for her understanding and for "giving him a chance."

That little note made it all worthwhile. She has always been a complimentary and positive influence on her students. I have never talked with her that she didn't make me feel better about myself.

A very caring teaching career is about to end as she embarks upon another adventure. She stated, "I just felt like this was the right time to retire." She told me that it would definitely be a busy time, because she couldn't stand to do nothing. The first thing she planned was to teach Vacation Bible School the next week after school.

Her husband, Roy, retired from the 3M Company in September of 1987 and is active as a stock farmer. The couple also share a woodwork hobby.

Cross Plains Elementary is sure to miss the smiling face of this dedicated teacher. She has touched all the lives of her students, and what greater satisfaction could be gained.

Many wishes of happiness are extended to Mrs. Stambaugh upon her retirement.

## School Board Summaries

The board of trustee meetings of May 9 and May 18 are reported as follows:

May 9

1. The board met for the purpose of canvassing the results of the recent school board election. A motion was passed by the board to approve the results of the May 7, 1988 School Board Election as correct.

2. The newly elected board members (Donnie Dillard and Randy Montgomery) were given the oath of office by County Judge Mack Kniffen with Mrs. Kniffen as notary.

3. During the reorganization of the school board, Charles Payne was elected as president; Randy Montgomery as vice president; Donnie Dillard as secretary; and Rex Beggs as assistant secretary.

4. A motion was approved to lease the auditorium on June 10 and 11 for a dance recital. The fee was set at \$75 with a \$25 deposit for custodial services.

5. An additional 5 transfers were approved for the 1988-89 school year. This brought the total to 23 students from outside the Cross Plains School District that will be attending school in Cross Plains next year.

6. Auxiliary personnel were approved for 1988-89 school year.

7. Mrs. Robbye Fullen was offered a one year contract for the 88-89 school year. She will be teaching in high school.

May 18

1. The State TEAMS report was given to the board for the 1987-88 Junior Class. Students that did not master all areas in the exam have been given the opportunity for extra tutoring. The test was given again in late spring of this year and will be given in the fall of 1988. Any student that does not pass the exam will not be permitted to graduate from high school. There is no limit to the number of times a student may take the exam.

2. The proposed guidance plan was presented to the board for deleting the old plan and replacing it with the new one. After a brief discussion, the proposed plan was approved as presented.

3. Approval was given by the board for the school to participate in the gifted/talented program with the Education Service Center in Abilene.

4. Keystone Insurance Company was approved by the board as carrier for the student insurance program for 1988-89.

5. Approval was given to continue the Drug Dog Program for 88-89.

6. The board was advised that the lease on the auditorium approved at an earlier meeting had been cancelled. The board also discussed repairs needed to the roof of the bus shop and the need for a temporary building.

7. Permission was given for the administration to hire student help for the summer, provided funds were available.

8. The financial report was presented to the board and bills to be paid were approved.

9. The board and administration spent approximately one hour in budget preparation for the 88-89 school year. In view of the economy of the general area, more time will be spent than usual on the budget preparations.

10. Mrs. Billie Clausen was offered a one year contract. She will be teaching in the elementary school.

Timothy Lynn McCoy was named Salutatorian for 1988. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W.G. McCoy.

He has attended the local school system since kindergarten.

Tim has participated in various

sports and organizations during the last four years.

He plans to work this summer and attend classes at Cisco Junior College. He will enroll at Texas Tech University in Lubbock in the fall.
