

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'Know Before You Go' Is Message Of Texas Safe Boating Week June 5-11

As hundreds of thousands of Texans make their summer vacation plans, those contemplating going on the water are being urged to 'Know Before You Go' during Safe Boating Week, June 5-11. This message, which is being promoted nationwide by the National Safe Boating Council and in Texas by the Boating Trades Association of Texas (BTAT), is aimed at reminding non-traditional boaters of the need to understand basic rules of boating safety.

Non-traditional boaters are those who use boats for sports activities such as fishing, waterskiing or hunting. The National Safe Boating Council reports that even though these people may not consider themselves boaters, they make up 90 percent of the boating population.

To help spread the message in Texas, Governor Bill Clements has proclaimed the June 5-11 period as Texas Safe Boating Week. Officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department also are using this week to kick off a new educational campaign among the state's more than 600,000 registered boat owners. In cooperation with BTAT, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is publishing a listing of "Boating Commandments" which it will distribute to each boat owner along with registration renewals. These guidelines will serve as reminders about procedures all boaters need to follow to ensure a safe and enjoyable trip.

"We are proud to be working with the state to provide some basic education to all our boaters," said Jimmie Vititow, BTAT president. "It is much easier to prevent a problem by knowing and heeding boating basics than it is to get out of trouble once a problem has occurred.

Rules of the road for boaters are available from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in a pocket guide entitled "Boating in Texas." The department also offers a free boating course, "Texas Boating Basics." To receive the pocket guide or to inquire about the "Texas Boating Basics" course, call toll-free 1-800-792-1112.

Boating courses also are available through the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, the U.S. Power Squadrons, and the American Red Cross.

The Boating Trades Association of Texas is a statewide organization of boat dealers, manufacturers, distributors and others in the industry. BTAT works at the state and national level to enhance the pleasure and safety of recreational boating.

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So what can you do for a healthy back? One important bad "back habit" to correct is improper bending and lifting.

When bending or lifting or even just reaching down for that matter, follow these rules:

-Face the object you'll be picking up; don't twist your body.

—Bend from your knees and hips not from your waist. And bend down as far as necessary to reach the object you'll be picking up.

—Then tuck under your buttocks and pull in your abdominal muscles. This helps reduce swayback by flattening the lower back.

-Pick up the object and hold it close to your body.

—Then lift with your legs, using the large muscles of the thighs, not the small of your back.

—A general guideline to follow is to lift a heavy object no higher than the waist, lift a light object no higher than the shoulders — greater height tends to sway the back.

-To turn with an object in your hand, turn your entire body as a unit. Do not twist to turn or to set the object down.

—And when setting the object down be sure to follow the same steps you used in lifting the object. Hold the object close to your body, and bend down from your knees and hips, not from your waist.

One last caution — don't be a hero with a heavy load or one that is especially large or awkward so that it can't be held close to the body. Get help!





Census Bureau To Survey Households

Local representatives of the U.S. Census Bureau will revisit selected area households beginning June 1 to conduct its Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP), John E. Bell, director of the bureau's Dallas Regional Office, announced today.

SIPP is a major nationwide continuing survey introduced in the fall of 1983. It is one of the nation's largest surveys, with about 36,000 households participating.

The Census Bureau publishes periodic reports providing information from the survey. Subjects covered include the following:

—Jobs and earnings

-The economic effects of unemployment, disability, and retire-

-How taxes affect personal spen-

-Participation in programs such as Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid, and food stamps.

Information from SIPP helps policy makers and administrators determine how well government programs are serving the public and how changes in programs and policies will affect the public.

Here are some facts based on SIPP interviews during 1984 on pension plans (the sample size limits accurate reporting to national figures only):

-Two thirds of the nation's wage and salary workers age 25 and over, some 52.7 million, were covered by employer-sponsored public and private pensions in 1984.

-Coverage, excluding Social Security, extended to 70 percent of men and 64 percent of women. Social Security covered about 92 percent of all civilian workers.

-About 90 percent of workers in firms with 1,000 or more employees were covered by pension plans, compared with one-quarter of those in firms with fewer than 25 employees.

-Pension coverage ranged from only 38 percent of workers with monthly earnings under \$500, to 84 percent of those earning \$2,000 or more.

-About one-fifth of wage and salary workers age 25 and over, some 16.3 million, had individual retirement accounts in 1984. Three out of four IRA participants were also covered by a pension plan at work (IRAs were established in 1974 to cover those not under a pension plan, but the program was extended to all workers in 1982).

Information collected in SIPP is confidential by law. Interviewers have credentials identifying them as U.S. Census Bureau employees.
