skill and agility. The kids liked all the animal acts. The tigers were very elegant, while the elephants put on a good show. I had never seen trained camels and

goats, but they were very entertaining. The bulldogs stole the show with their comedy football game as they

chased balloons with sheer determination to burst them. Speaking of comedy, the two clowns who performed an unusual balancing act on a revolving ladder were terrific.

The combination of skill and comedy was very appealing to the crowd. Their whistling act got everyone's attention, too. The crew men must be com-

County Employees Get Pay Raises

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular meeting Monday, September 12, voted to give themselves and all county employees a pay increase just before raising the county tax rate that will pay for those increases.

Commissioners voted unanimously for the four percent pay raise for all elected officials and all other county employees, stating that the pay increase was only the first in three years without one.

The increase in county employees' pay was being encouraged by all county department supervisors but was not demanded.

The 1988 county budget, which included the pay raises, was set at \$1,234,000, slightly higher than the 1987 budget of \$1,187,000.

This year's budget is a deficit budget, with projections of a \$3,000 deficit expected. If the budget goes into the red, unencumbered funds will

be used to make up the deficit. County commissioners then approved a 1.4 percent increase in this year's tax rate. The 1988 tax rate was set at .3345 cents per \$100 of appraised value. Last year's tax rate was .3299 cents per \$100. The 1988 tax includes .2568 cents for the general fund and

.0777 cents for the FM Road fund. Other items brought before county commissioners include:

-Voted to enter into a lease agreement with the Department of Health to lease the Callahan County Hospital building to the health department for office space. Department of Health offices will be located in the east wing of the hospital building as soon as building repairs are completed. The agreement is for a 10 year lease at no charge for rent. All repairs to the building must be paid for by the Department of Health. The health department will be moving from offices located on the third floor of the county courthouse building. The Callahan County Hospital building is located west of the courthouse building.

—Commissioners met with Cliff and Mary Van Der Linden to discuss when a deputy would be stationed in the Eula area. Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner told the county residents that the deputy should be stationed in the Eula area within two weeks, since a home in the area has been found for the deputy to live in.

-Two members of a Callahan County Grand Jury met with commissioners to report that the grand jury had not been given the case of Baird Justice of the Peace Bobby Curtis and questionable activities concerning funds in his office. The grand jury members requested that the commissioners court pass a resolution requiring an outside audit be done on the four Justice of the Peace offices within the county twice a year. Commissioners voted for the resolution.

—The two grand jury members discussed with county commissioners the possibility that the county sheriff's office was not properly preparing its cases to present to a grand jury. No action was taken.

-Met with James Reese of United Hospital Corporation to discuss if the county is considering selling some of its hospital equipment, now that the building is being leased to the department of health. No action was taken.

-Met with Justice of the Peace Bobby Curtis concerning a phone bill charged to the county which was for personal calls. The Baird Justice of the Peace told commissioners he would soon pay the personal phone charges.

-Opened bids for computer service for the Callahan County treasurer's office. Two bids were opened from CPS Business System of Wichita Falls and Hill Country Software of Comfort. Commissioners voted to accept the bid of Hill County Software for software only at a cost of \$5,900 and a \$900 a year maintenance agreement. Commissioners agreed to take bids again for the purchase of hardware only for the treasurer's office.

-Met with Baird Meals-On-Wheels Director Fern Lee to discuss the county contributing again to the non-profit organization. Commissioners voted to contribute \$3,000 to the Meals-On-Wheels Program, the same contribution as the previous year.

-Met with Tom Smith of the Economical Development District concerning the county's approval of a resolution to establish an economic district in a 19 county area. County commissioners voted to pass the resolution. There is no charge to be a member of the economic development district.

-Voted to advertise for bids on repairing the north parking lot around the county courthouse building.

County commissioners, in a called meeting Friday, September 16, voted to hire Jon Herod, a C.P.A. from Clyde, to perform an audit of Justice of the Peace Precinct 1 office of Bobby Curtis.

The final item of the short called meeting was a motion of approval to have County Commissioner Precinct 1 to clean a ditch for drainage purposes in the Pecan Grove addition on the Carl Rice residence.

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
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



Provisions For 1989 Wheat And **Grain Programs Available**

The "0/92" provisions are available for the 1989 wheat and feed grain programs. Some producers are debating whether or not to plant winter wheat because of the dry soil conditions. This reminder may assist them in making this management decision ASCS official Scott Odom said.

The "O/92" provisions gives wheat and feed grain producers the option to devote all or a portion of their permitted acreage to conserving uses and received deficiency payments on the acreage. The maximum acres for deficiency payments under this provision is 92 percent of the permitted acreage.

Odom pointed out that the sign up dates and the projected deficiency rates for the 1989 wheat and feed grain crops have not been announced. However, Odom said that the "0/92" provisions will be available for these






