Acts of heroism in the 8th Air Force are not always performed at high altitudes, 2nd Lt. Morris C. Eastham of Baird, Texas, proved recently.

At a Liberator station, commanded by Col. E. W. Napier of San Antonio, Texas, the young officer extricated five injured men from a B-24 loaded with several tons of bombs and amunition, which had suddenly burst out into a raging inferno of fire prior to take-off.

Lt. Eastham, the Station Marshall, saw the helpless bomber aflame from the control tower and rushed to the ylane in a jeep, shortly before two fire trucks and ambulances arrived. He pulled one of the crew members from beneath the wreckage of a motor, and proceeded back to the flames of the explosive-laden bomber to free four more men.

Four others of the unfortunate bomber crew, inn a somewhat dazed condition, walked out of the ship unadied.

One man, the radio-operator, was trapped on the flight deck behind a wall of flame, unable to reach safety and counld not be approached because of the inntense heat, while the rescuer and his helpers worked againstt ime before the impending explosionn. He perished.

Wh .. it was believed all of the airmen that could be reached had Lt. Eastham ordered all rescuers to a safe distance.

Seconds later, three violent explosions destroyed the Liberator.
