The Cross Plains Buffaloes may not be the District Champs, but that just doesn't seem to matter when you're one step better - The Bi-District Champs.

Cross Plains' first score, a 36-yard run by Chris Brown, capped just a 3 play drive 5 minutes and 11 seconds into the game. The Buffaloes' second score came on a 1-yard run by Brown, approximately 2 minutes later when the Yellowjackets bobbled an attempted punt. The Buffs led 14-0 after the first quarter when Chris Brown ran in the 2-point conversion.

Punting problems then plagued the Buffaloes, helping Menard pull within 7. Attempting a punt deep in his own territory, Cross Plains' James Ames bobbled the snap and was tackled at the Cross Plains 2.

Two plays later the Yellowjackets pushed the ball over from the 1-yard line with 8:53 left in the 2nd quarter. The extra point attempt was good.

With 3 seconds left in the half, Menard scored its last points when they kicked a field goal, leaving the score 14-10 at half time.

Third quarter play was filled with

lots of action, but no scoring. In the 4th, Menard advanced to the 9-yard line, and then on 4th and 2 the 'Jackets were stopped short of the first down after opting not to punt into the

Cross Plains regained possession on downs and 4 plays later Chris Brown scored from the 1 for his 3rd touchdown of the game. The Buffaloes led 20-10 after a two-point conversion failed.

The wind was both the Cross Plains Buffaloes' enemy and friend. The Yellowjackets used the wind to their advantage in the 2nd quarter, preying on 3 Cross Plains punts that traveled an average of 11.3 yards. However, Coach Permenter was most pleased with Ames' 68-yard punt that left Menard on their own 1-yard line.

Another big play in the second half was when Cross Plains stopped Menard on 4th and goal from the 3.

The Buffaloes were missing seasonlong starting quarterback Deron Duffey who broke an arm, but replacement Terrill Smith filled the vacant position admirably, Permenter noted.

The Buffaloes meet up with Baird Bears in an Area playoff game Friday at 7:30 p.m. in Breckenridge.

Coach Permenter has led the Buffaloes to their first playoff berth since 1956. Be sure to get out and back those Buffs!

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farmers and ranchers got two big corrections in tax laws," reports Phil Williams, President of the Callahan/Shackelford County Farm

many capacities.

One dealt with the diesel fuel tax and the other, the so-called "heifer tax," pertained to an income tax provision regarding production expenses, he said.

One correction restores a tax exemption on farm-used fuel at the retail level. The so-called "heifer tax" restores preproductive expensing of livestock.

"Both tax corrections are very important to the farmers and ranchers of these counties."

The Budget Reconciliation Act, passed by Congress last December, changed the collection point for the diesel tax from the retail to the wholesale level, forcing users to pay the tax and then apply for a refund. The change became effective April 1. In most instances, producers would have to wait for an entire year to get a refund.

Both taxes have now been repealed by the Technical Corrections Bills passed just before Congress adjourned, the local farm leader said.

The local county Farm Bureau received a letter from Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True, congratulating local leaders for the two successes.

"Your hard work has paid off, and the Texas Farm Bureau's top legislative priorities have been accomplished for 1988," True wrote.

The American Farm Bureau Federation credits Texas producers with playing a key role in obtaining final passage of the Bills. AFBF reported that hundreds of letters were received by Texas members of Congress, he said.

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



## **Farmers Need** To Check On Crop Insurance

Farmers who plan to put in winter crops with the Farmers Home Administration emergency loans based on this year's drought should take steps immediately to see if they need crop insurance for 1989 crops, according to J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director for Texas.

The Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 requires any farmer with a production loss exceeding 65 percent of normal to agree to purchase insurance for 1989 crops, with some exceptions as a condition for obtaining an FmHA emergency loan to help cover 1988 losses, Futch said.

The open season for obtaining multiperil crop insurance for winter crops expires October 31, except in certain northwestern States where it is November 30, leaving farmers little time to obtain insurance. Although some extensions to the deadline may be granted on an individual basis, Futch said farmers should get in touch with their local insurance representative without delay. Proof of insurance will be required before disaster loan applications can be processed.

Exceptions to the insurance requirement include cases where insurance is not available and where premium costs would impose an undue financial hardship as determined by the FmHA county committee.

If you love Texas and its history, the next time you go to San Antonio, there's something you've just got to see.

We want to believe that Davy Crockett could shoot the eye out of a squirrel at 100 yards. That's the way it is in the movie. We want to believe that Santa Anna was a low-life. That's the way it is in the

We want to believe that 189 men chose to stand and die for freedom when they could have run. That's the way it is in the movie.

Some historians have tried for decades to debunk as myth much of what happened at the Alamo. I think they should shut up. I want my heroes. I want to believe it happened just like I read when I was a kid.

The fact is the men were there and they did die.

The giant screen makes the event and the men bigger than life. They are.

Many Mexican Americans have objected to the movie, saying it protrays their ancestors in a bad light. (As far as I could tell, there was not a single Mexican American in the audience of about 200 when I viewed the movie.)

I don't agree with their objection. After all, it was the Mexican army that was fighting to take the Alamo. There's no getting around that.

Also, the movie pointed out several times that there were a number of Mexicans fighting for our side and against their own countrymen at the Alamo.

All and all, if the movie doesn't put a lump in your throat, you don't have Texas dust in your craw.

I can't wait for the sequel and watch us kick you-know-what at San Jacinto.
