Down Home

Mother Seeks Protection For Children

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following news release expresses one Mom's opinion about T.V. shows content and children's viewing hours. She makes a good point. Vanda King.

Lynda Beams, a Fort Worth mother of two, wants to shield children from talk shows that often deal with sexually explicit subject matter. The Geraldo Show and the Oprah Winfrey Show air at 4 to 5 p.m. each weekday. Many children are home from school and unsupervised at that hour.

Beams was spurred into action when flipping through the channels, she caught references to bestiality on Geraldo. She spent several weeks writing letters and formulating petitions which have generated thousands of signatures. The petition asks that airing times be changed to an hour when children are in school or the evening when parents are home.

Beams is rallying support throughout the Metroplex and the state. Resolutions are being adopted and petitions are circulating through PTAs and churches of all denominations. Many mothers, grandmothers and people from all walks of life are cheering her on. She has received letters of encouragement from Mrs. George Bush and Mrs. Dan Quayle.

Beams has studied transcripts and topic lists from the two shows and says these publications are proof of objectionable material. "Geraldo is wading in the waters of verbal softcore pornography," Beams said, "and these waters have risen in the short time that I have been working on this project."

Beams cites Geraldo's March 22 show titled "Sex Surrogates" in which one guest, a sex therapist, spoke of having sexual intercourse with 350 clients while maintaining a relationship with a boyfriend. Among Geraldo's other topics: "Satanic Breeders: Babies for Sacrifice," "Women Who Can't Say 'No'," "What men Want from Women in Bed," "Breast Obsession," "Unlocking the Doors of Great Sex," "Transsexuals and Their Families," "Male and Female Strippers," and "Male Prostitutes and Married Men."

KDFW-TV/Channel 4 Dallas, which airs Geraldo, said that station's position is to run the show at 4 p.m. and include advisories for parents if it contains material unsuitable for young viewers.

"The advisories are a red flag, a come-on to children and are ineffective for absent parents," Beams states. She believes fewer children would watch the shows if the advisories were withdrawn.

The transcript list for Oprah Winfrey indicates a lower percentage of topics focused on sex and violence. But a sample of inappropriate topics includes: "Teacher-Student Affairs," "Witches," "Relatives in Love," "Addicted to Sex," "Self-Abuse and Mutilation," "Profiling Prostitutes," "Sex Slaves," "Men Who Dress as Women," and "Wives Who Have Affairs."

"The topics alone are shocking," Beams states, "but only when one reads a transcript or views a show in its entirety is the full impact of the destructive influence realized."

The Texas PTA has supported her efforts and published an article about the cause in the PTA Communicator, a newsletter distributed to 8,000 members across the state.

"It sort of falls under our jurisdiction because we have a position on trying to remove pornography or inappropriate material from children's view," said Sandy Kibby, the state PTA's legislative chairwoman.

"I am not a psychologist," Beams states, "but I do not think it is that difficult to rearrange the mind of an adolescent."

"It is very important that everyone concerned about this vital issue continue this fight to protect our children from the influence of people who have lost sight of the good in this world."

City Of Cross Plains Update

In August of 1988 the City of Cross Plains applied for a Sewer Treatment Plant grant. After all steps were taken to try and secure the grant, the City was notified, unofficially in the middle of March by the Council of Governments, that the grant funds would be allocated.

On April 19, 1989 the Texas Department of Commerce officially notified the City that it was the recipient of a grant in the amount of \$236,000. At this time the contracts on this grant have not been signed, but as soon as these steps are completed the City will accept bids on the project. When construction begins further information will be available.

The City of Cross Plains is currently operating under a burn permit issued by the Texas Air Control Board for the disposal of refuse. This allowed burning every other Monday, if conditions are favorable. However, as of August 31, 1989 the Federal Environmental Protection Agency has passed a bill curtailing outside burning.

Each day that refuse is dumped into a pit, at the end of that day it will have to be covered with 6 inches of dirt. Thus a pit that normally lasts from 2 to 3 years will last only months, depend-

ing on the amount of refuse.

The costs of operating the landfill, along with the restrictions that the EPA is placing on all landfill operators, motivated the City to consider all alternatives that are available in order to cut costs incurred by the landfill.

It was pointed out by City personnel that the funds received for the sewer system CAN NOT BE used for the landfill operation.

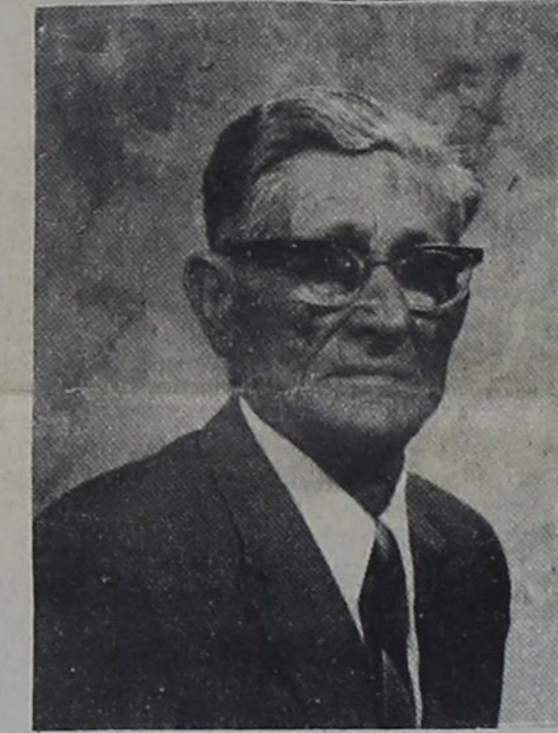

Ira H. Hall, age 93, a former long time resident of Cross Plains died at 6 a.m. Thursday, May 4, 1989 at Northwest Medplex Nursing Facility in Austin, Texas. Services were held at 2

p.m. Saturday, May 6, 1989, at Higginbotham Funeral Chapel in Cross Plains with Rev. Knox Waggoner officiating. A eulogy was given by Jack Scott. Burial was in the Cross Plains Cemetery.

Ira was born January 28, 1896 in Itasca, Texas to James Jeremiah and Elmetta Mayes Hall. His father, a store owner and cotton ginner, moved the family to Bulcher, Cooke County, Texas. He met Alice Virginia West, a teacher in the Bulcher Community School and daughter of a Baptist preacher, Francis Marion and Carolina Hildebrand West.

Ira and Alice were married December 7, 1917 in Marysville, Texas. Ira served in the Army in World War I. Five children were born to Ira and Alice: James, Katherine, Doris Marie, Wanda Jean, and Joan. The family moved to Callahan County, Texas from Lamb County, Texas in 1935, settling first in the Sabanno Community. They moved to Cross Plains in 1936 where Ira worked for and operated several small businesses.

In 1939 he established Texas Milling Company, a part of Kimbell Milling Company of Fort Worth. He bought grain and peanuts and shipped them out on the old MKT Railroad. Texas Milling Company was located on the corner of Highways 36 and 279 and was a hub of activity during harvest time. In 1956 Ira and Alice built and operated Hall's Grocery on East Highway 36 until they retired in 1963 and moved to Brownwood Lake in 1966.

During their thirty years in Cross Plains, Ira was active in community affairs. He served on the Volunteer Fire Department for twenty-three years, four of those as Fire Chief. He was on the City Council from 1963 until 1966, serving on the water board and as City Judge during that time. He was also active in the Masonic Lodge. Ira was a member of the Rocky Creek Baptist Church, Brownwood Lake. He moved to Lake Fork, Emory, Texas in 1981 and had been a resident of Trinity Lutheran Home in Round Rock, Texas since October 1986.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Alice in 1967; a son, James in 1975; and a great-grandson, Roby Carlisle in 1966.

Ira is survived by daughter and son-in-law, Katherine and Robert Harris, Emory, Texas; daughter, Doris Givens, Odessa, Texas; daughter and son-in-law, Wanda and Arthur Boyle, Emory, Texas; daughter and son-in-law, Joan and Charles Kunkel, Pflugerville, Texas; daughter-in-law, Mrs. James Hall, Plainview, Texas; twelve grandchildren; twenty-five great-grandchildren; seven great-great-grandchildren; and one sister, Mrs. Jessie Hall Rector, Tulia, Texas.

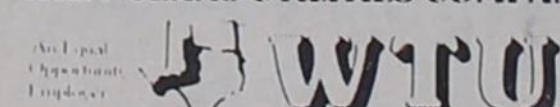
