## Local Man Preserves Family History By Publishing A Book

Ray Trent, who retired to Cross Plains with his wife, Erma, in April of 1988, has written a book about his family which will serve as a permanent recollection for future genera-

"The main purpose of working on the book for the past two years was to preserve family history and history of the Central Texas area in a written form," Trent stated. "The Trents of Texas" is filled with over 300 photos of both family and friends, and it covers happenings related to many locations including Abilene, Brownwood, Burkett, Cisco, Coleman, Comanche, Cross Plains, Cross Roads, Cross Cut, Ranger, Rising Star, Rockwood, Santa Anna, Trent, Camp Barkley, and Camp Bowie over the past 50 to 60 years.

Mr. Trent was raised around Echo and is well acquainted with residents in the area. He will be remembered by many at Burkett. He has performed at Echo School reunions, and his grandparents are buried in the Burkett Cemetery.

Trent has a very impressive background stemming from Denver City where he resided for 45 years. He was the founder and president (since 1945) of the B & W Insurance Agency. He was editor and publisher of the Plains Record in 1967-68. He was the founder and president of Beauty, Inc. since 1969, and South Plains Gospel Music Association since 1970.

He served as president of South Plains Publishing Company since 1973 and Senior Citizens Association 1979-80. He also chartered the organization in 1980 and it remains active at this time. Ray was also appointed Yoakum County Youth Director and served in this capacity for two

For the past sixteen years he was responsible for the South Plains Music Festival and Old Settler Reunion in Denver City, along with the Miss South Plains Pageant. In the late 1950's he formed a gospel band, The Gospelaires, and in the sixties a country band, The Westerners. In 1970 he formed another country-western band, The Echo Valley Boys. He has appeared on stage with some of the best known musicians, and children's homes, churches and fairs.

Trent is affiliated with BMI as publisher, musician, singer and songwriter. Several of his works have been copyrighted, including "Texas Tragedy," "Heartaches and Teardrops," and "Echo Valley." He cut his first record in 1976, "Lovin" You" and "Faded Rose," on the South Plains label

In the 1960's he lost to E.L. Short of Tahoka in a bid for State Representative. He has received many honors including the National Living Centers Award, the Congress of Freedom Liberty Award, the Leadership Foundation Award, and has been included in several publications including Personalilties of the South and International Book of Honor. Since 1970 he has been involved in evangelistic

Trent stated that Cross Plains had "just the place" he was looking for. The fifty acres and house, known as the Burks Welding place, was where he chose to retire. "I wanted to get back down in God's country," he lovingly remarked. "We really like the people here," he stated. "That is why

we chose Cross Plains to retire." Many of the stories in the book he wrote from memory, including the one about his grandfather, James Polk Trent. He had always known that he served in the Civil War, but just recently located the paper work to prove it. He also received a permanent grave marker commemorating his grandfather's service.

James Trent was captured and held on Hilton Head Island in South Carolina along with several other Confederate soldiers for nine days. When

the war ended he start d a long and difficult trip to Georgia, only to find that his parents had moved. He finally located a sister in Tennessee and was able to be reunited with his parents at

## **Hospital West Wing Occupant Possibly Found**

Callahan County Commissioners might have found an occupant for the west wing of the old county hospital building after Callahan County Tax Authority Chief Appraiser Rod Lewallen met with county commissioners Monday, June 26, during the commissioners court regular meeting.

Lewallen told commissioners that the Callahan County Tax Authority was "very interested" in relocating its offices into the west wing of the county hospital building.

Early in June, the Department of Human Services relocated its offices into the east wing of the hospital building, after making some remodeling construction to the building. The Department of Human Services had been in the third floor of the county courthouse building but made the

move to the hospital building because of office space consideration.

Lewallen said that the tax authority was considering making the move for the same reason. He said that the tax authority has outgrown its offices, located on the first floor of the courthouse building.

Lewallen said that he estimates that \$30,000 to \$40,000 is needed to remodel the west wing of the hospital building, before the tax authority can relocate.

Lewallen said that the relocation plans must be approved by the tax authority's board of directors, before the move could be made.

Lewallen said that if county commissioners were not willing to pay the

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Cross Plains Review:

I have received two papers and have enjoyed them very much. Many relatives and friends still live there. My maiden name was Billie Joyce Brashear and I went to school there many years.

Continued From Page 1 remodeling cost for the move, that the tax authority would consider paying the remodeling cost. He said that if the tax authority paid for the remodeling, that the tax authority would ask commissioners for a no-rent contract in the building until the county had reimbursed the tax authority for the cost of remodeling the building.

Lewallen said that he would present relocation plans to his board of directors and come back to the commissioners with exact estimates of remodeling the building.

No action was taken by county commissioners.

Several other items were brought before county commissioners court including:

-Met with Callahan County Tax Assessor/Collector Wauneta Estes. Mrs. Estes told commissioners that the county tax office has applied for participation in a new computer system that links with the state office in Austin. Mrs. Estes told commissioners that if Callahan County is awarded the computer linkup, that the state would furnish the computer equipment to the county at no cost. She did say that the county would have to pay for some electrical work to the county tax office and that a central airconditioning system would also be needed. Also during the discussion, Mrs. Estes discussed the salaries of the employees in the county tax office. Commissioners took no action on neither items.

-Met with Cross Plains resident Eddie Albrecht to discuss his county taxes. No action was taken by the commissioners.

-Met with Callahan County Treasurer Dora Hounshell to discuss how the four county precincts would distribute tax monies. She told commissioners that she wanted a clarification on the way tax money is distributed among the precincts. Commissioners let stand the pay distribution that was adopted at the May 8 commissioners court meeting. At the May 8 meeting, commissioners voted to change the precincts share of tax money to 25 percent for each of the county precincts.

-Discussed naming possible election judges for the county general election set for this fall. Commissioners were given a list of last year's precinct election judges but took no action on naming the election judges until next month's regular meeting.

-Commissioners voted to put approximately \$15,000, made during an auction for hospital equipment last Saturday, into the hospital's account. Commissioners will consider what to do with the money at a later meeting.

—Commissioners voted to purchase two new typewriters for the Clyde and Eula sheriff's deputies offices.

-Voted to purchase property identification tags for each county department and that the tags be placed on the department's property and an inventory list of that property be turned into County Judge Mack Kniffen.

-Discussed the county budget for the fiscal year between October 1989 and September 1990. No action was taken.

-Voted to have each department head to prepare a budget for his particular office and to turn in the proposed budget into the county judge. The department heads would make up budgets for the fiscal year between October 1989 and September 1990.

-Commissioners discussed what to do with the fourth floor storage area in the county courthouse building. Commissioners agreed to inform each department head that anything currently stored in the fourth floor must be removed before August 1, 1989. Commissioners said that the county would then relocate the shelving from the old hospital building to the fourth floor storage of the county courthouse building. The new storage area would be used by the county departments to keep records that are not used on a consistent basis. Commissioners stated that the fourth floor storage area had become a fire hazard and the action was taken to alleviate the pro-

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) today pledged to co-sponsor a constitutional amendment that would make it against the law to defile the American Flag. Stenholm made his comments while addressing the House and voicing his opposition to the Supreme Court's 5-4 decision that burning Old Glory is not a violation of

The Supreme Court decision was handed down Wednesday afternoon and essentially overturns Texas law and Federal law which imposes up to a year's jail sentence and/or up to a thousand dollar fine for "desecrating" the flag.

"Perhaps the Supreme Court finds no wrong-doing in treating the flag with anything less than full respect," Stenholm said. "But I'm here to tell you my constituents in the 17th District feel otherwise."

Stenholm pointed out that the flag flies in respect and gratitude for the more than one million Americans who have died defending our country.

"This court decision is, in effect, an insult to all who served," he said. "It's an insult to the American beliefs and values which they fought for."

Stenholm took part in a Rally Round the Flag in Abilene on July 4 to continue pursuing the issue. The rally was organized in cooperation with Texas State Representative Bob Hunter of

Stenholm is currently a co-sponsor of H.R. 1295 which would make it a violation to place the American Flag on the floor. He says he will continue to support his bill in addition to the constitutional amendment.





Walter Jones, an industrious man, was the annual lemonade maker. In a wooden barrel filled with water from home was the best lemonade one could ever hope to drink. This chore was his year after year, as many will remember.

Young people enjoyed a Bayou swimming hole through the day. Small children had room to play games.

One year this picnic day was interrupted by a heavy rain storm which cut short the day. Also, it made a problem for vehicles to travel up a steep slick hill. Vehicles had to be pushed one by one. These are good times to remember.

Today's 4th of July picnics are observed by families crowding around our Texas lakes with meals of sandwiches, and the lakes full of speeding boats and the people wondering who is camping by them.
