## 'Living In Tornado Alley'

Many people probably question why those of us who live in "tornado alley" do not move. I certainly can recall thinking I wouldn't live along the coastal states and have to contend with hurricanes.

Guess it just boils down to the fact that home is what you are use to and the threats seem more minimal. The beginning of tornado season has just commenced and we must all be prepared for such emergencies.

After considering some premeditated plans on the subject, I came to the conclusion that we couldn't even get out the windows on one end of the house without shoes to protect us from grass burs. Being prepared with flashlights, clothing, umbrellas, etc., necessary to make a move to a safe shelter would prove very beneficial when time is critical.

Also, learning the precautions if there is no time to leave could be essential to survival.

Below are some helpful suggestions for tornado season which were provided by Texas Insurance Advisory Association. TIAA is an advisory organization with membership consisting of 300 insurance companies writing property insurance policies in the Texas regulated market. It is licensed to advise the State Board of Insurance on matters involving property forms, rules, and rates.

Before Trouble Heads Your Way - Keep emergency supplies on

hand, including a portable radio and flashlight with fresh batteries. - If you live in a mobile home, know the location of the closest

- Find the designated shelter areas

in public facilities, such as schools and shopping malls.

- Make an inventory of all household furnishings and possessions, supplemented by photographs of each room. Include a description of the item, date of purchase or age, purchase price and estimated replacement cost today. (For a free household inventory form or tornado safety brochure, write to: Insurance Information Institute, 800 Brazos St., Suite 4220, Austin, TX 78701.)

 Update your insurance coverage annually. The standard Texas homeowners policy (HO-B) provides replacement cost coverage for the structure, as long as your property is insured for at least 80 percent of its replacement value. Otherwise, you will only be reimbursed the actual cash value (the depreciated value at the time of the loss). Contents are insured for actual cash value under a standard HO-B policy, but you can purchase an endorsement which provides replacement cost coverage. **During the Storm** 

- Know the difference between a "watch" and a "warning." A tornado watch means that conditions are ripe for formation; a tornado warning means one has been spotted and danger is imminent.

- During a tornado warning, take cover immediately in a basement, bathroom, closet or under a heavy piece of furniture away from windows. Do not go outdoors. The only exception is if you are in a mobile home or car, in which case you will be safer taking cover in the nearest ditch

or depression. After the Storm

- Be alert for potential hazards. such as broken power or gas lines, shattered glass and splintered wood.

- Take photos of any damage and notify your insurance agent or company representative immediately. Your policy requires notification as soon as possible after a loss. Leave a phone number or address where you can be contacted, especially if damage is so severe that you will be living elsewhere until repairs are made.

- If debris (such as a tree falling on the insured property) prevents you from using your home or if such debris

could increase the damage, advise insurance officials of this when you report the loss.

- Your policy requires that you make temporary repairs as necessary to prevent future damage. This includes boarding up broken windows and covering holes in the roof with temporary materials. Your insurance will pay for the cost of these repairs, so record expenditures and keep receipts. DO NOT MAKE PERMA-NENT REPAIRS unless the adjuster has reviewed the claim and given you permission.

- Take steps to protect property from theft or vandalism, and do what you can to salvage damaged property.

- Make a detailed list of all damaged or destroyed personal property for the adjuster, keeping a copy for your records. Gather canceled checks, invoices or receipts that could help in placing a proper value on them. Get repair estimates for those pieces which can be economically repaired.

 In a major catastrophe, hundreds of claims will be processed and emergency cases must be handled first. Being available when the adjuster calls can speed your settlement. If you must leave the property, put a note on the door saying how you can

#### Food Stamp Items Non-Taxable

AUSTIN — State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Monday reminded Texas businesses that items bought with food stamps are not taxable.

"We're not going to take advantage of folks who are already having a difficult time financially by making them pay sales tax on groceries they buy with food stamps," Bullock said.

According to Bullock, the Texas Legislature exempted food stamp purchases from state and local sales taxes in 1987. The exemption went into effect in October of that year.

Only items that can be legally bought with food stamps are exempted from the sales tax, Bullock said.

For example, federal law prohibits applying food stamps towards alcohol or tobacco products, Bullock said.

However, items that would normally be taxable, such as gum, candy and soda, aren't taxable when they're paid for with food stamps. Bullock said his agency has mailed

more than 24,000 notices to grocery stores, specialty food stores, bakeries, and convenience stores statewide to remind owners and managers of the exemption.

#### Work Reports Due April 17

People who received Social Security benefits and also worked in 1988 may have to file an earnings report by April 17, Glyn Hammons, Social Security

manager in Abilene, said recently. Any beneficiary whose earnings went over the exempt amount is required to file an annual report showing exact earnings for 1988 and estimated earnings for 1989

Exempt earnings vary for different age groups, Hammons said. For beneficiaries under 65, the 1988 amount was \$6,120; for those 65-69, it was \$8,400. Earnings limits do not apply when workers reach 70.

The exempt figure is the amount a person can earn in a year and still receive full Social Security benefits. When earnings are over the exempt amount, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings over the limit.

The estimate of 1989 earnings in reports filed now will determine what checks will be sent this year. The 1989 exempt figure is \$6,480 for persons under 65 and \$8,880 for those 65-69.

The annual report is very important in avoiding overpayments, and penalties can be imposed for failure to file, Hammons stated. Anyone who received checks in 1988 and estimated earnings over the exempt amount should have received an annual report form in the mail.







In 1959, the American Legion sponsored the first "National Employ the Older Worker Week" to draw special attention to the growing and valuable resource of older workers in the nation's labor market.


