#### "Cross Plains: Just As It Is" **By SCOTT CROCKETT**

Cross Plains - a small community in the heart of Texas - a spot of land with a population the size of many high schools. On a universal scale it is not even comparable to a speck of dust. Yet, of all the great planets, of all the masses of land on the earth, it is the place that I call home.

There are several thousand towns very similar to this one. Nearly a hundred of which are only a few hours' drive away. Slowly, however, small towns are beginning to disappear, steadily being swallowed up by the cities, or simply fading away into the desert. Cross Plains is part of a dying breed. Still, it has managed to survive. Lasting through the oil crunch, hanging on through the drought. It seemed for a while that it too was giving in, balancing precariously over a great chasm that threatened to consume it. Clinging desperately to Highway 36, its only life line.

Things seem to be better now. There is more money flowing. Oil is still bad, but the crops have been good the past two years. New businesses have opened up. Others are expanding. I realize that this growth is good for the people, good for the school, and good for the town, but I cringe to think that my small hometown is slowly being commercialized. My father was in the service for nearly twenty years. My family has moved several times. I have lived in four different states, and spent nearly four years in the Phillipines. I have attended five separate schools, and visited most of the southeastern states. Of all the places I have been, Cross Plains is where I hang my hat. Cross Plains is where my heart is. My family has its deepest roots here. My great-great-grandfather McDaniel settled here in the late eighteen hundreds. He built a house, cleared the land, and started his family. My grandfather was born here. He

#### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 89-001**

An ordinance making it unlawful for any person to burn trash, brush, grass, leaves, paper, cloth, garbage, trees, boards, planks, lumber, or any other character of debris or inflammable materials whatsoever, except it be in an approved container or incinerator; requiring said incinerator be approved by the City Engineer, City Fire Marshal, or City Fire Chief; requiring each person to obtain a written permit from the City Fire Chief or the City Fire Marshal for out of door burning of trash, trees, limbs, boards, lumber, or any other character of debris or inflammable material not in an approved incinerator or container and not for purely domestic purposes; requiring each person having a fire out of doors for cooking and other purely domestic purposes to build such fires in fire proof containers or surround such fire with fire proof material to prevent said fire from escaping; prohibiting the burning of automobiles or other motor vehicles or nay part thereof for wrecking or salvage purposes within the City of Cross Plains; providing a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$200 for each violation hereof; providing a saving clause and providing for an effective date hereof.

ing their regular garbage fees as required by the Garbage Ordinance. SECTION 7.

It shall be unlawful to burn trash in a garbage container.

**SECTION 8.** 

Any person violating this Ordinance or any part thereof shall upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined not less than \$10 nor more then \$200 and each day that said violation continues shall be considered a separate offense.

#### **SECTION 9.**

If any section or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared to be void, ineffective or unconstitutional, this shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections and provisions of this Ordinance and they shall remain in full force and effect.

#### **SECTION 10.**

This Ordinance shall be effective on and after the second and final reading, passage and publication thereof.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 89-003**

An Ordinance declaring certain conditions to be a nuisance providing for notice and hearing to abate, providing for involuntary abatement by the city, declaring cost of involuntary abatement as a lien, providing for the control and abatement of weed and brush growth, fixing fines for violation, providing for repeal of prior existing ordinances on same subject matter.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cross Plains:

#### **ARTICLES I. IN GENERAL**

ing or permitting any condition or thing to be or exist, which act, omission, condition or thing either:

(a) Injures or dangers the comfort, repose, health or safety of others; or (b) Offends decency; or

(c) Is offensive to the senses; or

(d) Unlawfully interferes with, obstructs or tends to obstruct or renders dangerous for passage any public or private street, highway, sidewalk, stream, ditch or drainage; or (e) In any way renders other persons insecure in life or the use of property; or

(f) Essentially interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of the life and property, or tends to depreciate the value of the property of others.

Section 2. Illustrative enumeration.

The maintaining, using, placing, depositing, leaving or permitting to be or remain on any public or private property of any of the following items, conditions or actions are hereby declared to be and constitute a nuisance; provided, however, this enumeration shall not be deemed or construed to be conclusive, limiting or restrictive:

(a) Noxious weeds and other rank vegetation.

(b) Accumulation of rubbish, trash, refuse, junk and other abandoned materials, metals, lumber or other things.

(c) Any condition which provides

Whenever it becomes necessary to burn trash, brush, grass, leaves, paper, trees, boards, planks, lumber, or any other character of debris or inflammable material whatsoever out of doors in the city limits of Cross Plains, Texas for any purpose whatsoever, except in an incinerator or container as provided in Section 1, and except as provided in Section 3, said person shall first be required to obtain a permit in writing for such fire from the City Fire Chief or City Fire Marshal. Said permit shall be issued only if in the opinion of the City Fire Chief or City Fire Marshal, the time and place of said fire is not dangerous to adjoining or nearby property. Said fire shall be supervised by the person obtaining the permit, and he shall not leave it unguarded at any time while it is burning. No open fire shall be permitted until one hour after sunrise nor later than one hour before sunset.

The permit shall contain the following:

- A. Type material to be burned
- **B.** Location
- C. Date
- D. Time to be burned E. Material to be stacked in small

piles in the center of the area

F. The Permittee to assume all liability and responsibility **SECTION 3.** 

Whenever it shall become necessary for any person to have a fire out of doors for cooking, washing, or any other purely domestic purposes, such person is hereby required to build such fire in a fire proof container of some kind, made of brick, stone, metal, or other fire proof material in such manner as to prevent said fire from escaping.

An Ordinance declaring any application for water service, sewer service or garbage service shall be deemed as an application for all such services: no application shall be accepted except for all such services; allowing an exception for partial services; providing that a request to terminate any of such services and all shall be terminated; providing an exception to partial termination of such services.

Be it ordained by the City of Cross Plains, Texas:

Every application made to the City of Cross Plains for water service, sewer service or garbage service shall be deemed as an application for all such services, and no application shall be accepted nor any service or services furnished unless such application is for all such services. The City of Cross Plains shall grant and furnish all such services if it is practical and feasible to do so. If at the time the application is made, there do not exist facilities of the City of Cross Plains extended so as to connect or furnish such services to the premises for which the application is made, or in the case of garbage services, there is no prescribed route to such premises, the applicant may make a request to the City Council for any one or more of such services not being furnished him. The City Council shall hear and consider same and if the Council shall deem the request to be practical, feasible and in the best interest of the citizens of the City of Cross Plains the Council shall grant or modify such request. If the City Council shall deem the request to be impractical, not feasible or in the best interest of the citizens of Cross Plains, then the Council shall decline to grant such request. П.


Notice by any customer who is utilizing one or more of said services to the City to disconnect or terminate any of said services shall be deemed as a request to disconnect and terminate all of such services? All of such services shall be disconnected and terminated upon receipt of such notice. If any customer should desire to disconnect or terminate one or more of said services and to continue to receive one or more of said services, he shall make a request for same to the City Council. harborage for rats, mice, snakes and other vermin.

(d) Any building or other structure which is in such a dilapidated condition that is unfit for human habitation, or kept in such an unsanitary condition that is a menace to the health of people residing in the vacinity thereof, or presents a more than ordinarily dangerous fire hazard in the vicinity where it is located.

(e) All unnecessary or unauthorized noises and annoying vibrations, including animal noises.

(f) All disagreeable or obnoxious odors and stenches, as well as the conditions, substances or other causes which give rise to the emission or generation of such odors and stenches.

(g) The carcasses of animals or fowl not disposed of within a reasonable time after death.

(h) The pollution of any public well or cistern, stream, lake, canal or body of water by sewage, dead animals, creamery, industrial wastes or other substances.

(i) Any building, structure or other place or location where any activity which is in violation of local, state or federal law is conducted, performed or maintained.

(j) Any accumulation of stagnant water permitted or maintained on any lot or piece of ground.

#### **SECTION 4**.

The burning of garbage in any form, petroleum products, or or automobiles, or other motor vehicles or any part hereof for wrecking or salvage purposes in or on any lot or other premises within the city limits of the City of Cross Plains, Texas is hereby prohibited.

#### **SECTION 5.**

It shall be unlawful for any person to light or have lighted any fire in any street, alley, thoroughfare, or public property.

#### **SECTION 6.**

This ordinance shall not relieve a person, firm, or corporation from pay-

#### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

(k) Dense smoke, noxious fumes, gas, soot or cinders, in unreasonable quantities.

#### Section 3. Prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person to cause, permit, maintain or allow the creation or maintenance of a nuisance.

#### Section 4. Notice to abate.

Whenever a nuisance is found to exist within the city or within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, the health officer or some other duly designated officer of the city shall give ten (10) days written notice to the owner or occupant of the property upon which such nuisance exists or upon the person causing or maintaining other nuisance.

#### Section 5. Contents of notice.

The notice to abate a nuisance issued under the provisions of this chapter shall contain:

(a) An order to abate the nuisance within a stated time, which shall be reasonable under the circumstances; or to request a hearing within ten (10) days after service of notice to abate the nuisance. Request for a hearing shall be in writing and shall be addressed to the municipal judge in which court the procedure to abate the nuisance is pending.

(b) The location of the nuisance, if the same is stationary.

(c) A description of what constitutes the nuisance.

(d) A statement of acts necessary to

or by the person causing or maintaining the nuisance. The hearing shall be held before the judge of the municipal court. The judge of the municipal court shall determine at the hearing whether or not a nuisance exists. If a nuisance is found to exist, the judge shall order the abatement of the nuisance. Any ruling or order by the judge of the municipal court at this hearing shall become final unless appealed within ten (10) days to a district court of the State of Texas.

#### Section 6. Service of notice.

The notice to abate a nuisance shall be mailed, by certified mail with a five (5) day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the property upon which such nuisance exists or to the person causing or maintaining the nuisance.

If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, offical action to abate such nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return.

#### Section 7. Abatement by city.

Upon failure of the person upon whom notice to abate a nuisance was served pursuant to the provisions of this chapter to abate the same, or to request a hearing before the judge of the municipal court, the health officer or other duly designated officer of the city shall proceed to abate such nuisance and shall prepare a statement of cost incurred in the abatement thereof.

#### Section 8. City's costs declared liens. Any and all costs incurred by the ci-

Annual notice may be given to property owners, as above provided, prior to the grass-growing season.

Upon the giving of said annual notice, no further notice shall be required pursuant to this article.

#### Section 11. Notice.

The notice of violation shall contain the following:

(a) You are required to maintain your property so as to keep grass, brush and weeds at a height of less than twelve (12) inches;

(b) In the event you fail to do so, the city will enter upon your property and mow or have it mowed at thirty (30) day intervals during such annual growing season;

(c) You have ten (10) days from the date of this notice to correct the violation; and,

(d) Tall weeds are a breeding ground for rats and mice; and are a source of fuel for many fires.

#### Section 12. Action by city.

In addition to court action, the city may enter upon the property found in violation of this article and mow or have said property mowed at thirty day intervals during such annual growing season in the event such owner fails to mow same.

#### Section 13. Assessment of city's expenses; billing.

Expenses incident to the action taken by the city to correct any conditions coming under the provision of this article, which included a service charge of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to cover administrative cost shall be assessed against the owners of all outstanding interest in the lot or parcel of land involved. An itemized bill of such cost shall be mailed by the city secretary to each such owner if his address is known.



ty in the abatement of a nuisance under the provisions of this chapter shall constitute a lien against the property upon which such nuisance existed, which lien shall be filed, proven and collected as provided for by law. Such lien shall be notice to all persons from the time of its recording, and shall bear interest at the legal rate thereafter until satisfied.

#### **ARTICLES II. WEEDS, ETC.**

Section 9. Maximum growth.

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association of persons, owner, agent, occupant or anyone having supervision or control of any lot, tract, parcel of land or portion thereof, occupied or unoccupied, improved or unimproved, within the corporate limits of the city to suffer or permit grass, weeds or brush that is uncultivated to grow to a greater height than twelve (12) inches on any lot, tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the city, five (5) acres in size or less.

(b) On tracts of land more than five (5) acres, it shall be unlawful to suffer or permit grass, weeds and brush to excess of twelve (12) inches in height to grow uncultivated within one hundred (100) feet adjacent to and along and dedicated public street within the corporate limits of the city or within one hundred (100) feet on either side of any lot that is occupied by a residence or business.

#### Section 10. Notice to property owners; annual notice.

When any violation of this article is found to exist, a notice by letter shall be addressed to the owner of the property in question, or if the address of the property owner is unknown, then notice may be given by publication one time in a local newspaper of general circulation.

#### Section 14. City's expenses declared a lien; recovery.

If the bill for the city's expenses in correcting any condition coming under the provisions of this article, including the administrative and penalty charges, shall remain unpaid for a period of thirty (30) days after the date of the mailing of such bill, the city secretary shall file a statement of such bill and the reasons therefor with the county clerk. From the date of such filing, the city shall have a lien on the lot or parcel upon which such expenses are incurred only to tax liens and liens for street improvements. The amount of such debt shall accumulate interest at the rate of ten (10) per cent per annum from the date on which payment was due. For any such debt and interest, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure had in the name of the city. In such suits the aforementioned statement, or certified copy thereof, shall be deemed prima facie evidence of the debt and interest thereon.

#### **ARTICLES III. FINES**

#### Section 15.

In addition to the above provisions, any person who fails to abate a nuisance after proper notice and hearing (if any) shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction therefor shall be fined in an amount not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each day that such nuisance remains abated, and each such day shall constitute a separate offense.





# Appraisal Dis. To Move Into Hospital Build.

Callahan County and the Callahan County Appraisal District have entered into a contract whereas the appraisal district will occupy the west wing of the old Callahan County Hospital building. The contract was signed after Callahan County Commissioners approved the contract at the July 24 regular court meeting.

According to the contract, the appraisla district will renovate the west wing of the old hospital building at the expense of the appraisla district and at no cost to the county. The contract is for an 11-year period, with the appraisal district not to pay rent to the county during the 11-year period. The county appraisal district will be responsible for maintaing the west wing of the building, janitorial services and utilities. The county may renegotiate the contract after the 11-year period.

The renovation calls for five remodeled offices, plus computer and drafting facilities.

"This move and expense will not increase the tax appraisal district's budget any," said the district's Chief Appraiser Rodney Lewallen. Lewallen stated that the appraisal district offices in the Callahan County Courthouse building were presently bursting at the seams. "With the addition of more and more equipment and necessary paperwork and files that must be maintained, the district needed additional office space," Lewallen said.

## Powerful Anti-Drug Legislation Passed

AUSTIN — State Representative Dan Morales (D-San Antonio) applauded House Bill 65 as "the most powerful anti-drug legislation ever passed by the Texas Legislature," as it was signed into law August 2.

"House Bill 65, the Asset Forfeiture Bill, grants the state broad new authority to seize assets and property used in criminal activity, with the objective of forcing criminals to begin paying a significant portion of law enforcement costs. This new statute will give the state the power to directly take the profit out of criminal activity," Morales added.

The bill, which Morales authored, could provide up to \$200 million in funds to local law enforcement agencies in its first year alone.

"This new measure will make sure drug king-pins cannot hide behind 'legitimate' businesses," Morales said. "It basically says if you choose to make money selling drugs, you will pay with not only time in jail but with your car, your bank account, and your property."

circles a group of post trees. Yellow cannas were blooming in tall array with petunias in purple, red and stripes. Red and pink caladiums, elephant ears, red hot sally, and sweet peas in yellow and salmon mixes and light yellows topped it all off. Pampas grass border the front edge of the lawn.

Rose moss and petunias made a bright arrangement in the blue barrels out front. A large patch of morning glories flaunt their red, dark purple, and white early in the cool of the day.

The east side of the yard is highlighted by a goldfish pond made from the flat rock. A group of differently shaped rocks fused together form a very unique design inside the pool. Goldfish can be seen swimming leisurely around.

• The flower beds across the front of the house were lined with miniature shrub and gorgeous dahlias in orange yellow, tan, and deep purple blooms reflected a little different type of flower. I had not seen these or the sweet peas very often and they are so attractive.


