## Rancher Honored By Rodeo Group

Clyde rancher Ira Roy Akers was posthumously named a memorial honoree of the year by the Pro Rodeo Historical Society December 9 in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Akers was killed at the age of 40 when he and two other Clyde Volunteer firemen were battling a grass fire February 11, 1974, 12 miles north of Clyde. An oilfield equipment vehicle, carrying explosives, exploded when the firemen began to extinguish flames around the truck.

Akers was honored by the rodeo historical group during its annual convention. Akers was one of 14 cowboys honored by the group. The Pro Rodeo Historical Society is headquartered in Fort Worth.

The twenty-one family members and friends who travelled to the Sarah Hotel in Las Vegas, where he was honored, included his wife, Gayle Akers of Clyde.

Born June 13, 1933 in San Antonio, Ira Akers lived in San Antonio until 1951 when he graduated from Harlandale High School. He attended Sul Ross College for two years and graduated from Sam Houston College in 1956. He was the world champion intercollegiate cowboy for two years, in 1955 and 1956, and competed in rodeos until 1960. In 1958, Akers was the bull riding champion at a Madison Square Garden rodeo in New York City. He married Gayle Dyer August 25, 1954 in Baird. The couple had met at Sul Ross College in Alpine where both were attending school.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Clyde, First Baptist Church of Clyde, and a past president of Callahan County Co-op Directors.

He was also a past president of the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse and past president of the Clyde Community Park Board. He was a 32nd Degree Mason and member of the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department.

The couple has four children, Ira Roy (Iky) Akers Jr., Archie, Barbara, and Brenda. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Akers, still reside in San Antonio.

Both sons competed in rodeos. Iky was an AJRA rodeo champion two years.

While in Las Vegas, Akers' wife, Gayle, was given a plaque in recognition of the award.

## Cable Service Rate Increases

Brownwood Television Cable Service will increase certain rates effective January 1, 1989.

Basic cable rates will increase one dollar (\$1) per month in Rising Star and Cross Plains. HBO rate will increase fifty cents (\$0.50) per month. Senior citizens will continue to receive a \$2.70 discount on basic cable service.

The rate increase is necessary to offset the increased cost of programming. "Most of the companies who supply us with satellite services have increased the fees they charge us," stated Bob Nevill, manager of the cable company. "We have absorbed some of these increases but some of the increased cost is reflected in the new rates."

## Commissioners Court Meets

The purchase of a \$1,700 copy machine highlighted the agenda with the Callahan County Commissioners Court meeting Monday, December 12, in Baird.

County Commissioners unanimously voted to purchase a copy machine for the Justice of the Peace in Cross Plains, after Cross Plains JP Rolan Jones met with commissioners.

Other items brought before the commissioners court meeting include:

—Commissioners voted to allow Callahan County employees to take Monday, January 2, as a holiday, since the New Year's Day holiday was on Sunday.

—Commissioners approved a motion authorizing three county officials be able to sign county checks. Those officials whose signatures were approved are: Dora Hounshell, county treasurer; Darlene Walker, county clerk; and Mack Kniffen, county judge. Only two signatures from any of the three officials will be required on all county checks written.

—Commissioners voted to authorize the county treasurer to transfer funds from the county's General Fund into the county's Indigent Health Fund. The transfer of money was made to bring the county's Indigent Fund up to state standards.

—Held a discussion with Jon Herod, C.P.A., concerning recommendations for the best financial procedures for the new computer in the county treasurer's office. Herod is the county's auditor. No action was taken.

## Savings Bonds Sales In Texas Exceed \$305 Million In 1988

Sales of United States Savings Bonds in Texas amounted to \$21,871,073 during September 1988 for a total of \$305,278,022 for fiscal year 1988. This October 1987-September 1988 figure represents 87.2 percent of the assigned goal of \$350 million, T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Texas, announced today.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$108,297 during the October 1987-September 1988 period in Callahan County, James Eubank, Volunteer County Chairman, said.

Nationally, total sales for fiscal 1988 amounted to \$7,264 million. The amount outstanding in U.S. Savings Bonds as of September 30, 1988 reached \$107.78 billion, a gain of 9

percent over fiscal 1987.

All Series EE Bonds purchased on or after November 1, 1982 — and held at least five years — will earn 85 percent of the average market yield on Treasury marketable securities. The average yield for Bonds held since the beginning of the market-based interest rate on November 1, 1982 is 8.50 percent; the six-month rate for the period November 1, 1988 - April 30, 1989 is 7.35 percent. Outstanding Series E/EE Bonds and Savings Notes held for at least five years after November 1, 1982 are also earning this market-based rate. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

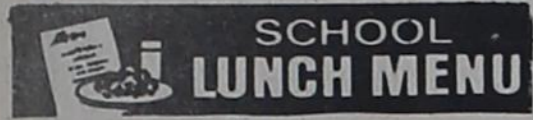




## C. P. Student Review

### Free Washington Trips For Local Winners

An all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C. next June will be awarded to two young people from Taylor Electric's service area by Taylor Electric Cooperative, Inc., according to Don Hart, manager of the Cooperative.

Hart said winners of an oratorical contest would be awarded the trip which begins June 27, 1989. All youth 14 to 19 years of age in the Cooperative's service area are eligible to enter the contest.

Contest entrants will be required to interview someone who remembers what it was like without electricity, and give a 5-8 minute speech on the theme "When the Lights Came On."

The contest will be judged on the basis of knowledge of the subject, speaking ability, poise, personality, and appearance.

Deadline for submitting entry forms will be March 23, 1989.

This is the 24th year that Taylor Electric Cooperative has sponsored a Youth Tour to Washington contest. Winners last year were Cassie Townsend of Merkel and Stacey Hawes of Baird.

As participants in the Youth Tour, local contest winners will travel by bus to Washington where they will spend twelve days visiting places of historical interest and visiting members of Congress.

A highlight of the Washington trip is the Rural Electric Youth Day, during which a special program coordinated by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association will feature speeches by high government and rural electric officials, participation in an "Energy Battle" competition comparable to the 1960s television series "College Bowl."

Approximately 1,100 Youth Tour participants from thirty-seven states will meet in Washington, D.C. for the 26th National Rural Electric Youth Tour.

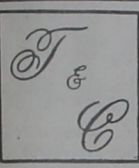
