Last week I attended a meeting of the Texas State Legislative Committee of the AARP in Austin where I was interviewed as a prospective member.

I really don't know what I expected members of the committee to be like, but what I found was a surprise.

Their hair had a bit more silver in it than mine (although I'm catching them fast) and I was possibly a little younger in years than most of them.

But when it comes to sharpness of mind, they left me at the starting gate. And their enthusiasm made me tired just listening to them.

What this group does is monitor the state's lawmaking process, getting out information to the AARP membership about legislation and the position of legislators on various issues.

You'd think the committee would concentrate only on issues concerning older citizens, but not so. I would label it as more of a watchdog group for the general consumer. For instance, this year the committee zeroed in on rural health care and health care cost containment, issues of concern to more than just the elderly.

At the meeting last week, much of the discussion concerned telephone rates.

At the meeting, members gave reports which showed they haven't been sitting around the past year. They found legislators to sponsor bills, they monitor the progress of legislation, they researched issues, they attended legislative hearings and even gave testimony before legislative committees. To call them energetic would be an understatement.

I was very impressed by the chairman of the committee, a little guy from Lake Kiowa named Ken Huff.

Brother, I would hate to have to keep up with that guy on one of his normal days. According to various remarks he made during the two-day meeting, his duties have taken him to California, Denver and Washington, D.C., in just the past few weeks.

After observing these folks for two days, I think they ought to take out the word "retired" from the name of the American Association of Retired Persons, and replace it with the word "untired".

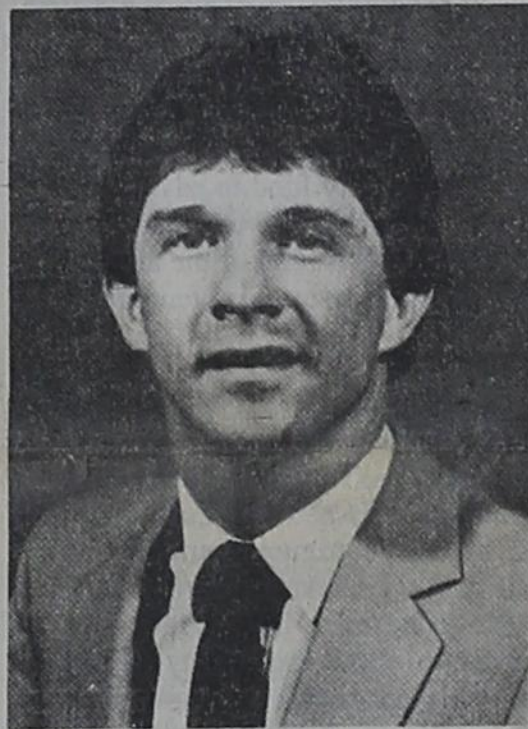
President Russell H. Dilday will award degrees to 162 students in Southwestern's school of theology, religious education and church music.

Green Thumb, Inc. Seeks More Workers In The Cross Plains Area

Green Thumb, Inc., which began in 1965, is one of eight national organizations who operates a Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) pursuant to a grant with the U.S. Department of Labor. Since its beginning as a pilot project under the Economic Opportunity Act, Green Thumb has been sponsored by the National Farmers Union, a national farm organization dedicated to preserving the family farm.

Green Thumb has grown tremendously in the past twenty-four years. It serves approximately 18,000 enrollees and 10,000 Host Agencies in over 1,900 counties throughout 43 states and Puerto Rico. Its mission is (1) to improve the social and economic conditions of older Americans by promoting employment and training opportunities for older workers, and (2) to provide essential community services, thereby promoting community development, particularly rural areas.

To be an eligible enrollee in the Green Thumb program you must be 55 years of age or older. Priority is given to applicants over age 60. An enrollee will be offered 22 hours or more of community service employment in a non-profit organization each week, unless budgetary considerations require otherwise.

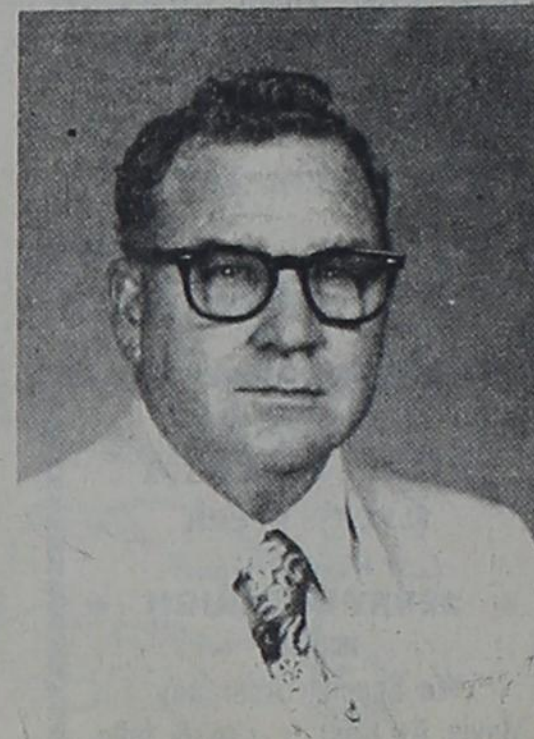
Hanke Retires After 31 Years In Postal Service

Commissioners Met On November 14

Callahan County Commissioners voted Tuesday, November 14, to allow the Callahan County Nutrition Project to move its offices from the basement of the county courthouse building to the third floor of the courthouse to increase its office space.

The move was made after the Texas Department of Health and Human Services moved its offices from the third floor of the county courthouse to the Callahan County Annex (old county hospital building).

Other items addressed by commissioners were:

—Voted to cast 100 of the county's allocated votes for Wauneta Estes to the Callahan County Appraisal District Board of Directors. The county cast its remaining 37.70 voted to City of Clyde nominee Eddie Craig.

—Voted to amend the county commissioners Precinct 3 (Baird) budget, moving \$812 out of the miscellaneous fund into the utility fund to pay for the precinct's water bill and to move \$200 from the education fund of the tax collectors budget over for temporary help.

—Voted to allow the county treasurer to issue checks without the approval of the commissioners if needed and approved by the county judge, and an order issued by the county clerk, with the commissioners reviewing all paid outs when next reviewing the bills to be paid. The motion was approved to allow the county to pay certain bills before the commissioner's court would hold its next meeting.

Some Adults Need Payees

While most adults who draw Social Security are able to manage their own benefits, some beneficiaries are paid through another person who acts as a representative payee, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said today.

A representative payee is someone appointed by Social Security to receive and use payments for the well-being of a beneficiary who is unable to manage benefits because of mental or physical impairments.

Once it has been determined that an adult needs a payee, the Agency tries to find the most qualified person for the task. The preferred payee is a relative who lives with the beneficiary. If none can be found, a friend who shows strong concern for the beneficiary, an organization, institution, or other qualified person may be appointed.

Social Security exercises the utmost concern in choosing the best payee, Hammons said. Beneficiaries who need a payee are further protected because Social Security requires payees to file yearly reports showing how benefits were used.





Students who did not pass one or both parts of the test will retake the part or parts they failed in May of 1990. All students statewide must pass this test in order to receive a high school diploma.

Mrs. Conner has an endorsement through the Region XIV Service Center in Abilene for computer literacy and is currently enrolled at Howard Payne University.

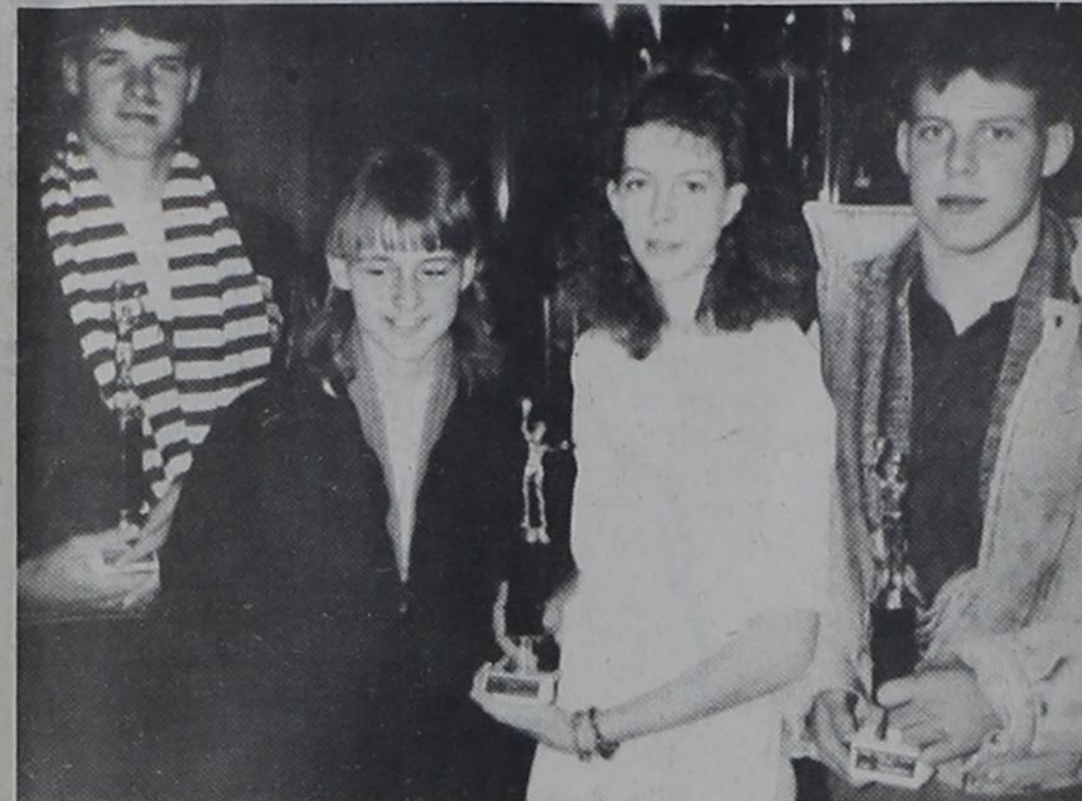
