TEC Ranked No. 1: 'We Try Harder,' Naber Says
It was recently announced that the
Texas Employment Commission ranked $\# 1$ in the nation in the number of individuals placed in jobs by state Employment Security Agencies, acLabor. TEC placed 284,000 individuals in jobs for the year ending June 30, 1989, according to the Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers. "This
significantly exceeded the significantly exceeded the number of
individuals placed by such states as individuals placed by such states as
California and New York," said. "We are very pleased to get this
report."
Nabers went on to stress that the agency managed to place a significant
number of job-seekers under very difnumber of job-seekers under very difreceived only seven percent of the funds distributed among the states, but made nine percent of all job

Bill Penix received a plaque today honoring him for saving C.W. Hines $t$ his ranch near Quimman. The 2nd annual Texas/Southwestern Safety Conference and Exposition at Thawnown Hyatt Regency Hotel. anch on February 11, 1989. Penix was visiting his stepfather at the time ot the accident.

Hines attempted to push down on

Hines then got down from his tracweight at the top of the augur to push into the soil. Some of Hines' clothing was caught by the augur, and he was pulled into the rotating bit.

LOCATE EMPLOYEES
Dear Commissioner Nabers. We are a construction company on a are U.S. residents and live in Mexico. When we are ready to recall after a layoff, these employees are hard to locate either by mail or whoever we can and then the claims for unemployment insurance begin arriving. Is there any relief for us in
this situation?

Dear R.B., There is really no foolproof solution to this problem, but inave a couple of suggestions which might help. First of all, if it is ever possible to give employees a the layoff, do so. It then becomes the employee's responsibility to return to work at the designated time or face possible disqualifica tion from receiving unemployment benefits. This is particularly useful for short term layoffs. Althe tive youre, require that employees give you a permanent where they can be reached. They have to provide this information the TEC in order to be available for work referrals. There is no reason why they cannot provide the same to you.
Keep copies of all written job offers/recall notices and send originals certified mail, return receipt requested. This documentation is very useful in establishing work refusals on the claimant's part.
Despite an employer's best attempis, here may be times after a layofr when an employee either from the area. In such a situation, the employer is still liable for unemployment benefits. Frustra ing, but true.
