'A Glance Into The Past'

A box containing photographs once belonging to my great-grandmother, Rosa Paralee (Pierce) Irvin, and Loma (Irvin) Atwood made for an interesting afternoon. A cousin, Gaylia Underwood, an aunt, Joe Watson, my mother, Wanda Anderson, my children, and I sat at the kitchen table rummaging through the old family photos.

Everyone had a great time recalling forgotten experiences which were suddenly inspired by the pictures. Trying to decide the identity of relatives was also a challenge.

If my cousin, Staci Watson, had not written many names on the backs of the photos while working on a research paper in high school, we would have not known very many. Granny Loma had identified those she knew for her project. We sometimes take for granted that someone will always be there to keep the family history correct. Thank goodness, so many people have taken an interest in finding and recording their family heritage.

If you have the time, I think everyone should label family photos with names, dates, etc., for the time will come when your photo may lay in the box with no one to recall. It was apparent that in a short time families expanded, joining other families and we were unaware of their connection.

The quality of the photos, some 50 up to 100 years old was amazing. The cardboard frames around most preserved them and the details still visible in the pictures were great.

We were impressed by the elegant clothing worn. The ladies had on the long skirts, sometimes ruffled, fancy collars, broaches, and many times hats. Little girls wore low waisted dresses with black stockings and high-top shoes. Their hair was usually done in ringlets with bows to decorate. Little boys had on three piece suits with white fancy collars and ties. The men sported three-piece suits with white shirts and bow ties. Most had mustaches or beards and all looked well-kept.

They really appeared better dressed than the casual wear of today's world. You just wonder what will they say about our generation.

An actual photo of a confederate soldier was also uncovered. A handsome young man in full uniform, with pistol in hand, was among the most interesting. No name was discovered, so we have our own "unknown soldier." How sad. He looked like someone special, too.

The original telegram from the late Travis Irvin was among the treasures. It stated that he was back in the states and would be home soon. A V-line, another form of communication during the World War II era, was found. It was addressed to my grandmother from her brother, the late W.B. Irvin. At the top it says, "Some where in Italy." He inquired about his brother, Travis, and also about my dad, Darwin Anderson, who was stationed in the Philippines.

A little more recent photo showed a mural on a wall, and Joe and Mother decided it represented a Halloween Carnival at Cross Plains High School.

A variety of emotions were experienced while looking at the photos. We laughed and then at times it was sad remembering the war and the loved ones deceased.

All entries must be paid by 7 p.m., except poles and goats on Saturday by 5:30 p.m. Trophy buckles will be awarded in each age group for boys and girls based on the six point system.

"Bandera" will perform nightly in the shady oak grove at the arena, starting at 9 p.m. Admission is \$4 per person, under 12 admitted free.

Contel Provides Free Emergency Calling

DALLAS — Beginning July 1, 1990, emergency calls placed to police, fire department and ambulance emergency services are now toll-free, Contel recently announced.

While this announcement may come as a surprise to many, to rural telephone customers it comes only as a relief. In Texas, as in most other states, many rural telephone customers receive their telephone service in areas where telephone calls to emergency services are long distance calls. The new 9-1-1 emergency communications system will correct this situation for most Texans, but the completion of the 9-1-1 system is still several years away from some areas.

In the meantime, Contel wants to assure that its customers are no longer faced with this issue. Contel customers can make emergency phone calls now without long distance charges. Jim Feaster, Contel customer services director, said, "Contel's customers will still dial the emergency number as it is listed in the telephone book. Even though the number will be dialed like a long distance number, no charges will be applied to the customer's bill." Feaster also stated, "Contel customers should contact their Contel Service Office to have the charge adjusted from the bill should they ever receive a charge for calling one of the emergency numbers." The toll-free emergency calling will remain in effect until 9-1-1 emergency communications service is available.

Contel of Texas' President, Dennis Myers, explained how pleased he is to be able to provide this service to Contel's rural customers. Myers said, "This is just one way that Contel can provide its customers with quality service."

Myers further said, "With 9-1-1 only a short time away, this may not have happened had it not been for the encouragement of Public Utility Commissioner Jo Campbell. It's a known fact," Myers added, "that Commissioner Campbell is a strong supporter of advanced telecommunications services in rural Texas. In discussions with her earlier this year about our plans for new services in our rural

areas, Commissioner Campbell encouraged us to try to do something to relieve the rural customers from paying long distance charges for emergency phone calls. We promised her we would look into it, and if it could be done, we would do it."

Local emergency phone numbers are listed in the front pages of Contel's telephone directory.

Your Tax Dollars At Work

We often hear about "federal government dollars," but where do they come from and where do they go?

According to the budget prepared by the Office of Management and Budget for the current 1990 fiscal year, each dollar is comprised of individual income taxes (41 cents), social insurance receipts (34 cents), corporation income taxes (10 cents), borrowing (8 cents), other sources (4 cents) and excise taxes (3 cents).

As to how it is spent, 43 cents of every dollar goes to direct benefit payments for individuals, 26 cents goes to national defense, 15 cents pays net interest on the deficit, 11 cents funds grants to states and localities, and 5 cents is spent on other federal operations. lil

HALF OF ELDERLY POOR FALL THROUGH SAFETY NET

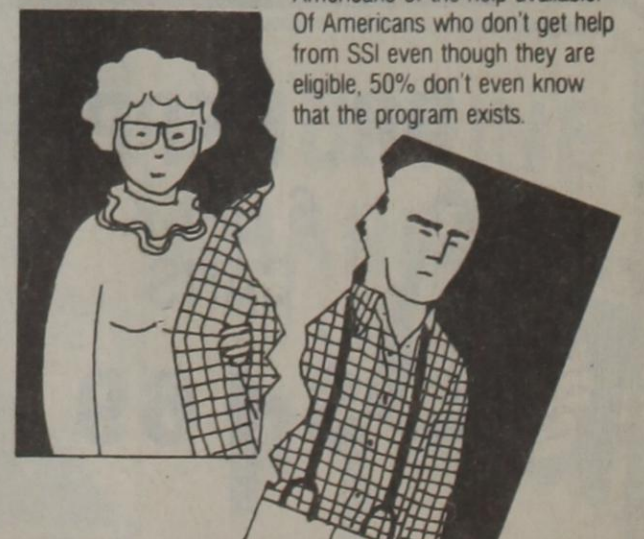
There is supposed to be a government safety net to protect the poorest of America's elderly, blind and disabled from the depths of poverty. The safety net is called Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and it was designed to provide minimal income security. Not all poor seniors are poor enough to qualify for this help. But even among those seniors who are poor enough to be eligible, only half (52%) ever get any aid under the program!

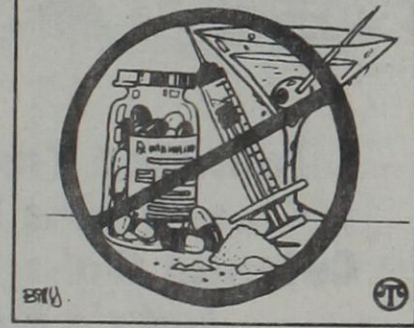

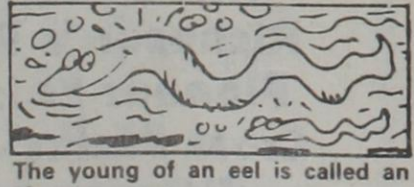

Cross Plains 1990 Tax Values Up \$2 Million

Lewallen said that 1990 tax values in Callahan County are down slightly. Callahan County's 1990 tax value is listed at \$267,842,035. The county's 1989 tax value was \$268,560,626. Lewallen said the county's tax value losses can be blamed on a sizeable drop in real estate values. He added that an increase in mineral values in the county could not offset the drop in real estate values.

Lewallen reported that the Cross Plains School District will see a \$2 million increase in 1990 tax values; an increase that can be attributed to an increase in mineral values in the school district.

1990 tax values within the Clyde School District have increased one percent over last year, according to Callahan County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser Rodney Lewallen.

Lewallen said Friday, July 20, that the 1990 tax value for the Clyde School District is \$122,290,870, an eight-tenths of one percent increase over 1989 tax values of \$121,297,286.

The chief appraiser said that the increase in taxable value can be attributed to an increase of \$1.5 million in mineral values. Lewallen stated that a \$500,000 decrease in real estate values were reported in the school

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County Selects Insurance Proposal

Despite a 29 percent increase in the insurance premiums, Callahan County Commissioners voted to stay with its present health insurance carrier during the regular monthly commissioner's court meeting Monday, July 23.

Commissioners Lowell Johnson, Joe Ingram, and Tommy Holland voted to keep the county health insurance coverage supplied by Aetna. Commissioner Roy LaFoy voted against the proposal.

Commissioner LaFoy dropped by the *Clyde Journal* office Tuesday and stated that he was against purchasing the insurance coverage for the county employees because Aetna has increased premium rates twice within the past two years. LaFoy said that the county received several other insurance proposals that were lower than the proposal from Aetna, but the other three commissioners decided to keep the Aetna coverage.

Callahan County employees have been covered by Aetna insurance since 1986. All county employees have their health insurance paid for by the county, but dependents can receive insurance coverage by paying for the insurance themselves.

The Aetna policy raised the premium price 29 percent from \$163.75 per month per employee to \$205 per month for each employee. A dependent would pay \$225.80 per month and a family health coverage would cost \$351.10.

The Aetna proposal pays 80 percent of the hospital charges for up to \$5,000. Over \$5,000, the policy covers 100 percent of the hospital expenses. There is a \$200 deductible on the coverage. The coverage also includes a \$10,000 life insurance policy and \$10,000 accidental death policy.

The health insurance coverage for Callahan County has increased dramatically over the past couple of years because one county employee has cancer.

Callahan County Clerk Darlene Walker said that Aetna was the only insurance carrier that had a cheaper group health plan. She said that there were many other insurance carriers that would not even bid the insurance because of the county employee with cancer. She said that Aetna officials

told Callahan County officials that Aetna has lost money on insuring the county employees over the past two years.

Walker said there were several proposals from other insurance carriers on providing individual policy coverage for specific county employees, but that as many as three or four employees could not get coverage under the individual policy. Insurance officials told the county officials that the county would still be liable for health coverage of those county employees that could not get coverage under the individual policy proposal.

Other items brought before commissioner's court meeting include:
