'Wild Cow Catcher'

Everyone has heard the story about the black and white spotted Longhorn bull who escaped at the Abilene Auction last Thursday, but here are some interesting details about one of the cowboys.

Billy Golson was one of the men who roped the 1,400 pounds of mean bull. He is a cattle buyer for J.M. Cattle Company of Abilene, and happened to be at the auction when the mishap occurred. Having his horse with him, he was requested to assist in the pursuit.

Catching wild cows is not a new adventure for 26-year-old Golson, as he has been in this line of business for the past three or four years. He is called on to roundup cattle for various individuals who cannot corral their animals by conventional means. He also catches cattle for the Abilene Auction when they escape.

He uses cow dogs to assist in the capture of wild cattle. He recently lost two trained Catahoula during a chase when the animals were ran over on the highway. He is now training two young dogs.

His dad, Bobby Golson of Cross Plains, explained that this was definitely a young man's game, as he stated that all caution is thrown to the wind when he went for the wild cattle.

Pete Golson stated that his grandson could tell some great stories about cow catching and that he enjoyed the challenge it provided.

I am sure some of you have had some experiences of your own attempting to gather cattle. There is always at least one animal who refuses to be penned. They can clear a fence like a deer and crash panels in a blink of an eye.

Bob pointed out the kind of equipment necessary for this unusual occupation and it was rather impressive. He uses a dooley pickup, a gooseneck trailer, cow dogs, a trained horse, and a good saddle. All of these are expensive, and yet in the chase a dog could be killed or the horse crippled or hurt.

Billy had a bad feeling about the Longhorn from the first and his instincts didn't fail him. As soon as he had the bull in his noose, the animal hooked his paint horse in the lower neck and ripped it to the top. His horns slipped just in front of his leg, missing him by inches. Another cowboy's horse was ripped across the chest during the chase. It was reported by police that the bull even hooked at their vehicles.

Bulls of this caliber are usually labeled "bad to the bone" and this one had all the characteristics. His six hour escapade was the last of his freedom on the range. He really looked pitiful behind bars in the photo.

The celebrity bull favored "Spotted Fever," one of the most dangerous bulls in the Don Gay Mesquite Rodeo stock. This fellow might have made a good rodeo bull, but he probably would not let his rider ever walk away. Too late now, he made a lot of "Wild Bull Patties."

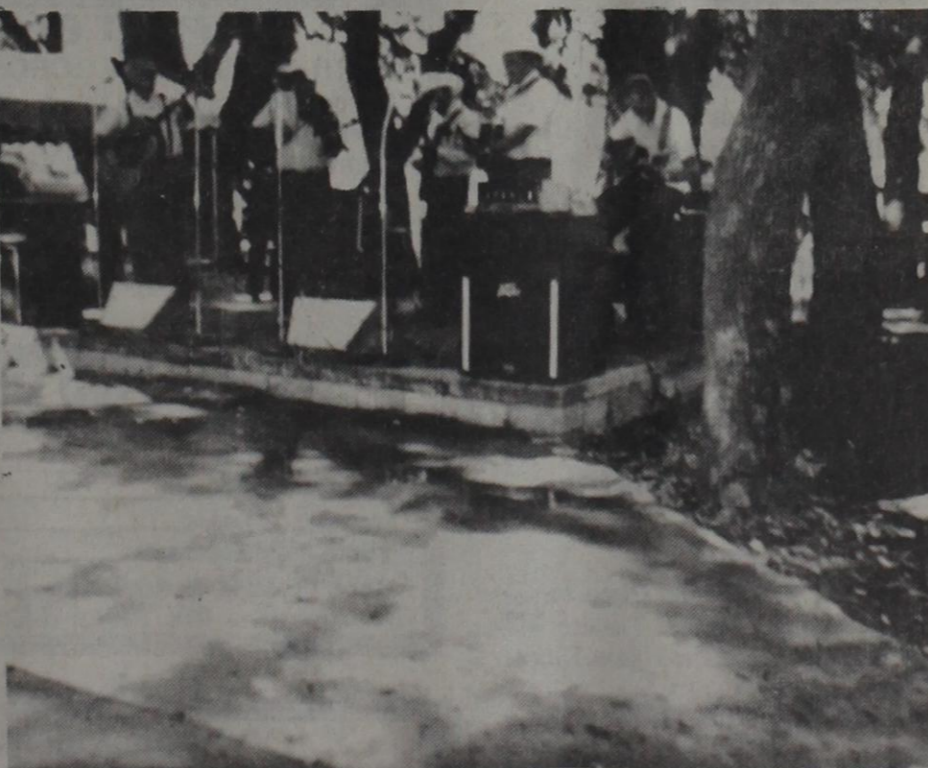
Thank goodness the reunion program was complete and the rain was a blessing to the farming and ranching community.

Volunteers Needed For Alzheimer's Research

HOUSTON — Volunteers are needed at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston for drug tests which may help with the devastating memory problems that accompany Alzheimer's disease.

"There is as yet no cure for Alzheimer's disease," said Dr. Rachelle Doody, an assistant professor of neurology at Baylor, "but we are hopeful that these drug trials now underway here and elsewhere around the country will provide us with new tools to alleviate some of the misery Alzheimer's patients and their families must endure."

The drugs are physostigmine and

SQ29852, which is similar to the blood-pressure medicine Captopril.

If these drugs help in stemming memory loss associated with Alzheimer's, it could be good news for victims of the disease, Doody said.

Volunteers must be 50 or older, in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease and free of any other major health problems. In addition, there are restrictions concerning other drugs patients may already be taking.

Local Families Travel To Utah

In keeping with the family tradition of vacationing together, ten Price troopers spent two July weeks traveling 3,200 miles in five states, mainly southern Utah. The adventurous ones were Wright and Verna Price of Early; Lucinda, Timothy, Amy, and Arron Price of Brownwood; Nora Odom, Rodney Rudloff, and Dora and Brandon Smith of Cross Plains. The group ranges in age from 18 months to 65 years, which made for necessary flexibility as well as lots of fun!

Accommodations and transportation included once again "Old Blue," the 1963 Chevy Van, "Little Scotty" camper, an additional tent pop-up camper, and my new Cougar for comfort and convenience.

First on our agenda was Palo Duro Canyon to see TEXAS, a musical portraying the state's and area's history. The spacious outdoor amphitheater, under an umbrella of stars, provided a perfect setting as the TEXAS cast paid special tribute to the production's 25th anniversary. Camping in the canyon, we tried to imagine what life was like there for our ancestors. Verna and her sisters and brother are the closest living relatives of Charlie Goodnight, a famous pioneer in that area, who established the Goodnight Trail.

Near enchanting Angel Fire, New Mexico, in a cabin high in the cool mountains, we kept the fireplace burning all night. At Angel Fire we watched a Hot Air Balloon Rally and toured the DAV Vietnam Veterans National Memorial, which was quite touching and impressive!

Two relaxing days were spent in splendid Pagosa Springs, Colorado, where we enjoyed the mountains and took advantage of nature as we bathed

in the Hot Springs Spas.

Southern Utah captured all our hearts as it left us breathless with such majesty and untouched beauty! While camping near Monticello in the Manti-LaSal National Forest, we made day trips into Arches and Canyonlands National Parks. The world's largest assemblage of natural sandstone arches, more than 700, is located near Moab in Arches National Park where combined erosive forces of wind and water have created a land also filled with fins, spires, pinnacles and balanced rocks. Canyonlands is a wild and forbidding expanse of southeast Utah dominated by the Green, San Juan, and Colorado rivers. Dramatic colorful rock formations, towering peninsulas, canyons, and potholes are left behind as thousands of years of erosion removed the weaker rock and sandstone.

Natural Bridges National Monument is an area where the plateau has eroded into fantastic bridge formations. We viewed three scenic treasures: the Sipapu; the Owachomo, the oldest at 10 million years; and the Kachina, the largest with a 186-foot-span, 107 feet thickness, and a towering height of 205 feet above the canyon.

In Capitol Reef National Park we camped under towering cliffs at Fruita, an old Mormon farming community. We freely picked from the apricot orchards, and admired the deer leisurely grazing in our back yard. Capitol Reef is a 100-mile flexure or upthrust of the earth's crust, all of monumental grandeur! It is named after Capitol Dome, a rock outcrop capped with white sandstone resembling the capitol building in Washington, D.C.

At this point in our journey, we could not imagine sights more spectacular than those thus far; however, Bryce Canyon had new thrills in store! The countless spires, temples, and towers in this water-eroded limestone landscape, producing colorful steeples and amazing designs, struck with incomprehensible vividness. An array of endless minarets, sheer walled fortresses and brilliantly colored pinnacles captivated us all.

Through tunnels and mountains, traveling still southwest along the Virgin River, Zion National Park was yet another phenomenon. An area of great natural temples and cathedrals, Zion's inspiration is reflected in the names given its peaks. Here, mountains are called temples, patriarchs, thrones, and cathedrals, the most famous being The Great White Throne.

Journeying through Arizona, we surveyed the Grand Canyon from a different perspective, the North Rim. We marveled at the vastness and splendor of this World's Wonder! At Walnut Canyon National Monument, we explored prehistoric cliff dwellings, tucked under limestone ledges, built by Sinagua Indians around A.D. 1150.

Meteor Crater, near Flagstaff, claimed the best preserved crater on earth, was formed 49,500 years ago by a huge meteor crashing to earth. An extensive training station for astronauts, the floor of the crater is 560 feet deep — equivalent to a 60-story building — and is more than 4,100 feet across; and the rim is more than 3 miles in circumference. We observed it from above and visited the museum illustrating the importance of meteoric phenomena.

The group explored Petrified Forest and Painted Desert in Arizona, then ventured to Pueblo of Acoma "Sky City." It is known as the oldest continuously inhabited city in the United States, with occupation dating back to A.D. 1150, and is built on a massive sandstone mesa 367 feet above the valley.

Mountainair, New Mexico, was our final attraction, where we walked among ruins of a once thriving Indian/Spanish community. A great roofless temple has been excavated, among tumbled mounds of stone which

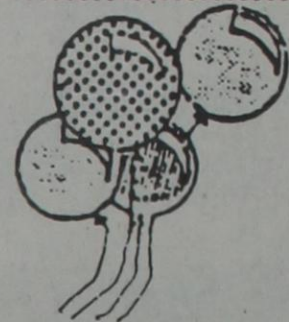
were once houses and kivas.

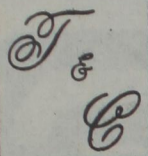
