Kindergarten Pre-Registration

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will enter Kindergarten next fall. All children who will be five on or before September 1, 1990, may attend Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Cross Plains School system and the service is available to all students. Please come by the Elementary Principals' office to register your child during the week of May 14-18 or call 725-6123 for additional information.

Kindergarten screening will be conducted during the month of August prior to the opening of school. The screening will take about sixty minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills, language ability, and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter school in Texas the student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization requirements include: three in a series of DTP and/or a booster after age 4, oral polio series, measles, mumps, and rubella. Please bring the birth certificate, immunization record, and social security number at the time of registering, asks Principal Ray Womack.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time as regular Kindergarten screening. The early childhood program is to help those children age 3-6 who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have, or know of a child who might benefit from this

service, please contact the elementary school office during Kindergarten registration.

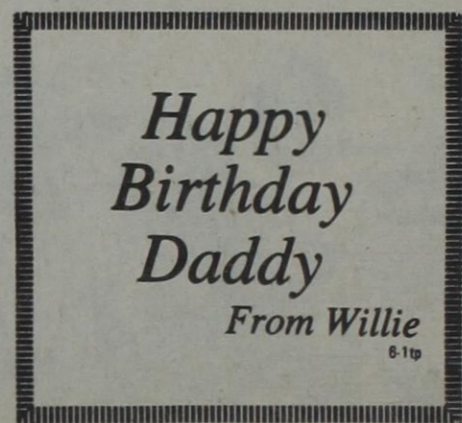

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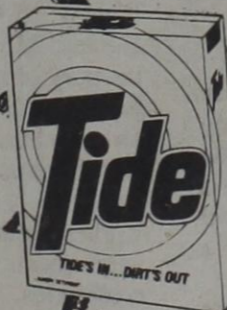

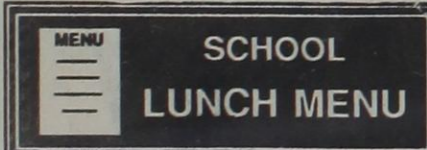
Where Did They Go?

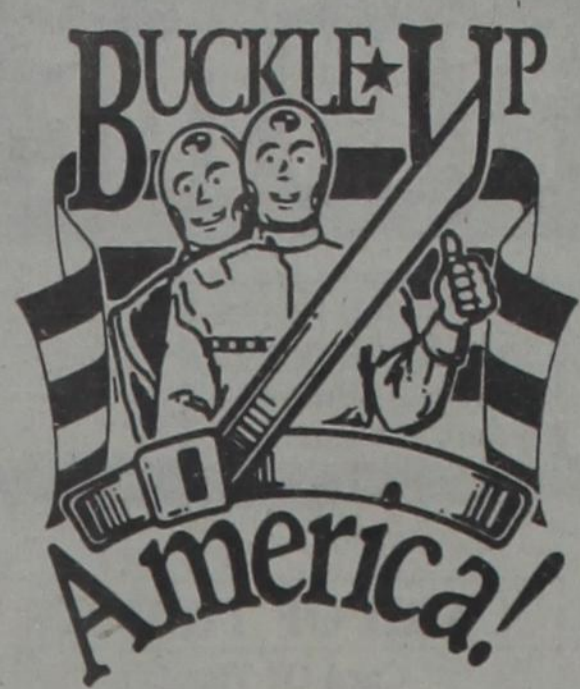

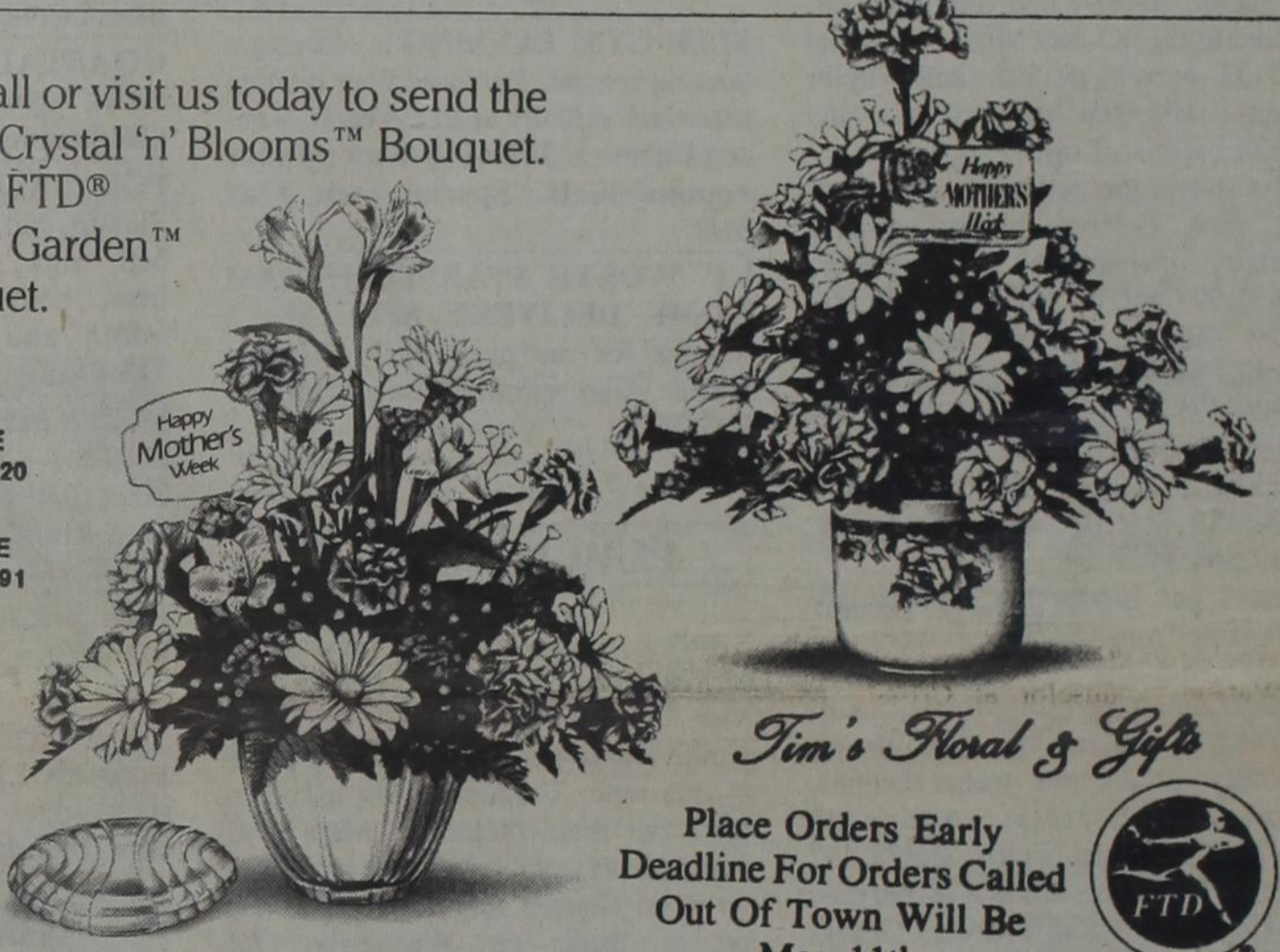

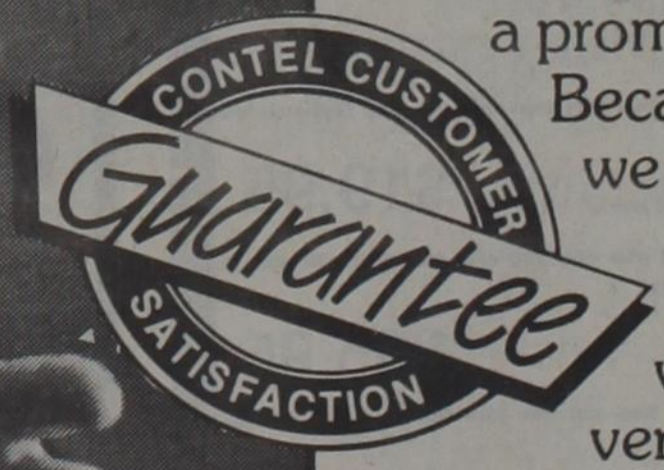

County Oil And Gas Totals Published

Oil and gas production figures for February 1990 in Callahan County have been released by the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Total gas production in Callahan County for the month of February was 334,739 MCF. One MCF is 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas.

Total crude oil production in Callahan County for the month of February 1990 was 76,219 barrels of oil. September 1989 oil production was 74,856 barrels of oil. October 1989 oil production was 74,581 barrels of oil. November oil production was 77,659 barrels, December 1989 oil production was 74,553, and January 1990 oil production was 84,735 barrels.

Big Country area counties oil and gas production for February 1990 include: Brown, 292,167 MCF of gas and 29,204 barrels of oil; Coleman, 492,257 MCF of gas and 55,183 barrels of oil; Eastland, 948,784 MCF of gas and 76,253 barrels of oil; Jones, 73,962 MCF of gas and 104,040 barrels of oil; Runnels, 277,309 MCF of gas and 93,984 barrels of oil; Shackelford, 485,689 MCF of gas and 122,132 barrels of oil; and Taylor County, 103,095 MCF of gas and 84,533 barrels of oil.

The state's top gas producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary February production were: Pecos, 27,120,997 MCF; Webb, 20,655,009 MCF; Zapata, 18,491,302 MCF; Panola, 14,840,599 MCF; Hidalgo, 13,909,375 MCF; Crane, 11,533,859 MCF; Ector, 8,778,278 MCF; Crockett, 8,766,601 MCF; Hemphill, 7,820,358 MCF; and McMullen, 7,559,544 MCF.

Texas gas production in February 1990 came from 184,535 oil wells and 46,231 gas wells.

The state's top oil producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary February production were: Gaines, 3,251,251 barrels; Andrews, 2,977,667 barrels; Ector, 2,888,432 barrels; Yoakum, 2,608,438 barrels; Hockley, 2,381,826 barrels; Gregg, 2,229,766 barrels; Pecos, 2,104,637 barrels; Scurry, 1,148,792 barrels; Crane, 1,426,767 barrels; and Kent, 868,274 barrels.

Preliminary Texas oil production figure for February 1990 was 48,905,012 barrels, down from 53,996,346 barrels in January. February 1989's preliminary Texas oil production was 50,260,163 barrels.

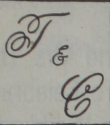
