AUSTIN - Texas recorded its highest primary runoff election turout since 1972 on Tuesday when more than 1.2 million people cast
ballots in the Democratic and ballots in the Democratic and
Republican party runoffs, Secretary o State George Bayoud said.
The runoff turnout is the highes ince 1972 when more than 2 million Texans went to the polls to nominate candidates for governor and ourer of-
fices. On Tuesday, Texas voters at the
statewide level nominated Democratic Party candidates for governor treasurer, the Texas Supreme Cour and Texas Court of Criminal Appeal
and Republican Party candidates fo and commissioner and agriculture ommissioner.
The runoff turnout represents 15.2 percent of the state's 8.3 million registered voters. In the March 13
primary, 28 percent of the state's registered voters cast ballots. The March 13 turnout was the highes primary election turnout ever in a nonpresidential election year and the second highest total for any primary Texas history
expectations," said Bayoud, the state's chief elections officer. "I am particularly pleased that we have reversed a historical trend in which

## Financial Help For Disabled Children

A common concern among parents with disabied chidren is whether there
will be enough money for them whroughout their money for them
the Social Security and supplemental security income (SSI) programs can do much to
lessen this concern. These two prolessen this concern. These two programs can assure some economic
security to disabled children of all ages.
Although there are differences between the programs, both pay monthly cash benefits to disabled people. And
someone who receives Social Security someone who receives Social Security
or SSI will usually be eligible for Medicare or Medicaid, that will help pay the costs of health care expenses. The Social Security program pays benefits to the children of retired or
disabled people receiving Social disabled people receiving Social
Security benefits. Benefits can also be paid to children of workers who died. Any child under 18 may be eligible for benefits. And a child over 18 may get benefits if he or she is disabled and the disability began in childhood - before the age of 22 .
The disable
started getting benefits before age 18 . Benefits can start at any age since entitlement to benefits depends on the parent's death, disability, or retire-
ment. For example, suppose John ment. For example, suppose John
Smith, who has a 40 -year-old developmentally disabled daughter living with him, is planning to retire. Chances are his daughter would be able to collect benefits when he retires. She probably could also get
benefits if he died or became disabled. The SSI program is somewhat different from Social Security. It pays monthly benefits to disabled people with limited income and resources. The age at which the disability started
has no bearing. Disabled people of any age who qualify - young or old - can receive SSI benefits.
A disabled child under 18, who lives with his or her parents, can qualify for
SSI payments only if the income and SSI payments only if the income and
resources of his or her parents are resources of his or her parents are
limited. However, once a child turns 18, the parent's income and resources no longer count. If the child has little income and few resources, he or she
may be able to get SSI checks. may be able to get SSI checks.
Sometimes disabled children who live in institutions might be able to
leave and live outside the institution if leave and live outside the institution if
they had an income. In many cases, that needed income could come in the form of SSI checks.
If you have a disabled child who
may be eligible for either Social security or SSI benefits, call, write or visit any Social Security office. The people there will be glad to give you completing an application
