During 50 years as country editor and publisher I learned to listen to people to understand their thinking on public questions.
I have heard enough opinions
recently to pass on what I believe is the consensus of West Central Texas on seven oft-discussed topics.

1. Most people would believe congressmen are sincere in their desire to reduce the national deficit if they
began by cutting their own salaries in half. 2. Mudslinging politicians are
boosting sales of remote control devices for television sets. People want the gadgets to flick off the tirades without having to rise from their easy chairs.
2. Few feel that Texas public
schools are accomplishing their purpose. Many argue that youngsters learned better how to read, write and calculate in days of the one-room schoolhouse.
3. Lawyers deserve less input in concern for victims of crime and less tor offenders.
4. Professional athletes are
disgustingly over paid. Their performances are more often mediocre than exceptional. How do you reconcile paying a baseball player 15 times more than the nation's president, or far more than a life-saving cancer surgeon?
5. Doctors are respected but not held in the esteem of general practi-
tioners long ago. Note how few babies are named for the attending physician at their birth. Such was common practice when this century was young. 7. Preachers who practice brevity are most beloved. Theologians point out that Christ's Sermon on the Moun-
