We had some great times and didn't realize how good life was then.

Jack Tunnell and my dad, Darwin Anderson, each coached a team and the baseball diamond was located in the area of the Housing Authority apartments, just north of Colonial Oaks Nursing Home. We didn't have any spectators, but at least we got to play. I always had to play center field. Daddy didn't show any partiality, believe me. The only ones who could hit that hard were the Purvis girls, Bet-

ty and Peggy. It has been a while since a skating rink has been here. There are no gocarts, kids aren't allowed to ride into the country for fear of being abducted, and nowadays girls play baseball with the boys. Looks like we made some improvements and some backslides, as time determinedly marches on.

Lee Thompson, superintendent, will present each senior, and school board



character of Conan, and turning it into a museum.

In the 1960s and 1970s, de Camp helped revive Conan, the sword and sorcery hero of Robert E. Howard. A longtime resident of Cross Plains. Howard had published stories of his famous barbarian only in pulp magazines before his suicide in 1936. De Camp recognized the imaginative power of Howard's work, and edited. compiled and wrote Conan novels, which resulted in two Arnold Schwarzenegger movies in the 1980s.

The de Camps shared their literary expertise and experiences in the meeting with the Circuit Writers on Tuesday, May 22, in the Bell Club Room of the Howard Payne Library. The authors signed copies of their books, which were on sale at the meeting.

After publishing over 400 short stories and articles, 150 poems, and 120 books of science fiction, fantasy, historical fiction, popular nonfiction, children's books and textbooks, Mr. de Camp brings the ring of authority to the subject of his talk, "Writing Salable Fiction." It deals with plotting, characterization, narration, and setting - topics explained more fully in his bestselling, "Science Fiction Handbook," now out of print.

Although she has published three books of her own, including, "Creatures of the Cosmos," a collection of children's stories, Mrs. de Camp also edits her husband's work, keeps track of copyrights, republication schedules, royalty payments, and income taxes generated by their 120

Mr. de Camp gives an example of her work when he says, "It's pretty hard to collect a royalty payment from Italy or Japan." This work is reflected in her talk, "Literary Housekeeping." She hopes to help beginning writers get off to a good start by establishing sound business practices. Having published two books on popular economics under her own name, "The Money Tree" and "Teach Your Child to Manage Money," she is well qualified to help writers reach their goal of economic independence.

Unlike many authors who dreamed of a writing career from childhood, Mr. de Camp says, "I thought I was going to be an engineer. The Great Depression took care of that."

He received his degree in engineering from California Institute of Technology in 1930. After being laid off from two engineering jobs in quick succession, he started work for trade journals. At night he wrote freelance articles to increase his income.

"For fun I wrote a few stories and articles, and sold them - to my great surprise," he said. He started freelancing fulltime when he lost his editing

Today the de Camps devote much of their time to lecturing, attending science fiction and fantasy conventions throughout the world, often as guests of honor, and answering letters from fans, but he still writes every

He is working on his autobiography, which will be published next year, and

simultaneously on a new novel. "Then I have an idea for another

book," he said.

The University of Texas' Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center has recently acquired the de Camps' collected manuscripts and books. They occupy over 100 linear feet of shelf space. Dr. Harold Billings, the university's director of general libraries, says, "Of the four or five major writers who helped set the directions of contemporary science fiction and fantasy, Mr. de Camp and his wife are quite important. They are very much heavyweights in their world."

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by adverse weather conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Baird, FmHA County Supervisor Jack Phillips said today

Callahan County is one of nineteen in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from tornadoes, flooding and severe storms.

Phillips said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Phillips said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 1, 1991, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Phillips said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.





"Since a child's brain is continually developing," said Dr. Wasco, "anything that disrupts that development process can have serious long-term consequences for that child.'

Help avoid accidents this summer by keeping the following safety tips in mind: Be aware of pedestrians and

bicyclists when driving near playgrounds, residential and school areas, and especially

when turning or backing up. Be a role model for your children. Go for walks and bike rides together and always stop at the curb or edge of the road. Teach children to listen and look for traffic to the left, to the right and to the left again, then keep looking until they've crossed the street safely.

 Buy the right size bike. Children should be able to place the balls of their feet on the ground and their hands on the handlebars when sitting on the

Dear G.G., The Worker's Compensation Commission advises that employers may get pre-employment claims information if they have a signed, notarized waiver of confidentiality from the applicant. Waiver of confidentiality forms are available from the WCC. An employer can get the information over the telephone, but it must send in the waiver within 10 days or be liable for a fine up to \$10,000.

The WCC will tell an employer if an applicant has filed two compensable Worker's Comp claims or more within the last five years. The WCC will not tell an employer if the applicant has filed only one claim within the last five years.

Dear Commissioner Nabers, What are the restrictions on the new subminimum training wage?

Dear V.N., The subminimum training wage is \$3.35/hour until April 1, 1991 when it rises to \$3.61/hr. The training wage provisions, which expire March 31, 1993, are available only to workers under the age of 20 for 90 calendar days. A worker who has received 90 days of training wage for one employer may be paid the training wage for another 90 days if he works for a different employer who provides on the job training. However, according to Department of Labor regulations, the "total period that an employee may be employed at the training wage by any combination of employers may not exceed a cumulative total of 180 days."

Employers are prohibited from employing individuals at the training wage when any person has been laid off in the same or Austin substantially equivalent position.

Also, no more than one-fourth of the total hours worked by all employees in an establishment may be paid at the training wage.

CORRECTION: Last week's Texas Business Today mistakenly reported that a military employee who voluntarily retired would be disqualified from receiving unemployment benefits. The "voluntary quit" and "misconduct" disqualification provisions of the Texas **Unemployment Compensation Act** do not apply to claimants whose last employer was the military. Military retirement pay would, however, be deducted from any benefits for which the ex-employee could qualify, so as a practical matter, the retiring military employee will usually not receive benefits. Texas Business Today regrets the error.


