

FREE PUBLIC KINDERGARTEN TO BEGIN IN 70-71 SCHOOL YEAR

Free public kindergarten will begin in Texas on a limited basis in the 1970-1971 school year. House Bill 240 passed by the last Texas Legislature provided for state assistance to school districts to provide kindergarten for educationally handicapped children.

Eligibility for kindergarten for the 1970-71 school year is limited to educationally handicapped children who are 5 years and 5 months old or older. This eligibility age will be reduced to 5 years and 2 months for the 1971-1972 school year and to 5 years for the 1972-1973 school year. Children other than handicapped will begin kindergarten at age 5 years and 7 months in the 1973-1974 school year. The law provides that all children 5 years old will be provided free kindergarten by the 1977-1978 school year.

Educationally handicapped children have been defined by law as those children who do not have the ability to use and understand the common English language words that are necessary for normal progress in the first grade. Children from families whose annual income is less than \$3,000.00 are also classified as handicapped.

School officials are trying to build a census list of children born after September 1, 1964. Parents are asked to cooperate in filling out the census forms to be sent out next week. Census blanks are being sent to homes where it is known there are children born after September 1, 1964. Those parents who do not have children in school are asked to secure a blank from Mr. Don Allen, Ele-

mentary Principal. The information on these blanks will be used to make plans for the kindergarten program for the next three years.

It was pointed out that for the first three years the kindergarten program will be limited to those children defined as handicapped and will not be a general program. Clyde school's participation in this program will depend on the need that is found for providing for handicapped children of the age specified.

County Sells \$5,561 Bonds In February

United States Savings Bond sales during February in Callahan County totaled \$5,561, according to an announcement by County Bond Chairman Howard Farmer. Sales for the first two months were \$11,813 - 9 percent of the 1970 sales goal.

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$16,678,196 in Savings Bonds during February - an increase of 16 per cent over February 1969. Series E sales alone during the month were \$15,497 million compared to \$12,940 million during 1969 - an increase of 19.7 per cent. Sales for the two month period totaled \$32,540,738 with 18 per cent of the yearly goal of \$179.9 million achieved.

Nationally, there were new purchases of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares amounting to \$414 million. Total cash sales for the first two months of the year totaled \$821 million - 5.1 per cent below a year earlier.

Mr. Lee Herring, Grand Prairie banker, was the featured speaker. His recipe for making speeches is one-third serious talk and two-thirds humor. He told about a fellow that was compared to a gold watch. He said, "It is made of pure gold and full of gold works."

He also compared the bonds secured in a bank as being very valuable, and that there were many kinds of valuable bonds.

One of these is the Family bond and another is a Community bond. The bond that ties us to each other is the bond of security and happiness.

Another serious thought he presented was about his little negro friend Will. Will wore little blue overalls. He came into the bank one day with a \$5.00 bill and wanted to buy \$5.00 worth of dimes. Will said, "My church is very poor and most of the kids in my church have never had any silver to give to the Lord and to the church, I am going to give silver to each of the children of the church so they can give silver to the Lord and His church. Mr. Herring was deeply touched by the many words that Will did for his church, because he did not have much money to give. Mr. Herring said, "It doesn't take finances or position to be influential in your community, just good works."

On the humorous side Mr. Herring told many jokes. One was about a young negro man that worked at the bank at night cleaning up. The phone rang one night and he answered it, saying, "Hello." The man on the other end wanted some information about bonds, chattel mortgages, and various information about banking, and wanted to know if the young man could help him. The young man said, "When I answered the phone, I told you everything I know about banking."

Mr. Herring referred to himself as being a "big" banker in that he carried "great weight." He is a very interesting and entertaining man. He is very sincere and serious about the many basic human problems that exist in our world today. In his closing statement, he commented that he wished to belong to the "Bank of Joy."

JOE HANNA ENDORSED BY HOME TOWN PAPER LAST WEEK

BRECKENRIDGE - Joe Hanna, candidate for the state legislature from the 53rd district, received the endorsement of his home town paper, the Breckenridge America, Thursday.

Hanna and Burke Musgrove, the incumbent are both from Breckenridge, but the local paper chose Hanna. 49-year old business man and 25-year resident of that city, as its choice in the hotly contested legislative race.

The paper stated that Hanna had made a success of every venture he had entered and knew first hand the problems the average business man and rancher faced every day. Better than a background as a politician, the newspaper said, Hanna has 25 years experience as a successful business man. Until recently he owned and operated the Stephens County Abstract Co., and is also in the cattle business and real estate and serves as a director of First Federal Savings and Loan Association.

"Voters in this district have a rare opportunity to send a mature state representative to Austin," the editorial stated. "Joe Hanna knows first hand the problems of this district. He

can work with the leadership in Austin and he can bring unity back to our county."

The American then said that Hanna is a man to be respected in Breckenridge or in Austin. That he as a parent, a man who wants his children to inherit a better county, and a better state.

"It is a rare occasion in this day and time when a man of Hanna's ability can be persuaded to seek public office," the newspaper editorial stated, and urged voters to consider Hanna's many qualifications when they vote May 2.

JURY DEADLOCKED IN TRIAL OF FORMER AREA MAN

ABILENE - A mistrial was declared Tuesday in the "theft by false pretext" trial of a former Clyde man, charged with obtaining \$70,020.28 in loans from Abilene National Bank.

Bill Galusha, a former Clyde and Abilene resident, was indicted last Sept. 12th. He was charged with stealing the money from an Abilene bank, using non-existent cattle and ranch property as collateral.

After hearing a day and one-half of testimony, the jury deliberated less than two hours,

and had an hour of testimony read back, before reporting itself hung at 8-4, the majority favoring conviction.

FILL OUT YOUR '70 CENSUS QUESTIONNAIRE AND HOLD IT

District Manager Robert C. Ford reports good progress in this area of the 1970 Census of Population and Housing. Census takers started the house-to-house canvass April 1 to pick up the filled-out questionnaires distributed earlier by the Post Office.

The District Manager pointed out that residents can speed up the big count by having their questionnaires filled out and ready for the census takers. This action will save time for both the householder and the census taker, the District Manager said.

Answers should be made in pencil so that if a mistake is made, it can be erased. Most answers are to be made by blacking in a tiny circle beside the right answer. This makes a black dot which can be read by an electronic device at the Census Bureau, which will, in turn, speed up the processing of the information.

At every fifth household, the census taker asks additional questions covering population

and housing characteristics which are being asked of a 20 percent sample of the population.

The District Manager emphasized that all information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law. It is used only to provide summary figures such as totals, averages and percentages. The information about individuals cannot be examined by any one other than census employees who are sworn to secrecy, and thus cannot be used for investigation, taxation or regulation.

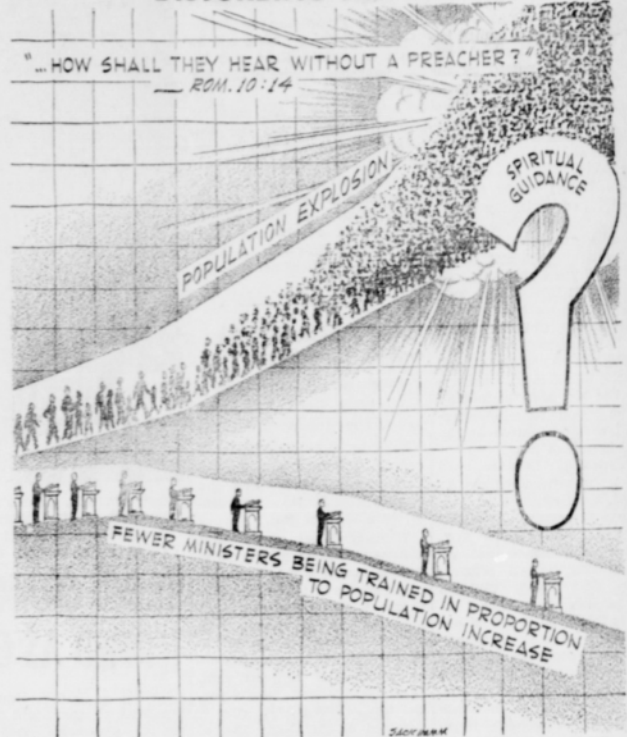

"Therefore, if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature; old things are passed away; behold all things are become new." (2 Cor. 5:17).

Man is not converted in some mysterious way which is better felt than told. He is "begotten by the word of truth." (Jas. 1:18). He is converted by obeying the teaching of the gospel which Paul preached. (Rom. 6:17,18). Have you been truly converted as the Good Book teaches?

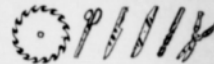

Lawyers Vote 4-1 In Favor of Austin McCloud For Chief Justice

Lawyers have voted overwhelmingly, more than 4 to 1, in favor of Judge Austin McCloud for Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 11th District. Vote by lawyers in the 23 counties in the 11th District was 225 for Judge McCloud and only 43 for his opponent, Roger Q. Garrett Jr., of Abilene.

The 32nd District Judge was approved almost 3 to 1 by the lawyers in Taylor County, Garrett's own home county. Taylor attorneys voted 78 to 30 for Judge McCloud in an important expression of professional preference for the Colorado City jurist.

In Mitchell County, Judge McCloud's home, the Abilene lawyer did not receive a single vote. All eight Mitchell lawyers made it a unanimous ballot for the 32nd District Judge.

The pre-election poll of professional lawyers was conducted by the State Bar Association in secret ballot and announced last week.

A total of 273 attorneys cast secret ballots in the 11th District poll, part of the Bar Association's statewide poll of its lawyers for judicial offices. It usually is viewed as poll-

tically important in the various judicial races because the view is an expression of professional appraisal of the candidates by their own professional peers.

In Judge McCloud's district of Nolan, Mitchell and Fisher Counties, McCloud received unanimous support of the Bar.

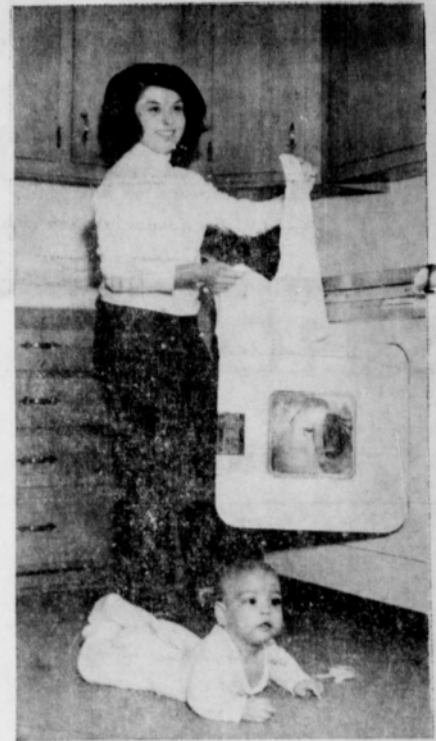

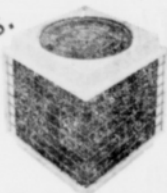
