EASTLAND — Jason Ray Flippin, 19, died Thursday, September 27, at a local hospital of injuries received in an automobile accident.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Monday at Bethel Baptist Church with the Rev. Dewey Lamb officiating. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery, directed by Bakker Funeral Home.

He was born in Golden Valley, Minn., and grew up in Oklahoma and Texas, moving to Eastland in 1984. He was a 1990 graduate of Eastland High School and a member of Bethel Baptist Church.

Survivors include his parents, Jodee and Patricia Flippin of Eastland; two brothers, David Flippin and James Flippin, both of Eastland; two sisters, Dawn Flippin and Angela Flippin, both of Eastland; maternal grandparents, Ray and Dorothy Ristesund of Howard, S.D.; his paternal grandparents, Tom and Wanda Flippin of Pioneer; and several aunts, uncles, and cousins.

Commissioners Report

Disappointing was the word most used by Clyde ambulance and fire department officials when hearing the news that Callahan County will not be increasing its contribution to the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department and the Citizens Emergency Ambulance Service.

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular court meeting Monday, September 24, tentatively approved the 1990-91 fiscal year budget that does not include a funding increase for the ambulance service or the Clyde fire department.

Citizens EMS administrator Ron Young said, "I'm disappointed the county didn't increase funding. The ambulance service is having financial problems." Young said this year's deficit is expected to be \$12,000 in the red. Young said that he went to the county commissioners three times this year asking for a \$400 increase in funding for the ambulance service and that commissioners gave him "no indication" whether the ambulance service would receive the increase or not. Young said that if the ambulance service does not receive any additional income, that changes could be made in the service.

Young said that the City of Clyde has in the past always made up the difference in funding for the ambulance service, "but I think they (the Clyde City Council) do not feel they're able to shoulder the burden any longer," he added. The ambulance administrator added that the City of Clyde also provides an office and bookkeeping for the ambulance service free of charge. He said that the City of Clyde is also named anytime the ambulance service is sued.

He said that the Citizens EMS ambulance service has not received a subsidy increase since 1981.

"I can't find anything to keep this ambulance service running on this little amount of subsidy," Young said referring to the service's annual \$33,000 budget.

Young said that the ambulance service's current financial problems are not because of poor money management. He said that the deficit is simply from rising operations cost and the ambulance service receiving less from Medicare for patient transportation.

Young said that he has also asked the City of Clyde and the City of Baird to increase its funding of the ambulance service by \$400 a month, but he said he has not heard from the municipalities.

Don Haley, an officer with the Callahan County Fire Departments Association, said he too was disappointed to hear that the county fire departments would not receive any additional funding from the county to battle rural fires.

"I'm pretty disappointed the county didn't offer to increase its subsidy. I don't think they've (the county commissioners) heard the last of it," Haley said referring to the funding denial.

Haley said that during his trips to visit with county commissioners, the county did not say one way or the other whether the county's volunteer fire departments would receive the funding subsidy increase. He did say that the commissioners originally indicated that the county wanted to help.

Haley said that he expects changes to be made in the volunteer fire departments if those departments don't get more funding.

The changes could result in the fire departments, particularly the Clyde fire department, only serving those people within the city limits of those communities. "I'm afraid that the people in the rural areas would suffer on fire protection," Haley said. He said that the county has a responsibility to help subsidize the county ambulance and fire departments for use by the rural citizens.

Haley, a member of the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department and mayor of Clyde, said the cities cannot bare the load of fighting rural fires and that it is unfair that the city tax payers pay for funding rural fire protection. Approximately 75 percent of all calls made to the Clyde fire department are outside the city limits of Clyde.

"The cities can't continue to carry the load to fund fire departments. This is a serious situation," said Haley.

Haley added that the City of Clyde supports the local fire department to the tune of \$25,000 annually. The local fire department's budget is approximately \$36,000.

"The City of Clyde is not going to continue to do this. I think the city council will act on the situation," Haley said.

The fire officials said that each county fire department received \$600 a year from the county for rural fire protection and that sometimes can receive additional funding for emergency equipment purchases. However, Haley said that the county has contributed less than \$10,000 in emergency funding over the last nine years.

Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen said following the commissioners

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rate. This year's county tax rate is .2590 cents for every \$100 of property value and .0779 cents for every \$100 of value for the Farm to Market Road tax.

The new tax rate is less than one cent higher than last year's tax rate. The 1989 county tax rate was .2572 cents per \$100 for the county tax and .0777 cents per \$100 for the Farm to Market Road tax.

In other commissioners court agenda items commissioners:

— Approved a one day workshop for 42nd District Clerk Cubelle Harris to attend in Granbury on October 5.

— Tabled taking any action on having on-site sewage facility inspections for sewage systems being installed in the county. The State Health Department is now inspecting these private sewage facilities in the county but county commissioners don't know if the state would continue to do this. County Judge Mack Kniffen would get contact area counties on how those sewage systems are inspected.

The absentee voting for the election will take place at the county clerk's office between October 17 to November 2.

— Commissioners set the number of workers needed for each precinct to count the votes of the General Election. 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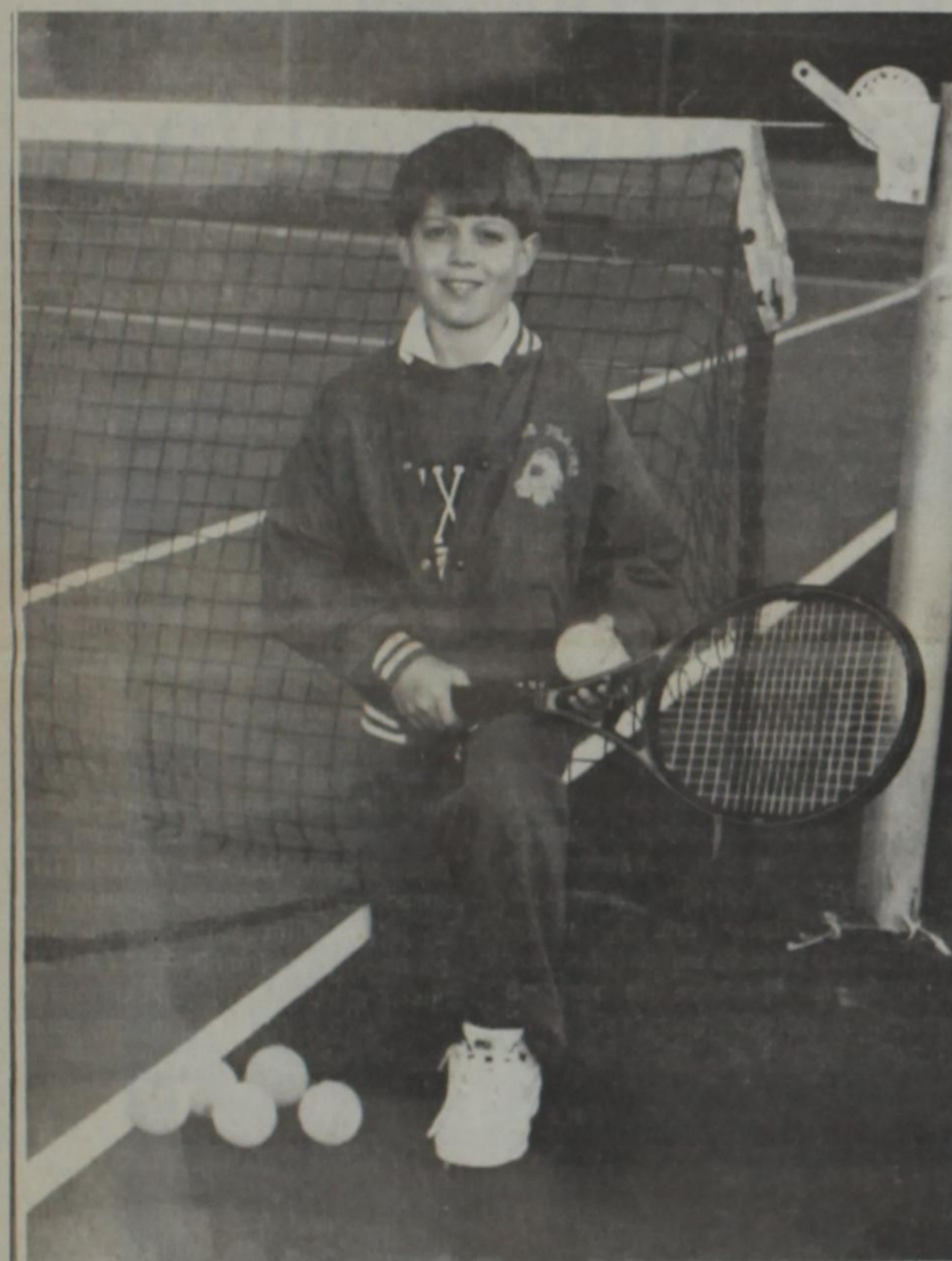

Register To Vote

Approximately 150 of 500 voters purged from the Callahan County voter list have re-registered, according to Callahan County voter registrar Wauneta Estes, Monday, October 1.

Every two years, the Secretary of State requires the voter registrar's office to mail out new voter certificates. Because the cards are not to be forwarded, the

registrar's office received many of the cards back because of incorrect addresses.

If the incorrect addresses are not corrected by August 16, the voter registrar is required to purge these voters from the active voter list. This past summer, the county purged over 500 voters from the voter registration list.

The Secretary of State George Bayoud has issued a challenge to all 254 counties in the state. Callahan County is competing with 55 other counties in the state for registering the highest percentage of loss due to the purge. The county's goal is 500 new voters and as of Monday, 150 had registered. Bayoud visited Clyde High School September 4 to speak to the seniors at Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains High Schools about registering to vote.

Mrs. Estes said that October 5 is the last day to hand carry the voter registration card to her office and that the mail-in date is for October 8 postmarked registration cards.

She added that during last Friday's ballgame in Clyde, members of the Clyde Student Council and tax office employees registered new voters during the varsity football game.

Mrs. Estes said that she has also visited with Clyde High School seniors and various clubs and organizations in the community seeking new voters.

"Registering is only the first part of our commitment. We are electing a new county judge locally and a new governor statewide. If we don't vote, how can we rightfully complain? Don't forget to vote November 6," Mrs. Estes said.

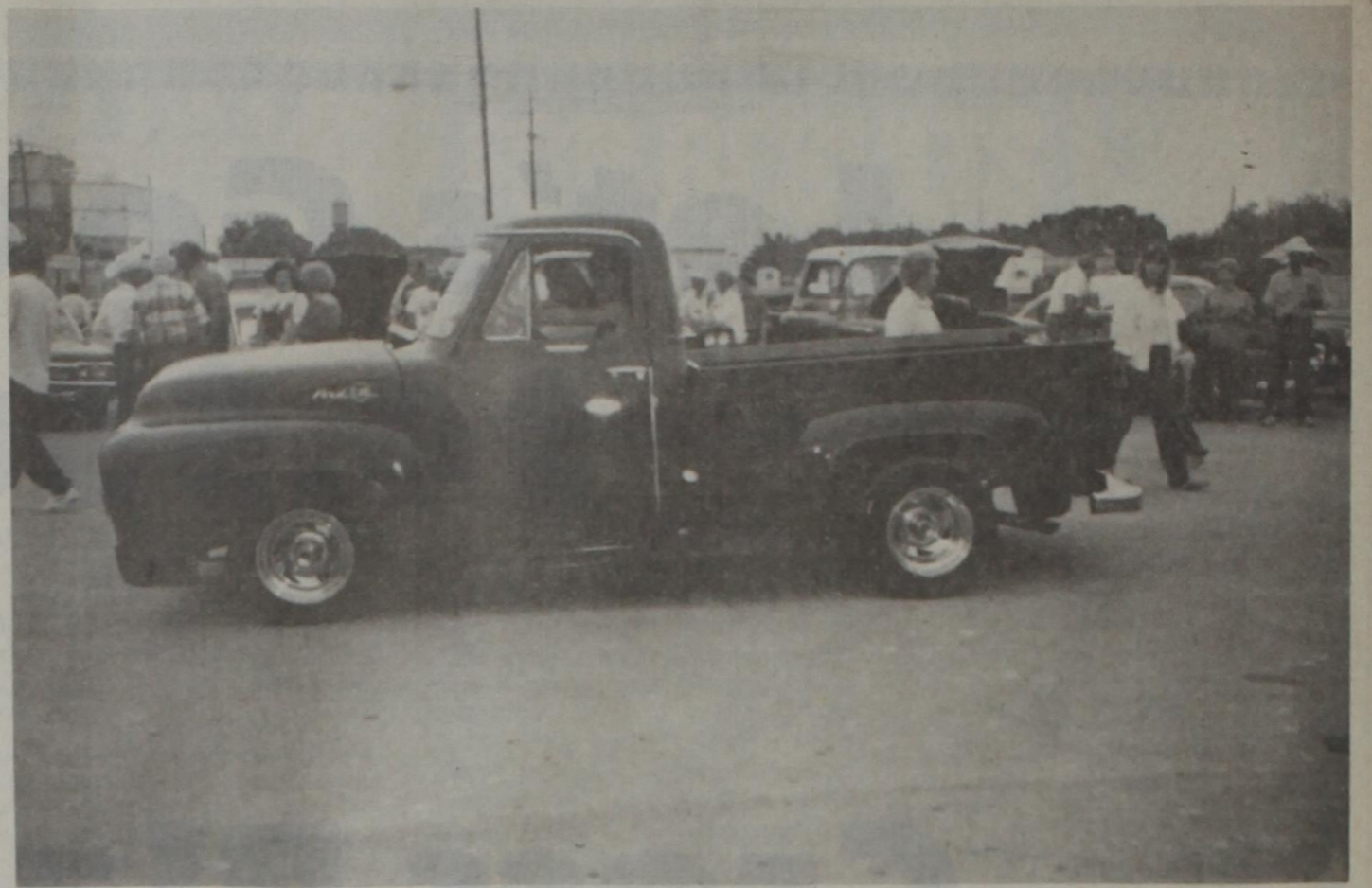

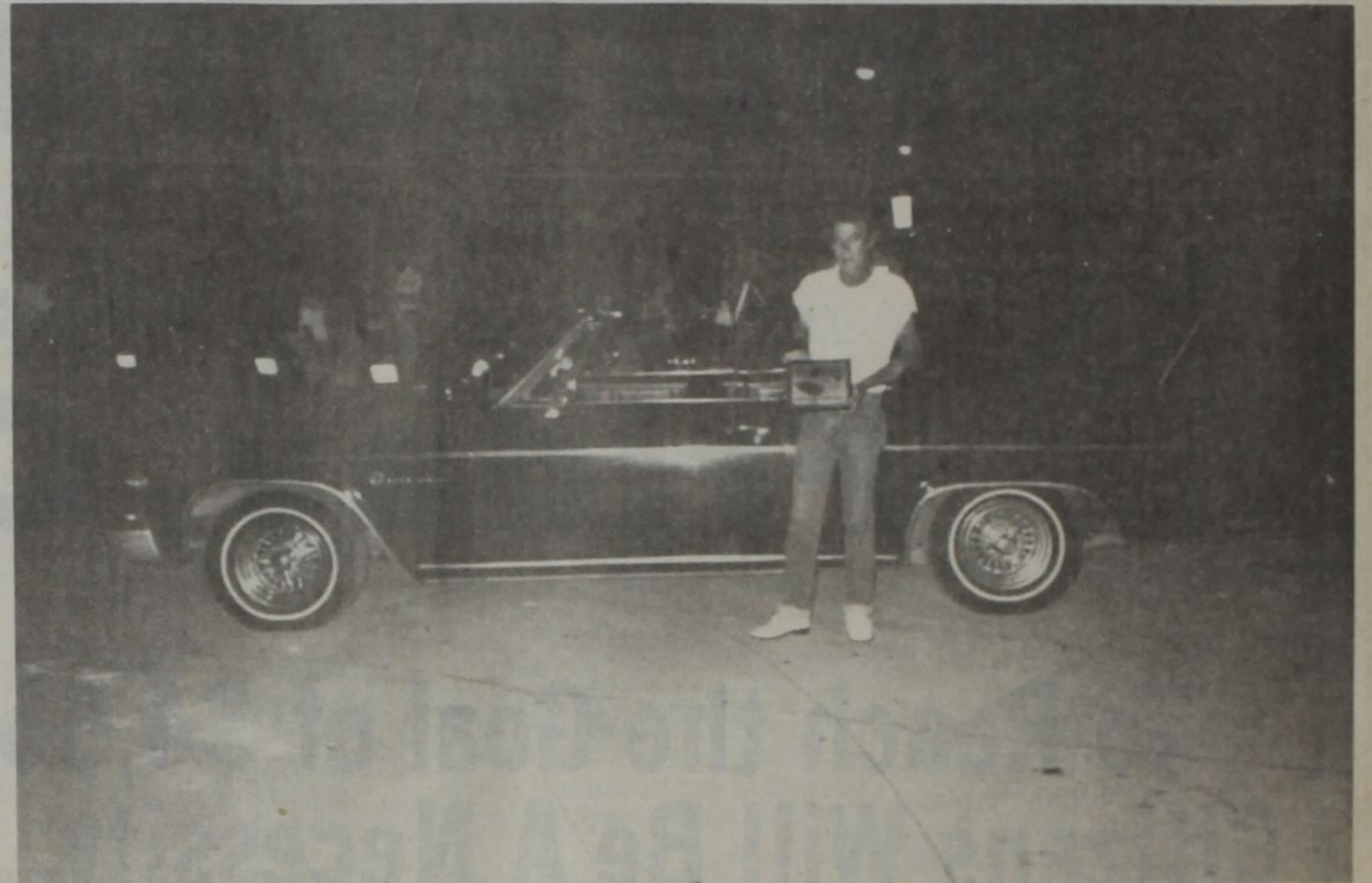

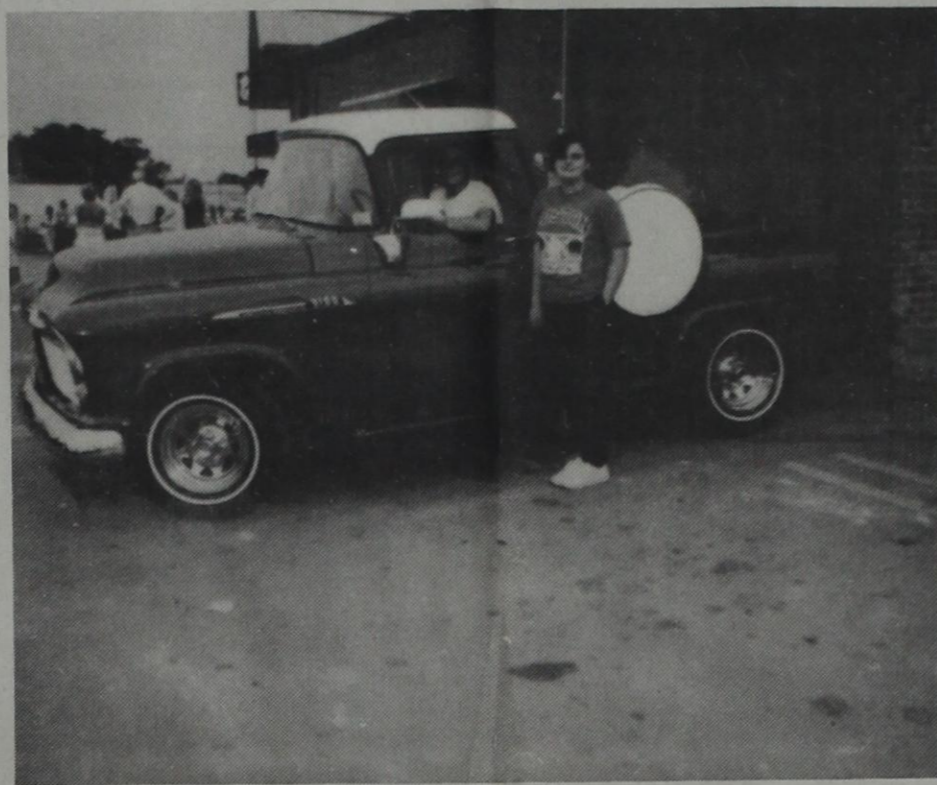

Another Farm Bureau sponsored fire protection program is the payment to fire departments that fight fires in the rural areas involving Farm Bureau insured property.

Farm fires cost lives and many dollars each year. Preventing fire is your first line of defense against heavy loss. Knowing what to do should fire occur is your backup, all the more important if you live miles from a fire station.

*Inspect your house and out-buildings for fire hazards, in particular checking the electrical system and all appliances and equipment, fuel storage and heating system, stoves and portable heaters. Make needed repairs without delay. Remove fire hazards such as trash, clutter, stacks of newspapers, unneeded flammable materials, etc.

*Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Teach small children how to "Stop — Drop and Roll" if their clothing catches on fire. Teach them how to call 911 or other "help" numbers.

*Equip your house, outbuildings and machinery with fire extinguishers. Have small dry chemical extinguishers recharged after each use. If you don't know ask your fire department why this is important.

*Test smoke detectors regularly. Replace batteries as directed.

*Follow directions on containers or labels of flammable products. Store them in their original containers out of the reach of small children. Store small amounts of fuel in approved, labeled safety containers.

*Have plenty of water available to fight fire. A full swimming pool, an accessible pond or water holding tanks will augment that available from your well and tank trucks.

*If you smoke, do it with care. Don't smoke where there's risk of igniting combustible or flammable materials. Don't smoke when drowsy or in bed.

As the Fire Prevention Week theme for 1990 suggests, "Make Your Place Firesafe: Hunt for (farm) and Home Hazards."

Proclamation By The County Judge Of Callahan County

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

I, Mack Kniffen, County Judge of Callahan County, do hereby declare the week of October 7-13, 1990 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Callahan County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, FIRE PREVENTION WEEK was inspired by one of the worst fires in the history of our nation: The Great Chicago Fire of 1871. On October 9th of that year, 250 people died and 17,430 buildings were destroyed. In 1911 the Fire Marshalls Association first designated the anniversary of this tragedy Fire Prevention Day, dedicated to encouraging

fire safety. In 1922, President Warren G. Harding proclaimed National Fire Prevention Week. Since then, The National Fire Protection Association has been the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, leading the nation to practice life-saving fire safety; and

WHEREAS, each year roughly 6,000 Americans die in fires. In 1988, more people died in fires than in any year since 1981. And four-fifths of those people died in their own houses or apartments. During Fire Prevention Week, the NFPA is spotlighting the causes of these tragic home fire deaths and the simple steps you can take to protect yourself and your family.

Iky Akers, President of the Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau said, "Fire Prevention Week is not only a time to emphasize fire prevention education, but to call attention to Farm Bureau's two fire protection programs of working with fire departments in the county." County Farm Bureaus, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies, sponsor 100 volunteer firemen each year to the Texas Fireman's Training School at Texas A&M University. Sponsored this year was Ronald Green of the Putnam Volunteer Fire Department.
