CALLAHAN COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MET MAY 22

Seven people attended a public hearing before the Callahan County Commissioners on Monday, May 22 voicing their opinion about raising the local vehicle registration fee from \$5.00 to \$10.00 per vehicle per year.

Of the seven county residents in attendance, two were for the additional fee, while five were against the added fee.

Commissioners took no action on approving or rejecting the fee because Commissioner Harold Hicks was absent from the public hearing. Commissioners will act on the matter during the commissioners' court meeting Monday, June 12.

County commissioners are considering raising the local vehicle fee to \$10.00 in a move to bring in more money into the county's road and bridge fund. All money raised by the local vehicle registration fee will go into the county's road and bridge fund, Callahan County Judge Bill Johnson told those at the hearing. Judge Johnson said no money from the user's fee goes into the county's general fund. He did say 20 cents of the \$5.00 local registration fee goes directly to the state.

According to Judge Johnson, the additional \$5.00 added to the local vehicle registration fee would generate \$12,600 for Precinct 1 (Clyde), while Precinct 2, 3 and 4 (Baird, Cross Plains and Eula) would see an additional \$15,400 added to those precincts' road and bridge fund.

Before seeking public comments, Judge Johnson said the additional fee has its advantages and disadvantages. He said the disadvantage is it raises taxes. The advantage, Judge Johnson said is it's as close to a user tax as there is. Those county residents who own vehicles will pay the increased fee used to repair county roads.

"I think the commissioners have done an excellent job with what they got," Judge Johnson said with the small amount of money that goes into the road and bridge fund. The current \$5.00 local vehicle registration fee generates \$59,000 for the four commissioner precincts' road and bridge fund.

Clyde resident Charles Caldwell was the first to speak at the public hearing. Caldwell, who has lived in the county some 19 years, said he owns two ve-

hicles and the \$10.00 increase would be difficult to absorb because he's on a fixed income. "I'm in opposition to raising the \$5.00 fee. The taxpayers are over taxed and over governed. I'm against it," Caldwell said.

Another Clyde resident, Donna Hagan, who lives on Cherry Street, presented the commissioners with a petition signed by 29 county residents against the additional road and bridge fee.

Hagan, who lives outside the city limits of Clyde, asked commissioners why haven't the roads been maintained around Clyde. She then went into a discussion about the lack of maintenance on Gas House Road. She said she's complained to the city and county both and has had no results yet. She said neither entity wants to claim the road.

Commissioners told Hagan they would look into her complaint about Gas House Road.

John Adams, who lives west of Cross Plains, was the next county resident to speak. Being retired, Adams said he too is on a fixed income. He said he has lived in Callahan County off and on for over 40 years and Callahan County has the cheapest tax of any place he's lived.

Adams said the user's fee is as fair of a fee there is. He said the \$5.00 fee is only a pittance as far as the amount goes. "I recommend they vote for it," Adams said to the commissioners.

Leon Chrane, who has lived south of Clyde some 20 years, said he is speaking in opposition to the \$5.00 increase. Chrane said its not the \$5.00 fee that grates him, its the dead-end road he lives on that is in such disrepair.

"If you can guarantee that materials will be purchased with the fee I'd be for it," Chrane said.

The road Chrane referred to is located in Commissioner Charlie Grider's precinct. Grider, who is the Cross Plains commissioner, said the heavy vehicle traffic on the road and no base material to begin with is the major problem with the road. Grider did tell Chrane he plans to put some material on the roadway in question. Grider added he's only been commissioner for some five months and it will take him time to get to each road in his precinct.

Eula Commissioner Bryan Farmer told the audience that his precinct had only budgeted \$15,000 for road material for the coming year.

To show the audience how small amount that is, he said both Grider and Baird Commissioner Tommy Holland spent \$25,000 each for road material on one road recently.

Earl Hughes, who has lived in the county some 72 years, said he remembers when there wasn't even the local \$5.00 vehicle registration fee. Hughes said he's see no improvement in the county road system since the first \$5.00 fee was imposed. "It seems everyone wants to raise taxes," Hughes said, "If

we could get our \$5.00 worth, I wouldn't object." Hughes added that county residents spend \$5.00 on the tax now and he's seen no benefits from it.

Hughes then went into a discussion about the poor roads in the Belle Plaine area southeast of Baird. The road in question is also located in Commissioner Grider's precinct.

Grider told Hughes he's recently done some work on county roads in that area and asked Hughes to drive on those improved roads sometime.

Leonard Farmer was the next person to speak at the public hearing. Farmer said the \$5.00 shouldn't be considered a tax, but a "user's fee".

"I think it's a good deal (raising the \$5.00 local fee)," Farmer said. Farmer went on to say he has sympathy for the commissioners. "Fifteen thousand dollars is not a lot for roads," Farmer said referring to the amount of additional money the fee would raise.

Leon Chrane then brought up a discussion about some \$400,000 the county has in its general fund, which is located in a money market account. Chrane said he's not suggesting the commissioners use that money to repair roads, however,

Judge Johnson said the surplus funds are set aside because of what the state legislature might do to the county. Johnson said every time the legislature meets it costs the county money. The county judge also said the surplus is a six-month operating reserve for the county in case of an emergency.

Some questioned as to why the surplus is not put into a certificate of deposit. Johnson said they don't put it into a CD because the money is transferred on a regular basis.

Rita Treadway, who lives on Timber Trail between Clyde and Baird, said she was there to speak on behalf of the elderly and disabled. She then went into a discussion with commissioners about what constitutes priority on county roads. She also asked the commissioners if some additional county road signs to be placed on Timber Trail.

Judge Johnson told the audience that commissioners had planned to vote on the additional fee Monday, but that Commissioner Hicks needed to be there to vote on it.

Johnson told those in attendance the county appreciated their attendance at the public hearing and they were welcome to attend the commissioners' court meeting at any time. He said the commissioners' court meets every second and fourth Monday of the month at the courthouse in Baird. Johnson also said those at the public hearing would also be welcome to attend the June 12 meeting in which the commissioners are scheduled to vote on raising the local \$5.00 vehicle registration fee.
