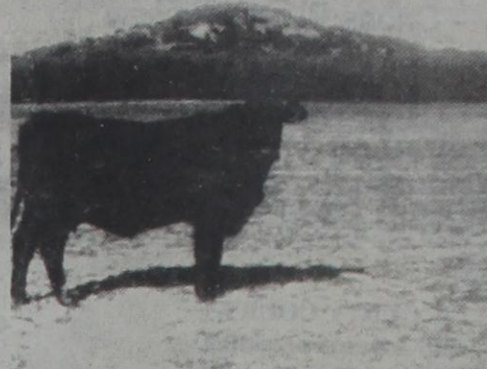

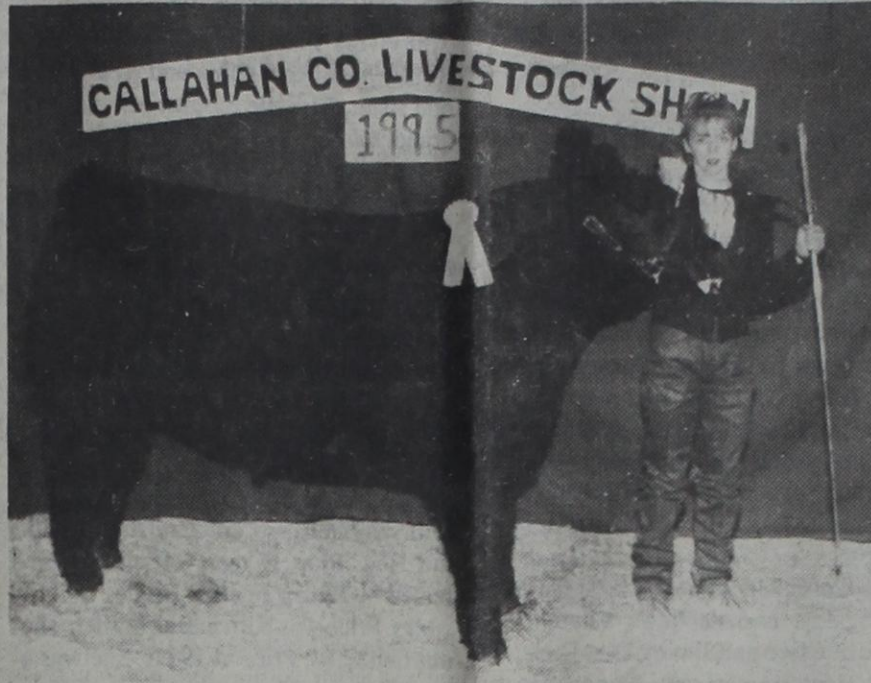

...reserve champion steer

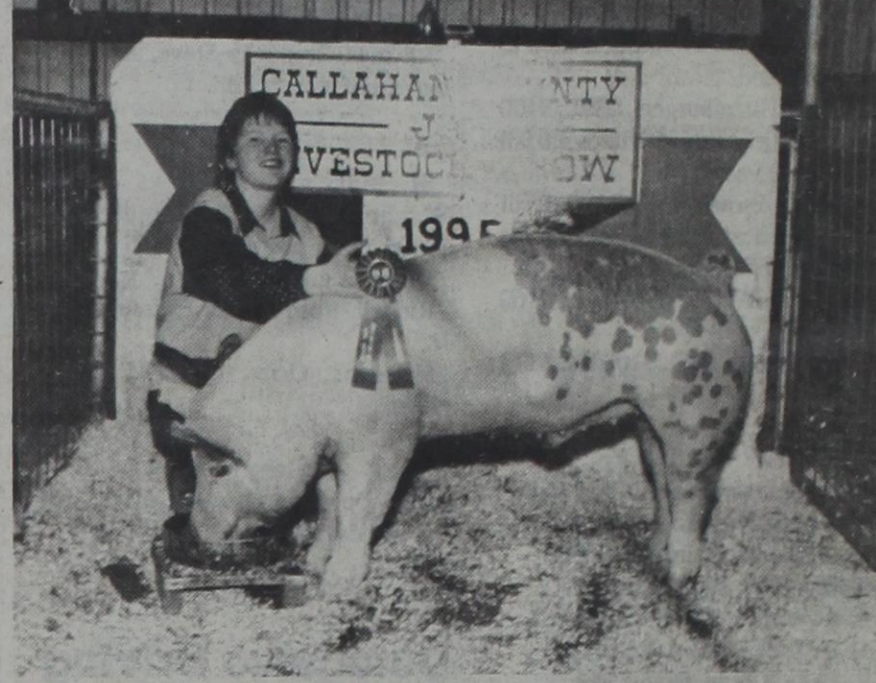

## Callahan County Youth Exhibit Outstanding Livestock

1995 Callahan County Junior Livestock Show was another successful year for the youthful exhibitors and their animals. Jay Parker of Clyde FFA showed the Overall Grand Champion Market Steer. His Limosin crossbred competed in the heavyweight European class where he was also the European breed champion.

Brittany Hinyard of Cross Plains FFA exhibited a European entry which earned Reserve Grand Steer. Her steer competed in the light heavyweight division. Tom Edd Johnson of Clyde FFA showed the Grand Champion Heifer, a European heifer.

Clyde FFA member, Bradley Black, exhibited the Reserve Grand Heifer, and English heifer.

Fifty-four market steers and nine breeding heifers were represented. Emily Winfrey of Cross Plains Junior FFA claimed Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Market Lamb. Both entries were a medium wool.

Grand Champion Market Swine was exhibited by Janeal Stephens of Cross Plains FFA. Janeal won with a heavyweight crossbred. She also had the champion OPB hog.

The Reserve Grand Champion Market Swine was shown by Ashlee Hutchins of Cross Plains FFA. Her hog was a heavyweight crossbred.

Jessica Archa of Eula 4-H showed the Champion Buck with a colored rabbit and the Reserve Buck with another colored entry.

Jonathan Maikell, Baird 4-H showed the Champion Doe in breeding rabbits with a colored doe. Cole Koenig of Cross Plains FFA took Reserve Doe with a white rabbit.

Cassie Cook of Eula 4-H exhibited the Champion Pen of Fryers in meat rabbits. Jessica Archa showed the Reserve pen of three fryers in the division.

Amelia Carroll showed the Champion Pen Broilers and Alicia Carroll exhibited the Reserve Broilers. It was one of the biggest poultry shows ever, with 35 pens of three broilers each—or 105 total chickens.

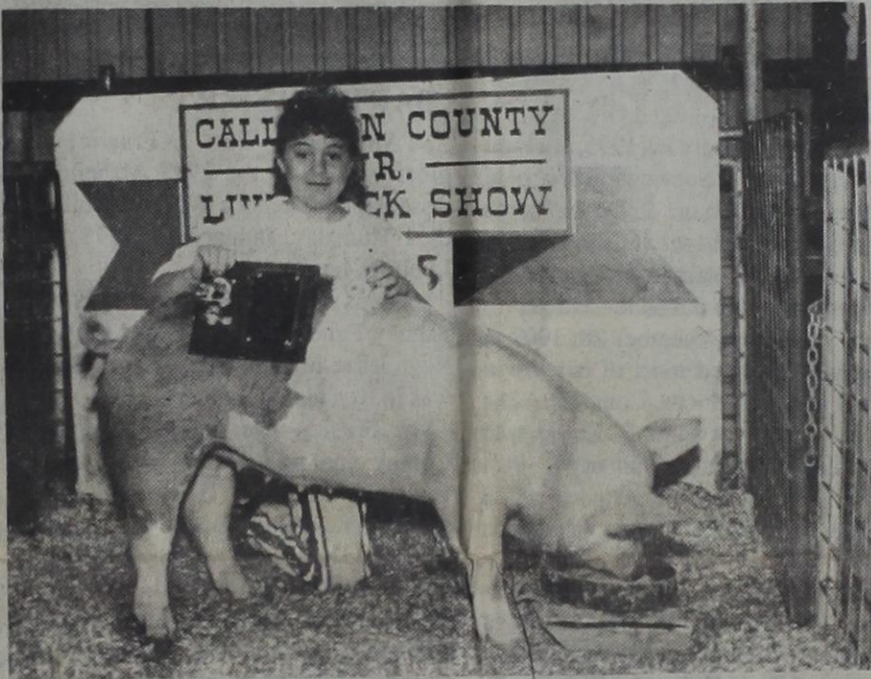

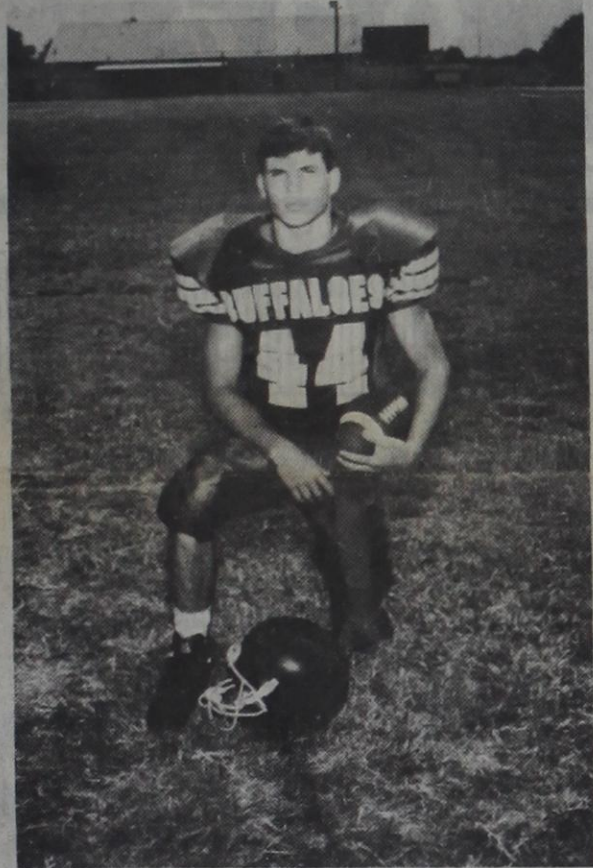
## Texas Midwest Community Network Workshop

Question about sales tax for economic development will be answered at workshops sponsored by the Texas Midwest Community Network and WTU.

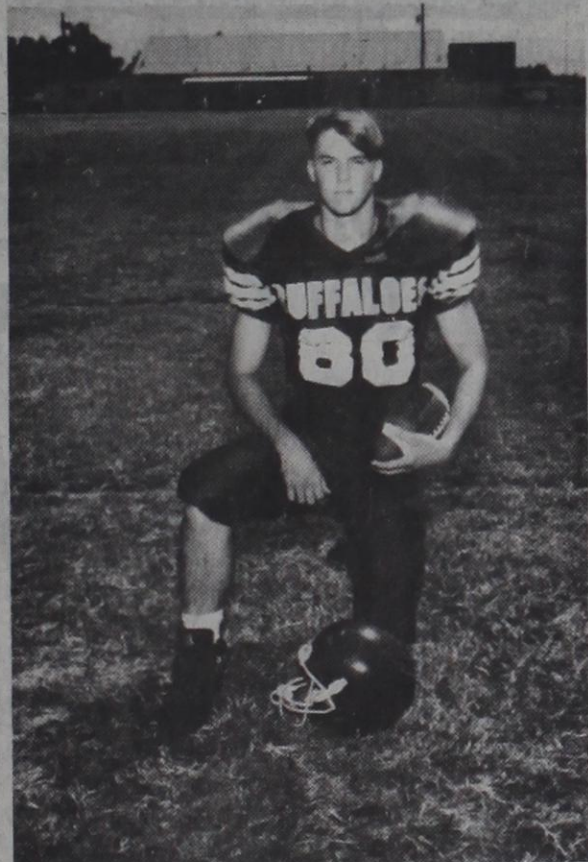
Workshop dates and locations are February 8 in Baird and February 3.

## Independent Cattlemen's Association Urges Texas Beef For Prison Inmates

AUSTIN—Texas prison inmates should eat beef produced in the Lone Star State rather than a soy-based meat substitute imported from Canada, the head of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas (ICA) said today.

Jim Selman, ICA president from Gonzales, urged the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to take another look at plans to serve inmates at more than 60 prisons a soy-based product known as VitaPro.

Beef production is a major Texas industry, with more than half of the state's total agricultural cash receipts coming from the sale of cattle. According to the Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas had 14.3 million head of cattle in January 1993—more than the entire human population of Florida.

"Instead of sending our tax money out of the state to buy a Canadian product, we should be supporting an industry that provides Texans with jobs," Selman said. "Beef production is the economic mainstay for many of our rural communities. It's an industry that we must and should support," Selman added. "So, let our prisoners eat beef—that's what I say."

The prison system earlier this month announced plans to market and distribute VitaPro, produced in Montreal by VitaPro Foods Inc. At state prison units, it will be used as a meat substitute in such dishes as spaghetti, hamburgers and casseroles.

ICA represents more than 6,000 cow-calf producers in Texas.

Through the years Cross Plains has produced a number of people who went far as professional writers. To name a few, there have been: Robert E. Howard, C.S. Boyles, Jr., Dr. Lou Rodenberger, Novalyn Price Ellis, Skipper Nichols and others. None though evidenced a greater gift during high school years than Vanessa Kimmel demonstrates daily. You should manage to meet that young lady. She's destined for greatness and it will be nice to say you knew her in the long ago.

## The Elderly: They're Not Just For The Holidays

During holiday seasons like the one we have just completed, we're inundated with images of friendly family gatherings—especially "warm, fuzzy" scenes involving parents and grandparents. But at other times of the year it seems as though many people are less hospitable toward the elderly.

The contrast is very noticeable to me, because I was raised in India, where growing old is viewed as a positive thing, and older people are considered a tremendous resource. They are respected for the wisdom and knowledge they have acquired, and young people come to them for advice.

I don't see this happening as much in the United States. Here, so much emphasis is placed on looking young that being elderly has acquired a negative connotation. The message to our youth is that being old is "uncool"—despite the fact that most of them, too, will inevitably reach this stage of life.

It is fortunate that the biomedical science community doesn't view the field of gerontology as uncool. In fact, there's an increasing interest in the cell biology of aging. Graduate students are realizing that studies on aging can be exciting.

A better understanding of how and why cells age should help scientists find ways to improve the health of the elderly. We know already, for instance, that the immune system declines as the body gets older. The T-cells that help fight infection don't proliferate as well in older people, which makes them more vulnerable to illness. If researchers can identify at the molecular level the mechanism that causes cells to become non-responsive to viruses, perhaps we can develop gene therapy to boost the immune system of elderly people.

It is ironic that cells that proliferate too much can also cause a problem for the elderly. If you live long enough, cancer is probably the one thing that will get you. Understanding the basic science of what causes some cells to multiply abnormally might lead to ways to prevent or treat various types of cancer.

The statistics alone emphasize the need for research of this nature.

Today the population of people 85 or older is growing six times as fast as any other age group. In the U.S., we spend more than \$162 billion a year to treat elderly patients and \$600 million to relieve problems related to aging.

With so many people living longer, it would be wonderful if they could enjoy

those extra years rather than suffer through them with physical ailments. Scientists are working on the problem, but the answers aren't going to come overnight.

We can help by paying more attention to our aging parents, grandparents and friends—and not just during the holiday.

Meanwhile, go make friends with the older generation. Learn from the wisdom of the elderly; they have fascinating stories to tell!

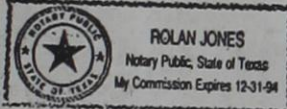

—Commissioners met with TMS Group in regards to adopting some housing rehabilitation guidelines for the \$350,000 grant awarded to tornado victims in the Cross Plains area.

Commissioners voted to allow County Judge Bill Johnson to sign the housing rehabilitation guidelines once they are compiled by the TMS Group.

The TMS Group is administering the grant for Callahan County. No county funds will be paid to the TMS Group. Instead, the company will be paid from the grant money for administering the program.

Judge Johnson said some 25 families have applied for grant relief from a tornado which damaged homes and businesses in the Cross Plains area in May of 1994.

—Commissioners met with Clarence Million and a Mr. Young in regards to taking in a road for county maintenance. The private road is located south of Bulldog Steel in Commissioner Harold Hicks' Precinct #1.

The private road has only 40 feet of right-of-way, but the county requires 60 feet of right-of-way before a roadway is taken into the county.

Commissioners were informed that Hicks would meet with some eight property owners along the right-of-way to try and reach an agreement.

Judge Johnson said the roadway must be brought up to county standards before the county will maintain the roadway.
