Callahan County Junior Livestock Show February 15-17

For the past 55 years, the students in Callahan County schools have had an opportunity to show their lambs, swine, poultry, steers, and rabbits in competition in hopes of being selected as Grand Champion in their division.

According to local historian, Jack Scott, the first Callahan County Junior Livestock Show was held not at the present show barn area, but right on Main Street in Cross Plains in 1935. At that time, V.A. Underwood (originally from Coleman) was the Ag teacher at C.P. He remained at Cross Plains until O.B. Edmondson took over.

During those early years, lambs, steers and chickens were shown. Steers were provided by local ranchers such as the McDermott families. The steers were usually herefords weighing about 850 lbs. and were short and stocky as compared to the taller, longer, and leaner steers that are shown today.

The busy weekend actually starts on Thursday, February 15, when all the animals will be officially weighed and checked in at the show grounds. The schedule for the various competitions is as follows:

Steve Carriker Met With Area Educators

There was a group of about 50 people at the educator's meeting with Senator Steve Carriker which was held in Cross Plains on Monday, February 12. It did allow those present a chance to ask questions and voice opinions concerning education.

Mr. Larry Crawford, a Uniserve representative of Texas State Teachers' Association (TSTA), served as moderator for the meeting, which covered a variety of topics.

During the nearly 2 hour session, the discussion ranged from special education, elementary school curriculum, more local on-site decision making for the teachers, the power of the Texas Education Agency (TEA), teacher appraisals, the career ladder, salary increases, health insurance, and equalization of school funding.

Senator Carriker explained that the most pressing issue before the legislature at this point is the equalization of school funding. The courts have ordered the legislature to come up with a plan that would equalize the funding for public school from district to district, and school to school.

He explained the 5 different proposals that will be discussed during the special legislative session set to begin on February 27. The legislature has until April 15 to decide on a plan which will affect every school in the state. Related to this equalization idea, the senator explained the 5 different proposals that will be under study as to how to equalize school funding.

The power of TEA was another important issue discussed. You'll recall that Cross Plains ISD just went through a rather harsh audit by TEA. Other schools voiced similar concerns about the ultimate authority that TEA has and that the majority of TEA policy making is not improving education, but causing many problems.

Senator Carriker explained that it is the elected state school board that has the authority over TEA and that a campaign should be started by educators and other concerned citizens to contact the board members with concerns and opinions.

Health insurance for state employees in education was also a topic that was a priority among the teachers. They are the only state group of employees that is not under some form of state funded health insurance program.

In another monetary issue, teachers also voiced their concern over the lack of consideration by the legislature concerning salary increases. Even with this year's raise, Texas teachers are still paid below the national average. One concern of the educators was that they are the only profession in which you reach a certain number of years in the profession and the salary increases stop.

Senator Carriker did point out though that although he and many other legislators support the idea of equalization of funding, raising

teacher salaries, and providing a health insurance plan, they are all going to cost a great deal of money...money that has yet to be raised and from what source has yet to be determined.

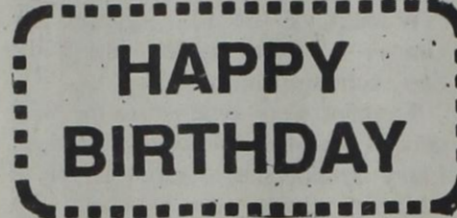
Along this line, the senator discussed several possibilities ranging from a state lottery, increased gasoline tax, increased sales tax, increased "sin" tax, tax on out of state consumers, a restructuring of the corporate franchise tax, and a state income tax.

He asked for a show of hands on each one. There was a split vote on the state lottery, increased gasoline tax and increased sales tax. A definite "yes" was expressed on an increased "sin" tax on alcohol and cigarettes and the out of state consumers tax, and the restructuring of corporate franchise tax. There was a definite "no" on the issue of a state income tax.

The controversial Career Ladder was also an issue that the majority of the teachers felt the same about. Most teachers would like to see the system eliminated for a multitude of reasons. The senator has already introduced legislation to this effect, but he emphasized the importance of educators contacting their congressmen and let them know how they feel.

Another important issue from the teachers' point of view was the issue of "on-site decision making" which would allow those that are teaching more voice at the local level concerning the actual operation of the school. Senator Carriker said that that is something that should be taken up on the local level with the local school boards.

At the end of the meeting, the teachers turned in a 2-page form in which they could write down their opinions concerning these and other issues. The local TSTA members will then summarize the material and forward the results along with all the forms to not only Senator Carriker, but all other state representatives and senators.

Local musicians and bands from around the Big Country area will gather at the Cottonwood Community Center in Cottonwood on Friday, February 16, for the Cottonwood Musical.

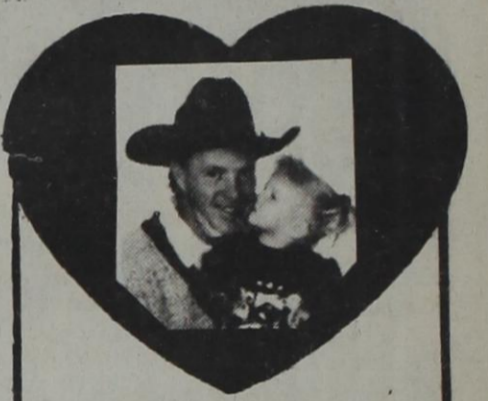
Live musical entertainment begins at 7 p.m. with "Smoky" Callaway as the emcee for the evening.

Few Tax Form Changes For Taxpayers

There are only a few changes to the 1989 tax forms that taxpayers will use between January 1 and April 16, 1990, to file their tax returns. They are, in brief:

- There are now two lines on the 1040 and 1040A federal tax forms to include both spouses' full names for married couples filing jointly;
- A single line has been added to Schedule 1 of Form 1040A and to

Form 2441, "Child and Dependent Care Expenses," for taxpayers claiming child care expenses to enter their child care provider's taxpayer identification numbers as required by law; and

- Revisions were made to Form 2106, "Employee Business Expenses" to reflect changes in the law regarding reimbursements and other expense allowance changes.

has whitewall tires.

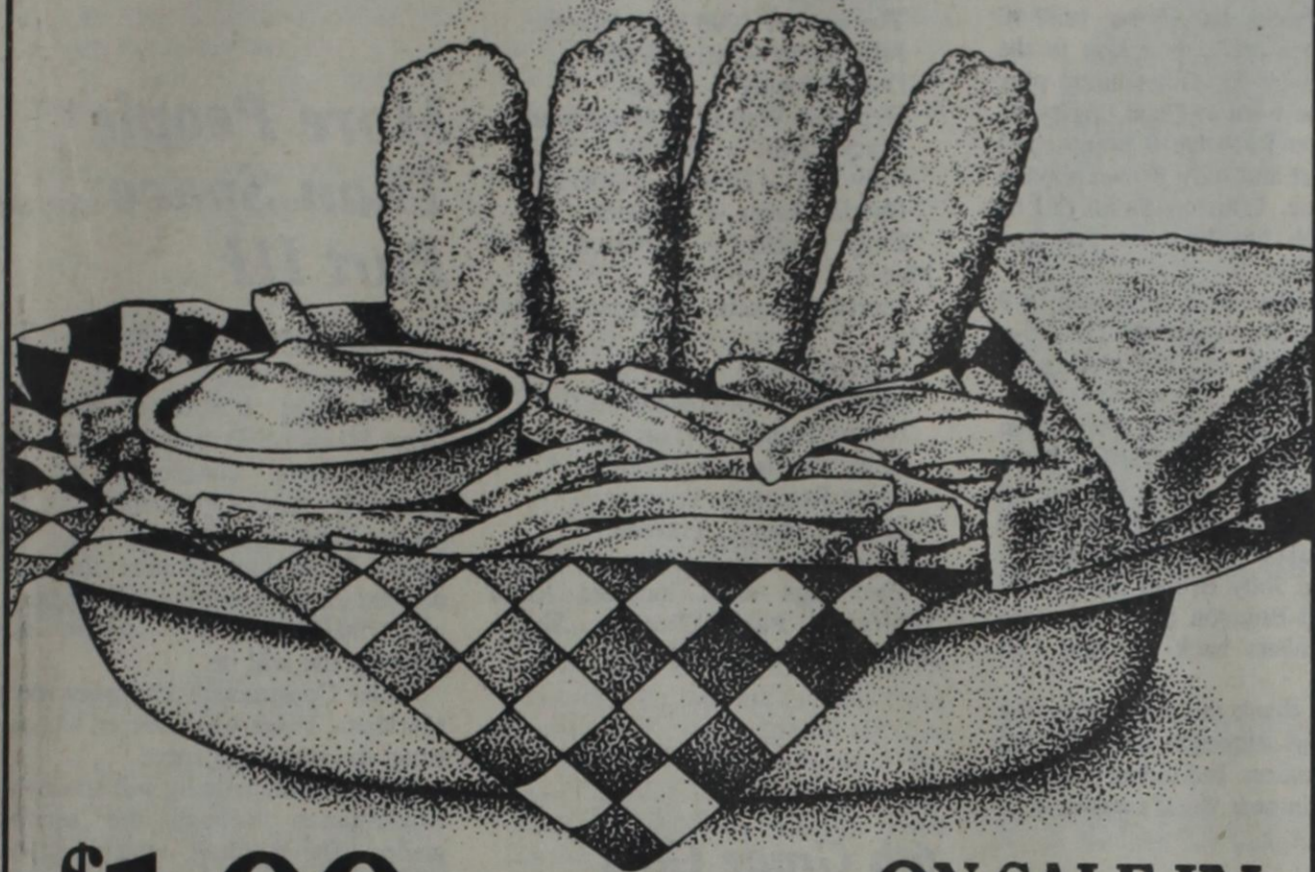
When he says he needs the money, he means he found a better car.

Remember Our Feathered Friends

For birds to survive they must have cover, food, and water.

Cover — Birds of this area need cover for protection from year round weather, such as wind breaks, dried grasses in fence rows and buildings, such as barns. Birds also like hen houses where birds can sleep, also pecking grain in the feeders.

Food — Birds like eating grain on the ground. Snow is no problem, as they like eating in the snow. Feeders can be hung from trees a few feet from the ground. Birds learn where feeders are placed and keep a daily routine.

Different types of feeders attract birds, such as berries, sunflower seed, hen scratch, nuts and thistle seed are a few.

Water — Water is best when on or near the ground. A dripping faucet is better than a birdbath. If using a birdbath, it should be in the open so cats cannot ambush a wet bird. Water is the most important factor in attracting birds.

Stenholm Promotes Use Of Rural Areas In Airport Overcrowding

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) today submitted testimony to the Subcommittee on Aviation, encouraging the group to consider using rural areas as a way to fight airport overcrowding.

Stenholm told the group that an increased demand on current airports must be improved through expansion, modernization and the implementation of various efficiencies at existing airports. He suggested the idea of wayports (rural transfer airports) be explored as an additional way to alleviate existing congestion at the major hub airports.

"The wayport concept is an integrated system approach for dramatically increasing airport and airway system capacity quickly and inexpensively," Stenholm testified. "Basically, the concept proposed developing several regional transfer airports strategically positioned in underused airspace and in rural areas where land costs and environmental impact would be minimal. These airports would represent a tremendous economic boom for the surrounding rural communities and hence avoid the popular opposition which so complicates expansion of our nation's metropolitan airports. The wayports would serve as regional air transportation collection and distribution centers for passengers, cargo and mail."

Stenholm testified that the number of commercial air passengers has increased from 267 million passengers in 1978 when the Airline Deregulation Act took effect to 476 million in 1988.

According to the FAA, in 1987 the 21 major hub airports experienced 20,000 or more total hours of air carrier delay, which amounted to a loss of between 4 and 6 billion dollars.

The Congressman said wayports would provide an inexpensive means of addressing current capacity strains on the system in two ways. First, it would divert considerable transfer traffic from existing hubs permitting increasing numbers of originating and departing passengers to use these facilities without costly expansion. Second, the low land costs, limited and inexpensive ground facility needs of a transfer airport, along with community support of the wayport would permit rapid and inexpensive increases in existing airport capacity.

"My personal belief is that we should develop a national strategy to provide sufficient capacity since capacity constraints not only limit travel options and create delays, but are anti-competitive in a deregulated environment," said Stenholm.

Stenholm is co-sponsor of H.R. 1638, the Wayport Development Act, which calls for the establishment of a revolving loan fund for the development of wayports and the establishment of a commission to propose areas suitable for the location of wayports.

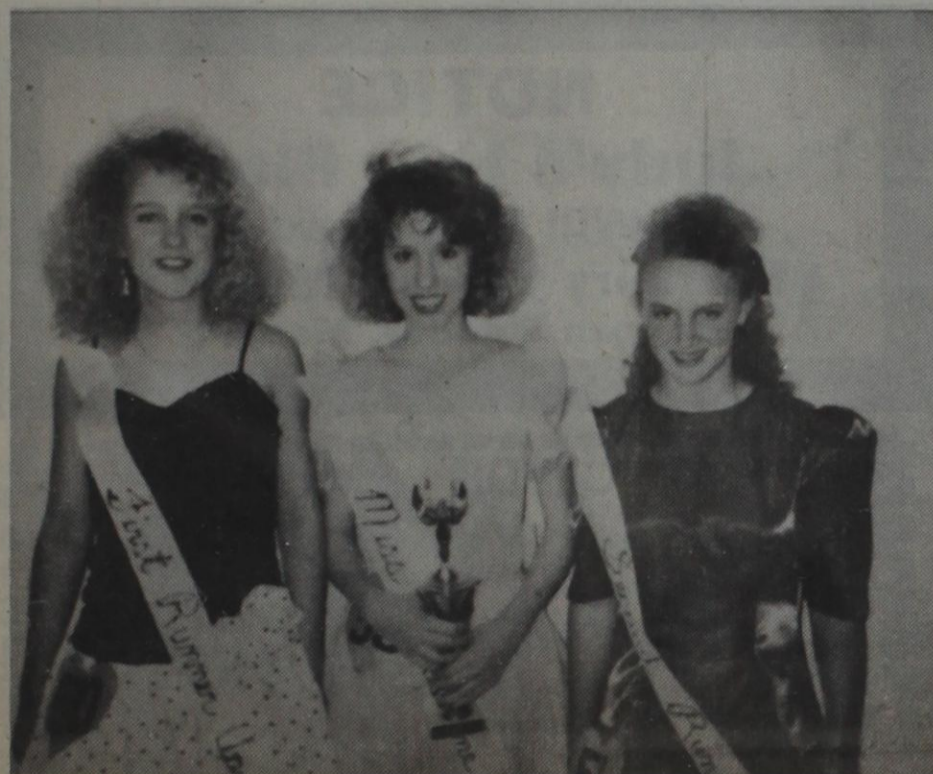

1/2 cup orange juice
1 cup mashed bananas (3 very ripe medium bananas)
3 tablespoons honey
1/3 cup vegetable oil
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs, beaten until frothy
1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon grated orange peel
1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
Combine oat bran and orange juice;

set aside for 30 minutes. Mix together mashed bananas, honey, oil, vanilla and beaten eggs. Stir into orange juice/bran mixture. Combine dry ingredients, grated orange peel and chopped nuts. Mix into banana mixture. Pour batter into 9" x 5" greased loaf pan. Bake in 350° F oven for 55 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack for 10 minutes; remove from pan and cool completely on rack.

Preproductive Cost Deductions Vary

Farmers on a cash accounting basis should capitalize on both direct and indirect costs of raising plants that will take more than two years to produce income, or include these costs in their inventories.

Some exceptions to this advice from the IRS are that this does not apply to trees that do not bear fruits, nuts or other crops, or ornamental trees (ornamental trees do not include evergreens that are more than six years old at the time of cutting). Also, growers of pistachio trees may elect not to capitalize preproductive costs.

More information can be obtained from free IRS Publication 225, *Farmer's Tax Guide*, available by using the order blank in the IRS tax return package or by calling toll-free, 1-800-424-3676.

Some Farm Trucks Exempt From Highway Use Tax

Agricultural vehicles used on public highways for 7,500 miles or less per year may be exempt from the Federal Heavy Vehicle Use Tax.

Some of the criteria necessary to be exempt from this tax are: more than half of the vehicle's use is for farming purposes; it is registered as a motor vehicle used for farming; and a tax statement, Form 2290, "Heavy Vehicle Use Tax Return," must be filed.

If, while the tax is suspended, the vehicle is used on public highways for more than 7,500 miles, the owner is liable for the tax for the entire tax period or part of the period for which the vehicle is used. However, if a farm truck on which "use tax" already has been paid is used less than 7,500 miles on public highways, the owner may



claim a credit for the tax. For details, obtain free IRS Publication 349, *Federal Highway Use Tax on Heavy Vehicles*, available by using the order blank in the tax package or by calling the IRS toll-free, at 1-800-424-3676.

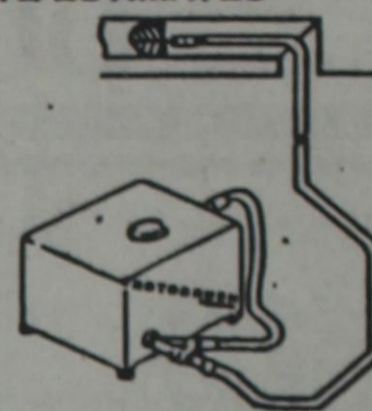

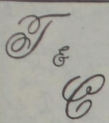

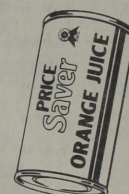
