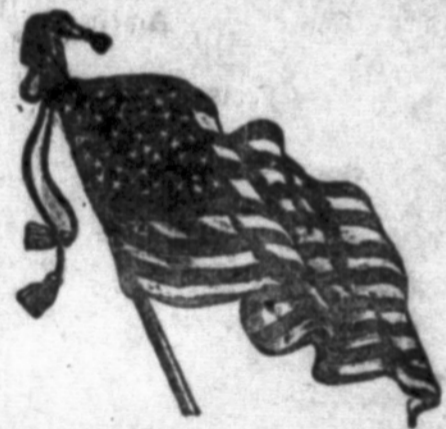

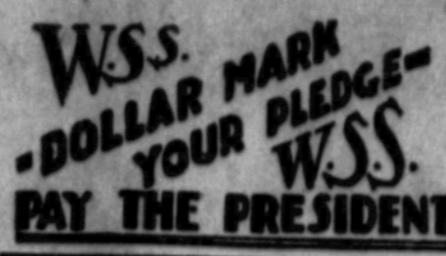

In buying bonds and helping charities one should buy and systematically according to his financial ability. A committee of members of New York have figured out about what families drawing certain incomes should do in both cases. The income should be figured upon an average year, and not what we are making during this month.

According to the Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo the man who refuses to do his duty in this world crisis will have poor chance for salvation in the next world. That looks to be a very reasonable deduction. A Christian that expects to make his calling and election sure that will not do his bit in this terrible hour is woefully wrong in his convictions or derelict in his duty.

That the cotton crop is a failure in this country is well known to be commented on. Something more than two hundred bales have been weighed at the local yard with every little more to come. Prior to Sept. 25th Callahan county had ginned 429 bales against 2,145 bales to the same date last year. Brown has a credit of 714 bales against 2,336 last year, and Coleman, the poorest record of all, has only 195 against 7,932. Eastland has 1,510 as compared to 3,165 last year. The sand is doing better since the dry weather is affecting conditions.

We did in some measure our duty in subscribing to the fourth Liberty Loan. It is now again our privilege to help in the charity end of the war—the Y. M. C. A., Knights of Columbus, the Jewish Welfare Board, Y. W. C. A., War Camp Community Service, American Liberty Association, Nation Catholic War Council and the Salvation Army. The Red Cross is not represented in this work. The Nation is to be called upon to donate 170 million dollars to be used by these seven organizations. Every man will be expected to give as he is able. Let every one do his part. A few can not afford to do your part.

The consolation of having done in some measure your duty is all the thanks you need for buying Liberty Bonds, unless you bought to a point where it entailed a real sacrifice. St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 28.—A call for 1,500 women between the ages of 25 and 45 years to serve as nurses aid in American military hospitals in France has been issued through the Red Cross by U. S. Surgeon-General Ireland. Many are wanted from the Southwest. Transportation to and from France and \$30 and maintenance

while there will be paid. Training, ten days in theory and thirty days of eight hours each in hospital, will be required. Those who wish to volunteer for this service should make application to the nearest Red Cross chapter.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 28.—In the first six months of 1918 the American Red Cross spent \$2,110,686 in supplementing the efforts of the United States government to care for American fighting men in training in camps and cantonments in this country. The work calls for an appropriation of \$2,475,000 for the remainder of the year. The department of Military Relief, through which the Red Cross does this important work, has 700 canteens on railroads lines and at embarkation points from which traveling soldiers are given food and drink. The canteens are manned by 55,000 women volunteers.
