

"Come Saturday"

Like a spectre, the memory of a special person, long in the grave, can arise and rumble through one's mind as if it were yesterday; sweeping the dust of the past aside, revealing a vivid and vibrant personality. To me Ira Loving was such a man, and I'd like to tell you why.

Away back in 1943 I was the new kid on the block, and the stick horse I rode was fast, lean, and a wee bit green. Checking out the condition of the range (neighborhood), we were on a dead run circling the block and whinnying and bucking as we pulled up to the new corral (home) to get a bucket of oats (dinner).

Across the street sat an old man in a wheel chain, applauding and laughing at my childish actions. Perhaps, he was remembering his own childhood, for tears of joy were welling up in his eyes and streaming down onto the little quilt covering his small lap.

Riding that wooden dun over to his house, I lit on his porch and instantly inquired, "What's your name, mister?"

"Boy," he responded quickly in a wonderful, heart-warming way, "my name is Ira Loving." Reaching out to shake my hand, the quilt silently fell from his lap and revealed himself to be a man without legs. Stricken into momentary silence, I stumbled backward, being somewhat alarmed and dumbfounded because of his missing legs. Alas! the childish question shot out from the tip of my tongue; and it was simple, direct, and rude. "How'd you lose your legs, sir?" Ira gave an immediate gesture of surprise by holding his hands over his mouth; and his eyes began a roaming search. He wheeled his chair all around his porch, looking to-and-fro, seemingly, for his long lost legs. Even though I had been so surprisingly impertinent, facing me and looking deadlevel into my eyes, Ira mustered a warm and friendly smile. And he told it like this: "Didn't lose 'em, boy. Had 'em removed.'' "Why?" Polite behavior had been completely forsaken. Looking at my stick horse from head to toe, and quickly settling his soft gaze upon me, he replied, "So's I'd never be accused of being a cattle rustler. That's why!" And he laughed and laughed; then, he laughed again and again. He grinned, and with his pale hand, he blessed me and the warm summer wind, letting it be known that his answer was a very private joke. There was still humor in his red. misty eyes, and we laughed together and shook hands for almost an endless time. It was right there, our first meeting, that I became a friend of the legless man with the musical laugh and red, misty eyes. Knowing nothing of his long, drawn-out struggle for life, I wanted to ask him about the "whys" and "wherefores" that had brought him down to such a state as this. In his red, misty eyes I saw not self-pity or anger because of some unjust fate. No! There was life! Yet, I wanted to know if he felt robbed "Boy," my expression must have betrayed me, "life has not defeated me. Why! I've only been de-feeted! Come Saturday," he continued, "how'd you like to push me to town?" Saturday, at that time, was the most exciting time of the week, for Main Street was swarming with people like a beehive. And seeing Ira make new friends and renew old acquaintances was a heart rendering delight. If there happened to be anyone with a swollen pride, Ira, with his words of encouragement and laughter, could set you aglow and melt your heart down

Ticks Are A **Growing** Problem

The tick problem is continuing to cause various diseases and illness throughout the Callahan County area. An infestation of ticks can cause great discomfort to a dog, contribute to generalized skin problems, create anemia leading to the death of the dog and pose a serious threat by transmitting diseases from infected to non-infected dogs.

Tick-borne diseases have been diagnosed with increasing frequency in the last few years. With the spread of these diseases into new areas, including the infection of humans, the frequency of their diagnosis is expected to continue to increase. Suspicious dogs should be tested so that infected dogs can be treated to eliminate the reservoir of the disease and prevent its spread to other dogs.

Eventhough we are seeing these new tick-borne problems, the most common complication in our area is severe infestation resulting in anemia and occasionally death.

If dogs become infested with ticks they should be dipped, sprayed or powdered as frequently as recommended to kill the ticks. If dogs have access only to a limited area, a tick eradication program should be followed in that area to eliminate ticks that may be harboring the disease organisms. All label instructions on any dip, spray or powder should be strictly followed for safety and effectiveness.

Your veterinarian will be able to help you with a disease control and tick elimination program.








Environment. That word has become a trigger word. We all are supposed to pay close attention and then demand action, without thinking for ourselves. Above all, we must not think

And all those dire "catastrophes" that they claim are about to overcome us. Acid rain. "Greenhouse" effect. Global warming. Global cooling. Ozone depletion. Overpopulation. All these have also become trigger words.

Profits must be cut. And most important of all, taxes must be raised. We have just endured an Earth Day extravaganza. We are being condition-ed to demand that controls be impos-ed, that government do something.




Heartworms In Dogs

Heartworms in dogs in Callahan County has become more prevalent during recent months. Cats are rarely affected. Dogs with canine heartworm disease can show a variety of symptoms. Infected animals may tire easily and be short of breath. Their physical condition may deteriorate and dogs often have a persistent cough and abnormal heart sounds. Life span is often shortened in untreated dogs which are severely or even moderately infected. Because heartworms normally live in the pulmonary artery and heart, they can block blood flow. Some dogs that have shown little or no signs of the disease may collapse and die following strenuous exercise. Some mildly infected dogs may show no symptoms at all and live an apparently normal life.

Heartworms cannot be transferred directly from one dog to another, but must spend part of their life cycle in one of 30 different species of mosquitoes. The adult heartworm in the dog produces immature heartworm forms called microfilariae which move throughout the circulatory system and can be passed to a mosquito ingesting blood from the dog. The microfilariae develop into infective larvae in the mosquito in 10-14 days and can then infect another dog bitten by the mosquito. After the dog has been infected, 2-4 months are required for the larvae to develop in the muscle and subcutaneous tissue and to migrate to the heart. The life cycle is completed in another 2-3 months when the heartworms become sexually mature.

Consult with your veterinarian before implementing any type of heartworm control problem. Some risks are involved in the prevention and treatment of canine heartworm disease. There are relatively inexpensive preventive drugs available to be used before and during the mosquito season. While this drug may be recommended for non-infected dogs, it can be hazardous to dogs already infected if there are large numbers of the microfilariae. Any drugs used in heartworm prevention or treatment must be used under the direction and supervision of a veterinarian. If detected early enough canine heartworm disease can usually be successfully treated. Emphasis should be toward the prevention of heartworms. This area will likely become as heavily infested as the eastern and southern parts of Texas if control measures are not implemented. A hard winter will help on the persistent mosquito problem, but there is no substitute for prevention.
