SCHOOLS DESIRING STATE AID

During the next two years the state will distribute two million dollars annually among schools desiring aid in order to run their schools six or more months. To be eligible to receive this money schools must meet the following minimum requirements:
Vote a 50 cents on the \$100 school tax.
Construct state plan school buildings, or remodel old houses according to state instructions.
Provide state approved room for teachers.

During the last four years three million dollars have been given to the state three or four schools in this state, and about 25 schools in Callahan County have received more than \$40,000, and the state is very gratifying, for those schools now rank "First Class" in

the state and county classification schools. The majority of these districts voted school bonds to do this improvement.
Several districts have already voted bonds in order to qualify for aid this year and many other districts have requested the County Judge to order elections to be held soon. All other schools desiring to secure some of this state money should begin to get plans under way at once to meet the requirements and place their applications with the state as soon as possible. Application blanks will be sent to County Superintendents about the 15th of June and distributed among schools.

If your school needs a better house and more room equipment, and your patrons wish to make a sacrifice in spending a little more money in providing a better school building, this state aid appropriation will afford your district a splendid opportunity to "put over the proposition." BONDS CARRY FOUR TO ONE BIG SUPPRISE TO EVERYBODY

In the election on Saturday to decide whether precinct No. 4 of Callahan County should issue bonds for \$150,000 for the purpose of building macadam roads, an overwhelming majority was in favor of good roads. The vote for the bonds was 211 for and against 53. The most nearly unanimous vote for the bonds was at Atwell, where twenty-one voted aye and only one nay. The only box deciding against the bonds was at Caddo Peak, where the vote stood nine against and seven for. Cross Plains came after Atwell in favoring the good road movement, 119 voting for, and only seventeen against the issue. Dressy registered fourteen for and four against. Cottonwood voted 56 for, and 22 against. On account of farmers being so far behind with their work, a great many failed to come to the polls to vote, doubtless more than two thirds majority of those remaining at home being in favor of the bonds. All in all, it was a great victory for good roads and progress. It was the most progressive vote ever polled in the precinct, as well as the most unanimous on any question where there is a big chance for a division of sentiment.

It will be some time before the bonds can be sold and the matter of building the roads taken up. The thing now to do is to see that we get the very best roads possible with the money and that we get all the State and Federal aid possible.

PILOT OF MAIL AIRPLANE LEAPED TO HIS DEATH

Hundreds of persons saw Frank McCusker of New York, pilot of a mail airplane, leap 200 feet to his death from a burning machine at Cleveland, Ohio, Sunday. The cause of the accident is not known.

Witnesses saw puffs of black smoke come from the rear of the De Havilland. When the machine was at a height of between three and four hundred feet, McCusker was seen to climb from his seat to the framework. Then the machine plunged and the pilot leaped. The machine flew forward 200 yards before it plunged to the ground. McCusker formerly was an instructor at a Texas aviation field.

For New School Building at Dressy

County Superintendent Settle met with the trustees of the school at Dressy on Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of preparing to vote bonds for a new modern school building. It was decided to start a petition calling for an election to vote on \$2,800 school bonds for the erection of a three-room school building, to be modern in every respect. A tax of 50 cents or as much as is necessary for the maintenance of the school will be voted on to take care of the bonds. The election will be held the first Saturday in July and will doubtless carry. Mr. Settle says this will wind up the poor school buildings in this part of the county, except Victoria. Dressy has never been eligible for state aid, and she is doing this in order to get help, and to keep abreast of the times in providing for the education of the coming boys and girls. We are glad indeed to see the community take this step forward.

CANNOT LEASE PUBLIC HIGHWAY FOR DRILLING

According to a recent decision of the Civil Court of Appeals the leasing of the Public Highway in Callahan County to an oil drilling concern, made by the County Commissioners about two months ago, is illegal.

County roads or highways in Texas cannot legally be leased for other other mineral development purposes, according to the decision handed down Saturday in the Second Court of Civil Appeals in which the action of the District Court of Wichita County was sustained in the case of C. H. Clark et al. vs. F. R. Boone et al.

The case developed a few weeks ago when the County Commissioners of Wichita County leased the highways for oil development on a cash bonus and royalty basis. The lessees erected a derrick on a highway in the oil belt and began to erect machinery in place for drilling. Clark and ninety-eight other citizens of the county brought suit for a restraining order against the County Commissioners and the lessees to prevent the drilling. The injunction was granted and the case was appealed to the high court with the result that the highways of Wichita county will not be used to drill oil wells in un-

der the present decisions should be reversed by the higher court. The decision it is declared that there is no law providing for such a lease, even though the lessees of the highways might have secured the fee title of the highway on the highway be-

fore the County Commissioners are given the right of jurisdiction over the highway, it is pointed out, by legislative action, but that does not mean they have the right to lease or have them used for other than community Welfare Purposes Originally intended.

The plaintiffs in the suit claimed that by drilling in the highway the defendants were endangering the lives of the citizens of the county in that teams might be frightened and that gas escaping from the well might become ignited from passing automobiles and do great damage. Again it is claimed that the rig erected obstructed travel, which was unlawful under the statute providing supervision of roads by the Commissioners Court, which gives them considerable responsibility for their upkeep, maintenance or abandonment. The plaintiffs alleged that the law might provide for that, but that it did not provide that they might ignore public need in permitting obstruction to travel and that where condemnation proceedings were not had the county did not own the roadway title in fee. Under the decision a road can not be drilled by a person owning the land through which the road passes if it has been acquired for public roadway purposes which are deemed necessary for community welfare and travel.

It was understood that several counties in Texas were planning to lease their roads through the oil fields when the suit was brought in Wichita County. From all reports action was withheld pending the outcome of the Wichita controversy. The decision means an end of drilling on highways for either oil or gas where the roads are needed for transportation and cannot be abandoned legally.

FARMERS TO GET PRICE ASSURED BY GOVERNMENT

Farmers will get the guaranteed price for wheat even though the price goes down, as predicted in a recent dispatch from New York, which carried the news that Julius H. Barnes, wheat director, had issued a statement to the effect that it was almost certain that there would be a drop.

H. B. Dorsey, secretary of the Texas Grain Dealers' Association, states that the reference to the lowering of the price does not mean that the figure will go under the government's fixed price, but that it forecasts a decrease in what the millers are now paying for the product—around \$2.88 per bushel. Wheat of the 1919 crop delivered at Galveston will be paid for at the rate of \$2.28 per bushel and even should the price go under this, the producer has a contract

with Uncle Sam to get at least that much. In the opinion of Dorsey the price of Texas, Oklahoma and Southern Kansas wheat will be above the return guaranteed by the government.

Any way the matter is figured, Dorsey says there is no chance for the grower to get less than the price agreed on.

Mrs. J. W. Wesley.

Mrs. Laura Wesley, wife of J. W. Wesley of Cross Plains, died suddenly at her home at 5 A. M. Tuesday morning and was laid to rest in the family cemetery at Burkett on Wednesday afternoon. Elder J. M. Harlow conducting the funeral services. Mrs. Wesley had been in poor health for some years, having been to Dallas and other points a few months ago for medical treatment. Death resulted from heart failure, it is thought. She was apparently in good spirits, and had interested herself particularly in preparing for the return of her daughter, Miss Ophelia, who was expected to arrive from Denton on Tuesday. She arose, lighted a lamp, and returned to bed. Mr. Wesley and Grandma Henderson, who was visiting the family, hearing her struggling, came to her bed and found her dying.

The family are pioneers of the country, having lived in Coleman County, near Burkett, from 1879 to 1913, at which time they moved to Cross Plains. Mrs. Wesley was born April 27, 1855, in Madison County, Texas. She has been a member of the church since young womanhood, and was a good woman, a kind neighbor and devoted mother.

She leaves her husband, J. W. Wesley, and four sons and three daughters living, and three children dead, A. P. Wesley of Cleburne, B. D. and A. K. of Burkett, and Eugene, who is in the U. S. Navy, stationed in North Chicago. The daughters are Mrs. Mary Helms of Fisher County, Miss Ophelia Wesley of Cross Plains, who is teaching at Denton, and Mrs. Myrtle Crocker of Burnet.

All the living children except Eugene were present at the funeral. We join the many friends of the family in expressing our sympathy in their sorrow.

OFFICERS RECOVER MULES STOLEN FROM RANGER

Deputy Sheriff S. W. Henson and Joe Cates of Coleman, spent Tuesday night in Cross Plains. They were enroute to Ranger with two mules, alleged to have been stolen by Jim Crossland from a contractor at Ranger and found near Coleman. Crossland was also located and arrested near Coleman, but in a different neighborhood from where the mules were recovered. He was placed in the Coleman County jail Tuesday night, but it is presumed he has been removed to the Eastland County jail by this time.

Another party, whose name we failed to learn, who was employed as corral or team boss by the owners of the stock, is alleged to have been implicated in getting away with the mules. He did not accompany the man who was found with the mules and was arrested at Ranger immediately after their disappearance. According to information by Deputy Sheriff Henson, Crossland, after his arrest, admitted to the theft and in his statement implicated the other party as assisting him to procure the stock from the corral and escape with them from Ranger, which occurred about 4 o'clock last Friday morning. According to Crossland's confession, we are informed by Mr. Henson, he was to have sold the mules at Cisco, return to Ranger and pay the corral boss \$180 for the part he played in the operation. Crossland, with the stolen mules, it is stated, passed through Cross Plains a day or two after the theft.

They were an exceptionally fine pair of mules, and it is stated the owners had refused a price of \$1500 for them. The owners, Henson Bros., had offered a reward of \$500 for the recovery of the mules and \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the thieves. Deputy Sheriff Henson and Mr. Cates will receive both rewards if the party whom they arrested is convicted.

M. J. MANNING KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE AT EL PASO

Marion J. Manning, who formerly resided with his family at Cross Plains, and was engaged in the restaurant business was struck and killed by an automobile at El Paso last week. Mr. Manning was a member in good standing of the Odd Fellows Lodge at Cross Plains and they were notified of his death. In an El Paso paper we find the following particulars of the accident.

One man is dead and one badly hurt and two others are suffering slight injuries from two automobile accidents which occurred. One Wednesday night and the other Thursday morning.

Marion J. Manning, 52 years old, 2919 Ore street, was struck and fatally injured by a service car driven by C. H. Greenwood, Fort Bliss Boulevard, near Dyer street at 11:45 o'clock Wednesday night.

Mr. Manning died at Repton Hospital at 6:15 o'clock Thursday morning. John A. Biely, 24 years old, 3915 Trowbridge street, received cuts about the head and hands, and another boy received slight injuries when the automobile in which they were riding plunged into the side of a viaduct near the smelter. Greenwood was arrested on Thursday on a warrant charging negligent homicide, by J. P. Cates, a deputy constable. He was immediately released, however, on his own recognizance, to await the result of an inquest which will be held late this afternoon by coroner A. J. Hall.

According to Greenwood, the street car on which Manning was working stopped in the middle of a block as it was turning toward the city. Greenwood, driving in the same direction,

"I was driving behind him," he said, when it suddenly and Manning ran across toward Mothers Kitchen. He intended buying a lunch, but in the middle of a block he did not expect him to stop or get out of the car. I tried to stop, but avoid hitting him but the pavement was wet and car skid, crashing that the rear end struck him, knocking him to the pavement. "A soldier, driving a Dodge, passed and took Manning to the base hospital at Fort Bliss. From there he was removed to Repton hospital."

Attendants at the hospital said Thursday morning that Mr. Manning's death was due to a severe concussion of the brain and a broken clavicle.

SUNSHINE OVERTAKES A COW AND QUITS TRACK

The westbound Sunshine passenger train overtook a cow this side of Strawn Friday night. Evidently the cow was standing still, otherwise the Sunshine Special would never have overtaken and come in contact with her. May be it was a bull in bad humor, looking for something slow and easy. **ARMY AEROPLANE PAYS
 CROSS PLAINS A VISIT**

It was maned by a young lieutenant and a pilot of the regular aviation service and both were groomed de aerial latest fashion. **SPECIAL SESSION

The second special session of the Legislature, to convene the 23rd day of this month, has been called by Governor Hobby. In his proposition he indicates that approximately 100 bills will be the only new ones submitted.

It was vetoed at the last regular session, according to promise of the Governor, be resubmitted for consideration. A bill that live stock commissions be required to furnish will be urged.

To Can Berries.

Following suggestions may be helpful in saving the berry crop.

Wash the berries and wash inside of a vessel. Be

careful not to break the berries. Wash and sterilize the jars by placing them in a vessel of water and allow to boil for a few minutes. Fill the jars with fresh berries, shaking them down gently so as to get the greatest number possible into the jars. Place the jars into a pan of hot water on the back of the stove for eight or ten minutes to allow berries to shrink then add more berries to fill the jar. Place a vessel of crushed berries over the fire and heat to boiling, strain off the juice into a sauce pan, and for every four quarts of juice add one of sugar, bring to a boil and pour into the jar. Fit the rubber in place, fasten the lid loosely and process pint jars 12 minutes, beginning the time after boiling begins. Seal jars and cool.
